Dryland root rot, leaf and stem rust and wheat streak mosaic virus infected wheat pastures and will Individuals who are no longer potentially reduce wheat yields. The presence of these disc affected growers' decisions as of whether to harvest the grain, graze out, or cut for hav. Some producers have decided to cut and bale their wheat for hay. Wheat hay has a protein content ranging from 6-8 percent depending on fertilizer applications combined with the grain in the hay which has a protein content of 10-11 percent.

Wheat pastures in Coleman County will average 15-20 bushels-acre of grain with some wheat yields as high as 30 bushes-acre. The majority of the wheat in Coleman County will be ready for harvest during the first half of June, and the weather outlook appears favorable for a dry harvest period.

### Ken Cleveland

DIMMITT--Ken Cleveland, 57, died Sunday, may 16, 1993 after being struck by lightening at the Pendaries Village Golf Resort, 25 miles northwest of Las Vegas, New Mexico. He reported was riding bicycles on a mountain trail with his granddaughter, 8-year-old Caitlin Buckley, when he was fatally injured between 6 and 6:15 p.m. New Mexico time.

Services were at 2 p.m. Wednesday, May 19, 1993 in Dimmitt Middle School gymnasium with the Rev. Johnny Robertson, pastor of First United Methodist church, and the Rev. Vernon O'Kelly, former pastor of First United Methodist Church, officiating. Burial was in the Westlawn Memorial Park by Foskey Funeral Home.

Mr. Cleveland was born in Coleman. He married Libby Pegram in 1955 at Coleman. He played collegiate at the University of Texas and was a co-captain of the Longhorns and an All-Southwest Conference guard during his college

Mr. Cleveland was South Plains Coach of the Year and was a lifetime member of the Texas

Association of Basketball Coaches and Texas High School Coaches Association. He was past president of TABC. He was named Panhandle Plains Coach of the Year in 1983 and Citizen Through the Year in 1991 by the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce. He was a member of the First United Methodist Church and the Balfour Hall of Honor.

Cleveland currently ranks ninth in the nation among boys' high school basketball coaches with a record of 887-277.

He led the Bobcats to 27 district titles, including 18 in a row. During Cleveland's tenure, Dimmitt won 20 or more games in a season 29 times.

Dimmitt advanced to the state tournament 10 times and won state championships in 1975, 1982 and 1983. Cleveland was inducted into the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame April 17.

Cleveland was named the Class 3A coach of the year in 1983 and coached the TABC North All-Star team in 1975.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Kevin Cleveland of Plainview; two daughters, Beth Buckley of Dimmitt and Vickie Fretwell of Houston; two brothers; a sister; and five grandchildren.

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### **Thoughts From Our Pastors**

Manley Sweazey was a man who not only had an uncommon name but worked at a most unusual job. He was an insurance salesman who walked up and down the Alaska Railroad selling insurance to the section hands. Time after time he tramped the distance of nearly 500 miles.

People are not always happy to see insurance salesmen, but Manley was always greeted like a long-long brother. His potential customers would come racing down the railroad ties to meet him. They were naturally flattered that anyone was willing to come way out there to see them, even if he did want to sell them something. But there was more to it than that. Manley Sweazey went the extra mile. He was actually interested in the men themselves, so much interested that he studied their needs, and even though it had nothing to do with insurance, he attempted to fill those needs.

For instance, he noticed that many of the men needed haircuts, so he learned barbering and gave free trims. He saw that the diet of his customers was poor-in some cases consisting of just beans and bacon-so Manley learned to cook, and prepared tasty dishes for them. He studied first aid and learned enough about medicine to help a person who was sick or injured.

Now all this was very fine for the section hands who lived along the Alaska Railroad. But did it accomplish anything for Mr. Manley Sweazy, insurance salesman? Yes, it did. In time Mr. Sweazey became a member of a select organization known as the Million Dollar Round Table. Its members are people who have sold more than a million dollars' worth of insurance in one year's time.

In the greatest sermon ever preached. Jesus spoke about giving and receiving (see Luke 6:38). His message is that as we involve ourselves with our friends and with people in need, inevitably a greater blessing

This has been a most hectic week, with last minute committee meetings going later and later into the night. The Natural Resource Committee, of which I am a member, was in session until 2 a.m. one night this past week.

It appears at this time that the Texas Penal Code will have put the Sodomy Statute back in the law, as well as such items as theft from the elderly and a number of other things that we in the conservative and rural coalitions have worked hard to accomplish. The funding packages and appropriations bills are getting shaped into their final form and it appears that perhaps our area will not be hurt badly as we had previously feared. The rural members of the Legislature have worked hard to be sure that our Rural and West Texas interests were in place and funded.

The House has created and presented a plan for public school finance, as a substitute bill for the Senate Finance plan, that appears to be headed for approval in the House. It remains to be seen if the Senate will approve this substitute language, or if one of the most difficult in which to strike a fair bargain, in that we have both rich and poor districts and invariably, what is help to one area, hurts the other. Most legislative districts are either rich or poor and representation becomes a fairly simple matter.

A bill was passed in the House this past week that would permit County Commissioner Courts, when having advertised for bids to purchase equipment, to consider the cost of getting the equipment from the factory to the county into the bid cost. In the past, often the lowest bidder is thousands of miles away, and the actual cost of the equipment, plus the transportation charges are higher than the next bidder. This will give Commissioner Courts a little more leeway in their equipment purchases and the legislation was strongly en-dorsed by the Association of Counties. Representative Jim Rudd, of Brownfield passed a bill that will permit water flood and other enhanced recovery of gas and oil to continue to pay half of the normal tax charges by the state. This is an effort to make it profitable to continue to use enhanced recovery techniques in the oil field and is of real economic assistance to producers in West Texas. Several changes were made this week on a bill in the Texas House concerning teacher requirement. These changes

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were made this week on a bill in the Texas House concerning teacher retirement. These changes will increase the monthly survivor benefits by \$50 per month. This bill would increase the minimum monthly annuity payment for members who retired prior to September 1, 1991 to \$6.50 for month per every year they had taught, or if the retiree is 65 years of age, by \$150 per month. In addition, a two plus two early retirement clause was added to the Teacher Retirement Plan. This bill should become law September 1, 1993, if the Senate approves the bill. The TRS is one of

the most stable retirement systems in the nation and these changes will improve the benefits to retirees. This should provide you with a bit of a legislative undate.

It is truly a great experience representing you in state government. In this business, the "highs" are extremely good when you get legisla-tion passed and signed into law by the Governor, but I might add that the "lows" are extremely low when the legislation on which you have worked for months is voted down, or vetoed by the Governor. A good example of this is House Bill 2494 of ours, which . would have made it necessary for anyone who made false, or unsubstantiated claims about food safety, to be liable for reimbursement to the agricultural producer for the monetary loss they suffered because of the allegation. This bill was fought strongly by the consumer activist and environmental extremist groups and was defeated in the Senate, after I had gotten it passed through the Legislature. This simply shares my frustration with you because I feel. as all of the agriculture groups felt, that this legislation, which is currently in place in some other states, would be very beneficial to our farmers. But, like General McArthur, I will return, with another try on getting that particular bill passed in a subsequent session of the Legislature.

Sine Die, or the end of the legislative session, will be on Monday, May 31 at midnight. At that time, my staff and I will get together and do a wrap-up on what has been accomplished by this legislative session--our personal accomplishments and the accomplishments of the 73rd Texas Legislative as a whole. This information will constitute our next. Capitol Comments. Thereafter, I plan to provide a Capitol Comments to the newspapers monthly to keep my constituents abreast of what is going

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
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
