Municipal Court Announces Increases In Fines

Some May Do Community Service To Satisfy Fines

Fines for municipal offenses and some traffic violations have been increased at the Santa Anna Municipal Court after new laws were enacted by the State Legislature during the recent session.

Approximately one-half of all revenue collected from fines is paid to the State, and several of the categories have now been increased locally and over the state.

Increases will be reflected in local fines for the following violations: municipal ordinances and state traffic violations for speeding, failure to wear protective motorcycle headgear, failure to maintain financial responsibility and other Class C misdemeanors.

A large increase mandated by the State for the fine for passing a school bus changes that offense to a Class B Misdemeanor (Over \$200.00) and removes jurisdiction from Municipal Court to the Justice of the Peace Court.

Another change that is expected to be utilized locally will provide for community service to satisfy a fine or cost for Class C misdemeanors. Persons who are determined to have insufficient resources to pay fines may be ordered to participate in work in the community for a governmental entity or non-

profit organization that provides service for the general public. A work schedule is arranged to avoid a hardship on the defendant or their dependents.

Municipal Judge Barbara Kingsbery took part in a Legislative Update Conference in Austin recently where the new laws were reviewed, with the changes in effect on September 1, 1993.

Non-compliance At County Jail Being Corrected

The Coleman County jail underwent an inspection on Sept. 8 and was found in non-compliance regarding the number of jailers necessary when the total number of inmates reaches 10 or more. No formal notification has been received from the State on the non-compliance status. After formal notification, the County has 30 days to remedy the problem or submit plans to remedy the problem within one year.

Sheriff Wade Turner does not anticipate formal notification as plans are already underway to make sure a jailer is on the 2nd floor at all times. A written statement explaining the plan will be sent to the inspector. This statement may halt the formal notification.

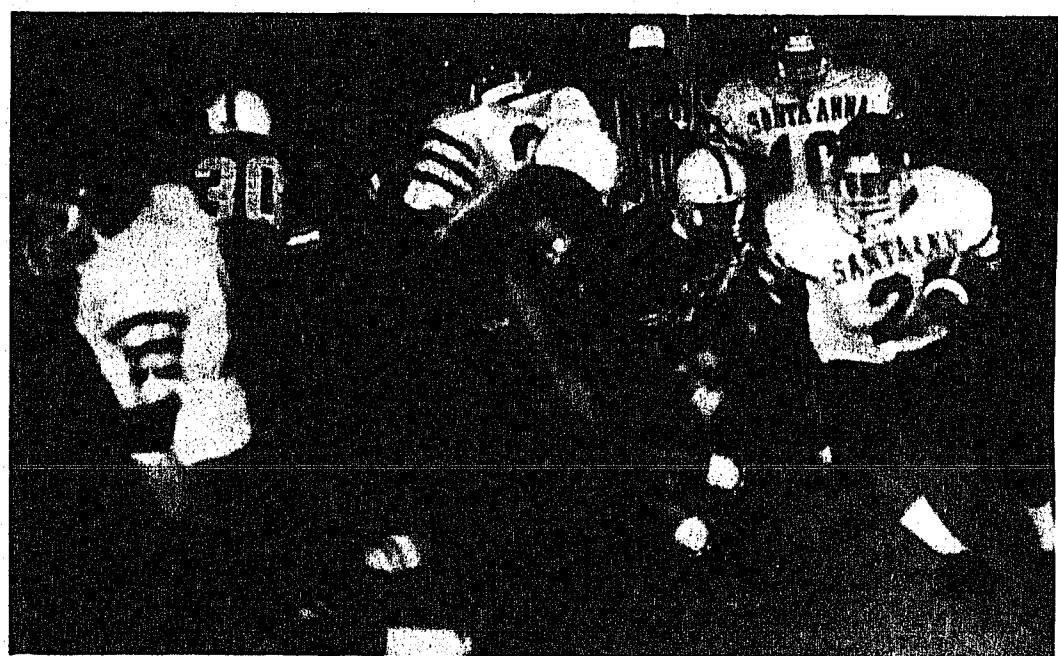

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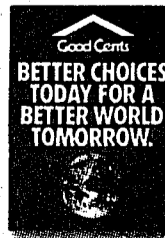

