## News Publisher Succumbs After Long Illness



J. J. Gregg

J. J. Gregg, pioneer newspaper man of the central Texas area, and owner and publisher of The Santa Anna News for the past 33 years was laid to rest in the Santa Anna Cemetery Monday, July 5, 1954, after having succumbed at 11:20 P. M. Saturday, July 3, to an illness lasting for slightly over eight years. He was 73 year, 4 months and 27 days old and had been in the newspaper business 47 years.

Funeral services were held in the Santa Anna First Baptist Church at 4:00 P. M. with the Rev. H. G. Verner, pastor, officiating. Rev. D. R. Philly, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Rising Star, assisted. At the time of death Mr. Gregg's membership was in the Rising Star church, having put his membership there when he and Mrs. Gregg moved to Rising Star seeking a place where he could regain his health.

Joseph Jackson Gregg was born to John Nelson and Susan Frances (Dingler) Gregg at Delta, Alabama, February 6, 1881, being the 11th child of a family of 16 children. He attended the Lineville, Alabama, College in 1900-01 and was a school teacher for four years. In 1906 he came to Texas and settled at Comanche where he was employed on the railroad until 1907, when he first entered the newspaper business at Gustine, Texas.

He was married on December 26, 1910 to Clara Eunice Buchanan of Pecos, Texas. Four sons and four daughters were born to this union, seven of whom survive. One son, James Robert (Jim Bob), preceded him in death on September 4, 1940, at the age of 25 years.

After editing and publishing the Gustine newspaper for a few months and working at a number of other professions, in 1911 he purchased the Rising Star Record and served that city as editor and publisher until late in 1920. During World War I he served as mayor of Rising Star. He purchased The Santa Anna News in June, 1921 and until his retirement in February, 1948, after suffering the first of several severe heart attacks, he was the editor and publisher here. During the years of his illness he retained the title of publisher of The News.

A number of under-privileged children have been sent to school through

the efforts of J. J. Gregg. It seems to us that he was always doing good at every opportunity. He was a great lover of people and was always ready for a conversation, especially with his old-time friends in and around the Central Texas area. As editor and publisher of The News he fought for and sponsored many civic improvements and did what he could for the betterment of the entire county. To the members of his family he was the greatest man who ever lived.

Two things we recall to mind that we know he was particularly fond of. And that is his work and association with the Ex-Texas Rangers during the late 1920's and all during the 1930's. Second to none was his work with the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis. This organization was founded in 1933 and since that time he has either personally conducted the annual campaign or was overseer of the campaign. He was working on getting the campaign for 1954 started when he suffered the heart attack in January that eventually caused his death.

His survivors include his wife, Mrs. Clara E. Gregg of Santa Anna; four daughter, Mrs. Queenie Simmons of Tuscon, Arizona; Mrs. Eris Jones of Bishop, Texas; Mrs. Frances See of Santa Anna; and Mrs. Mary Josephine Schulle of Watonga, Oklahoma; three sons, Lt. Col. Joseph Jackson Gregg, Jr., of Alexandria, Virginia; John C. Gregg of Santa Anna; and Ralph Burton Gregg of San Antonio. Fourteen grandchildren also survive: Betsy and David Simmons of Tuscon, Arizona; Mildred and Buddy Jones of Bishop; Janet Gregg of Alexandria, Va.; Bobby (Gregg) Perrin, daughter of Jim Bob, of San Fernando, Calif.; Jim See of Santa Anna; Darlene and Juanel Mercer and John, Wayford Gregg of Santa Anna; Helen and Joe Gregg III of San Antonio; and Jackie and Willene Schulle of Watonga, Okla. Six brothers, Neal, Raymond, Calvin, George, Wade and Henry Gregg and three sisters, Mrs. Amelia Ann Cook, Mrs. Susie Harris and Mrs. Mary Jane McDaniel all of Alabama, also survive.

All the members of the family were present with their families with the exception of Mrs. Jack Gregg and small daughter.

Benny Bass of Goodfellow AF Base, brother of the groom, was best man.

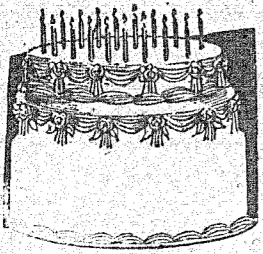

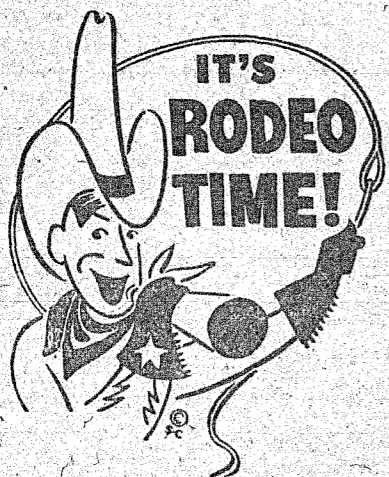

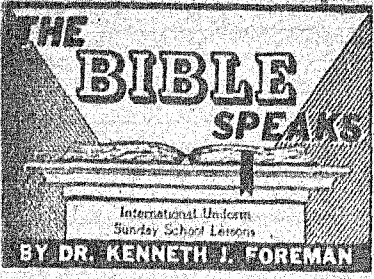

Are We Growing?

