The Second Democratic Primary election will be held throughout Texas on Saturday, June 4, just over a week from the date of this newspaper. We would like to urge every qualified voter to go to the polls and cast your ballot. It is very important to the men whose names will appear on the ballot, and it is very important to you as a citizen to cast your vote.

Three offices will be decided in this primary. The only state wide election will be for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Lloyd W. Davidson of Travis County is seeking re-election to this high office, and in our opinion should be defeated. He has caused untold hardships for other members of the court, and has been directly responsible for numerous convicted criminals to be released, because of very minor errors and the phrasing of minor complaints. He has cost the State of Texas many dollars in trial courts because of his tactics. So, we urge you to vote for Judge W. T. McDonald of Brazos County, who is presently serving as a District Judge at Bryan.

The other two races are on the local level and for that reason we do not suggest which one for you to vote for. However, we do suggest you give each candidate due consideration, and that you vote for the one you feel is best qualified to fill the positions they seek.

The races are for District Judge, 35th Judicial District, which includes Coleman, Brown and McCullough counties. Joe Dibrell of Coleman and William O. Breedlove of Brownwood are in the run-off.

And for Sheriff of Coleman County, which has two candidates that have been matched against each other on two occasions. H. F. Fenton Jr., is seeking re-election, and W. J. Smith is seeking the office.

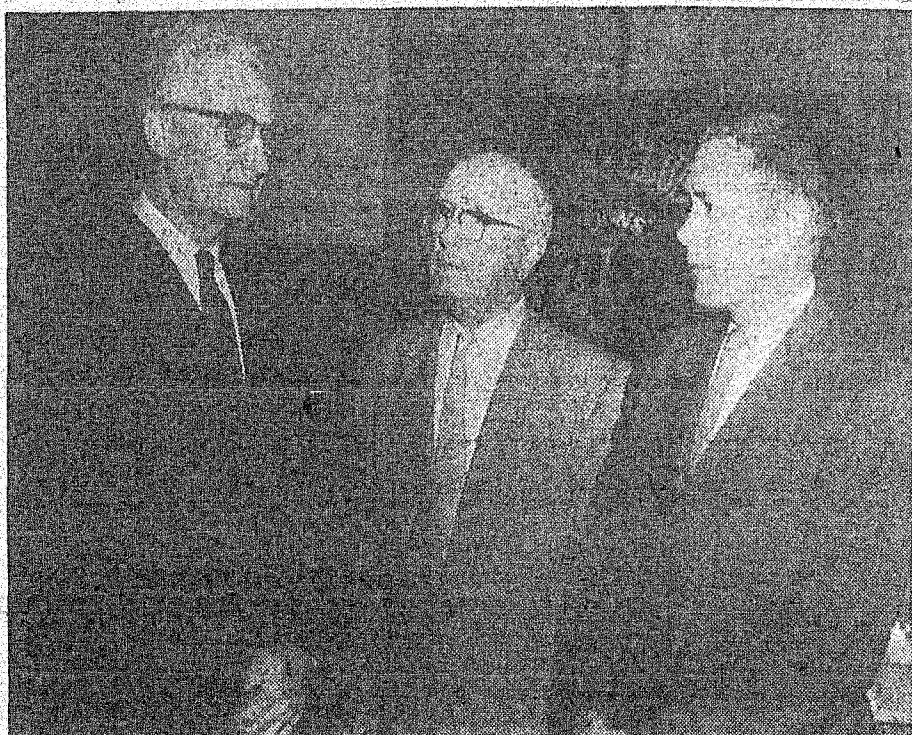

L. Gene Hensley Buried Here Friday Afternoon

Military rites were conducted in the Santa Anna Cemetery Friday afternoon, May 20, for L. Gene Hensley, a former resident of Santa Anna and a longtime military officer. Hensley died in the Veterans Hospital in Oklahoma City, Okla., Monday, May 16, after an illness of about two years. He had spent about six months of the past year in the hospital.

