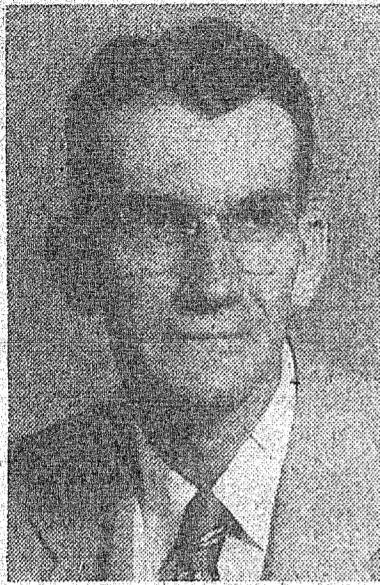

### THE CALL OF GOD TO CHRIST'S PEOPLE TODAY

In the bedlam of voices and the screaming headlines of the capitals of the world and the streets of our town, in the crying aloud to communize the world, to socialize the world, to militarize the world, to democratize the world, I also hear the voice of God; "Who shall evangelize the world? Whom shall I send and who will go for us?"

For this revival of soul-saving power the church may not be ready. But the world is ready. To the churches a revival means humiliation, a better knowledge of unworthiness, an open and humiliating confession of sin on the part of ministers and people. It is not the easy and comfortable thing many think it is, this re-instating the churches in the spiritual authority of binding and loosing. The power comes to search before it heals; it comes to condemn ministers and people for their unfaithful witness, for their selfish living, for their neglect of the Cross, and to call them to daily renunciation, to an evangelistic passion and to a deep and daily consecration.

A revival says to the people nothing of power such as they have learned to love, or of ease or of success. It accuses them of sin; it tells them that they are dead; it calls them to awake, to renounce the world and follow Christ.

Not until our churches are bowed down before God in prostration of need, in conscious dejection of unworthiness will a revival come. Not until our people in passionate self-abasement plead for that revival which through renunciation, will the revival come. Our entreaty to God in prayer for a spiritual renewal must deepen and spread until the sense of need becomes a burden, until the cry "How long, O God? How long?" becomes an agony. This is the cry which God cannot deny. It is for that cry God intently listens. For until the need becomes real, the answer is not given. Not until "the kingdom of heaven suffereth violence" does the divine response come.

If Bible-believing Christians are to be the world's evangelists, where shall we begin and how shall we proceed? We must begin where Jesus began and do what our Saviour did. It all starts with an awakened sense of the infinite worth of the individual. You must begin with the man next to you, with the congregation where you belong, in the neighborhood where you live,

## Rites For Milton Ray Woodard On Friday

Funeral services were held at the Hosch Funeral Chapel at 5:00 p. m. Friday, July 16, for Milton Ray (Jack) Woodard, aged 27, who died at 8:00 a. m. that morning in the Santa Anna Hospital, where he became a patient on Wednesday. He had returned home on Monday from a stay of several days in the Veterans hospital in Temple.

Mr. Woodard, a veteran of World War II, received severe injuries when shot down from a plane, which burned, near the men who fell. The other men preceded him in death.

Rev. H. G. Verner conducted the services here, and the body was carried to Lovington, New Mexico, for another service and burial.

Mr. Woodard had lived here only a few weeks and was part owner with his father-in-law, P. A. Lindley, of the Truck Harbor. His wife, whom he married June 3, 1953, survives him.

He was the youngest child and first to die of seven children of Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Woodard of Lovington, New Mexico. The parents arrived before his death and other members of the family came for the funeral. He was a member of the Baptist Church and calmly assured his loved ones he had made preparations for his departure.

His bereaved loved ones expressed appreciation for the kindnesses shown them by Santa Anna people. Members of the American Legion sat with the body in the funeral home Friday night until 4:15 Saturday morning and assisted as it was leaving for Lovington, where services were held at 4:00 p. m. Mr. and Mrs. Lindley and Mrs. Woodard returned home Sunday.

