## Our School Money Problem

Many school districts over the State of Texas have adopted Senate Bill No. 116 since it was authorized by the Texas Legislature in 1955. Among some of the nearby districts are Coleman, Baird, Abilene, Comanche, Albany, Stephenville, Early in Brown County, Breckenridge, Bronte, Ballinger and many others. The squeeze of inflation has affected the operation of almost every school in Texas, and will continue to do so as long as there is a continued rise in the costs of materials and supplies necessary for the operation of schools.

The legislature realized the need for additional funds for the operation of schools was urgently needed, thus the passage of S. B. 116. This bill authorizes school districts to call an election to see if the voters approve an increase in property taxes up to a maximum of \$2.00 per \$100 valuation, with the actual amount of the taxes being determined by the school trustees. They determine the amount needed and set the tax rate in accordance with that need. In the case of Santa Anna, as much as 50 cents per \$100 valuation could be allotted to the retirement of bonds, and up to \$1.50 could be allotted to the operation and maintenance of the school.

From the maintenance fund must come the money for the upkeep of all school property, about 20 percent of the teacher's salary as allotted on the state aid basis, all the salary for any teacher over the number authorized through state aid, all school insurance, books, office supplies, and many many other items it takes for the school operation.

At the present time the school is desperately in need of the \$1-50 maximum for the maintenance fund, as this is the fund that will be several thousand dollars in the red at the end of the present school year. An estimated 35 cents would be a sufficient amount to take care of the bonded indebtedness of the school.

Plans for the circulation of the petition to request the board to call the election are progressing, and the petitions should be in circulation in a few days. When you are asked to sign the petition, we hope you will do so.

## No Conservation Reserve Signup This Fall

There will be no signup this fall of additional land or contracts under the Soil Bank Conservation Reserve, Vernon Bullard, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said September 14, 1960, in response to inquiries from farmers regarding the status of the program.

Mr. Bullard also said that program contracts which expire in 1960 or later are no longer eligible to be extended for an additional period of years.

"Under the Soil Bank Act enacted in May of 1956," Mr. Bullard explained, "The Secretary of Agriculture was authorized to enter into Conservation Reserve contracts with producers during the five-year period 1956-60."

"The signup under the 1960 program was held last fall, so that farmers would know in advance of the cropping season whether their land would be accepted into the Conservation Reserve. Since the authorization to enter into new contracts has not been extended beyond 1960, there will be no signup period this fall."

"Farmers should understand, however, that the existing contracts for 1960 and previous years will remain in effect and payments will continue to be made under them for the period of the contracts and in accordance with contract terms. The annual Department of Agriculture appropriation bills provide money with which to meet obligations already on the books."

There are 385 Conservation Reserve contracts in effect this year in Coleman County, involving a total acreage of 43,189 acres, Mr. Bullard said. Contract periods range from 3 to 10 years, and annual rental payments for 1960 amount to approximately \$443,121.24.

Nationally, there are more than 300,000 Conservation Reserve contracts in effect in 1960, covering a total acreage of approximately 28.6 million acres in 48 states. The average rental payment is \$11.85 per acre, and the rental payments for 1960 will amount to about \$338 million.

## Late Lambs Can Be Profitable

College Station — One of the plagues of the sheepman is the late lamb or "Pee-Wee." There are several causes for these late lambs such as summer heat, poor feed, needle grass, internal parasites, late birth and lack of milk. Whatever the cause, the "Pee-Wees" are not very profitable to the man who sells them.

With a little work and extra attention most of these lambs can be improved and turned into a profitable product, says a Virginia sheep specialist.

Sheepmen who still have some of the lambs can do the job themselves and usually pocket more profit. If the lambs are weaned, dipped and treated for internal parasites, they are on the road to becoming a profitable product.

The lambs can be kept in a shed or barn, or they can be put in a pasture. If they are put in a pasture, no sheep have been for some time. Corn fields, stubble fields, meadows or fresh pastures are usually excellent sources of grazing for these lambs.

"Pee-Wees" might be a good project for one of the youngsters. If he can make a profit from them, he is well on his way to becoming a good sheepman.

## Annual Christmas Program of Merchants to Begin Soon

Merchants will begin giving merchandise coupons right after October 1. On Saturday, October 22, \$25.00 in merchandise coupons will be given away. Then, each Saturday until December, another \$25.00 in merchandise coupons will be given away. On the two Saturdays just before Christmas, \$50.00 in coupons will be given away.

