French Woman 116 Years Of Age

Last week we printed a picture of Clarinda Menges who had recently marked her 103rd birthday. A longtime Santa Anna area resident, Mrs. Menges now makes her home at Ranger Park Inn. She is a remarkable woman who grew up near Harper, Texas and moved to the Santa Anna area in 1907 as the bride of the late Edmund Menges. The couple raised two sons, Charlie (Dude) and Earl, both now deceased. Her husband passed away in

She attributes her longevity to a "happy marriage and good life on the farm." According to a niece, Dorothy Alsobrook, "Aunt Clarinda just loved farm life." She is doing quite well, thank you, in spite of a recent setback and hospital stay. She goes anywhere in the Inn that she wants to, maneuvering her own wheelchair. She can walk if allowed, but since a recent fall is watched carefully when attempting to do so.

Her health is really quite good and her outlook is inspiring.

There is, however, a woman in France whose memories stretch further back than Clarinda's, probably further than anyone else's in the world. At 116 years of age, Jeanne Calment is reportedly the oldest person in the world today.

Born in 1875, she has lived her life in Arels, France. She and her husband, Ferdinand, were married almost a century ago in 1896 and had one daughter who died of pleurisy 57 years ago. Her husband passed away eight years later.


The state and federal governments share in the cost of AFDC to families where needy children are deprived of support because of the absence or disability of one or both

There were 52 investigations in adult protective services, these investigations concerned reports of abuse, neglect, or exploitation of elderly or disabled adults.









Curtis Bryan at Rockwood reported 1-1/2 inches on Monday with no rain falling there on Sunday. Rankin McIver at Trickham also reported about 1-1/2 on Monday with none on Sunday. Rainfall in the area of Hords Creek Lake was reported at 1.85.

A STUDY OF MATTHEW 16:24

"Then said Jesus unto his disciples, If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me." (Matthew 16:24). Please consider this brief analogy of the passage: The disciples of Jesus were those who were following him, listening to his teaching and learning from him. They were his students, "If any man will", the challenge of Christ and Christianity is to any and every responsible person on earth. Jesus died for the whole world (of mankind). But not all men are saved. Why? Because many reject the salvation offered through Jesus Christ. The invitation is to all, every man. Whosoever will, but not many will come. "Come after me, confess me and acknowledge me as Saviour and Lord, and be willing and ready to follow my example and teaching wherever it may lead. "Let him deny himself" - that is exactly what he did. See John 10:7-18 and Phillippians 2:5-11. Becoming a Christians involves a death, burial, and a resurrection, or a new birth. See Colossians 3:1-3, Romans 6:1-18, II Corinthians 5:17. When Jesus said, "Let him deny himself," He was not talking about material things, such as luxuries, conveniences, or even necessities, but he was talking about one "denying himself"! That is what Jesus did, and so did Saul (or Paul). See Galatians 2:20; 5:24; 6:14. "and take up his cross, and follow me." What is this cross which one must take up in order to follow Jesus?

This "cross" does not signify ordinary illness, sickness, diseases, accidental injuries and such, which are common to both saint and sinner alike, and in which we have no choice. The "cross" of which Jesus spoke is a cross which one who "will" follow Jesus must "take up" willingly, and bear it gladly for Jesus' sake and for the Cause of Christ.

Has Lots Of Problems

Problem No. 3 (or 4) was the learning that each of the four precinct barns must be licensed at a cost of \$500.00 each, and that storm run-off water must be checked by engineers at a cost to the county which is not known at this time. There was talk of seceding from the state and the nation, but a motion to do so was not made.

After a careful review of a contract to join other counties hoping to minimize costs of this "Storm Water" requirement, the commissioners approved entering the cooperative arrangement, convinced that is the only way to keep down the costs of a project which they feel is nothing but foolishness.

There were a few decisions which cannot rightly be called responses to problems.

Since the county has withdrawn from the Texas Workers Compensation Program, notice must be posted to that effect and all new employees must be so notified before being hired. The county is now self-insuring to cover on-thejob injury expenses.

An easement request by Union of Texas Petroleum to bore under a road in the former town of Silver Valley was approved.

Funds were transferred from the General Road and Bridge Fund to each of the four precincts. Each received \$5,000.00.

The 72nd Texas Legislature's regular session is now history. The session ended May 27th at midnight, with a flurry of last minute attempts to get legislation passed by some members, and get legislation killed by others. This session, being my first one, was a real "post grad" education for me in state government, as well as human behavior.