## Ramsey Urges Rural Men To Take Lead In Water Program

Austin (Spl.) — Lt. Governor Ben Ramsey has urged farmers and ranchers, who will benefit first, to take the lead in the development of a state-wide water conservation program.

Ramsey said a water program to first assist farmers & ranchers would bolster state economy. "When the farmer prosper, I notice that the merchant, the manufacturer and the public generally do pretty well also."

The Water Resources Committee, formed at the last session of the Legislature, is holding hearings to gather information for the development of a long-range state water conservation program.

Ramsey said, "While oil and gas are the glamour girls of our rapidly expanding state economy, farming is what we Texans do best and what we must learn to do better. Agriculture is really our basic economy because with our 267,000 square miles of land, our prosperity rises and falls with the harvest of our crops."

"Water, when and where we need it," has become the most important single factor in keeping our agriculture strong and more productive. When you save soil, you conserve water also. Farmers and ranchers in their respective communities should take the lead in and expedite the development of water conservation measures because they will benefit first," Ramsey said.

## Proper Method Of Air Conditioning

Austin — A washed-air cooler works best when enough windows and doors are open to exhaust its breeze properly and when it is in the shade, Associate Professor John R. Watt of the University of Texas asserts. Watt is testing evaporative coolers this summer to determine their best possible performances.

When washed air flows through an area, it absorbs heat from the ceiling, walls, windows, furnishings and people," Watt explains. "Unless that heat is carried out of the area, it just makes things seem hotter and clammy because of increased humidity.

Place an evaporative unit where prevailing breezes strike it if possible but keep it out of direct sunlight, Watt advises.

## Mukewater Dis. Annexed To Local School District

The County School Board annexed the Mukewater School District to the Santa Anna Independent School District at their last regular meeting. The Mukewater District has been dormant for the past two years and by law the district must be annexed to a district where regular classes are being held.

The annexation of a district requires two elections to be held. One, a Tax Election, to set the tax rate on the entire district. This rate has been set at \$150 per \$100 valuation, based on the state and county values, for the past several years. The election calls for setting the rate at the same figure.

The second election is a Bond Assumption Election and is for the purpose of assuming all the bonded indebtedness of the district annexed, which was none, and requiring the newly annexed district to assume their part of the bonded indebtedness of the entire district.

Both elections, required by law, will be held at the same time on Saturday, July 30, 1954, in the Stockard building at the corner of Wallis Avenue and N. 2nd Streets.

**A Safety Week  
Suggestion To  
Farmers - Ranchers**

College Station — A part of the safety program on every farm should be adequate liability insurance to protect the farmer against the legal risk resulting from injury or death to another person. Such protection, says E. C. Martin, agricultural leader for the Texas Extension Service, is almost a necessity under the present day methods of farm and ranch operation.

The greatly expanded use of power machinery on the farm has multiplied the risk of injury to hired help or tenants and more frequent use of motor vehicles has increased the chances for highway accidents. Then too, adds Martin, the farmer also has a responsibility to visitors on his farm.

In general, he says, a farmer's liability risks include personal liability, liability to employees and motor vehicle liability. With farm safety in the spotlight, Martin suggests that farmers

and ranchmen review their liability insurance coverage to determine if protection is adequate.

He further suggests consulting with an insurance agent, a lawyer, banker or farm organization representative for information on legal risks involved in relation to their liability problems. Too, information about employer's liability under the State workmen's compensation law and how it applies to farmers may be obtained from the Texas State Insurance Commission, Casualty Division, Austin, Texas.

Protection, in the form of insurance, could be a "life-saver" in case of a fatal or permanent disabling accident on the farm.

**Changes In Rural  
Areas Listed**

Austin — Most of Texas' rural areas are losing population but rural life is improving, Assistant Professor Wilfrid C. Bailey of the University of Texas declares.

Latest U. S. Census figures show only the irrigation-farming sections of the Texas Panhandle and Lower Rio Grande Valley recorded rural population gains.

