## Tax issues before voters on Aug. 10

On June 26, 1991, members of the Coleman County Education District called for an August 10th election on exemptions. Legislators established the county education district system to levy taxes required for schools to receive minimum state funding and to get around a state constitutional provision barring the state from redistributing local property tax.

The Coleman County Education board members are Harold Skelton, Coleman ISD; Billy McCorkle, Novice ISD; Harold Bragg, Panther Creek ISD; and Roddy Dean, Santa Anna ISD.

Most of the June 26 meeting dealt with details of calling the election on three propositions on offering exemptions on property taxes levied by the CED. The first proposition would allow a 20 percent homestead exemption. The second would grant a \$10,000 deduction on homesteads for the disabled or those 65 or older.

The third proposition which board members and superintendents said they opposed, would enable the CED to tax personal property such as cars, trucks, and boats. "It would not be in our best interest to have a 'yes' vote on proposition number three. It's very difficult to administer and it would hurt most of our taxpayers," said Santa Anna superintendent Gerald Brister.

Once voters have decided what exemptions will be available under

the CED property tax, the district will be able to set a tax rate that will be the same for all four districts. Under state laws, the state will determine how much revenue would be generated if a tax rate of 72 cents per \$100 valuation was levied on the property values set by the State Property Tax Board. The CED board then will determine what one tax rate would generate the same amount of revenue required by the state. The CED rate probably will be higher than 72 cents per \$100 valuations.

Following the adoption of the CED tax rate, each of the four component districts will set their own tax rate for the 91-92 school year.

## County MADD Chapter Reports Activities & Plans

Mothers Against Drunk Driving, Coleman County Chapter, held their regular monthly meetings June 3 and July 1 in the First Coleman National Bank Hospitality Room.

The "Keep it a Safe Summer" banners arrived in time to be placed at all county schools except CAP for a short period of time. They later were used at the County 4-H Horse Show, Chamber of Commerce Bass Tournament, Little Miss fund raiser, in front of the court house, in Santa Anna, at the swimming pool, and at the rodeo.

After the resignation of Jeanne Nixon, treasurer, Sue Titsworth was elected to fill that position. Edwina Hopper was elected as State Coordinating Committee Representative Alternate.

A Home decorating and Gift Show was held June 30 with two items earned to be used as fundraisers at the County Fair this year.

The Coleman County Chapter was represented by Edwina Hopper as a Victim Assistant in a trial in Brown County on June 11 which resulted in the conviction of a drunk driver.

Debbie Blackwell, Jodi Salas and Edwina Hopper will be sent to a Court Monitoring Workshop to be held in Abilene July 27.

During the recent Legislative session, HB 499 concerning Social Hosts being held liable for persons they serve alcoholic beverages to was passed. We are not as fortunate in getting the bill for Administrative License Revocation passed. It was killed by the action of only one senator after having passed the House. Members were asked to contact Governor Richards to consider it again in special session since the passage would qualify Texas for \$3.2 million a year for five years in Federal Grant 408 money. Due to this fact, it would come under her requirement of finance bills only. There were 7 bills MADD supported which passed but 11 that failed. Members were asked to contact their legislators expressing their concern over Comptroller John Sharp's budget proposal which

could eliminate the Texas Alcohol and Beverage Commission and turn their responsibilities over to the Department of Public Safety.

## City Council Told Old Sealy Hospital Cleared Of Debris

A report to the City Council at last weeks meeting was that all leftover drug debris had been cleared from the old Sealy Hospital building that had burned quite a few years ago. Apparently old medicinal drugs had been left there through the years after fire destroyed the building creating a hazard. The City had been in contact with the building owner, Dr. Phil Cabanzag, about clearing the building of the debris and boarding up the structure for safety reasons. A citizen's letter had been sent to the EPA and got some results. About two weeks ago, an employee of the owner of the building, a Texas Dept. of Health representative and city officials were on hand to see the drugs removed and buried according to state requirements. The building is now in the process of being boarded up.

In other matters brought up at the meeting on Tuesday evening of last week, Superintendent of Operations, Derriel Warnock, reported that nine water leaks had been repaired during the month of June. He also gave a report on the progress of the sewer farm project. Paper work is still being processed but it is hoped that bids can be called for in about three weeks. Warnock reports that the tracer system for the water department is coming along well. A community development grant application for replacement and repair of water lines and fire hydrants has been refiled.

Police Carlos Torres gave the following police report for the month of June:

No charges filed in municipal court during the month. The Coleman jail was used for a period of two days. The department had two DWI arrests and one for public intoxication. Torres reports he answered calls for 4 family disturbances; three assaults, with charges filed; three harassments; one suspicious person; one suspicious vehicle; three motorist assists; one theft; two violations of City animal codes; one trespassing; one vandalism; two wrecks investigated; one case of criminal mischief; one terroristic threat for which an arrest warrant is awaited; two run-away juveniles.

The next regularly scheduled meeting will be August 5 at 7:00 p.m. in the First Coleman County National Bank Hospitality Room.