Also on Christmas Eve a large number of gifts will be given away.

## Junk Planted in Seed in Texas

Waco — Oats, long regarded as a dependable small grain for Texas, has in the past few years, become more and more undependable. Is it the weather or new small grains that are taking their place?

No, says Bill Staffel, Chief of the Texas Department of Agriculture, Seed Division, Austin. Fact is, there is more junk planted in oats in Texas now than in any other crop.

Why? Simply because farmers aren't paying enough attention to the quality of the oat they are planting. "Apparently, we have forgotten that the crop we harvest will be no better than the seed we plant. And there is strong need throughout Texas to get back to certified and registered varieties, not only in oats, but in all small grains and other crops, too," Staffel said.

Oats is still a popular crop in Texas. There are about three million acres planted annually. Farmers have found it good for both grazing livestock and for taking a grain crop.

"Only a pitiful number of the total acres that goes to oats in Texas is from seed which is certified or registered," Staffel said. "You're likely to plant more weeds and even other crops in your oat fields than you are oats if you plant non-certified seed," Staffel said.

College Station — There is festive October eating in store for families that serve plentiful foods often, suggests the Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A & M College.

Cheese is the featured item. All varieties of cheese are in good supply. Also, October is national Cheese Festival time, when food markets will provide special displays and bargain buys on the many kinds of cheese.

Four meats are on the October list, as determined by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service in cooperation with producers and the food trade. Beef has become plentiful again. Lamb, too, is available in abundance. Prices of both are much lower than they were last spring. Broiler fryers and turkeys continue plentiful as prices on both encourage frequent use.

With a record crop of cranberries being harvested, this colorful item takes its place among October plentifuls. Potatoes and rice are expected to be in greater-than-normal abundance so wise menu planners will do well to include these popular foods often.

Farm products are eligible for USDA's monthly plentiful foods list when supplies are estimated greater than expected trade needs.

## Mountaineers Make It Two In A Row By Downing Rising Star

The Mountaineers took their second game in as many starts Friday night by downing the Rising Star Wildcats 26-6 in a thrill-packed game. The first half was played on more or less even terms, with half-time statistics being about equal. Although the Mountaineers led 12-6 at half-time, the big difference in the game was the first touchdown in the game, where Quarterback Pete Simmons tossed a short pass to Randy Brown behind the line of scrimmage, and Brown raced 67 yards for the TD.

The Wildcats were a threat all through the game, and it never was considered the Mountaineers had the game on ice until a touchdown near the end of the fourth period. Steve Voss was injured on the first play of the second period, but the injury was not considered serious. He was expected to be released from the hospital early this week and is expected back in the line up Friday night.

Most of the game consisted of ground plays for both teams. The Mountaineers attempted only five passes, and completed two of them in the first period, one for a TD and the other for 29 yards and a first down on the Wildcat 11-yard line. Two passes in the second period went incomplete and a third period pass was intercepted and run back 35 yards by a Wildcat. No passes were thrown in the fourth period.

The Wildcats attempted one pass in the first period, three in the second period and completed one for 5 yards, and one in the fourth period. Several others were attempted, but because of receivers being covered and passers being rushed, the ball never left the passer's hand so it does not go in the records as passes attempted.

In the first period, Simmons passed to Brown for the first TD. The try for extra point was missed by Dockery. This drive started on the Santa Anna 21-yard line after an 8-yard punt return by Voss.

On the second TD drive, Voss returned a punt 9 yards, and the series "got underway" from the Mountaineers' 24-yard line. Brown took the handoff from Simmons and broke loose for 27 yards and four more ground runs put the ball on the Wildcat 25-yard line. A 15-yard penalty put the Mountaineers back on the Wildcat 43 and Simmons connected. Tommy Stewardson hit a 29-yard pass. On the next play Dockery went through the line for the remaining 11 yards to the goal line. Walker failed to get through the line on the conversion try.