That means prosperity for all areas, Bailey says. Farming prospects in the Panhandle and Valley are improving. In other rural sections, farms have become larger and marginal lands have been turned into grazing pastures.

Better roads and transportation have caused larger villages and towns to grow as shopping centers for the larger-farm owners, Bailey explains. Operators of small marginal farms have found better-paying jobs in the shopping centers.

Only the smaller villages have suffered from the change, he says. With today's highways and motor vehicles, a purchaser who once had time to drive 10 miles to a store now is willing to drive from 30 to 50 miles to shop.

New industries in smaller cit-

ies also are improving living conditions in many rural areas, allowing farmers to work in factories also. Bailey pointed out. An anthropologist, Bailey has made many studies of changing social, economic and cultural conditions in rural areas.





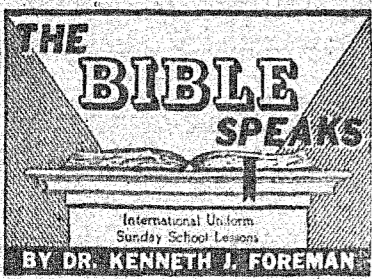

**Growing by Prayer**

Lesson for July 25, 1954

IT IS TRUE that we can grow spiritually through prayer; but it is not true that we can grow by just any prayers. Out in Tibet and other parts of the Orient they have these prayer-wheels or prayer flags. A prayer has been inscribed on the wheel or the flag, and every time the flag flaps in the breeze, or every time the wheel turns over

under the waterfall, the prayer is supposed to rise. Is a Tibetan who puts out one of those things the most spiritually mature person in any religion? Of course he is not. Jesus told a story about a Pharisee and a tax-collector, both of whom prayed in the same temple to the same God. But the tax-collector grew by his prayer, while the Pharisee certainly did not. When God said to the Israelites, "Though you make many prayers I will not listen," they were surely not growing by the prayers they had made.

**Be Still and Wait**

The trouble is that so many prayers are just variations on the one theme, "Gimme." They are selfish through and through, and selfishness never fails to shrink the soul. Then some people in praying do all the talking and never listen to see if God is saying anything to them. "They that wait on the Lord shall renew their strength," the prophet says,—not those who talk loudest and longest. "Be still and know" is as true as it ever was. For the laws of prayer have not changed since man and God first spoke with each other. The prayer by which we grow is not just a one-way thing, a kind of telephone line on which we have only a transmitter and God only a receiver. There is such a thing as being too noisy with our desires and demands.

**'In Everything--'**

There is another side to this. We ought never to feel shy about asking God's help at any time. Paul says to his friends at Philippi, "doubt from his own experience, 'have no anxiety about anything, but in everything . . . let your requests be made known to God.'" Paul knew very well that God does not say "Yes" to all our requests. He was in jail at the time he wrote those words. Is it likely he had never prayed to get out? We do know that before this time he had prayed to God earnestly to have a "thorn in the flesh" removed. We do not know what that "thorn" was, perhaps a pain or a disease that could not be cured. Perhaps Paul hoped for some miracle to cure him. But God did not send the miracle; he sent something much better. Paul learned that God's strength is made perfect in weakness, something he would not have known had he not been weak. So while we have every right to offer God our desires in prayer, we have to remember that he knows what is best, and not we ourselves.

**'The Throne of Grace'**

In conversation, one of the best simple rules is: "Remember" to whom you are speaking." This is just as true when we are talking with God as when we are talking with other people. That great phrase in Hebrews, the "throne of grace," expresses two vital truths. One is that our prayers are going to a Throne. God is the sovereign of this universe; his throne is Power itself. There is nothing too hard for the God of the Throne. It is a throne of judgment too; and God knows very well whether we ought to have our prayers answered the way we want them, or not. We have access through Christ to come before God with boldness; but it is to a throne we come, and we must not forget that. We can never dictate to the throne. But it is the throne of Grace. More than mere power sits in control of all things. The true God is a God of love and grace and mercy. "He knoweth our frame, he remembereth that we are dust." God is actually more interested in our welfare than we are in our own. God is more eager to help us than we are to be helped. Our prayers do not so much change God's mind and induce him to do something for us, as they release the divine purpose on our behalf. This is why it is so important to grow, as Christians, into the stature of Christ; for only as we grow Christlike can we become aware of what God's gracious will is, and so be able to pray as Christ himself would pray.

binding contract may be completed in the most informal manner.