Mr. Hensley was born in Santa Anna March 25, 1905 to Mr. and Mrs. John A. Hensley. He graduated from Santa Anna High School with the Class of 1923 and was married to Miss Jeanette Johnson November 27, 1929, in Santa Anna.

When just a lad of 16 years of age Hensley joined the local National Guard Company and remained with them until after World War II. He was mobilized with the Company in late 1940 as a Lieutenant and Commander of the Company. He spent 34 months with the 36th Division in Europe, serving in Italy, North Africa, France and Germany. He came home in December, 1945 and was discharged from the Army. He was re-called in 1951 and sent to Korea where he served for 20 months. After returning from Korea he was assigned as an Army Advisor to the 95th Reserve Division in Oklahoma City. He was retired from active duty March 31, 1957.

Mr. and Mrs. Hensley have been in the ranching and Quarterhorse business in Oklahoma for the past five years. Hensley was a member of the American Quarterhorse Association, National Cutting Horse Assn., and a number of other horse clubs there. He was presented a lifetime membership in the Rodeo Cowboy's Association of America when he reached his 50th birthday.

Hensley was a member of the Corpus Christi Catholic Church of Oklahoma City, where services were held at 9 a. m. Thursday, May 19. Father Walde was in charge of the Oklahoma services. The body was transported to Santa Anna where services were held on Friday. Father Benedict of Coleman conducted services at the Hosch Funeral Home and helped with the services at the graveside.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Jeanette Hensley of Edmond, Okla., one brother, G. A. (Tode) Hensley of Coleman; two step-sisters, Mrs. Joe Stuart of San Antonio and Miss Annette Hensley of Corpus Christi. Pallbearers were Vernon L. Scott of Ft. Hood, Maj. Grady Leach of Brownwood, Capt. Robert Hinkle of Brownwood, Sgt. O. L. Oakes of Brownwood, Capt. Eddie P. Voss and Lt. Billy J. Harvey of Santa Anna. The firing squad was composed of Master Sergeants John Hensley, Thomas Wristen, Charles Wristen, W. R. White and T/Sgt. Glen Copeland and P. Roach. Buglers were Donnie Neff and Darlene Mercer.

State Capitol NEWS

Austin — Gov. Price Daniel's money raising proposals indicate that many of next year's tax battles will be fought on familiar terrain.

Basic program submitted by the governor to the State Finance Advisory Commission is the same as the one he submitted in 1959. Even the total goal is nearly the same.

In 1959 the Legislature passed

a bill aimed at raising \$185,000,000 in new money. Governor Daniel estimates 1961 new-money-needs at \$193,000,000. This is to cover an expected deficit of about \$68,000,000 and increased annual spending of about \$62,527,000.

To raise this money, the governor suggests revising the corporation franchise tax formula and increasing the liquor tax, gross receipts tax on utilities and the auto sales tax. He also suggests passing the abandoned-property act (allowing the state to take over unclaimed bank accounts, property, etc.) and putting a tax on beer and cigarettes sold on military bases.

Governor Daniel also told the Commission of four other tax ideas which he said had been suggested by others.

These include:

1. A 10 percent increase on all items in the Omnibus Tax Bill except cigarettes, tobacco and franchises.

2. A 1-cent-a-gallon increase in the gasoline tax.

3. A tax of 1 cent per thousand cubic feet on the processing of natural gas.

4. A 3 percent tax on gross receipts of gas pipeline companies.

Governor Daniel said he knew

his proposal would be criticized as "riding the same old horses." But he said the affected tax sources would not be taxed any heavier than those in neighboring and competing states.

Finance Commission is to begin committee work this month and hold another joint session of its 34 members — all leaders in their fields — in June.

TAX EXEMPT SALES JUMP

Texas apparently is losing some tax revenue through sale of tax-exempt cigarettes on military posts, reports State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert.

Calvert told the State Finance Commission that since the state tax increased to eight cents a pack last year, cigarette sales at federal installations have jumped almost a million packs a month.

He said sale of tax-exempt cigarettes in March, 1960, was up by 1,500,000 packs over what it was in March, 1959. Military officials denied that non-taxed cigarette-selling-privileges had been abused.

