Coleman Hospital re-opens

COLEMAN — Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital reopened its doors at 7 a.m. Monday, July 22 after a shutdown of 12 days. The 48-bed hospital began receiving patients that morning.

Alisa LeSueur of San Antonio, temporary administrator, said that she was notified Friday evening by Gene Hisey, head of the new board of directors, that the hospital was going to reopen.

"We had been in negotiation stages for two weeks, and I was waiting by the phone to hear the welcome news that we would reopen," she said.

LeSueur explained that the hospital will be reorganized as a non-profit corporation, making it eligible for more state and federal funds, but will be run as a business. The non-profit hospital will be part of a family of the Florida-based Noravex Medical Group.

An apparently pleased LeSueur, who has had 13 years of entrepreneurial experience in reorganizing a failing or closed business, said she was notified of the reopening on her

birthday. "It was a nice birthday present," she quipped.

Approximately 90 percent of the former staff has already been rehired.

Joseph A. Wenzell of Round Rock, has been named administrator and will assume his duties in 30 days.

"We are anticipating renaming the hospital Coleman County Community Hospital," LeSueur said.

"The hospital, which was closed after 67 years, may be the first rural Texas hospital to reopen," she emphasized.

It was closed on July 9 after voters rejected establishing a hospital taxing district that would have levied a property tax of between 25 cents and 30 cents per \$100 valuation.

Hospital administrators asked for tax support to offset a monthly deficit of about \$49,000 caused by small patient loads and unequal Medicare and Medicaid reimbursements.

"We were approached by a concerned citizen of the Coleman community who wanted the hospital to remain open," she said.

The hospital will be self-supporting and taxpayers will not have a tax increase to cover our costs," she said. "We don't expect a problem unless Medicare and Medicaid make radical changes in its reimbursement policies," she said.

The hospital's three proposed programs will include a heavily skilled nursing program for elderly people needing more care than a standard nursing home can provide. Twenty of the facility's 48 beds will be available to those who are admitted for extended stays caused by pivotal or critical stages, LeSueur explained.

The second program, which should be initiated within two months, will provide special advance payment for non-insured expectant mothers.

The third planned program, a well baby clinic, that will handle check-ups for infants, is to be established within 60 days, LeSueur said.

"Everyone around here is ecstatic about our reopening. Now patients can come back here instead of having to drive other area hospitals," LeSueur said.

Ten cases filed in District Court

5. Cause No. 454 — Minor Lee Johnson, Felony DWI, a Class three felony. Mr. Johnson failed to appear and he was granted 15 days before the Court issues an order for his arrest.

6. Cause No. 455 — James Tony Owen, Theft over \$750.00 but less than \$20,000.00, a class three felony. Mr. Owen was ordered to reappear in two weeks for arraignment.

7. Cause No. 457 — Juan Oscar Flores, Felony DWI, a Class three felony. Dana Smith was retained to

represent Mr. Flores.

Highway Dept. may close doors

BROWNWOOD — If a recent audit of state spending drives Texas legislators to cut funding for the Department of Highways and Public Transportation, as many as 50 percent of the department's 24 district offices — one of which is located in Brownwood — could be forced to close their doors.

In his study "Texas Performance Review" released in June, State Comptroller John Sharp suggested a reduction in the number of highway districts from 24 to 12 to curb "duplicative administrative and support positions." By implementing the suggested reduction, it has been estimated that the state could save more than \$21 million annually in fiscal years 1993-1996, with the primary source of savings resulting from reductions in the number of highway department personnel. Sharp's estimates show that on a statewide basis, more than 530 positions could be eliminated from the SDHPT, or some 3.4 percent of the department's total current work force of 15,841 personnel.

Another threat to the number of district office locations, this one in the form of a bill that would lead to the closure of at least six locations, was scheduled for debate Monday in the Texas House of Representatives. The closure provision is included in a bill creating the Texas Department of Transportation which calls for the merger of the highway department with the Texas Department of Aviation. The Texas Turnpike Authority would also be included, according to the legislative proposal penned by Rep. David Cain, D-Dallas. Cain's bill calls for the new transportation department to divide the state into at

least 12 but no more than 18 districts.

Both proposals could deal economic and employment woes to Brown and neighboring counties. Brownwood serves as home base for District 23, which stretches across nine counties — Brown, McCulloch, Coleman, Eastland, Comanche, Stephens, Lampasas, Mills and San Saba. A total of 254 individuals are employed by the district with an annual payroll of \$2.72 million. Some 110 of those positions are filled by residents of Brown County. And although the consolidation measures would not affect the number or location of construction residency offices or maintenance sections according to the comptroller's report, the shutdown of the local office would mean the loss of many jobs, as well as a payroll reduction of approximately \$1.9 million.

Although neither of the reduction proposals mention specific targets of the offered downgrade, cities and communities who play host to each of the 24 district offices appear to be bracing for the worst.

