In the rural-voting boxes your precinct chairmen will also be a write in.

We urge each of you to study the qualifications of each candidate. Vote for the person in each race you think is best qualified to fill the office for the next term.

## Severe Weather Brings Needed Rain; Some Hail

Severe weather beginning Sunday evening and continuing through the night, and more Monday morning brought some much needed rain to most sections of this part of the country. A few areas were battered with hail and some crops were lost.

Here in Santa Anna 2 inches were measured at the Coleman Gas Company office Monday morning. There was not enough moisture to measure Sunday night. However, to the north and east of us, heavy rains were reported in several places, with considerable hail. Garland Powell, in the Buffalo Community, said he received four inches of rain in less than one hour Sunday night, along with severe hail. He said he did not know how much damage was done to his grain, but he would likely have to re-roof a part of his house. Other damage was also reported. William Brown reportedly lost several head of turkeys to the hail, and numerous other farmers had crop damage.

Monday morning about one-half inch rain fell in the Buffalo area, with some minor hail being reported. To the east and southeast of Santa Anna heavy hail and rain was reported from the Monday storm. Most seem to think the hail did some damage, but not as much as the benefits will amount to from the needed rain that fell. About 2 inches fell through most of this area. Rain was considerably lighter to the south and southwest areas. Reports run all the way from just a sprinkle to just under an inch, mostly in the one-half inch vicinity.

Gentle rains fell in the area Tuesday night, amounting to .55 inch in Santa Anna. Reports indicate about the same amount fell in most other areas nearby.

## Census "Were You Counted?" Campaign

With the 1960 Census of Population and Housing virtually completed locally, District Supervisor William G. Stacy today announced the beginning of a "Were You Counted?" campaign to insure that no resident of the area has been overlooked.

Persons who believe they have been missed by the census takers are urged to notify the census district office by means of "Were You Counted?" forms. Area newspapers are printing these forms in their current editions as a public service. Prompt mailing of the "Were You Counted?" forms will speed up the compilation of preliminary population figures for the area.

Preliminary figures presenting the total population of incorporated places of 10,000 or more population, and for counties, will be issued as soon as the district supervisor is convinced that a complete count has been made. Final, detailed population figures will be issued in Washington later this year after the returns have been tabulated on the Census Bureau's electronic computers.

The importance of a complete count was stressed by the district supervisor. He pointed out that the population figures compiled in the current census must stand as official until the next Federal Census.

"Federal aid funds are allotted to States and State funds, in turn, are allotted to counties and municipalities on a per capita basis. So a short count means a short allotment. Thus, it is imperative that we have a complete count. The help of every resident of the area is needed to reach this goal," he said.

# State Capitol NEWS

Austin — A great number of persons are not aware of the fact that the Legislature, at its 1959 session, moved the primary and run-off elections forward several months.

Candidates are not in sufficient abundance this year to impress this fact upon the voters. Now with only a short period remaining, many of them are surprised to learn that not one out of a hundred voters knows when the elections are to be held.

Those who are campaigning have not failed to stress the earlier voting dates. First primary will be held on Saturday, May 7. The run-off, if any should be necessary, is scheduled for June 4.

If you are going to be out of town during the first primary election, May 7, you have from now until May 3 to vote absentee for that election.

After May 3 you must go to the polls if you want to vote.

For those living in a county seat town, the simplest procedure is to go by the county clerk's office. If you do not live in the county seat, you can write the county clerk for the necessary forms.

Voting in the Democratic primaries is essential to participation in other Democratic party activities this year. No one will

be allowed to take part in a Democratic precinct convention unless he has a poll tax that has been stamped "Democratic." Poll tax holders must vote in the primary, absentee or at the polls, to get their poll taxes stamped.

This new section of the election law was designed to keep out so-called "one-day Democrats" who participate in Democratic primaries and conventions, and Republican conventions, too. People who go to the GOP precinct conventions will have their poll taxes stamped "Republican." This shut the door on their having any part in Democratic Party affairs until they get a new poll tax.

An intensive campaign has been under way for several weeks to educate voters to the new procedures and dates and the importance of their voting and coming to precinct conventions.

**DOOR KNOB COSTS CUT**  
Amid a statewide hullabaloo over the cost of hardware came a quiet explanation that the door knobs in the State Office Building really cost only \$3.65, not \$36.00 a piece.

H. R. Nieman, executive director of the State Building Commission, said the cost of all the hardware for the building—including automatic closers, locks, keys, hinges and door-stops for 1,000 doors—came to \$36,000.

Nieman, who was not with the building commission at the time the State Office Building was constructed, called the hardware cost "well within reason."

Nieman's statement punctured a story that had been the subject of almost as many jokes as Pappy O'Daniel's flour barrel. It got started when a House committee on tax saving investigated the building which had cracks in the lobby's terrazzo floor.

Sightseers had come, almost as to a museum, to look at the highly publicized stainless steel knobs.

**TROUBLES EVERYWHERE**  
If sunny weather and disappearance of the flu has you feeling secure and content, the State Department of Health has bad news.

Health officials warn of three separate menaces:

1. Rabies is on the increase — up 33 percent from this time last year. During the first three months of the year 219 positive cases were diagnosed.