DEMO HOUSING PROBLEM

Austin hotel and motel facilities will be stretched beyond capacity when an estimated 5,000 come here June 14 for the State Democratic Convention.

It's more people than Austin can accommodate. To ease the problem a little, the State Democratic Executive Committee has ruled that no room reservations will be made for persons living within 75 miles of the Capital City.

Also in preparation for the big day, SDEC has named a credentials committee whose job will be to decide which delegates shall be admitted.

Four counties had "rump" conventions and will send two rival delegations to Austin. Governor Daniel, "poo-hooing" the "rump" groups, said they were all too small to be a threat to the official delegations.

"There is more harmony in the Texas Democratic Party now than ever before," said the governor.

BEAUTIFUL MAPS READY

Texas' new 1960 official highway map, illustrated with 11 dramatic full-color pictures, now is available for the asking.

It's not only handsome, but informative. It shows the 1,933 miles of multi-lane divided highways not completed. Also, 26,378 miles of state and U.S. highways and 20,000 miles of farm-to-market roads.

Lakes, state parks and roadside parks are indicated. Texas' history, geography, and present opportunities are summarized.

In line with the state's tourist-seeking policy, it is headed, "All of Texas Welcomes You."

OIL ALLOWABLE UP

Texas Railroad Commission retained the eight-day producing pattern for the Texas oil industry for June, but because June has one day less than May, daily permissible production will be slightly higher.

Statewide allowable for June will be 2,643,516 barrels a day, a 47,108 barrel a day increase from May.

Several major oil companies asked the Commission to set nine producing days in June, indicating they expected an increase in demand for Texas crude within the next month.

REPAIR FUNDS OKAYED

Legislative Budget Board has approved transfer of \$75,000 for repair work at the Big Spring State Hospital, Abilene State School and Mexia State School. Board also heard a report that a state job classification study, detailing requirements for 1,225 different jobs, is nearing completion.

MED SCHOOL MONEY SOUGHT

A new money request awaiting the Legislature next year will be that of the University of Texas for \$100,000 for the planning of a new medical branch in San Antonio.

UT Regents said the money would be used to get specialists in medical center planning to estimate what would be required. With this information the board could draw up plans and a request for funds for the center itself from a later Legislature.

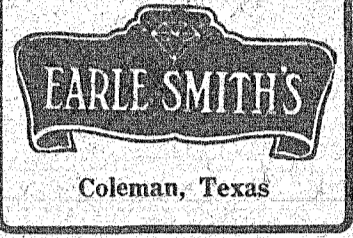

THAT U-2 INCIDENT has served to throw fresh light on the world-wide network of Soviet espionage activities. Because domestic communists in all countries owe their first loyalty to the Soviet Union, the Kremlin has a built-in spy system. In addition, Soviet agents by the thousands operate out of Embassies and Red Consulates everywhere.

The West, on the other hand, cannot compete with the Muscovites in that field. The police state with its secrecy makes it extremely difficult for western intelligence to get through.

Yet, in this missile age, when perhaps the only defense against the ICBMs is to destroy the launching sites, the necessity for knowledge about the location of such sites is self-evident. Hence, the risks that are taken.

Khrushchev showing outrage over the U-2 incident would be about like Frank Costello being outraged over a bingo game!

SPECULATION over what happened to Mr. K. in Paris continues. One line of thought, shared by many, is that when the Soviet leader went to Paris he thought there would be a summit conference. But after his arrival in France the word was flashed to him from the powerful Politburo in Moscow to keep away from it, turn his vehem on the U. S. and Eisenhower.

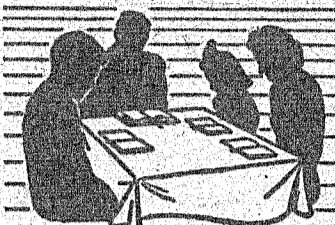
Others point out that things have not been going too smoothly between the Chinese Comies and the Moscow Reds, and Peking, which has all along has opposed the summit deal, turned the heat on Khrushchev and Co. to heed their demands

following the U-2 crash. That may have helped the Soviet Bosses make up their minds to sabotage the meeting.

