

In the State of Texas, an indigent patient is eligible to receive up to \$30,000 per year in health care or to be hospitalized up to 30 days per year whichever occurs first.

Without a hospital, Coleman County would have to contract

indigent care services from Brownwood, Abilene or San Angelo.

Glen D. Bunn, administrator said, The majority of our personnel have not had raises in 3 to 4 years because of our financial situation but our employees have been pa-

tient and understanding. They are the most loyal group of employees I have ever worked with. They love Coleman and Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital."

For instance, a new RN can start out for at least \$5.50 per hour more in Abilene than we pay experienced RNs. Bunn said, "That's loyalty and love for Overall-Morris."

Another "street" question, says Bunn, is, "Why does it take so many employees for Overall-Morris with so few patients?"-

of the Texas Hospital Association Doctor Morris Mann said, "People who are not familiar with hospitals, do not realize that a hospital must be staffed 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days per year. Plus, allowance is made for vacations, holidays and sick time." Doctor Mann said that it takes 4.1 employees to staff one position around the clock." Hospitals staff for 168 hours per week while most businesses staff for 40 hours."





JOHN 3:35-36 "DEAR UN-SAVED PERSON-

"The Father loveth the Son, and hath given all things into his hand. He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life; and he that believeth not the Son shall not see life; but the wrath of God abideth on him.

What will you do with Jesus? Will you state that He never existed? Will you simply say that He was a good man who did good things, like many other good men? Will you say His message is not relevant to our enlightened age? Your decision should not be based on what friends or relatives say or do not say or on your own private concept of heaven or hell. These really, in the final analysis, do not matter! What is important and what will govern your tomorrow in Eternity is what does the Bible say? As a landowner, I feel I am being discriminated against - and I guess this is the bottom line. How can any of you who see physicians in San Angelo, Abilene and Brownwood in good faith be in agreement with this tax.





Central Texas Opportunities, the sponsoring organization for the distributions, has no control over what items are available or the quantity of the items. Allocation of all commodities depends on the availability of food items from the U.S.D.A.

All eligible persons will receive emergency food assistance without regard to race, sex, political beliefs, age, national origin, or handicap. Shut-ins are encouraged to designate an authorized representative to pick up for them. Commodities will be distributed on a first come/ first serve basis.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION AUGUST 10, 1991

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to Juanita Naron are Janera Cagle, hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than children Pat Pollock and Terry \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or as successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.