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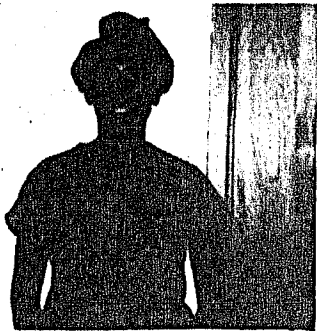

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 2, 1993

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Legislature to provide for the issuance of bonds for the state financing of start-up costs for historically underutilized businesses. The amendment provides that the legislature by law may establish a Texas historically underutilized business capital growth and start-up fund. The money in the fund may be used without further appropriation and only for a program established by the legislature to aid in the start-up costs of a historically underutilized business, as defined by the legislature. To carry out the program, the legislature may issue up to \$50 million of general obligation bonds to provide funding. The legislature may require review and approval of the issuance of bonds, the use of the bond proceeds, or of the rules adopted by an agency to govern use of the bond proceeds. Bonds authorized by the amendment constitute a general obligation of the state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the issuance of \$50 million of general obligation bonds for the recovery and further development of the state's economy and for increasing job opportunities and other benefits for Texas residents through state financing of the start-up costs of historically underutilized businesses."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature, by general law, to exempt from ad valorem taxation all or part of real and personal property used, constructed, acquired, or installed wholly or partly to meet or exceed rules or regulations adopted by any environmental protection agency of the United States, Texas, or a political subdivision of this state for the prevention, monitoring, control, or reduction of air, water, or land pollution. The amendment applies to real and personal property used as a facility, device, or method for the control of air, water, or land pollution that would otherwise be taxable for the first time on or after January 1, 1994. The amendment does not authorize the exemption from ad valorem taxation of real or personal property that was subject to a tax abatement agreement executed before January 1, 1994.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to promote the reduction of pollution and to encourage the preservation of jobs by authorizing the exemption from ad valorem taxation of real and personal property used for the control of air, water, or land pollution."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 3 proposes a constitutional amendment to clear land titles in which the State of Texas relinquishes and releases any claim of sovereign ownership or title to an undivided one-third interest in and to the lands and minerals within the Shelby, Frazier, and McCormick League (now located in Fort Bend and Austin counties) arising out of the interest in that league originally granted under the Mexican Colonization Law of 1823 to John McCormick or about July 24, 1824, and subsequently voided by the governing body of Austin's Original Colony on or about December 15, 1830. Title to such interest in the lands and minerals is confirmed to the owners of the remaining interests in such lands and minerals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the clearing of land titles by the release of a state claim in a fractional interest, arising out of the voiding of an interest under a Mexican land grant, to the owners of certain property in Fort Bend and Austin counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 49 proposes a constitutional amendment that would prohibit a state personal income tax without voter approval and would dedicate the proceeds of any income tax, if enacted, to property tax relief and education. The amendment provides that a general law enacted by the legislature that imposes a tax on the net incomes of natural persons, including a person's share of partnership and unincorporated association income, must provide that the portion of the law imposing the tax not take effect until approved by a majority of the registered voters voting in a statewide referendum held on the question of imposing the tax. The referendum must specify the rate of the tax that will apply to taxable income.

The amendment also provides that a general law enacted by the legislature that increases the rate of the tax, or changes the tax in a manner that results in an increase in the combined income tax liability of all persons subject to the tax, may not take effect until approved by a majority of the registered voters voting in a statewide referendum held on the question of increasing the income tax. The referendum must specify the manner in which the proposed law would increase the combined tax liability of all persons subject to the tax. The legislature may repeal, or amend without increasing, a tax approved by the voters without submitting the amendment or the repeal to the voters. If the legislature repeals a tax approved by the voters, the legislature may only reenact the tax without voter approval if the effective date of the reenactment of the tax is within one year of the effective date of the repeal of the tax.

