



**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6** proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, increasing to three and one-half percent (3 1/2%) the maximum permissible interest rate on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans Land Board, providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended by adding thereto the following:

"The foregoing notwithstanding, bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans Land Board pursuant to the authority of this Section 49-b of the Constitution may bear a rate or rates of interest not to exceed three and one-half percent (3 1/2%) per annum.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first

Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3 1/2%) per annum."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3 1/2%) per annum."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution of the state.

**About Your Health**

There's a one to five chance your youngster needs a major teeth straightening job, since an estimated one-fifth of the nation's children suffer from "malocclusion", or improper alignment of teeth.

A generation ago, parents of young children with teeth which did not meet properly were usually advised "to let them alone and nature will correct the situation."

Today we know better. Malocclusion is a condition to be corrected by a dental specialist known as "orthodontist." Nature by herself is a very poor straightener of crooked teeth.

Although the public is just now becoming aware of the health significance of malocclusion, experience has taught dentists that crooked teeth contribute to decay, faulty speech and malnutrition. One of the worst results of malocclusion is the psychological stress borne by a child singled out for ridicule by his friends because of "buck teeth."

A child with facial deformities such as those caused by misshapen teeth may develop traits of indecision and begin to doubt his ability to cope with problems in his environment, psychologists say.

What causes teeth to erupt irregularly? Dentists agree that heredity is probably one important cause. Another is persistent thumbsucking and abnormal pressures against the jaw. Living bone, contrary to popular thought, is not always hard and unyielding. The entire jaw structure can be molded by gentle persistent pressure.

In the case of thumbsucking, dentists believe that if the habit can be broken before age 5, there is a good chance the teeth may return to normal position without harmful effects.

Another cause of malocclusion is prolonged retention of baby teeth. Permanent teeth which follow are then prevented from arranging themselves properly.

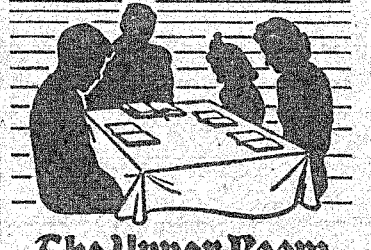
On the other hand, when primary teeth are lost too early, adjoining teeth may tend to tip and "migrate," crowding into spaces where permanent teeth should erupt.

There are different methods of bringing teeth into proper alignment. Sometimes it may be necessary to extract teeth to make room. In some cases a plastic or wire appliance may be fitted to the teeth to guide them into position by pressure.

Whatever the method, it is calculated to help the youngster avoid the fate of "buck teeth."

**State Ranks 2nd  
In Reduction of  
Traffic Deaths**

Texas traffic safety improved in every category during the first six months of 1960 over the same period of 1959, and the State ranked second among the eight states in the National Safety Council's statistical group in reduction in traffic deaths for the same period.

This information was announced Wednesday by Gov-

ernor Price Daniel following his receipt from the Texas Department of Public Safety's Statistical Services and the National Safety Council.

During the first six months of 1960, the DPS advised the Governor, Texas traffic deaths dropped from 1,112 for the same period of 1959 to 1,010 this year, a saving of 102 lives, and a reduction of 9 percent.

In the same period, Texas total traffic crashes dropped from 164,000 to 142,000, a reduction of 13 percent; injury-causing col-

lisions fell from 37,000 to 32,000 down 13 percent; non-injury crashes dropped 13 percent, from 128,000 to 109,000; estimated number of injuries dropped from 66,800 to 57,800, a decrease of 13 percent; and the actual number of injuries reported to the DPS dropped from nearly 35,000 to 28,000, a reduction of 19 percent.

Major Crimes In Texas on The Increase

The Texas Department of Public Safety reported today major crimes in Texas increased 10.3 percent during the first six months of 1960 as compared with the same period last year. The most pronounced increase, according to reports reaching the department from January 1 through June 30, was a 19.2 percent hike in the number of burglaries. However, the report showed a 15.1 percent decrease in murders and homicides.

It is estimated that for the first six months of 1960 there were 96,681 major crimes committed in Texas, compared with 87,679 for a similar period in 1959. Projecting the six-months crime experience over a period of one full year, a crime rate of 2,096.4 crimes per 100,000 population is indicated, compared with 1,891.2 for 1959.

The department gave the following breakdown of the comparative totals of the seven major crimes tabulated: murder and homicide, 479 in 1960 through June, 564 in 1959; rape, 561 this year against 548 in 1959; robbery, 1,458 against 1,412 last year; burglary, 27,048 against 22,896 last year; aggravated assault, 5,851 against 5,318; theft, 53,789 against 48,996; and auto theft, 7,495 against 7,645.

An overall percentage increase in major crimes in Texas of 12.5 percent was reported for the urban areas including all cities of 2,500 population or larger. This was offset only slightly by a decrease of less than one percent in the rural areas of the state.

WEEK-END FARM MOVEMENT

What is happening in the purchase of farm and ranch lands by city dwellers in Texas has been amply demonstrated in a study made not long ago in Dallas.

It is figured that more than 25,000 Dallas County families now own farm and ranch lands adding up to some 3,000,000 acres, and most of this acreage is located outside of Dallas County. The holdings include wheat farms in the Panhandle, irrigated cotton fields out on the South Plains and elsewhere in West Texas, citrus groves in the Rio Grande Valley, pastures and grazing land in all sections of the State.