All seem to agree that even if there had never been a U-2 incident the summit conference was doomed to failure. The Soviets found themselves right up to the lick-log and were looking for an excuse to ditch the meet without appearing to be at fault.

The big break for the West came when Khrushchev blew his top, and made a mad, raving fool out of himself, with the whole world looking on.

Warden Warns Keep Hands off Wildlife Young

Austin — Leave the babes of the woods in the woods. That's the advice of Captain E. M. Sprott, director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission.

During the spring season, when the young of wildlife come into the world, they are subject to many predators, not the least of them being persons who think the baby birds or animals are cute.

There is a tendency on the part of children to pick up baby rabbits or baby birds, but grown-ups have their weakness, too. It seems they just cannot pass a little fawn. They'll be driving down the road and spot a baby deer. Chances are that the mother is hiding in nearby brush, but the fawn-napper doesn't realize this. He gathers up the small animal and takes

it home with him. Bottle fed, the little animal grows up and becomes the family pet, unless someone reports it to the warden beforehand. Then one day the family pet reverts to nature and injures someone. The game warden then is called to take the deer back to the wild.

"If you have reason to believe a mother deer has been killed, then notify the game warden," says Captain Sprott. "Don't try to raise these babies yourself. It is illegal and dangerous."

Dairy Foods Plentiful for June Dairy Month

Coleman Station — There will be an abundance of milk and dairy products this June the Dairy Month.

In fact dairy food supplies are so large they are featured on the U. S. Department of Agriculture's June list of plentiful foods, reports the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The good-supply story covers the dairy field — whole milk, buttermilk, skim milk, flavored milks, butter, yogurt, cheese of all kinds, dry milk, evaporated milk, cottage cheese, cream, half-and-half and ever-popular ice cream.

Fresh spring vegetables also will be plentiful in Texas this month. Watch local markets and advertisements for specials. Look for especially good buys on celery, asparagus, onions, radishes, salad greens, green peppers, cucumbers, sweet corn, snap beans and potatoes. USDA's list emphasizes the abundance of Texas onions.

The supply of broilers and fryers continues large and current prices encourage frequent use of chicken for picnics and patio cooking.

Peanut butter is on the list. This protein-rich food is ideal for sandwiches with milk and a host of cooking and baking recipes. Vegetable fats and oils are plentiful. Prices are running lower than a year ago. And they're just the thing for spring salad time.

Wheat Referendum Set for July 21

Coleman Station — In line with current controlling legislation, Secretary of Agriculture Benson has proclaimed marketing quotas on the 1961 wheat crop and set July 21 as the date for a referendum to determine producer approval or disapproval of quotas.

The Secretary also proclaimed a national wheat acreage allotment of 55 million acres, the minimum permitted by law and announced State shares of the allotment. Texas' share of the allotment was set at 4,047,136 acres. This compares with 4,092,251 acres in 1960. An announcement was also made that the minimum national average support price for 1961 production will be determined before the wheat referendum on the basis of the latest available supply information.

If producers approve marketing quotas, under the proclamation announced, the national average support price available to eligible growers in the commercial area will be not less than the minimum support to be announced before the referendum. On the basis of the present supply of wheat and present legislation, the legal minimum wheat support price for the 1961 crop would be at 75 percent of parity.

Individual farm marketing quotas will be the normal production or the actual production

Summer and "sleeping sickness" go hand in hand. Sleeping sickness is actually a type of encephalitis transmitted by infective mosquitoes. The popular name is derived from the stupor it sometimes causes among its victims.

Since mosquitoes abound in warm weather, summer is the danger season for mosquito-borne encephalitis. The State Department of Health last year received reports of 57 cases, all of which occurred during the months of summer and early fall.

Altogether there are some 75 species of mosquitoes which have been identified in Texas, but encephalitis is spread principally by just two. The experts call them "cultex tarsalis" and "cultex quinquefaciatus." The latter is sometimes called the household mosquito because it has adapted itself to backyard environments.