The amendment also provides that, in the first year in which an income tax is imposed, and during the first year of any increase in the tax, not less than two-thirds of all net revenues from the tax shall be used to reduce the rate of ad valorem maintenance and operation taxes levied for the support of primary and secondary education. In subsequent years, not less than two-thirds of all net revenues of the tax shall be used to continue such ad valorem tax relief. The net revenues of the tax remaining after the dedication of money for reduction of ad valorem maintenance and operation taxes shall be used for support of education. The maximum rate at which a school district may impose ad valorem maintenance and operation taxes is reduced by an amount equal to one cent per \$100 valuation for each one cent per \$100 valuation that the school district's ad valorem maintenance and operation tax is reduced by the minimum amount of money dedicated under the amendment, provided that a school district may subsequently increase the maximum ad valorem maintenance and operation tax rate if the increased maximum rate is approved by a majority of the voters of the school district voting at an election called and held for that purpose. The portions of the amendment relating to dedicating tax revenues to reduce the rate of ad valorem maintenance and operation taxes apply on or after the first January 1 after the date on which an income tax takes effect, except that if the income tax begins to apply on a January 1, the amendment applies to ad valorem maintenance and operation taxes levied on or after that date.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment prohibiting a personal income tax without voter approval and, if an income tax is enacted, dedicating the revenue to education and limiting the rate of local school taxes."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to prescribe the qualifications of sheriffs. Currently, the constitution authorizes the legislature to prescribe the duties, perquisites, and fees of office, but not the qualifications for the office of sheriff.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to prescribe the qualifications of sheriffs."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the office of county surveyor in Jackson County. The amendment also provides for the powers, duties, and functions of the county surveyor to be transferred to the county officer designated by the commissioners court.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment abolishing the office of county surveyor in Jackson County."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 57 proposes a constitutional amendment that repeals article XII, section 6, of the Texas Constitution, which currently provides that no corporation shall issue stock or bonds except for money paid, labor done, or property actually received, and that all fictitious increase of stock or indebtedness shall be void.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment repealing certain restrictions on the ability of corporations to raise capital."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioners court of McLennan County to call an election to abolish the office of county surveyor. The office of county surveyor will be abolished if a majority of the qualified voters of McLennan County voting on the question favor the abolition. If the office of county surveyor is abolished, the amendment requires the maps, field notes, and other records in the custody of the county surveyor to be transferred to the county clerk of McLennan County. After abolition, the amendment also grants the commissioners court of McLennan County the authority to employ or contract with a qualified person to perform any of the functions that would have been performed by the county surveyor if the office had not been abolished.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county surveyor in McLennan County."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 19 proposes an amendment to article VIII, section 13 of the Texas Constitution that would modify the provisions for the redemption of real property sold at a tax sale. The amendment deletes current language in article VIII, section 13 that allows the legislature to provide for the sale of property without trial to pay for delinquent taxes. It also states that the deed to the new owner vests a good and perfect title subject only to redemption as set out in this amendment or impeachment for fraud. Language is added limiting application of the current two-year redemption period to former owners of residence homesteads and land designated for agricultural use sold for unpaid taxes. When property is sold as the result of a suit to enforce collection of unpaid taxes, the amendment would allow the legislature to limit redemption to property used as a residence homestead or designated for agricultural use at the time the suit was filed. The amendment creates a second type of redemption for former owners of real property when property is neither a residence homestead, nor designated for agricultural use. These owners would have a six-month period in which to redeem their property by paying the amount of money paid for the property, including the Tax Deed Recording Fee, all taxes, penalties, interest, and costs paid plus an amount not exceeding 25 percent of the aggregate total. The amendment applies to redemption of properties sold at a tax sale for which the purchaser's deed is filed on or after January 1, 1994. For redemption of properties sold at a tax sale for which the purchaser's deed was filed before January 1, 1994, the former law is applicable and remains in effect.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to modify the provisions for the redemption of real property sold at a tax sale."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment that adds a

new section 49-b-2 to article III of the Texas Constitution. This new section provides that, in addition to the general obligation bonds authorized to be issued and sold by the Veterans' Land Board (the "Board") by sections 49-b (3950 million) and 49-b-1 (\$1.3 billion) of article III, the board may provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds of the state in an amount not to exceed \$750 million to provide financing to Texas veterans. \$250 million of the bonds authorized by this new section shall be used to augment the Veterans' Land Fund (the "Land Fund"). The Land Fund shall be used by the Board to purchase lands situated in Texas owned by the United States government, an agency of the United States government, the State of Texas, a political subdivision or agency of the State of Texas, or a person, firm, or corporation. The lands shall be sold to veterans in quantities, on terms, at prices, and at fixed, variable, floating, or other rates of interest determined by the Board. Lands in the Land Fund that are offered for sale to veterans and that are not sold may be sold or resold to the purchasers in quantities, terms, prices, and rates of interest determined by the Board.