Probably most of the contracts in force today are merely spoken agreements. Many contracts are created by formal letters written by persons to one another. Many are made over the telephone, as when you call up a store and they agree to deliver some goods you order. Much of the world's grain supply is bought and sold, in the first instance, merely by hand signals in the great Pit in Chicago.

If the contract is of importance, involving substantial sums of money or vital services, it is a good idea to reduce its terms to writing to minimize the possibilities of fraud and misunderstanding. Details or oral under-

standings are easily forgotten or misinterpreted, but written contracts endure unchanged. And, if a difference of opinion must be settled in court, a written agreement speaks for itself.

Certain kinds of contracts, such as those involving the sale of real estate or the lease of real estate for more than a year, will not be enforced in the courts unless written. In the same category are contracts wherein one person undertakes to stand good for the debt of another and those which are not to be performed within one year from the date on which the agreement is made.

In order to create a valid contract of any sort, each party involved must be legally competent to enter into the agreement. Each must be sane and of legal age. A contract entered into by a male or unmarried female under 21 is voidable at the option of the minor (but not at the option of the other party). A married woman is competent to contract if 18 or over, but she is subject to a number of contractual restrictions because of her marriage.

To be enforceable, a contract must be entered into freely by each party involved. Their consent must be genuine. Compul-

sion or coercion will make the agreement void. Mistake, misrepresentation or fraud may also serve to invalidate a contract.

Another requirement of a contract is that each party perform some part of it. Similarly, there must be some object or benefit to be gained by each party. In return for your work, your employer agrees to pay you certain sums of money. He gains the use of your services, while you are benefitted by the wages or salary received.

Also, a contract must be entered into for a lawful purpose. You cannot enter into a binding contract to commit a crime or to evade the law. Thus, since gambling and wagers are prohibited by law, gambling debts cannot be collected by legal process. Nor will the courts enforce an agreement to pay interest in excess of the legal maximum provided by statute.

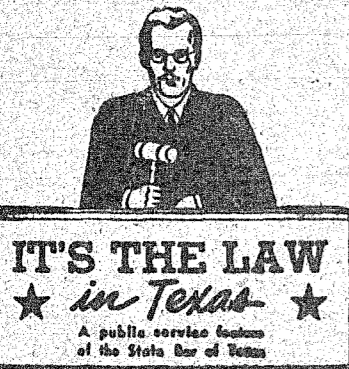

# State Capitol NEWS

Austin — Down to its bitter end moved the campaign for Governor of Texas.

Relatively short, the drive was one of the most intensive this state, notable for its violent politics, had ever seen.

Two men dominated the picture: Governor Allan Shivers, candidate for re-election; and his opponent, Ralph W. Yarborough, of Austin.

Shivers stood foursquare on his record of achievement in office and pledged to continue, if re-elected, "the progressive program" he had worked for during his tenure.

Cited by the Governor were concrete figures showing that during his administration Texas has come far:

"From worst to among the best is the state prison system's record.

"Many miles of farm-to-market roads have been built and maintained. Generally, the state highway system has been improved.

"Pay of teachers and public employees has been increased.

"Considerable progress has been made in the state hospitals and special schools.

"Title to our tidelands has been regained, and that victory meant \$32 million already realized for the State's school children, with untold billions yet to come."

**Yarborough Described**  
As he recounted the record of his administrations, Shivers flung certain charges at his opponent.

Yarborough, he said, is the captive of people who don't want to get tough with the Communists, and who want to get the Texas and anti-Communist law repealed.