Since the Governor's state agency audit reports are not completed, no action was taken on budgetary issues in the regular session. The Appropriations Committee will come in and begin work on June 10th, in preparation for the budget and financial planning for the state. Governor Richards has indicated that the Special Session will convene July 8th. The agency audits and state finances (including budgets) will be the specific purpose of the Special Session.

The regular session saw several significant things accomplished, and others left undone as is customary. A few accomplishments of the session were: Mandatory redistricting of legislative districts, public school finance equity legislation, ethics reform and establishment of a State Ethics Commission, insurance reform legislation, legislation making it a felony offense to vandalize or cause damage to an animal research cen-

ter, prison expansion up to 28,500 beds in the next four years, auto liability insurance reform (will require proof of insurance at the time of license renewal and auto inspection), a bill providing a longer term for capital murders, a bill forbidding telephone solicitation calls at your residence before 9:00 a.m. or after 9:00 p.m., omnibus school bill which reduces from 40 to 20 hours the required technological faculty training and establishes education "swat teams" to help schools with low academic performance records just to name a few items. However, there are a number of

bills of special interest in the 65th District which did not get final ac-

tion, for a multitude of reasons. Some of these that failed were Product Liability reform, the HB 7 Teacher Retirement bill, the concealed handgun bill, state budget, creation of a Texas State Environmental Production Agency (most 65th District residents indicated they did not want this), additional Workman's Comp reform, a bill authorizing 70 mph speed limit on Interstate Highways, a state lottery, and a bill authorizing an attorney to accompany a witness into the grand jury room - to give a partial listing.

The July Special Session will be especially tension filled, for with an ever-growing and aging population demanding more and more services, more and more taxpayer dollars are going to be required.

I will resume this series of news updates during the Special Session in July, and will start updating you at that time.

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Legislative Session Report

AUSTIN-The 140-day regular session of the 72nd Legislature is over. However, the Governor has announced her intent to call us back into special session in a little more than a month. The biggest issue we, in the Legislature, face is writing a new two-year budget and financing it.

That process will be difficult. Best estimates put the state's revenue shortfall at between \$4 billion and \$5 billion at current levels of service. The Governor and Lieutenant Governor have elected to defer budget writing until after the Comptroller has completed performance audits of all state agencies and the Governor's Select Committee on Revenue has issued its report analyzing the state's options for raising revenues.

As I have stated previously in this column, I refuse to consider any change to our existing tax system before:

1. we make good use of the budget axe to eliminate waste and excessive spending;

2. we work to abolish a school property tax which has become an overburdened, inequitable and inefficient means of funding our system

of public education. The social and economic future of Texas depends upon the sophistication and preparedness of our work force. That, in turn, depends upon our willingness to pay the price for delivering quality schooling to all of our children. It's been a long time in coming, but the State is finally going to ante up and share the financial burden borne by local taxpayers as a result of the education equalization bill approved by this Legislature.

The State is going to assume a larger role in the area of crime and punishment, also vital to our future prosperity and well being. The Omnibus Crime Bill calls for the construction of near 30,000 new prison beds through 1995. By then, Texas will have the largest prison system in the free world with a capacity for 95,000 inmates. This

translates into longer prison time for our most dangerous offenders and new programs for rehabilitation. This was an important plank in my legislative agenda and follows passage of a bill I sponsored during the last special session which makes room for another 5500 criminals. There is no excuse for our not having enough space to keep dangerous people off the streets and out of our homes. Housing convicted criminals is the responsibility of the state, not local government.

The final days of the regular session were typically frenetic. In addition to our education and prison reforms, I am pleased that we were

successful in passing my bill to straighten out the Texas Department of Commerce. As chairman of the Senate Economic Development Committee I made it my business to get rid of the bad management that wasted taxpayer money, as well as the bad attitude that produced more red tape than help for the people who need it and want it.

We also won passage of bills I sponsored to:

-protect the environment by funding the clean up of leaking underground storage tanks without bankrupting small business people who unwittingly bought into bad situations;

-help our military men and women avoid insurance problems at home while fighting for us over-

Institute to its rightful place as a college system;

-and make our court system more accessible and more affordable to the average Texan by shifting part of the caseload from the already overburdened district courts to our county courts at Law.

The Senate and House also met their obligations to complete the important task of legislative redistricting before adjourning. The upshot for District 24 is the addition of seven counties and the loss of

one, giving the district a total of 20 counties and approximately 531,000 residents. That leaves us with the task of drawing new maps for members of Congress and the State Board of Education. That job will be taken up when we return to. Austin for special session.