Texas Will Aid Duck Banding Job in Canada

Austin — Texas will participate again this year in the duck banding program in the Canadian wetlands, according to H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission. Each year, through a co-operative program between agencies of the United States and Canada, workers go into the nesting grounds to band young ducks and make a survey of the potential duck population.

According to Ducks Limited, prairie water conditions are greatly improved over 1959, but are still below the exceptional years in the mid 1950's. The snowfall was not heavy during the past winter, but heavy rains did saturate the soil. Geese appeared in Alberta March 17, and mallards and pintails on March 21. Western Saskatchewan reported arrivals only a few days later.

The National Wildlife Federation this summer will continue its survey of nesting production in northern U. S. and Canada. Reconnaissance trips will be made into Minnesota, the Dakotas, Manitoba and Saskatchewan in middle July.

From Texas, Tate Pitman of Seymour will join with U.S. Fish and Wildlife representatives in Canada to assist in banding the young ducks and geese. He will be away about six weeks.

from the farm acreage allotment, whichever is larger. Growers in the commercial area who stay within their allotments will be eligible for price support on their entire production. Growers who exceed their acreage allotments will be subject to market quota penalties if they have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest.

Growers who sign applications for exemption under the feed wheat provision permitting 30 acres or less to be used exclusively for feed on the farm will not be subject to marketing quota penalties.

If marketing quotas are not approved by the necessary two-thirds of the voting producers in the July 21 referendum, there will be no restrictions on wheat marketing. Acreage allotments will remain in effect as a condition of eligibility for price support at 50 percent of parity as required by law.

WTU Extends H-Bomb Program 4 More Years

The world's first and largest privately financed program aimed at harnessing the H-bomb's tremendous power for the generation of electricity has been extended for an additional four years. It was announced recently by Cal Young, President of West Texas Utilities Company.

West Texas Utilities Company is a member of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, composed of 11 investor-owned electric utilities companies operating in Texas. Cal Young is a director of the Foundation.

The directors voted at their annual meeting in Houston last week to continue their joint sponsorship of the nuclear research program underway since 1957 at the laboratories of General Dynamics Corporation's Atomic Energy Division which has as its goal the controlled power generation Nuclear fusion is the process responsible for the energy of the sun and stars, and of the hydrogen bomb.

J. E. Cunningham, president of the Foundation, announced the decision to extend the partnership with General Dynamics in this challenging and exciting undertaking aimed at unlocking the secret of this process and ultimately providing mankind with a virtually limitless source of power for millenniums to come.

Cunningham is President of Southwestern Public Service Company of Amarillo. Other member companies of TAERF are: Central Power & Light Company, Community Public Service Company, Dallas Power & Light Company, El Paso Electric Company, Gulf States Utilities Company, Houston Lighting & Power Company, Southwestern Electric Power Company, Texas Electric Service Company, Texas Power & Light Company and West Texas Utilities Company.

The jointly sponsored program was established in May, 1957, at General Atomic's John Jay Hopkins Laboratory for Pure and Applied Science in San Diego, Calif., shortly after the 11 utility companies formed TAERF as a means of consolidating and making more effective their participation in the development of atomic energy in the United States.

The program, which has shown a steady expansion over the past four years, includes both theoretical and experimental work in plasma phenomena, directed toward ultimately controlling and sustaining a

man-made fusion reaction. Dr. Frederick de Hoffmann, Senior Vice President of General Dynamics and President of General Atomic Division, hailed the TAERF decision as "a further impressive demonstration of the vision and vitality of the pioneering spirit in American enterprise in the best tradition of technological progress."

General Dynamics is delighted that we are to continue our association in this venture with such a forward-looking group of utilities," he said.

Dr. de Hoffmann said the new experimental facilities now coming into operation result largely from an enlargement of interest in shock wave plasma generation and ionization.

Indicative of the growth of the joint program, he said, is the fact that more than 50 scientists and other technical personnel are now engaged in its theoretical and experimental activities. In addition, the program has access to the talents of more than 1,000 scientists, engineers and others who make up the personnel of the John Jay Hopkins Laboratory. A large atomic beam laboratory because of the nature of its research program is closely associated with the controlled fusion program.