Shivers further charged: That Yarborough has made no positive statement on the segregation issue.

That Yarborough has promised George Parr to call off the cleanup in Duval County.

That CIO Union bosses had placed a \$2 per head levy on

members for a defeat-Shivers slush fund.

That Yarborough wanted schools run from Washington, not locally.

**Yarborough Talks**  
Shivers' opponent, twice a candidate for the state's highest office, was making his strongest bid for election.

Whether it was true that he had powerful support from the CIO could not be proven.

But he had money to buy expensive time on the state's radio and television stations, and to produce a campaign newspaper for statewide distribution.

Yarborough also was the first gubernatorial candidate to completely ignore the rural press of the state, in his bid for office. To reach the voters in the non-metropolitan areas, he has depended largely on TV and radio.

Some folks haven't liked the approach because it has crowded off their TV screens some of their favorite programs. Others have enjoyed politics' first big year on TV in Texas. Results of the approach will show definitely on July 24 when Texans go to the polls to record their choices for that and other offices.

**Yarborough Campaign**  
Yarborough based his campaign principally on charges which Shivers described as "mudslinging."

Yarborough had these things to say:

That Shivers had made a secret deal with George Parr of Duval County.

That Shivers had caused the resignation of former Chancellor James P. Hart of the University of Texas.

That Shivers had made contradictory remarks about segregation.

That Shivers' Republican friends are trying to cheat Texas out of part of the tidelands.

On the positive side, Yarborough promised higher teacher pay and old age assistance.

**Shepperd View**  
The information that Texas' tidelands fight is not yet over is no new development according to Attorney General John Ben Shepperd in a reply to gubernatorial candidate Ralph W. Yarborough.

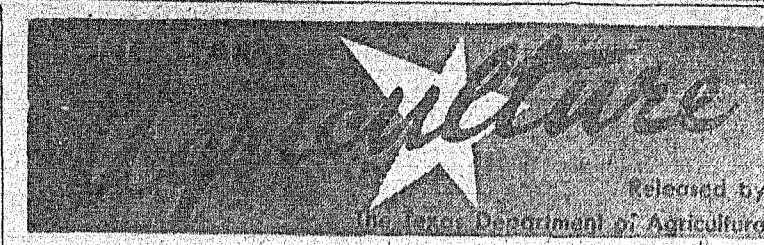
Shepperd issued his statement shortly after a remark by Yarborough that the Attorney General had let it "leak out" that the federal government still refused to recognize state tidelands boundaries as more than three miles off shore.

The state claims over 10 miles in the Gulf of Mexico and has issued leases for much of that area.

Shepperd said the tidelands dispute involving the boundary location was made public as early as last October in a newspaper article.

Although declining to take issue in the political battle for governor, Shepperd said that "the true facts concerning the matter should be made clear."

## CAUSES OF CATTLE BLOAT

A clue to major ranch headache, livestock bloat, has been found in legumes.

Agricultural researchers believe they have discovered the culprit in saponins, those plant materials that produce a soapy lather. Scientists say this helps explain the steady increase of bloat in recent years as improved varieties have increased the use of legumes in pasture mixtures.

In recent tests, alfalfa saponin was fed to five yearling ewes, two goats, and one heifer. In 8 out of 10 cases, the saponin caused definite distention. Bloat was severe enough in one sheep given 55 grams that it required immediate treatment to prevent death.

Legume saponins had long been suspected as causing bloat but they had never been isolated in identifiable form and in amounts for testing until recently. Now it is possible to obtain several pounds of saponin per ton of dry alfalfa.

Proof that alfalfa saponin can cause bloat is the first big lead in the all out effort by government and industry to find the cause of an ailment which costs millions of dollars annually. Bloat not only kills animals, it reduces milk yields and retards fattening of beef cattle.

Actually, these preliminary investigations have just scratched the surface. They will be extended to include studies of the active or toxic forms of saponins in different varieties of alfalfa, as well as in Ladino and other clovers.