New section 49-b-2 creates the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II (the "Housing Fund II"), and \$500 million of the general obligation bonds authorized by the section shall be used for the Housing Fund II. The Housing Fund II is a separate and distinct fund from the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund (the "Housing Fund") established under section 49-b-1 of article III. Money in the Housing Fund II shall be administered by the Board and shall be used to make home mortgage loans to veterans for housing within this state in quantities, on terms, and at fixed, variable, floating, or other rates of interest determined by the Board. The principal of, and interest on, the general obligation bonds authorized by this section for the benefit of the Housing Fund II shall be paid out of the money of the Housing Fund II. The principal of, and interest on, the general obligation bonds authorized by section 49-b-1 of article III for the benefit of the Housing Fund shall be paid out of money in the Housing Fund. If there is not enough money in the Land Fund, the Housing Fund, or the Housing Fund II, as the case may be, available to pay the principal of, and interest on, the general obligation bonds authorized by this section or by sections 49-b or 49-b-1 of article III, there is appropriated out of the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal of, and interest on, the general obligation bonds that mature or become due during that fiscal year.

If the Board determines that assets from the Land Fund, the Housing Fund, or the Housing Fund II are not required for purposes of the fund, the Board may transfer the assets to another of those funds or use the assets to secure revenue bonds issued by the Board. The revenue bonds shall be special obligations of the Board and payable only from and secured by receipts of the funds, assets transferred from the funds, and other revenues as determined by the Board and shall not constitute indebtedness of the State of Texas or the Board. The Board may issue revenue bonds from time to time, which bonds may not exceed an aggregate principal amount that the Board determines can be fully retired from the receipts of the funds. The revenue bonds shall be sold in forms, denominations, and in installments, and bear a rate or rates of interest as the Board determines.

The general obligation bonds authorized to be issued by the Board by this section or by sections 49-b and 49-b-1 of article III shall be issued and sold in forms and denominations, on terms, at times, in the manner, at places, in installments, and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as the Board determines. The bonds shall be incontestable after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing issuance of \$750 million in general obligation bonds to augment the Veterans' Land Fund and the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund and to fund the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 31 proposes a constitutional amendment relating to the duties of trustees of local retirement systems which provide retirement and related disability and death benefits for public officers and employees and that do not belong to a statewide retirement system. The amendment provides that the

board of trustees of such a system shall (1) administer the system of benefits; (2) hold the assets of the system for the exclusive purposes of providing benefits to participants and their beneficiaries and defraying reasonable expenses of administering the system; and (3) select legal counsel and an actuary and adopt sound actuarial assumptions to be used by the system.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing that the trustees of a local public pension system must administer the system for the benefit of the system's participants and beneficiaries."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 23 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that any person accused of a violent or sexual offense committed while under the supervision of a criminal justice agency of this state or a political subdivision of this state for a prior felony may, after hearing and evidence substantially showing the guilt of the accused, be denied bail pending trial. If the accused is not, however, accorded a trial within 60 days from the time of his incarceration upon the accusation or indictment, the order denying bail shall be set aside unless a continuance is obtained upon the request of the accused. In the amendment, the term "violent offense" means murder, aggravated assault (if a deadly weapon was used or exhibited during the commission of the assault), aggravated kidnapping, or aggravated robbery. The term "sexual offense" means aggravated sexual assault, sexual assault, or indecency with a child.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting the denial of bail to certain persons charged with certain violent or sexual offenses committed while under the supervision of a criminal justice agency of the state or a political subdivision of the state."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes a constitutional amendment that amends article VII, section 17(a), of the Texas Constitution to provide that, of the \$100 million currently appropriated by that section for the use of public institutions of higher education during each fiscal year, those institutions may also utilize this money to pay for acquiring, constructing, or equipping or for major repair or rehabilitation of buildings, facilities, other permanent improvements, or capital equipment used jointly for educational and general activities and for auxiliary enterprises to the extent of their use for educational and general activities. For the five-year period beginning on September 1, 2000, and for each five-year period thereafter, the legislature, during a regular session that is nearest, but preceding, a five-year period may, by a two-thirds vote of the membership of each house, increase the amount of the \$100 million constitutional appropriation for the five-year period. The amendment also reflects name changes that have been made to some of the institutions of higher education for which such funding is available. The amendment adds the Texas State Technical College System to those institutions eligible to receive such funding, but limits its allocation of the annual appropriation to 2.2 percent of the total appropriation each fiscal year. The amendment also provides that each governing board authorized to participate in the distribution of money under article III, section 17, may also issue bonds and notes for the purposes of refunding bonds or notes issued under that section or prior law for the purposes of acquiring capital equipment, library books and library materials, paying for acquiring, constructing, or equipping or for major repair or rehabilitation of buildings, facilities, other permanent improvements, or capital equipment used jointly for educational and general activities and for auxiliary enterprises to the extent of their use for educational and general activities. The amendment deletes language in article III, section 17, which authorizes the legislature to designate a single agency to issue such bonds or notes in lieu of the governing bodies, and to transfer to that agency the authority to collect and pledge money to the payment of such bonds and notes as directed by the governing body of each eligible institution. Funds appropriated under article III, section 17, may not be used for the purpose of constructing, equipping, repairing, or rehabilitating buildings or other permanent im-

