# **Farmers Must Stay** Within Acreage For **Price Supports**

To quality for price support for wheat or for any other crop in 1955 a farmer must stay within all acreage allotments established for his farm, explains Oz-ro Eubank, chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Furthermore, he points out, if more than 10 acres are to be diverted from allotment crops, the farmer must comply with a total acreage allotment in addition to any crop allotments assigned to his farm in 1955. In other words he must not exceed any acreage allotment assigned to his farm in 1955 if he expects any of his crop to be eligible for price support The total acreage allotment will be the Cover Crops, Green Manure Crops, Pasture, and Idle Crop Land and Summer Fallow are not included in the total acre-age allotment.

This provision of the program has not been in effect in 1954, Eubank explains, and therefore should receives careful consideration by farmers before planting crops to be harvested in 1955. Nor is it affected by the outcome of the wheat referendum held July 23. Furthermore, he explains, the "compliance with all acreage allotments" required for 1955 price supports will be in effect for farms with a wheat reage allotment of less than 15 acres.

The purpose of this provision, according to Eubank, is to assure a better balance in production, avoiding shifts which would transfer surplus problems from one crop to another.



HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. a proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 16a to Article VIII to provide that in counties of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants, as determined by the last proceding census of the United States, elections may be held to provide for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes; providing for submission of this Amendment to the voters of Texas; and providing the time; means and manner thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 16a shall be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas so as to read as follows:

"Section 16a. In any county having a population of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants, as determined by the last preceding census of the United States, the Commissioners Court may submit to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county at an election the question of adding, an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to the list of authorized county officials. If a mujority of such voters voting in such election shall approve of adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to the list of authorized county officials. # **Increase Butterfat**

Waco - The Texas Farm Bar eau will urge city governments in Texas to raise minimum butterfat requirements of milk to 4 percent as a means of improving the present plight of dairy farmers

The state farm organization has approved a plan for instituting a staate-wide promotional campaign that would result in outterfat moving into consumpby-products.

The 4 percent minimum wanted by the Farm Bureau is .75 over the present state minimum

Many dairy leaders contend an increase in the butterfat content of milk will help solve the surplus butter sitation and increase consumption of liquid milk by marketing a more wholesome product.

Butterfat requirements for milk were lowered during World War II when butter was scarce. Now that cheaper margarine has largely replaced butter on the American dinner table, butter and other milk by-products have been moving into government

The action taken by the TFB Board of Directors is in line with policies adopted by voting delegates to TFB's annual convention last November.

Under the promotional program, the Texas Farm Bureau will work with county Farm Bureaus in urging city governments to bring milk up to the standards of natural content. Farm Bureau will urge passage of ordinances requiring that all grade A milk sold within corporate city limits contain not less than 4 percent butterfat.



# Why Worship?

Lesson for August 1, 1954

of course he nev- Dr. Foreman er found any ears on his cornstalks. He did not know that one stalk of corn will not "make" by itself. Now human beings are like that, and especially Christians. Corn standing off by itself never is real corn, and a Christian off by himself is not a complete Chriszian. There are religions which suppose that a person can please God best if he becomes a hermit and carries on, so to speak, a single-track conversation between himself and God. But the Christian religion, at its best, knows better. Christians cannot become what they ought to be without the companionship and help of other Christians, Christianity without fellowship would not be Christian-

### A Shared Faith

Consider one very important form of fellowship: Worship, that is, public worship, in church on Sundays or otherwise. Why do we worship together? Wouldn't it be just as good if each of us worshipped alone? Private worship is necessary too, to be sure. "Enter into thy closet and shut thy door" is still Christ's directive. But Christ himself joined regularly in public worship even though in his day that was pretty formal. One of the reasons for public worship is that it is a united witness, a testimony of faith. Many churches repeat the Apostle's Creed on Sunday mornings. But even when they do not, public worship is the ex-

pression of a faith which can be shared, and is shared. When the communists took over the Chinese government, they did not attack the churches directly. What they did was to appoint official meetings, and require every one's attendance, at the hours on Sunday usually set for church services. They knew very well that if you can keep Christians from worshipping together you keep them from witnessing to their faith, and you are helping that faith to wither away. When you go to church on Sunday, you are not just sitting there in a pew listening. You are bearing witness to your faith in Christ, in the most public way; and others are helped by your being there just as you are helped by their being there,

### Better Worship, Better Living

How would you "improve" the worship in your church? By having a better choir? By getting more people out? By having more eloquent sermons? By making the sanctuary more beautiful? All these things could help, but they might one and all miss the main point. The vital question is: What effect does this worship have on the lives of those who take part in it? If a change in the manner of worship does not make for better living on the part of worshippers, then it is not a change for the better. Real worship will so bring us as a group into the presence of God that we are bound to be better men and women. Public worship ought to make us conscious of our sinfulness and our need of God; to make us aware of God's forgiving love in Christ our Saviour; to arouse in us a desire to be more like the Master; to make us stop and think about our lives and what is wrong and what is right with them; to stir us to be grateful to God for his blessings; to make us bolder to approach the "throne of grace;" to sharpen our consciences and make us see more clearly what God will have us do; to strengthen our courage to do in God's strength what he has for us to do.

### Fellowship

One of the greatest benefits from public worship is precisely Christian fellowship. We can have fellowship in many ways, at a fishfry or in a Sunday school class or a church painting party. In worshipping together, however, we can find fellowship at its highest level For in worship we are reminded of our common humanity, our common sinfulness, the need of God which all of us share.





Birds should be provided plenty of space. Leghorns need about 3 square feet each and the heavler breeds require about 4 square feet per bird.

Make sure that there is at least 1 nest for every 5 layers and be sure that some of the nests are darkened to reduce floor eggs. It is advisable to use the same type of nests that have been used on the range.
