## At 1:00 P.M. Mr. F. C. (Jack) Woodward, local postmaster, announced this week that effective Saturday, July 10, the local post office would close at 1:00 p.m. Woodward said that this was one of the few remaining offices that continued to stay open on Satur-

day afternoon. He stated that as long as the post office business was good on Saturday afternoon he thought it a good idea to keep it open, but during the past two months the business had fallen off to such an extent he deemed it advisable to close on Saturday afternoon.

The regular dispatch of mail will continue to be made at 2:00 p. m. and at 6:20 p. m. on Saturday, but the office window will close at 1:00 p.m.

Patrons of the office are urged to keep this in mind and attend to your business on Saturday morning.

## Lions Club To See H-Bomb Film Tues.

A film in technicolor of the first hydrogen bomb test in history will be shown at the Santa Anna Lions Club Tuesday, July 13. The film is being furnished through the courtesy of Con-gressman O. C. Fisher.

Mr. Fisher states the film is a spectacular dsplay and it gives one an eerie feeling. It was purchased by him from the Atomic Energy Commission and is entitled "Operation Ivy" and is available for showing to schools, clubs and other gatherings for programs, or special occasions. Anyone wanting to show the 16mm film is invited to make the request directly to Congressman Fisher. It is a 30-minute film.

A light attendance was present for the weekly meeting of the club this week and most of the program was taken up in a business session. New officers of the club were supposed to be installed, but very few of them were present and the installation was omitted.

Every member of the club is urged to be present next week to see the H-Bomb Film.

All the members of the Santa Anna Quarterback Club are to be congratulated on the fine effort they have made in getting this field completed in such a short time and with the minimum amount of expense.



Are We Growing? Lesson for July 11, 1954

WHEN is a "grown person" grown? All sensible grown ups know that they are not quite utily grown in some ways. Whenever you see an adult taking a correspondence course, or taking dancing lessons or m trying to play a better game of golf, or being a amarter farmer or business man or what not, there you see a grown person who knows' he still has room to grow, and can grow. Psycholo Dr. Foreman gists tell us that one of the great scientific discoveries of this age is finding that adults are plastic, that is to say, no one is ever too and to learn, too old to grow.

## Growing Up to What?

The tragedy is that many Chriscans, these same people who are and content to be just the same farmer or golf-player they used to be, these same people who are growing in other ways, are contept to be no bigger or better Christians than they were 20 years ago. As Christians, they are dwarfs, midgets. They stopped growing long ago. It is worth while to remember that Paul's letters were written to grown people, not children; yet he urges these adults not to be children any more! Paul has a good deal to say about growing as a Christian, and he points out that this is the most important growth sture is. The first thing you want to know, int growing anything, is what you want this thing, this plant or animal or what not, to Se. When a home gardener raises tomatoes, he always has in mind the pictures on the seed catalogue cover. When a horse breeder in Kentucky raises a colt, he has some great race horses in his mind's eye. It you don't know where you are headed, you can't sell whether you are making progress. Now the Apostle Paul leaves

It is all a mistake to sit around waiting for something marvelous to happen all at once. The Bible's emphasis on growing suggests that we become

more Christlike by degrees. There are springtimes of the spirit when growth is faster than in life's winter nights. But the growing season for the Christian is the year round. This is specially important to remember when we are up against something that seems to block us off" and keep us from any progress. We must remember what we were thinking about last week, that growing demands effort, effort against odds sometimes. Is it likely that the young man Jesus found Nazareth the kind of town that helped him to increase in favor with God and man? No; but the very fact that he had to push against the down-drag of that village, made him stronger. If you want to grow stronger physically, you will have to lift heavy weights. not egg-shells. If you want to grow mentally, you will have to study something harder than the multiplication table and the primer. So by those very things which make it hard to be a Christlan.

## How to Do It

There would be no point whatever in the command given more than once, "Grow!" if there were nothing we could do about it. II Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Lovelady. Peter 3:18 gives one extremely valuable hint: "Grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and day guests of her mother, Mr. Saviour." 