provements that are to be used only for student housing, intercollegiate athletics, or auxiliary enterprises.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to the amount and expenditure of certain constitutionally dedicated funding for public institutions of higher education."

PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 45 proposes a constitutional amendment that adds a new subsection (e) to article III, section 49-h, of the Texas Constitution. The new subsection provides that, in addition to the amounts authorized by subsections (a) (\$500 million), (c) (\$400 million), and (d) (\$1.1 billion) of section 49-h, the legislature may authorize the issuance of up to \$1 billion in general obligation bonds and may use the proceeds of the bonds for acquiring, constructing, or equipping new correctional institutions, including youth corrections institutions, and mental health and mental retardation institutions and for major repair or renovation of existing facilities of those correctional and mental health and mental retardation facilities. The amendment also provides that the provisions of subsection (a) of section 49-h, relating to the review and approval of bonds, and the provisions of subsection (b) of section 49-h, relating to the status of the bonds as a general obligation of the state and to the manner in which the principal and interest on the bonds are paid, apply to bonds authorized by this amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$1 billion in general obligation bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for projects relating to facilities of corrections and mental health and mental retardation institutions."

PROPOSITION NO. 15 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 37 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the county commissioners court of a county to call an election to abolish the office of county surveyor. If the office of county surveyor is abolished, the maps, field notes, and other records of the county surveyor are transferred to the county officer or employee designated by the commissioners court.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to permit the voters of a county to decide, at an election called by the commissioners court, whether to abolish the office of county surveyor in the county."

PROPOSITION NO. 16 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 44 proposes an amendment to article III, section 49-(b) of the Texas Constitution, which currently limits the principal amount of bonds outstanding at one time for the Texas agricultural fund to \$25 million and for the rural microenterprise development fund to \$6 million. The amendment would raise the principal amount limit for the Texas agricultural fund to \$100 million. The amendment would also make the principal amount limit for each fund apply to the total principal amounts of both bonds and notes issued or sold rather than just the principal amounts of bonds outstanding at one time.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing up to a total of \$100 million in bonds and notes to be issued or sold to finance the Texas agricultural fund for providing financial assistance to develop, increase, improve, or expand the production, processing, marketing, or export of crops or products grown or produced primarily in this state, by agricultural businesses domiciled in the state."

School Board Votes Same Tax Rate

The school board conducted a public hearing on Tuesday of last week at 7:00 in the evening with four school patrons in attendance along with the board and administrators. No objections were heard from the public to the board's proposal of setting the rate at \$1.34 per \$100 evaluation, lower than last year's, although there was some discussion among board members as to the advisability of lowering the rate and maybe having to come back in another year and raise it again. The board set Tuesday of this week for the official vote on the tax rate.

Other routine business was taken care of during the meeting.

The group met Tuesday evening of this week at 7:00 for the purpose of setting the tax rate and after more consideration voted to stay with last year's combined rate of \$1.40 (36¢ local and 1.04 CED). Since the legislature has abolished the County Education Districts, the local board sets the total tax rate for the district, as in years past. The \$1.40 tax rate set Tuesday night includes .12 (12¢) for bonded indebtedness and \$1.28 for maintenance and operation.

City Council Comes Up With Slightly Slower Tax Rate

The City Council met in a called meeting Tuesday night to set the tax rate for the coming tax year. After study and research in considering the matter, the group approved a rate of \$.7062 per \$100 valuation which includes .5345 for maintenance and operation and .1717 for bonded indebtedness. The group had hoped to hold the line with last year's rate but some complicated financial figures necessitated setting the effective tax rate 2.4 cents lower than last year's rate of .7305.