2. It's the measles season with Travis County (Austin) leading the state with 250 cases reported. Nueces County (Corpus Christi) reported 205 and Galveston 172.

3. Stinging caterpillars are about and will be around feeding on trees and shrubs until fall. Health Department officials particularly urge parents to

warn their children not to pick up the fuzzy, fascinating moth larvae. Stings should be treated as bee or wasp stings — by cleaning with alcohol and covering with calamine or other soothing lotion.

**OIL SLUMPS FURTHER**  
Texas oil allowable has been further reduced to a permissible flow of 2,574,894 barrels a day for May.

An eight-day producing pattern, as low as at any recent time, was set by the Railroad Commission.

A number of independent producers ask for an even sharper cut to seven days. They said the industry was going into a lower-demand season with too much oil on hand.

Recent crude oil price cuts have intensified the general gloom of the Texas oil industry. It raises, too, the probability that state tax revenue from oil will fall substantially below expectations.

**CRIMINAL CODE CHANGES**  
Directors of the State Bar of Texas approved recommendations for extensive changes in the Texas Criminal Code.

But they took a "make haste slowly" view about taking the proposals to the Legislature. If enacted, the revisions would bring about considerable change in the way criminal court trials are conducted.

Bar directors suggested the proposals might be voted upon by lawyers and studied in seminars over the state before presentation to the Legislature in 1963.

Recommended changes would allow 11 jurors to return a verdict if one juror had to drop out and would leave the locking up of juries in criminal cases to the discretion of the judge.

**LOAN SHARK INJUNCTION UPHELD**  
Texas Supreme Court upheld state action against several loan companies accused of charging excessive interest.

It was the first test in the state's highest court in a field where the state has filed 365 suits against loan companies for charging more than the legal maximum interest.

In other action, the Supreme Court ordered the participants in a fight over grazing rights in the Davis Mountain State Park to start all over with a new trial in district court.

At odds over the matter are the State Parks Board, which leased the land for park use, and owners of grazing rights on the land. Owners of grazing rights locked the gates to keep the public from using the park for horseback riding. Parks Board declared this impaired its use as a public park.

Supreme Court said there was error on both sides and ordered a fresh start.

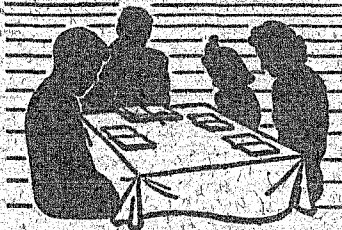

### Some Household Help Not Being Reported for SS

Some 100,000 housewives throughout the nation may be violating the social security laws by not making timely reports on the wages they pay their household help, according to a report furnished by R. E. Tuley, Jr., Abilene district manager for the Social Security Administration.

Each employer who pays a household worker (including a baby-sitter) as much as \$50 cash wages during a calendar quarter must file a return with the Internal Revenue Service, giving the name, social security account number, and amount of wages paid the employee. The law puts the sole responsibility for filing the returns and paying the tax on the employer, even though the employee may have asked that no tax be withheld from the wages.

If not detected by the Internal Revenue Service through its routine enforcement procedures, those employers not filing reports, may later be called to account in a number of different ways. Such could happen when a worker applies at the social security office for retirement or disability benefits, or when a survivor of a household worker applies for payment after the worker's death. An employer found to be delinquent under those conditions would normally be liable for the entire tax for several years back, plus interest and penalties.

Any housewife who employs domestic help (cook, maid, yardman, baby-sitter, etc.) should ask the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration for the free booklet "Social Security for Your Household Employee", and when received should complete the post-card form attached and mail it to the District Director of Internal Revenue. She will then be placed on the mailing list for the quarterly tax return forms. Returns for the first three months of 1960 are due by April 30.

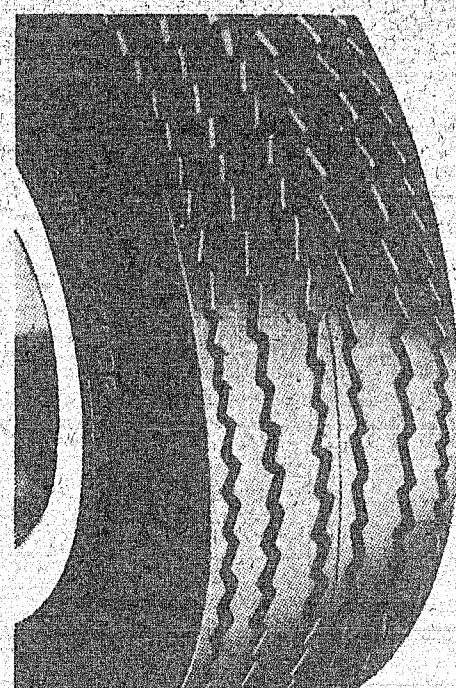

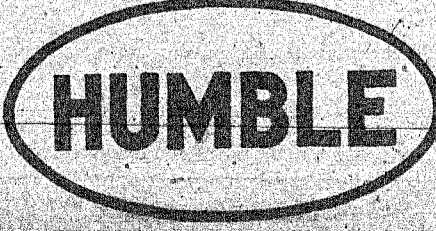

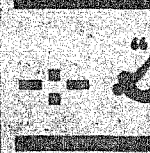