The program is under the direction of Dr. Donald W. Kerst, inventor and developer of the betatron nuclear accelerator. Dr. Marshall N. Rosenbluth, internationally known physicist, heads the theoretical research in plasma stability at General Atomic.

Mr. Cunningham explained that the long-range research program is directed toward the fundamental phenomena involved rather than toward the early use of fusion energy in electric power plants, although the possibility of using controlled fusion for commercial power generation represents of course the ultimate goal.

Although supplied of fossil fuels in the United States are adequate to meet demands for some years to come, they are by no means inexhaustible," he added. "Our needs for power and for new sources of energy will increase tremendously over the years and eventually additional sources of energy must be found and utilized."

Mr. Cunningham pointed out that natural gas, which is the principal fuel for electric power generation in Texas, is still abundant in that area, and the cost of generating electricity at this time with atomic power plants employing the fission process (as opposed to controlled fusion) would be much greater in Texas than through use of natural gas or oil.

COTTONSEED MARGINS OF COOPERATIVE GINS

Cottonseed, once a waste product of the cotton industry, has become an important agricultural product, which contributes to our economy in the form of human food, animal feed and other valuable products.

The competitive market position of cottonseed has been improved by major developments in processing along with improvement in cotton production. In 1959 the Texas cotton crop was valued at almost 737 million dollars at the farm level, and cottonseed accounted for over 72 million dollars of this total. Seed normally contributes 10 to 15 percent of the total value of the cotton crop.

More seed to go to the crushers every year and fewer seeds are returned to the farm for feed. The modern cotton producer prefers to feed cakes and hulls and to plant certified seed.

Cotton gins are practically the only market available to farmers for their cottonseed. The prices which gins receive from cottonseed oil mills presumably determine the price farmers receive from the gins for their cottonseed. However, the margins between the mill prices and prices paid farmers are affected by the operating methods of the gins and their buying and selling practices, which in turn affect the costs of handling cottonseed.

A recent study by the department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology at College Station shows that seven factors in the cottonseed buying and selling practices of cooperative gins affect the gross margins on cottonseed. Four of these factors affect the margins directly and two are minor or contributing factors at all gins; one factor affects only cooperative gins. Seasonal price changes, purchase weights, mill grading, and transportation allowances affect margins directly. Seasonal movement of cottonseed is correlated with seasonal price change. Harvesting methods contribute to gains or losses in the purchasing weights at the gins. At cooperative gins, the oil mill patron dividend on cottonseed purchases affects the margin.

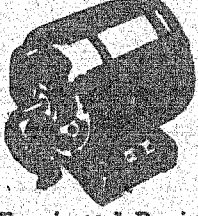

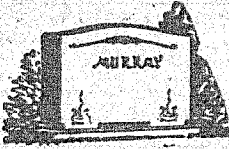

One Million People Victims of Fast Drivers in 1959

Despite anti-speeding campaigns that were conducted in many parts of the United States during the past year, nearly 1,000,000 men, women and children were 1959 victims of the fast driver.

The Travelers Insurance Companies in its statistical report describing what happened on our highways during 1959, stated that drivers exceeding the speed limit were involved in 43.1 percent of the fatalities while speeding drivers figured in 38.8 percent of the traffic injuries.

Of the 37,600 traffic deaths during the year, 12,980 were the direct result of drivers exceeding the speed limit. No other single action of drivers was even close to the grim record of speed.

Cited as causing 4,790 deaths during 1959 were the drivers on the wrong side of the road. Their mistakes accounted for 15.9 percent of the death toll. The driver

The director warned again that all persons between 17 and 65 who fish outside their home counties, or who fish with a rod and reel, must have a license. Persons over 65 are entitled to exemption.

TAX-MAN SAM SEZ:

This is the time of year when many taxpayers are waiting anxiously for a refund check. The Internal Revenue Service is a particularly efficient organization when it comes to paying out money as well as taking in money. The Dallas District alone has 700,000 checks amounting to \$70 million to process and mail to taxpayers each year. These tax returns must be checked in many different ways before the refund check can be mailed.