The Santa Anna City Council met in regular session Tuesday evening, September 14, 1993 in the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc. meeting room.

Mayor Gale Brock called the meeting to order with Councilmen Karen Morris, Jim Spillman, and Tom Hays present. Others present were Katy and Roy Joe Harvey, Superintendent of Operations Derriell Warnock, Chief of Police

Carlos Torres and City Secretary Alys Pelton.

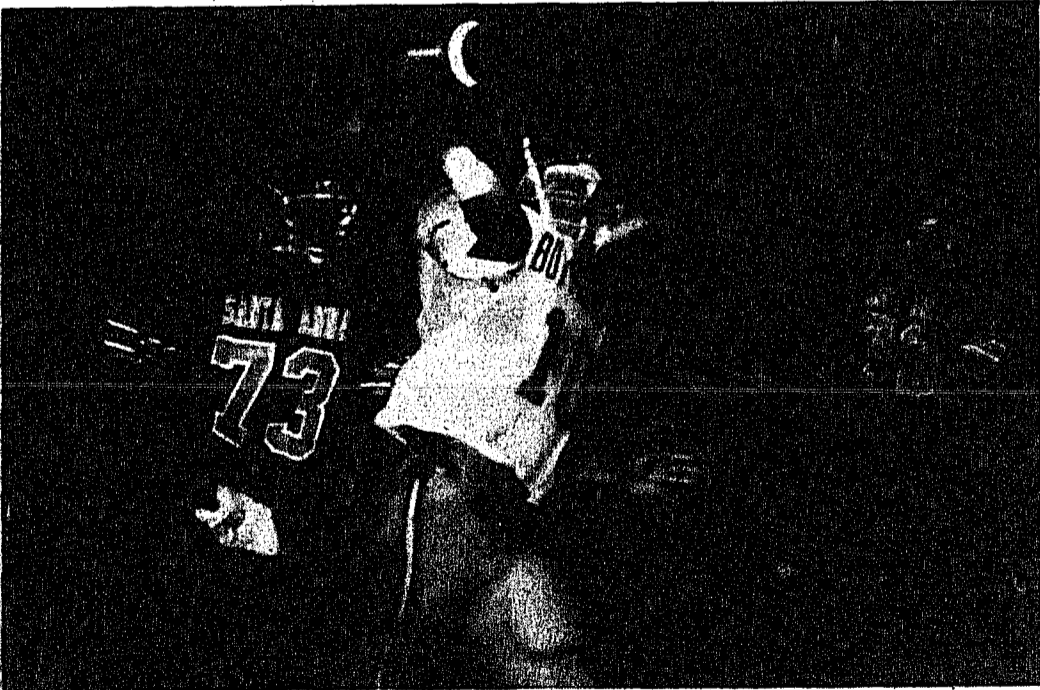
The minutes were read and approved following the invocation by Mayor Brock.

Carlos Torres presented the police report to the council for review.

Following the reading of a petition and ordinance regarding the closing of a portion of North 3rd Street, north of Avenue A by Councilman Spillman, a motion was made and carried to pass the ordinance on first reading. The second reading will be conducted at the next regular meeting.

Next on the agenda was a discussion of insurance for city employees. The City's group insurance for its employees is increasing the rates for hospitalization. The increase will cost the City approximately \$650.00 per year. Also presented was an option for Prescription Drug Cards or PCS cards which would cost approxi-



