





Everytime I hear the fire siren I in the sky. feel a cold chill. I know the feeling of getting a telephone call saying there is a fire near your house.

The first Tuesday of July I was busy as a little bee helping to get out the weekly edition of the NEWS when about four in the afternoon the phone began ringing. I was closest so I answered.

A rather familiar but distraught sounding voice asked for me. Now, of course in my normal curious mind I am thinking who is this, as I answered speaking.

As the voice said "Call the Fire Department", I immediately realized it was my husband. I ask why.

It seems that our youngest took some fireworks out and set them off. With the high southwest winds that day, the fireworks and sparks naturally flew across the fence and landed in our neighbor's

Our son was not allowed to set off his fireworks on the fourth of July due to the high winds and we had explained all this to him. He thought the winds just weren't blowing too high on this day although even a slight breeze will carry sparks.

This was where I received the phone call.

After calling the fire department, I left for home with a strange feeling in my stomach. I did not know what I would find when I got there.

All the way south I constantly scanned the sky looking for smoke while at the same driving like I was a participant in the Indy 500. After want seemed like an eternity I finally reached the dirt road still without seeing smoke billowing up

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August 5-15, 1993

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As I dropped off the hill I could just barely see smoke. My first thought was they got it out already.

When I got to the house I asked where the fire was. It was up from our house and still burning.

The fire department arrived and drove through the gate between us and the neighbor, and very quickly extinguished the little blazes. I made the comment to one firefighter that it sure would help if all the brush wasn't pushed up making it hard to move around. This gentleman told me that was the one thing that was helping in this fire. All the brush and trees were keeping the high winds from the flames.

Later that evening after dark you could see sparks flying and my family and I were out pouring water on all the sparking trees. Needless to say, I did not sleep much that night but the next morning the fire seemed to be extinguished.

Fires can start so fast. A dropped match on a little bed of dry grass can grow into a blazing inferno in a matter of seconds. The hot dry conditions we have had for the last month and a half have made the area and state a tinder box just waiting to be lit.

Just last week Menard County lost about 13,000 areas which was said to be about one-fourth of the county. Lightning was thought to be the cause. Closer to home San Saba County lost about 20,000 acres due to a controlled burn that got out of control.

Here in Coleman County we have had two smaller fires but no less devastating in the last month, the first burning 3,000 acres and the one last week causing a loss of about 1,500-2,000 acres.

Luck was with most people in that the losses were to weekend cabins, abandoned homes, fences and livestock. The major loss was probably to the loss of grass in pastures and fields.

I hope everyone who thinks of throwing down a cigarette, welding, burning trash and any of many other types of things that cause fires will stop and think how devastating a fire can be not to mention how scary it is a pick up the phone and hear someone say "Call the Fire Department".

As I finished this story on Monday afternoon the fire siren began screaming once again for all firemen to hurry to the station.

M. L. Guthrie, Jr. had someone mowing some kline grass. It is suspected that the mower may have hit a rock causing a spark. Had the winds been blowing high as they did early in the month of July, this fire would have spread to the north right into Santa Anna. Everything was with our community on this fire. No high winds and our firemen were quick to respond allowing the Guthries to lose only about 10-15 acres of grass.

Emil and Helen Williams were both born and reared in this area.

Helen was born and raised on a farm which now is known as the Ruth Hibbitts place. She was one of nine children of R. V. (Reed) and Lena Cupps. She attended Crossroad and Cleveland

Emil was born in Santa Anna. His early childhood home being near the site of the "Old Sealy Hospital". The son of George and Phoebie Williams, he was one of ten children. He attended through the third grade in the old Santa Anna School which was then

located where the Armory now stands. When his family later moved to the Cleveland Community he, also, attended the Crossroad school. It was there that he and Helen became acquainted.

At the age of about 15 Helen was a patient of some renown at the Sealy Hospital in Santa Anna. She was purported to be the first patient to undergo surgery there for a ruptured appendix and recover. As she tells the story, "Doctors came from all around to witness my remarkable recovery following a new surgical procedure developed by Dr. Sealy.

Emil was 12 years old when he family started on a new adventure joining a wagon trail moving west. His father, however, became ill with heart trouble and Emil ended up with the measles. They gave up their adventure at Clovis, New Mexico and returned to make their home near Cleveland.

Time To Control Hickory Shuckworm And Pecan Weevil

The adult hickory shuckworm is a dark brown to grayishblack moth about 1/3 inch long and the larvae are white with a light brown head and about 3/8 inch needs and returns home to long. The larvae overwinter in find it. fallen pecan shucks.

