The election for the creation and operation of a hospital district under the provisions of Article IX, Section 9 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is set for June 29. Absent voting began Monday, June 10., at Mrs. J.A.B. Miller Library building in Coleman. (On the courthouse square). At the last meeting of the hospital board, it was the consensus of the Board that a tax rate of 25¢ to 30¢ per \$100 valuation would need to be set the first year. An actual amount cannot

After stability for the local hospi-


tal has been established, it is hoped that the second year can be lowered with the recruitment of more physicians.

County Considering **Ambulance Tax**

It was standing room only for the June 10 meeting of the Coleman County Commissioners Court. The reason: local health care and ambulance services were on the published agenda. The 10 a.m. meeting recessed for lunch and did not adjourn until after 3 p.m.

The after lunch discussions focused on emergency ambulance service which is currently subsidized in the county budget at the rate of \$60,000 annually. The county cannot continue that subsidy level, and the possibility is real that the cost will go up when the contract is let out for bid in August for another

The commissioners decided to continue to look into the possibility of seeking to establish an emergency medical service tax district. County Attorney Joe Dan LeMay was instructed to notify the cities of Coleman, Santa Anna and Novice that the county intends to call an election to set up such a district. According to Texas law, those cities have up to a maximum of 60 days to decide whether or not residents in their jurisdiction are to be included in the district.

If the councils vote not to be included, then the service would not be available and taxes to support the service would not be paid. Commissioners feel that ambulance service is a necessity and are hopeful that county, and city, residents will wish to pay for the service by saying "Yes" to the setting up of a district to provide it.

According to Ed Freeman vho operates the Coleman Emergency Medical Service under contract with the county. "It costs \$102,000 a year to operate the ambulance, and that is without purchasing any new equipment". The county currently pays over half of that total from general tax revenue. That, the commissioners say, they cannot

continue to pay. If a district is approved, there would be a separate board to operate the ambulance service. The tax rate which is thought to be sufficient for subsidizing the operation would be .04 per \$100 valuation. The plan is to have the election in conjunction with another election so that costs are kept to a min-

Dr. Donald D. Pope spoke to the court and the visitors at the beginning of the morning session. He explained the reasons why the Overall-Morris Hospital is needed, and why funding must be found to keep it operating. He said a large part of the money problem "....is Medicare reimbursements which keep every hospital from making a profit...each admission (of a person over 65) is a guaranteed loss because of Medicare - 10 percent of the population have 90 percent of the medical problems". He said, too: "Can you provide quality care in Coleman without a hospital? The answer is 'no'."

Dr. Pope was carefully questioned by others who attended the meeting. Among those visiting and speaking were: Alice G. Spillman,

Gale Allen-Brock, Dorothy Eisenhower, Charlie Hunter, Norris Calk, Mike Calk, David S. Sooter and Ed

In addition to all that financial "rain on the commissioner's parade" there was real rain, again inside the jail. County Sheriff Wade Turner said: "We measure rain in our jail by the gallon, not by the inch". Emergency repairs costing about \$350 have been made and reduced rain coming in from the north side, but the south side still leaks, he said.

Marion Smith Roofing Co. of Brownwood has inspected the roof and made emergency repairs. Some of the problem is due to wind damage, and insurance company adjusters will be called in before complete repairs are made. Meanwhile, additional temporary repairs will be made to stop the leak on the south side of the jail.

And there is still the leak in the courthouse roof! Drains need to be installed to reduce the amount of standing water. The rains which come from the north still get into the courthouse walls especially in County Treasurer Barbara Freeman's office. The roofer will study this problem some more.

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Thoughts From Our Pastors

Don Elrod First United Methodist Church

BLEST BE THE TIE THAT BINDS

Blest Be the tie that binds Our hearts in Christian love: The fellowship of kindred minds Is like to that above. -by John Fawcett

I recently came upon an article clipped from the Waco paper concerning the history of that beautiful hymn.

John Fawcett began, in 1763, serving as a pastor of two small churches at Wainsgate and Hebden Bridge in England. In 1771, he was invited to succeed another pastor who had died. After prayerful consideration, he consented to do so. However, some days later, even after he had packed some of his possessions in anticipation of the move to London, he decided not to go. His small salary at Wainsgate was inadequate for his growing family, and he asked his small congregation if they could raise his salary. However, they declined. But Fawcett decided to stay at Wainsgate and Hebden, and he pastored these two small churches for 54 years.

A story that may or may not be true associates Fawcett's writings of "Blest Be the Tie That Binds" with his experience in the two small churches more than 200 years ago.

Fawcett, it seems, did more than minister, he established a boarding school, primarily to train young preachers, and in 1972, he published a collection of hymns to which he contributed 166 original hymns, most of which were written to be sung at the conclusion of his sermons.

In 1788 he published "Essay on Anger," which became such a favorite of King George III that the king offered to give Fawcett any benefit he desired. Fawcett, however, declined, saying he loved his own people in Wainsgate and Hebden Bridge, and God blessed his ministry among them. Fawcett claimed to need nothing that a ruling monarch could supply.