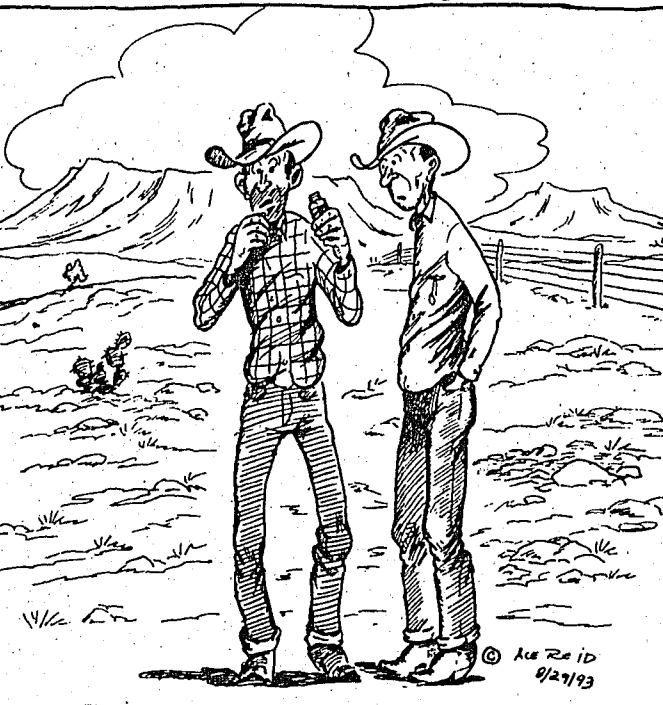

Senior Citizen Programs Coping With Reduced Funding

In September of 1993 the Coleman County Senior Centers and other centers across Texas were notified by the West Central Texas Council on Aging that program funds for the centers would be cut drastically beginning with the new operation year, October 1st, 1993 and perhaps each year hereafter. It will be the policy of the new governmental administration to fund senior centers with less money to route those funds to other programs for the aging that they think will be more productive and cost efficient.

The Coleman County Senior Center program was created in 1979, and the Title III governmental aide at that time was about \$45,000 a year. Today, the funding has been cut to \$19,000 per year. The most drastic cuts have been the last two years, a total of \$11,000 in the two-year period.

The Coleman County Senior Center advisory board and representatives Santa Anna Nutrition Program held an emergency meeting Sept. 20 to discuss the problem and adopt new policies that hopefully will insure the continued operation of the programs during the 1993-94 year.

Coleman County Appraisal District Approves Budget

The 1994 budget for the Coleman County Appraisal District was adopted by members of the Board of Directors when the group met in regular session Monday, September 13, 1993, at the district office in Coleman.

Barbara Kingsbery, chairman, led the meeting with other members present being D. G. Allen, Jack Knox and Max Horne. Dwight Nanny was absent. Also present was Chief Appraiser Bill Jones.

No visitors were present for the Budget Hearing, where the District budget for the coming year totals \$250,225. This is an increase of only \$250,00 over the 1993 budget.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved, and monthly bills were reviewed and approved for payment.

Mr. Jones reported that collections of taxes for the year stand at 97.80 percent. August collections totaled just over \$43,000 slightly higher than last year at the same period. The total collected for the year is almost \$4,000,000, also above the 1992 collections on September 1.

Mr. Jones has been appointed Successor in Interest for the County Education District that was disbanded this year by mandate of the Texas Legislature. He will be responsible for the collection and distribution of taxes still on the CED roll and the preparation of records and reports to be sent to the State.

In other business before the Board, salary increases were discussed for the Appraisal District employees but no action taken.

We are looking forward to seeing friends at the homecoming in October and we do commend each one who does such a good job of keeping the spirit alive there.

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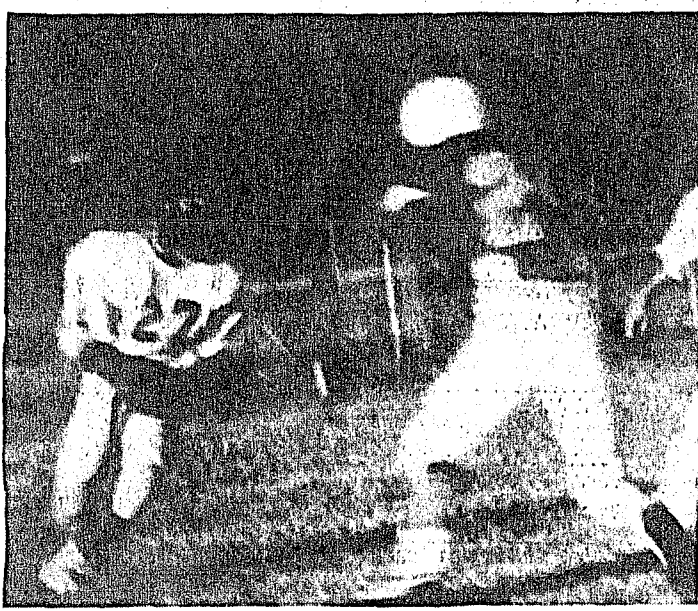

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Culpepper Returns From Six-Month Tour

