Such could happen when a worker applies at the social security office for retirement or disability benefits, or when a survivor of a household worker applies for payment after the worker's death. An employer found to be delinquent under those conditions would normally be liable for the entire tax for several years back, plus interest and penalties.

Any housewife who employs domestic help (cook, maid, yard man, baby-sitter, etc.) should ask the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration for the free booklet "Social Security for Your Household Employee", and when received should, complete the post card form attached and mail it to the District Director of Internal Reve nue. She will then be placed on the mailing list for the quarterly tax return forms. Returns for the first three months of 1960 are due by April 30.