Many of our popular hymns today developed from the simple faith of their authors, just as this one did. And if we would listen to the words, we would find that they preach a sermon in themselves.

Just listening to her tell of the many projects she is constantly working on makes one feel exhausted.

But sometimes all that hard work pays off. Take for instance, the fact that she recently won a trophy and blue ribbon at the Southwest Ceramic Show in Dallas. Her entry, a replica doll of the late actor and patriot, John Wayne, won a first place blue ribbon in the sculpturing division from among 600 entries. This entitled her doll to be placed in contention for the "Best of the Show" trophy, which it won hands down from among all of the first place entries of the various divisions. There were over 3000 total entries in the show.

Betty not only cast the doll and did the painting and kiln firing but made her own mold by sculpting it herself from clay.

Bettie's porcelain version of 'Duke' shows him to be authentically dressed in western attire, all made by the artist. She fashioned his jeans from denim taken from a pair of her dad's old jeans. Her dadd being C.W. Hunter of Coleman. The jeans are complete with a leather patch on a back pocket, with the letters "B.B." engraved on it. The shirt the doll is wearing is of chambray material from one of her Texas and the decorations depicted husband's shirts. The vest is made from the hide of a wild boar killed by her brother, Charlie Hunter, also holster he is wearing.

'Wayne's" clothing is complete down to the last detail. He is wearing red flannel "longiohns" also made by Mrs. Bryan, complete with the buttoned flap in the back.

This is by far not her first attempt at doll making. She has a large collection of her artwork, Because the Bryan's have run out of space for the full collection, many of her dolls have had to be moved to her daughter's home in Comanche where two granddaughters get to enjoy them. Many of our readers will remember their daughter, now Leann Boyd, a teacher in the Comanche schools.

Among the dolls she has made in the past are those of several of the early presidents and their wives, including the George Washingtons and the Abraham Lincolns. All their clothing is also very authentic looking and representative of the fashion of their day. Mrs. Bryan does intense research to make sure she is dressing her dolls in the style of the era. She even has a storage building full of special materials collected through the years to insure that she can be able to make the clothing she needs for her hobby.

Time was when she made specialty cakes for all sorts of occasions. Among the ones she is most proud is a 240 pound cake she made in 1965 for a Democratic Art show at the ranch of then Texas Governor John Connally. The cake took 175 hours to prepare. It was made in the shape of the map of

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION **AUGUST 10, 1991**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

Friday Is Flag Day, Fly Your Flag Proudly; Here Are Some Tips For Displaying The Flag Properly




The U.S. flag should be flown above a state flag on the same staff. With other national flags on separate staffs, fly the U.S. flag to its own right.

According to federal law, the flag of the United States should only be displayed from sunrise to sunset unless it is illuminated. The flag should be raised briskly and lowered ceremoniously. Here are some flag facts and other guidelines for displaying the flag.




In grouped staffs, put U.S. flag in center at highest point. With crossed staffs, place U.S. flag on its own right, its staff on top.

At half mast, the flag signifies mourning. Raise the flag briskly to the top of the staff then lower to half staff. Lower the flag after first raising it to the top of the staff.



Over a street, suspend vertically with the canton to the north or east.

Hang flat against wall behind speaker with canton to viewer's left.

session. Five measures, generated by the State Treasury, won passage during the regular session. This legislation will affect not only the State Treasury, but all Texas taxpayers as well. I credit your editorial support with much of our recent success.

The five measures include:

- Debt management legislation that would require future state bond proposals be phrased in ~'voterfriendly" terms. Under the so-called "truth in advertising'~ measure. Texas voters will decide in a Nov. 5 constitutional amendment election whether to require all future debtauthorizing measures be submitted in proposition form with full

disclosure of purpose and amount of

- Legislation that will strengthen the State Treasury's tobacco and cigarette tax enforcement efforts. The measure is aimed at helping to wipe out Texas' cigarette black market. It is expected to result in the collection of millions of dollars in potential tax revenue that has been lost to the black market.

- A bill that will require banks and other institutions to

simultaneously report and remit unclaimed property to the State of Treasury. This legislation is expected to pump an additional \$2 million annually in interest earnings into state coffers, while also expediting the process in which Texans are reunited with their unclaimed money and property.

- Legislation allowing financial institutions holding state funds to pledge securities backed by mortgages against state deposits. This measure gives banks more collateral options with which to seek state depository contracts, thereby giving banks more funds to lend in their local communities.

- A bill that maintains the current statewide system of petty cash accounts for state agencies, giving local state agency officials more

In another important step to better debt management, House Speaker Gib Lewis and Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock will appoint a joint legislative interim committee to closely examine debt issues and to make recommendations on debt policy to future legislatures. The State Treasury will work closely with the committee to give members recommendations on what Texas' debt capacity should be.

It is imperative that we plan, manage and coordinate future debt. while at the same time preserving and wisely applying our state's credit. I look forward to visiting with you this fall to discuss in detail the Nov. 5 constitutional