On the first play in the second period the Mountaineers punted to the Cats' 25-yard line and it was returned to their 39-yard line. On a series of 30 ground plays the Wildcats pushed over from the 3-yard line for the 4th time in the game. The Mountaineers took the kick off, then fumbled the ball away on the first play from scrimmage, squarely on their 25-yard line and it looked like the Wildcats had another quick TD. However, the powerful Mountaineer line held the Cats to only 6 yards in four downs, then took the ball back. Failing to gain the necessary 10 yards, the Mountaineers punted to their 47-yard line. The Wildcats failed to gain and punted into the end zone for a touchdown. The Mountaineers drove from the 20-yard line to their 45, then lost 6 yards and fumbled again, losing the ball. The Wildcats gained from the 39-yard line to the 26 and as time was running out on them, they attempted two passes which lost them yardage

back to the Mountaineer 49-yard line as the half ended.

Voss took the kick-off back 25 yards on the opening of the third period. He was injured when tackled on this play. Two plays later, and the Mountaineers fumbled the third time and lost the ball. However, the Cats failed to gain, and the Mountaineers took the ball back on the Cats 49-yard line. With Brown, Walker and Dockery alternating behind good line play, they drove to the 1-yard line and Simmons pushed over for the TD. The extra point was made but called back on an infraction, then missed. Trying hard to get off a long pass, the Wildcats lost on two downs, then fumbled with the Mountaineers recovering on the Cat 29-yard line. On the fourth try, Brown went 13 yards for the TD but it was called back on an infraction. Two plays later, the Cats intercepted a Mountaineer pass and went to their 49-yard line. As the quarter ended, the Cats were on the Mountaineer 35-yard line.

In the fourth period the Cats drove on to the Mountaineer 10-yard line before having to give the ball up on downs. The Mountaineers went the 90 yards to score with Walker going over from the 1-yard line. Brown went wide around left end and made the first extra points of the season for the local eleven. The remaining few minutes of the game were played near mid-field with neither team making a serious threat.

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## About Your Health

In Texas there are 612 licensed nursing homes with a combined capacity of 15,943 beds according to the latest quarterly figures.

Charged with the responsibility of licensing and keeping a health-check on these homes is the Division of Nursing and Convalescent Homes of the Texas State Department of Health.

To carry out this responsibility the Division has duties that are many and varied in addition to being statewide.

The philosophy guiding the inspection of nursing homes is one of cooperation between home and agency. Seldom is legal action necessary.

For instance during the last quarter — June, July and August — the Division issued 20 original licenses covering new operations; issued four provisional licenses; and renewed 163 licenses.

During the same period 35 licenses were cancelled. Only in two instances was it necessary to file complaints against persons found to be operating in violation of the law.

The primary reason for license cancellation was that buildings currently in use were sub-standard and the licensee voluntarily went out of business.

Some have already re-located in remodeled buildings, and in two cases new homes have been

completed and are now licensed and occupied.

The major work load of inspection is borne by local health departments, city and county health officers and fire marshals who render a vital cooperative service in the inspection and licensing program.

However, 170 licensed homes are located in 87 counties without the services of a recognized full-time local health department. This means the Division field staff must assume primary responsibility for keeping these 170 licensed homes under routine supervision.

In addition the Division receives daily requests for the inspection of potential facilities and for the investigation of illegally operated homes.

The Division is also responsible for processing and issuing emergency ambulance permits. (A weekly feature from the Division of Public Health Education, Texas State Department of Health)

### TAX-MAN SAM SEZ:

The Internal Revenue Service still has several thousand refund checks that belong to North Texans. Every year a lot of taxpayers fail to write plain enough for the tax folks to read. Then the electronic machines fail to spell some taxpayers' name right on their refund check. Due to several causes the Internal Revenue Service ends up with quite a few thousand returned refund checks. They work hard at trying to find the taxpayer's correct name and address, but a lot of folks also add to the confusion by moving and not telling Internal Revenue of their new address. If you were due a refund check this year, if you have not received your refund check yet, if you have not been notified that your return is being given a pre-refund audit, you should write to Internal Revenue. You may be one of the several thousand who may be pleasantly surprised by having a refund check forwarded to them.

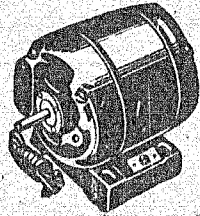

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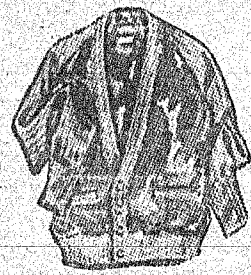