The federal Agricultural Research Service is the leader of the project. Many states, including Texas, are actively cooperating, with federal agencies in a search for other possible causes

the Fort Worth Corps of Engineers stated in Austin.

Legislation includes the proposed Canyon Dam for the Guadalupe River near New Braunfels and six major reservoirs to be created in the Brazos River Basin.

Hallock said that if the dams are built, many millions of acre-feet of water can be stored against drought periods.

If bloat can be reduced only slightly, it will mean many thousands of dollars extra for Texas cattlemen.

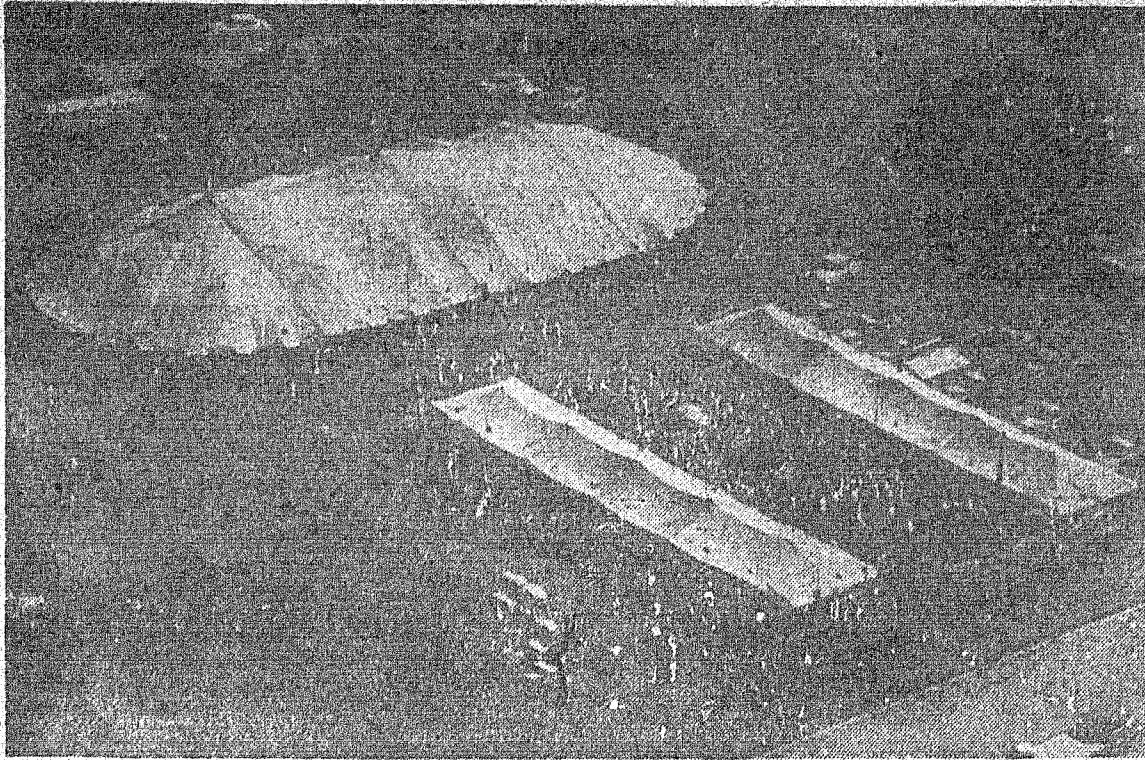

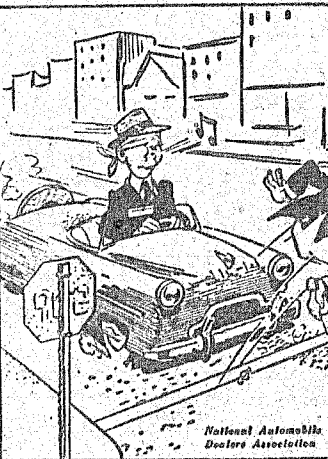