## City Council Told Old Sealy Hospital Cleared Of Debris

EMT services were discussed after which Mayor Brock appointed councilmen Danny Kellar and Karen Morris to an "emergency vehicle committee." John Pearce was appointed as a citizen member of the committee. The committee is asked to seek information from other communities regarding their ambulance services and find out what steps are available to the City.

After an executive session, the council reviewed employee contracts and made no decisions at this time. Mr. Warnock declined a salary raise at the present time.

Approval of an amendment to the City Code makes it illegal for any motor vehicle to park within the city limits at any time with the motor running in excess of one hour.

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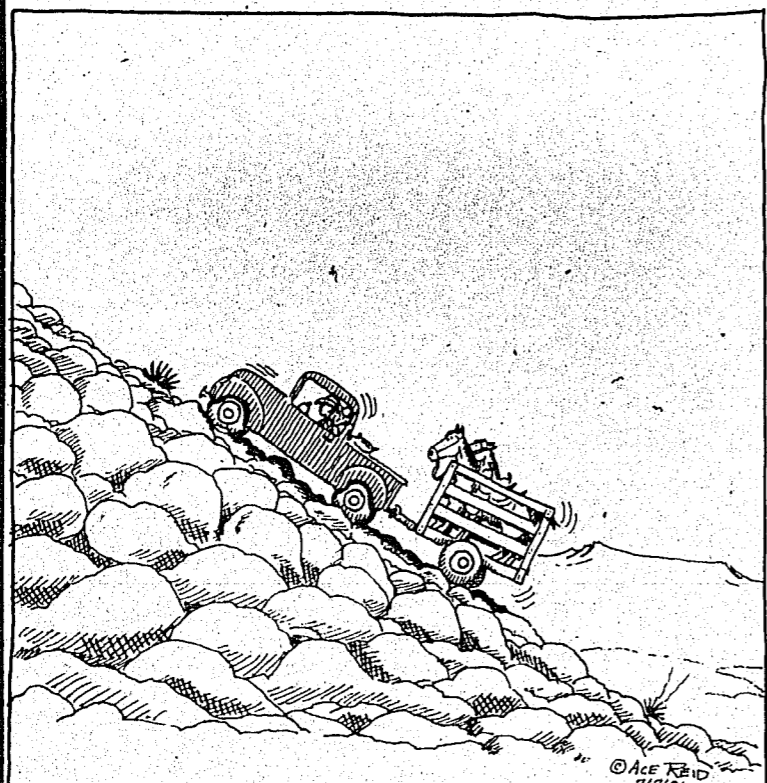

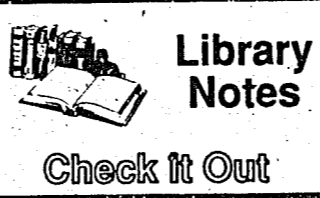

# Plans jelling for new jail

COLEMAN — The blow to Coleman County by the closure of the Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital last Tuesday has been softened by the news last Wednesday that the jail in the city is nearing reality. Plans for a correctional facility in Coleman began in 1989.

Gerald L. Burnett, executive director and general counsel for the WRI Group, the facility agent for Coleman and the developer, said the \$30 million Coleman Law Enforcement Complex and Correctional Facility could hold ground-breaking ceremonies for the 500-bed jail facility in about 60 days. However, a number of details must be resolved including final approval by a New York investment firm.

The loss of 50 jobs that resulted from the hospital closing could be offset with employment possibilities associated with the construction, and again when the facility opens, city officials said.

When completed, the jail will employ 64 correctional officers and 35-40 certified peace officers, as well as an administrative staff. The jail is expected to generate an annual payroll of about \$2 million. Coleman's City Manager Roy McCorkle estimates 100 jobs will be up for grabs during the construction phase and then another 100 when the facility opens its doors. The construction phase should last some 180 days.

"What we are looking for right now are job opportunities," the city manager said, emphasizing that the jail, when in full operation, should generate some \$7.1 million to Coleman's economy.

"This is a city facility that will be the county jail operated by Sheriff Wade Turner. What we really have here is a county jail. The sheriff will move to the new facility. The old one, built around the turn of the century, will close," Burnett said, emphasizing the importance for support of the city, county and the sheriff.

Burnett said the jail will operate exactly as any other county jail. The only difference will be in the method of financing which is a lease-purchase agreement.

At the end of the 20-year term, the jail will be owned by the city and be under the jurisdiction of the Texas Commission on Jail Standards, which oversees all county jails in the state.

Initial inmates will be coming from Harris County and the jail will serve any other county in the state, Burnett said.

The closing of the Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital could have some impact on plans for the jail facility by delaying its construction as authorities study the possible problems caused by the lack of a hospital in the city, he said.

"We could meet medical requirements on site but our preference

would be to have a local hospital. If we do not have one we will have to expand the medical facilities of the jail and implement policies and procedures for taking inmates to nearby hospital," Burnett said. "An ambulance would have to remain permanently on site and we would have to enter agreements with other facilities to provide medical services, such as Lifeline (emergency medical helicopter lifts).