Chemical control of hickory shuckworm larvae should be in mid-August or as shells harden with Diazinon or Liquid Seven (several formulations). Cultural measures will aid in reducing population such as plowing under shucks or removing infested pecans culls at harvest.

The pecan weevil is a late season pest which causes damage through larvae feeding on the pecan kernel primarily after the nut kernel has hardened. The adult is a brownish weevil about 3/8 inch long with a snout as long as the body. The larvae are white with reddish brown heads which feed on the pecan kernel. They will consume the kernel completely and chew a hole in the shell about 1/8 inch in diameter as they emerge. Pecans with a history of weevil damage should be treated at gel stage or when shells begin to harden and again 10 days to 2 weeks later with liquid Sevin (several formulations available).



Young Farmer **Endowment Program**

By: Marty Gibbs, CEA-AG

The Young Farmer Endowment Program was signed into law on May 27, 1993 with the purpose of providing financial assistance to eligible applicants who want to establish their first farm or ranch operation. The program was originally a grant but has recently been restructured as a guaranteed loan program. Applicants must be at least 18 years of age but younger than 40 years of age. Other requirements of the program state that the applicant have four years of practical farm or ranch experience, with not more than two years of participation in a 4-H or vocational agricultural program counting as practical farm or ranch experience, and the applicant must provide evidence that no more than 20% of his or her gross income within the last four years has been from farming or ranching. An exception to the 20% requirement can be given if the applicant can provide evidence that the income gained from farming or ranching was used for educational purposes.

This program goes into effect September 1, 1993 but application will not be accepted until December 1, 1993. The program will provide a

records show she lived in Coleman County nine years. William Butler Fiveash could have been her son.

My grandfather, John Fiveash, was born February 19, 1855. According to Beatrice Grady Gay's book, "Into the Setting Sun," the Fiveash family came to Coleman County in 1864, settling on Mukewater Creek about a mile south of Trickham.

The next permanent record is the Fiveash Cemetery, about two miles southwest of Trickham. The story is told in several books that Loucinda died of smallpox March 16, 1876 and Enoch H. Fiveash died on March 21, 1876 during the epidemic.

My parents, Richard Lee and Addie (Ramsey) Fiveash, were married September 7, 1913. I was adopted at two weeks of age from Rev. Nichols, a Baptist minister in Abilene, in September of 1928.

In 1934 my uncle and aunt, William and Alta Fiveash, received a phone call that Rev. Nichols had my brother, Temple Richard Fiveash, whose adoption papers at Coleman Courthouse list September 23, 1934 as the date.

Other markers in the Fiveash Cemetery are these:

Garland W. Walker (Apr. 20, 1869--Dec. 28, 1883); Elias S. McAlister (Apr. 26, 1877--Feb. 13, 1885); Richard R. Fiveash (Jan. 19, 1943); J. W. married Stephen Brannon because was so interesting watching the colors of clay and dirt that were heaped up to make the dam.

Aunt Madie was pianist for the Nazarene Church and Lorene was my Sunday School teacher. How I did love them.

There was also a Baptist Church at Whon, with each one having a revival meeting each summer, lasting one or two weeks. Men of the community made the brush arbor out of cedar or mesquite posts, covered with wire, then straw or hay to form the roof. Benches were moved from the church for seats, and on the last day the benches were turned together to form tables for food for "dinner on the grounds." One meeting usually followed the other, and everyone attended both as the highlight of the summer.

Preachers I remember at the Nazerene Church were Leonard Jennings, Howard Smith and Brother Hamm. Sammie Shields was song leader.

Morgan French was song leader at the Baptist Church and Tiny Black was pianist.

Lovelady Crossing on Home Creek was our swimming place and also the place of baptizing, usually following the summer meeting. On Sunday afternoon the last day of the meetings, the new converts were taken to the creek where the minister and the convert waded into running water about waist deep and were submerged. Some religions thought water had to be "running" in order to wash the sins away.

One time a leech got on someone, and Homer Schultz read a verse from the Bible and the leech turned loose. Mr. Homer, as most people called him, lived in the Rockwood community and was a teacher in the school at Whon.

If a tent show wanted to come to Whon they could, but never when a meeting was in progress. I don't remember any names for the shows, but they usually sold liniment and always boxes of hard candy (with a surprise inside) at intermission. You sat on benches and had a projector and screen, and the projector broke down often. I think they went to Rockwood, Trickham and Whon, showing serials for one or I remember when he built a stock two weeks, and you had to go every