FHTNC--Navy Airman James E. Culpepper, son of Vera A. Culpepper of Santa Anna, recently returned from a six-month Mediterranean and Red Sea deployment with Fighter Squadron 84, Naval Air Station Oceana, Virginia Beach, VA, embarked aboard the aircraft carrier USS Theodore Roosevelt, the lead ship in its battle group.
 The ship, with its 5,200-man crew and embarked air wing personnel, as well as its Special Purpose Marine Air Ground Task Force of 600 Marines, supported Operation Deny Flight, enforcing the U.N. sanctioned "no-fly" zone over Bosnia Herzegovina. Aircraft from USS Roosevelt also supported Operation Provide Promise by monitoring humanitarian air drop missions into the troubled former Yugoslavia.
 Additionally, the aircraft carrier demonstrated its value as a tool of foreign policy following a U.S. missile attack on Iraqi from the Adriatic into the Red Sea to assist in Operation Southern Watch, enforcing yet another "no-fly" zone over Southern Iraq.

Culpepper's squadron flies the F-14A Tomcat fighter which can attack and destroy multiple airborne targets.
 Since departing Norfolk in March, the carrier spent 165 of 183 days at sea. Culpepper enjoyed port visits to Rhodes and Corfu, Greece and Naples, Italy.

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Capitol Comments

(I know I promised you a series of articles on environmental matters, but I felt it was important to tell you about some of the things my office can do to serve you in the 73rd Legislative District. Next month's article will focus on environmental matters. The one article that has appeared as well received.)

Life never has time to become boring or routine when you serve in the Texas Legislature. We meet a whole net set of challenges and needs in the district every day, which is really one of the most interesting elements of being a state representative. During this interim the staff and I have worked on a wide variety of issues. Issues so varied in fact, that it keeps each of us learning new things about government, as well as a variety of other subjects, all of the time. Helping a parent in their effort to obtain health care and therapy through a state agency for their child who is disabled, assisting an elderly couple obtain governmental assistance, and helping a rural community obtain a fire truck through the Texas Forest Service constitute a few of the problems our office addressed last week.

In the last several weeks we have helped a retail merchant solve a problem with the Texas Lottery Commission and assisted him in finally obtaining his permanent lottery sales license. We helped an employer with a dispute over an employee's false claim on unemployment compensation with the Texas Employment Commission. On the other hand however, we are working to assist employees in their effort to obtain back wages from a former employer. This is also through the Employment Commission. We are working on future legislation that will correct the fuel tax permitting process for those vehicles which use both LP gas and gasoline. Under current law they are paying the road tax twice. A group of angry constituents brought this problem to our attention. We directed a number of constituents to their respective U. S. Congressman on issues that have concerned federal government and in which we in state government could not be of assistance. We have spent a large amount of time coordinating business ventures and business expansions with the Texas Department of Commerce, Small Business Administration and the Farm Home Administration.

An area industry has received our assistance in obtaining a fair deal in a large sale to a state agency through the General Services Commission. Another area industry has received our assistance in attempting to obtain an Air Control Board permit to burn wood

waste at their factory site, as well as in the obtaining of a Department of Commerce grant to finance the incinerator facility for that project. My staff and I are currently working to help one of our communities set up a workshop or seminar on economic development and bring individuals from the various governmental and utility agencies to work with their community leadership.

I feel that economic development and the creation and retention of jobs are an important part of my job of representing and assisting you. This effort has involved assisting Llano County retain their existing rail tracks, so that in the future they will be able to initiate a scenic tourist train ride into the community. Helping a company with a state sales contract and helping Menard obtain a rural fire truck (we have assisted a number of other counties to get a fire truck, as well); assisting Monahans and Ward County coordinate with the Governor's office concerning an Energy Efficiency Loan; and assisting Spring Hills Water Management District in Bandera County—these are all equally important projects to the community involved and they are to my staff and I, also.

It is my observation that most state agencies are extremely cooperative and helpful, once you know how to go about obtaining their assistance. I am finding that learning to understand and work the system, meet people in the various governmental agencies, both state and federal, so that contacts may be established, makes many of the seemingly impossible ventures something that can be accomplished. This confirms the old theory that it is not important "what" you know, as "who" you know, and this is especially true in getting things done within the governmental process.

I have had the opportunity to present programs, or talks to a large number of civic and community groups over the district, in which I have provided insight regarding the operation of state government. I welcome these opportunities and feel that it provides better communication between you and I, as well as giving a better understanding of the governmental process and a current view of what the future holds for us in government. Needless to say, it is a long way from Brownwood to Monahans to Llano, to Leakey to Bandera, but I am ready to come to your community, or help you at every opportunity.