"There is certainly a lot of interest and concern throughout the state," said Byron Blaschke, deputy engineer-director with the highway department in Austin. "Many areas that currently house one of our district facilities, especially some of the smaller communities such as Brownwood, have been especially concerned about it. But no decisions have been made to date."

To draw conclusions at this stage of the process is "presumptuous and premature," he said. "There are so many factors to be considered... that to say smaller districts like Brown-

wood will be targets is somewhat presumptuous at this state.

"To the extent that we are able to do so, our main concern is that we end up with an organized arrangement that will permit us to continue to serve the mobility needs of Texas, as well as serve our employees," Blaschke said. The final decision, however, whether it is ushered in via the Sharp report or through the bill to be eyed this week, will ultimately be up to the legislators.

Meanwhile, local officials are quietly stirring up support for the District 23 office. Brownwood Chamber of Commerce Executive Vice-President Paul Ellsworth appeared before members of the Brown County Commissioners Court recently to request support for the local highway department office. Ed Latta, executive director of the Brownwood Economic Development Corporation (BEDC), has also been voicing concerns on the issue.

"Due to the fact that 80-85 percent of any community's growth comes from within, it's imperative that we concern ourselves... to do whatever we can within our power to preserve those jobs and that payroll, whether it is a public entity or a private entity," said Latta. "It's much more difficult to attract business or industry to a community than it is to maintain existing entities. Your chances of being successful are greater when you can cause growth from within than trying to attract new growth from outside, and it's a lot more economical to preserve what you have than trying to attract new."

The loss of the district office

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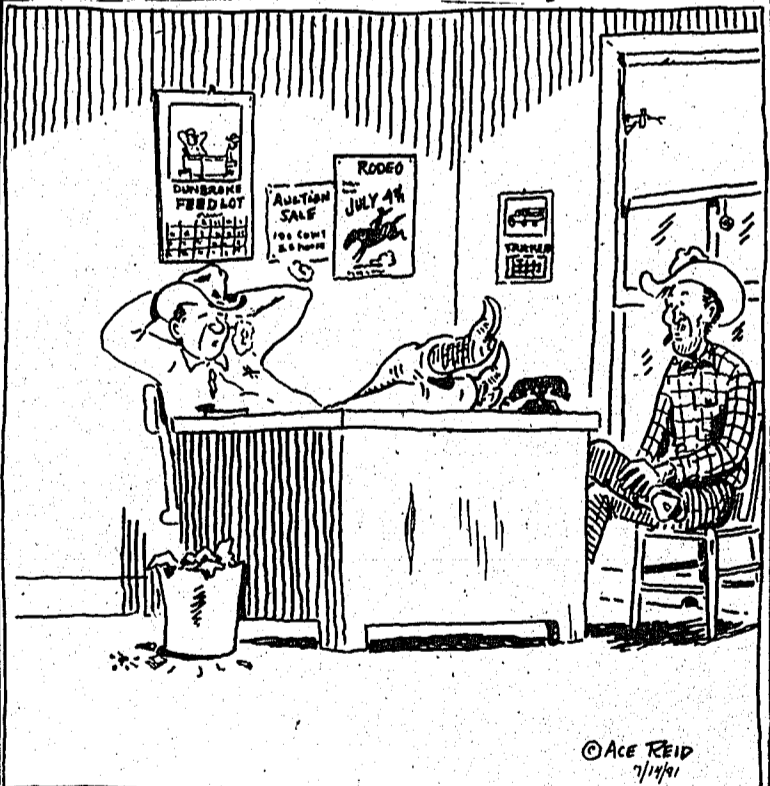

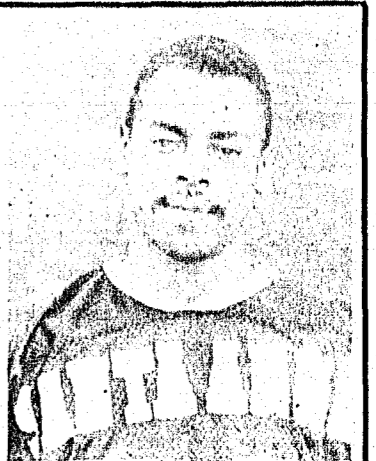

could also cause the Brown County area to suffer from the standpoint that the region would likely not enjoy the "enhanced" attention, particularly in the area of maintenance, currently offered by district personnel.

However, Latta said he believes the District 23 office is likely to be one of the survivors of any legislative action taken on the highway department issue. "There is merit in the fact that this could be one of the 12 remaining offices because of its central location between Waco, Abilene and San Angelo," he said.

In a recent tour of the district facility conducted by the BEDC, local officials viewed all facets of the local office, including accounting, the warehouse operation, the signal operations shop, the sign shop and the mechanics area.