The vast majority of these landowners are weekend farmers and ranches, maintaining their homes in Dallas and its suburbs where they make their living. Real estate dealers agree that the growing systems of super-highways and excellent roads out of Dallas have brought about definite changes in the demands of these city-dwelling farmers and ranchers.

It used to be that a radius of about 40 miles outside of the city limits of Dallas was as far as these buyers wanted to go to maintain their rural retreats. But the vast development of the

### 6 Items on USDA's September List Of Plentiful Foods

College Station — Grocery shoppers will find a lot of broiler-fryers available in Texas food markets this September. They are featured among the six items listed as plentiful for the month, reports the Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A & M College.

Turkeys are another poultry plentiful: Lamb, melons, peanut butter and a wide array of late-summer vegetables complete the list.

These foods were selected by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for special emphasis in this area because the supply of each is expected to exceed normal demand. Homemakers can take advantage of the abundance by serving these foods often.

September broiler-fryer marketings are expected to run about 5 percent more than a year ago. Look for meaty, tender, flavorful young chickens, from 2 to 3 1/2 pounds.

The number of turkeys expected to be marketed in September is about the same as a year ago, but total weight may be higher because there will be more of the heavy breeds. Both chicken and turkey provide ideal fall-weather entrees for family fare.

There'll be lots of lamb for National Lamb Week, September 15-20. Slaughter has been averaging about 6 percent more than a year ago.

Plentiful melons include watermelons, cantaloupes, honeydews, Cranshaws and Casabas. The late-summer watermelon crop is expected to be especially huge.

Choice of late-summer vegetables will vary in different localities but good supplies of

onions, carrots, squash, cabbage, eggplant, potatoes, sweet corn and many others will be available.

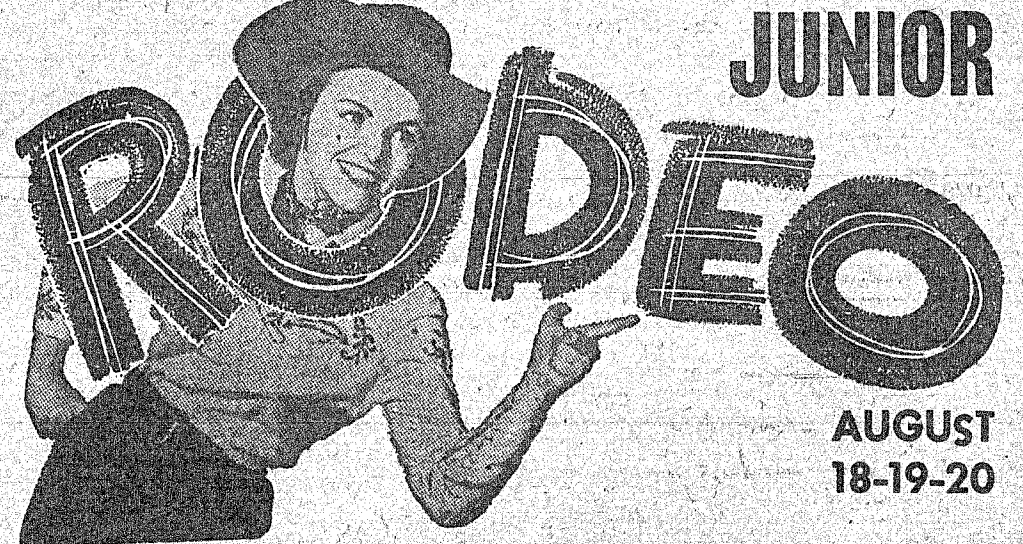

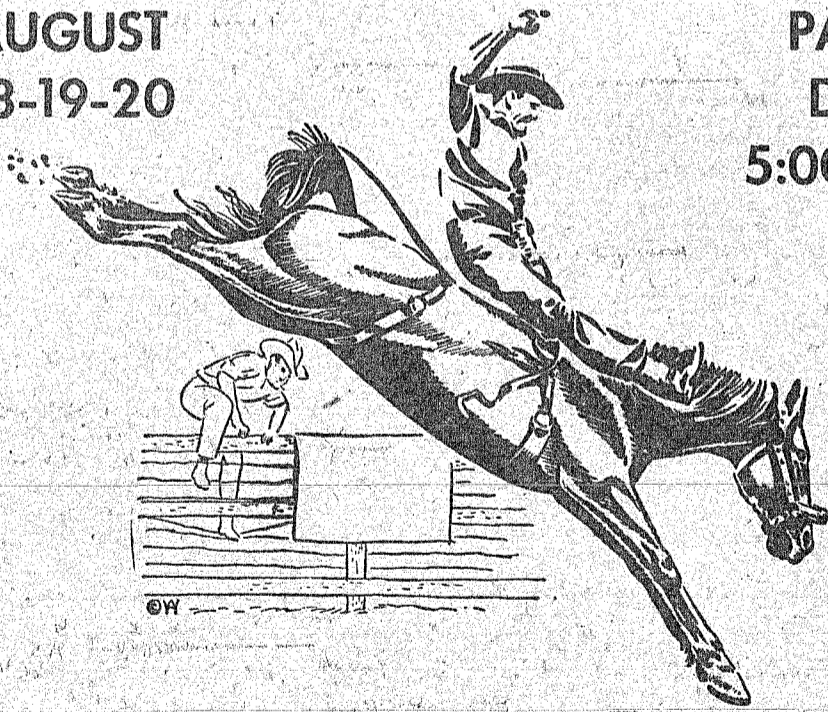