Most returns flow smoothly through the process and after a couple of months the taxpayer has his refund check. Several thousands, however, are stopped for a pre-refund audit. If you don't receive your refund check as soon as your neighbor does, be patient. Calling the tax folks vile names won't help a bit. The chances are your refund will be along in a few weeks. If you have not received your check by July 1, write a letter. If you have moved send your new address to the Internal Revenue Service so they can find you and forward your check.

Santa Fe Has "Go Now - Pay Later" Travel Plan

The Santa Fe Railway's go now - pay later travel plan will be inaugurated June 1, President Ernest S. Marsh announced today.

Under the plan a Santa Fe passenger may make a down payment of as little as 10 percent of his travel costs and in most cases can spread the balance of the cost over his choice of monthly payments up to a maximum of 24 monthly payments.

Available in Santa Fe traffic offices in 181 cities, go now - pay later can be applied to the cost of rail tickets, pullman accommodations, meal coupon booklets on El Capitan, travel and baggage insurance and certain sightseeing trips, provided some portion of the trip is over the Santa Fe. Sixty dollars is the minimum amount that can be financed.

Marsh said the Seaboard Finance Company, with offices throughout the United States, has been selected to handle the financing of the Santa Fe's go now - pay later plan.

Actually, a person can travel nationwide using the go now - pay later plan, Marsh declared. A trip can be made from New York to Los Angeles for instance simply by purchasing the tickets in Santa Fe's New York city office.

However, Marsh believes the plan will have its broadest appeal with families who have heretofore travelled in the family automobile.

"Santa Fe's Family Fare Plan," he said, "permits a family of four to make a round trip on the Santa Fe's famous 'Chief' between Chicago and

Los Angeles for as little as \$233.37. Purchased on the go now - pay later plan they will pay only \$23.37 down and the balance, for example, in 12 monthly payments of only \$19.24.

Rail travel credit cards have been available to Santa Fe passengers for many years. With the inauguration of the go now - pay later plan Santa Fe passengers have a full choice of travel credit arrangements," Marsh concluded.

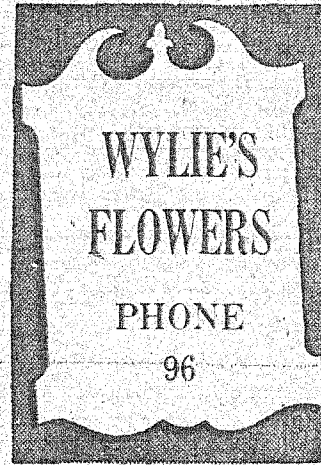

Egg Price Due to Improve During Last Half of Year

College Station, May 26 (AP)—Egg prices to producers for the last half of 1956 are expected to improve considerably better than for the same period a year ago, says John G. McHaney, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

A strong factor in the forecast is the likelihood that the number of layers will continue to decline during the month ahead. The production of egg-laying cracks in the United States during the first three months of 1956 was 37 percent below the production for the same period in 1955 and the trend continued through April, the economist says. The production drop in Texas for this same period was 38 percent.

Egg production in the nation in March was 9 percent more than the previous month but 7 percent below March of 1955. In Texas, March egg production was up 21 percent over February but 8 percent less than March of 1955. The number of eggs produced per layer in Texas in March was 22 percent above February and this increased rate of lay points out the economist could have been responsible for at least a part of the price decline in March.

McHaney says egg production will remain below the year before and soon the egg supply will decline seasonally. With an increase in egg prices, the possibility is very good, he adds, that many producers will hold hens which have been in production 10 to 12 months. From a marketing standpoint, this could mean more leakers and cracked shells and eggs with lower interior quality. These conditions, McHaney says, will lower the overall income from eggs.

This quality factor, along with the reduction of lay of older birds, should be analyzed carefully by producers in determining whether to sell old hens, keep them or replace them with pullets, concludes the economist.