"We have confidence in the people of Coleman finding a successful alternative to reopen the hospital," Burnett said.

The proposed jail is awaiting final approval by the New York investment firm — Kidder-Peabody Co., Inc. The firm will inspect the site next Wednesday and final approval is expected by Aug. 1.

No bonds are being issued to build the jail and the city and county are not liable if prison cells remain empty, Burnett said.

Next year we will be looking forward to our 40th Bullock Reunion.

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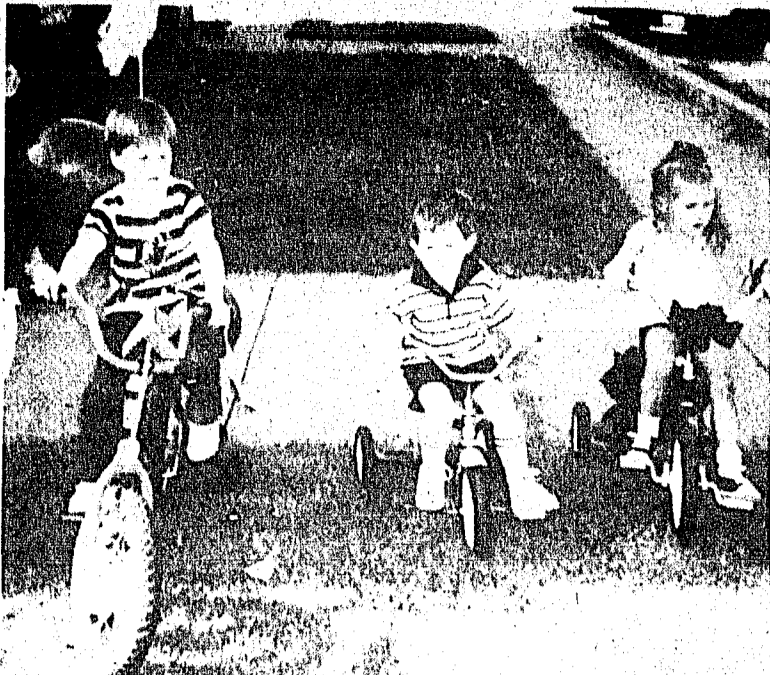

## CAN EMPLOYERS DEDUCT CASH SHORTAGES FROM AN EMPLOYEE'S PAYCHECK?

Dear Commissioner Nabers,

I work in a high-volume retail business. Each of us who cashiers as part of our job duties has a cash drawer from which we make transactions all day. When the drawer is "short," the difference is deducted from our pay. When it is "over," nothing is said and no attempt is made to reconcile the differences. Although I feel this is not right, I am reluctant to question the system for fear of losing my job. Is this legal? What are my options?

D.G., Galveston

Dear D.G.,

You didn't mention whether or not you have signed a written authorization for your employer to make these deductions. If not, the employer is violating a provision of the Texas Payday Law and a claim can be filed at any TEC local office.

You could contact the regional office of the Department of Labor Wage and Hour Division nearest you to find out if these deductions are otherwise lawful. Certain types of deductions for cash or merchandise shortages, uniforms, and tools are legal under the Fair Labor Standards Act, except where they reduce the employee's wages below minimum wage, or reduce the amount of overtime pay due for that pay period.

You probably should confront the employer directly about this policy. It's hard to believe that this could result in your discharge from the job. Merely asking for an explanation of a policy or requesting that you have an opportunity to make sure that any shortages are your fault would not be considered misconduct under our law.

If you ultimately decide that you will no longer accept these deductions and you do quit the job, keep in mind that you will have the burden of proving that you had good work-connected cause for quitting should you file a claim for unemployment benefits. Whether the employer's actions were lawful, or its policies reasonable, and whether you made an attempt to resolve the problem with the employer before quitting, will have a bearing on your case.

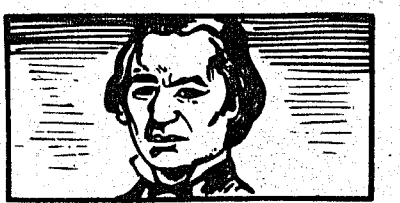

One of these employees has been unable to pass the test required to obtain the new license. I simply have no non-driving positions available at this time. When I let this guy go, will I be penalized by a chargeback to my tax account? I think I'm in a real bind here!

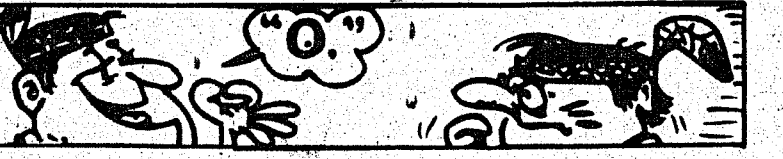
Dear M.P.,

No, the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act protects the employer's tax account from a chargeback if a worker is separated from the job due to a Federal or Texas statute or a Texas municipal ordinance. The situation you have described would fall into this category. Be sure, however, that you point out the reason for termination if the worker files a claim for benefits.