Lesson for July 11, 1954

WHEN is a "grown person" grown? All sensible grown-ups know that they are not quite fully grown in some ways. Whenever you see an adult taking a correspondence course, or taking dancing lessons or trying to play a better game of golf, or being a smarter farmer or business man or what not, there you see a grown person who knows he still has room to grow, and can grow. Psychologists tell us that one of the great scientific discoveries of this age is finding that adults are plastic, that is to say, no one is ever too old to learn, too old to grow.

Growing Up to What?

The tragedy is that many Christians, these same people who are not content to be just the same farmer or golf-player they used to be, these same people who are growing in other ways, are content to be no bigger or better Christians than they were 20 years ago. As Christians, they are dwarfs, midgets. They stopped growing long ago. It is worth while to remember that Paul's letters were written to grown people, not children; yet he urges these adults not to be children any more! Paul has a good deal to say about growing as a Christian, and he points out that this is the most important growth there is. The first thing you want to know, in growing anything, is what you want this thing, this plant or animal or what not, to be. When a home gardener raises tomatoes, he always has in mind the pictures on the seed-catalogue cover. When a horse breeder in Kentucky raises a colt, he has some great race horses in his mind's eye. If you don't know where you are headed, you can't tell whether you are making progress. Now the Apostle Paul leaves

no doubt as to what is the goal of Christian growth. It is not a what at all, but a whom. The measure of Christian manhood is Christ himself.

Growing Season

Life brings us some crises when we grow up, so to speak, overnight. But these are rare. It is all a mistake to sit around waiting for something marvelous to happen all at once. The Bible's emphasis on growing suggests that we become more Christlike by degrees. There are springtimes of the spirit when growth is faster than in life's winter nights. But the growing season for the Christian is the year round. This is specially important to remember when we are up against something that seems to block us off and keep us from any progress. We must remember what we were thinking about last week, that growing demands effort, effort against odds sometimes. Is it likely that the young man Jesus found Nazareth the kind of town that helped him to increase in favor with God and man? No; but the very fact that he had to push against the down-drag of that village, made him stronger. If you want to grow stronger physically, you will have to lift heavy weights, not egg-shells. If you want to grow mentally, you will have to study something harder than the multiplication table and the primer. So we may be helped to grow in spirit by those very things which make it hard to be a Christian.

How to Do It

There would be no point whatever in the command given more than once, "Grow!" if there were nothing we could do about it. II Peter 3:18 gives one extremely valuable hint: "Grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Saviour." If growing in his grace seems a bit hard to understand, growing in knowledge of him is surely plain enough. Do we want to grow as Christians? Do we want, really, to be more like the Master? Then we shall have to know him better. There are two ways of knowing Christ better. One is to read the gospels more often, think about them more. Matthew, Mark, Luke and John ought to be the most familiar books the Christian knows. But Christ is far more than a historical character. He lives today in the hearts of those who love and work with him. It is possible, and for a growing Christian it is necessary, to know Christ as the "unseen companion," the Christ who through his Spirit "dwells in the heart by faith." But how can Christ live in the heart, if the mind never gives him a thought?

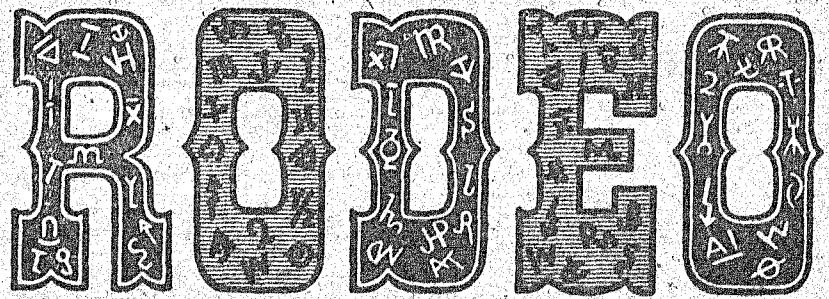

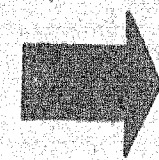

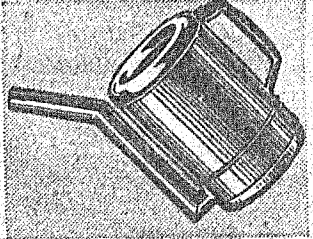
