NEW WATER TANK

The new water storage tank, proposed by the Santa Anna City Council, will mean a great deal to the citizens of Santa Anna, if and when the tank is completed. The city has advertised for bids on the tank, to be opened at 7:00 p. m. August 8. The tank is to hold a minimum of 500,000 gallons of water.

The proposal calls for increasing the city tax rate by 15 cents on the \$100 valuation, and it is estimated the tank can be paid for in less than 10 years with this additional tax revenue. Thus, it will not be necessary to call a bond election for the purpose of voting money for the construction of the tank.

With the installation of the 500,000 storage tank, fire insurance rates in Santa Anna will go down several cents on the \$100 worth of insurance carried. The exact amount of the decrease cannot definitely be determined, but it is estimated at 10 cents or possibly more. At the present time the city has a number of charges being carried on the insurance key rate, that will be deductible when the new tank is put in operation.

The insurance law clearly states that no city or town can be put in the first class insurance rate until a minimum of 130 gallons of water is in storage for each person in the town, and that pumps are in use that will pump a minimum of 1,000 gallons of water per minute into the storage tanks. The first class key rate is the division from 40 cents and down. Our present rate is 41 cents, and that is as low as it can possibly go until new water storage facilities are installed.

In most cases the saving in insurance premiums will offset the increase in taxes, and in a number of cases the saving will be more than the tax increase. And in a few cases, the insurance saving will not offset the tax increase. It all depends upon the amount of insurance carried and the taxable value of your property.

When we say your insurance will be lowered, it means just that. However, it will take several weeks and possibly longer after the new tank is installed before the town can be granted the reduced rates by the State Fire Insurance Board. Then there are other things to consider also.

Each insured fire loss in a town has a bearing on the exact amount of insurance premium the owner of property will pay. For instance, when the Payne Variety Store here burned several years ago, Santa Anna had a 25% fire insurance credit. Since that time the credit has dropped 5% each year until now we only have a credit of 10% and it is likely the credit will be reduced even more next year, as the result of fire losses during 1960. The fire credits can range from 25% good to 15% bad credit, which all goes to make up your actual insurance premium cost.

So, regardless of whether your insurance is more or less, the key rate on the insurance will be lowered, and you will actually be paying less money into insurance premiums than you would if the new water storage facility is not installed. (Confusing isn't it?)

Then another very important thing to consider is prospects of the future. Any growth of Santa Anna would cause a heavy drain on the present facilities. In fact, they are operating at peak capacity now and they could not take care of any additional usage. The new tank would take care of any additional growth for the foreseeable future.

When a company is looking for a new location to establish a new plant or to establish a completely new company, one of the first considerations is water. How much is available in a certain location and what facilities that location has to handle the water. If we are ever to have any growth, we must have additional water reserves. It is a must.

The City Council has requested anyone who has any comments, pro or con, to meet with them in their meeting the night of August 3, and present your views. In fact, the Mayor would appreciate anyone discussing the new facility with him at any time.

Hardy Blue Buried Saturday

Hardy Blue, a Santa Anna businessman for 47 years, died in the local hospital early Friday morning after an extended illness. Blue was the oldest businessman in Santa Anna from the standpoint of number of years in business. He was the owner and operator of Blue Hardware Store. He established the store as the Blue Basket Store in 1913 and changed the name in the middle 1920's to Blue Hardware Store.

Funeral services were held at the First Methodist Church at 2:30 p. m. Saturday, July 23. Rev. E. I. Craig, pastor, officiated, assisted by Rev. J. D. F. Williams of Georgetown, a former pastor. Burial was in the Santa Anna Cemetery under the direction of the First National Home.

William Hardy Blue was born in Santa Anna March 19, 1893, to Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Blue. He attended Santa Anna schools and was graduated from the high school in 1910. He established his store in 1913, and continued to operate it for 47 years. He was married to the former Miss Mae Allen in Buffalo Gap July 3, 1921.

A veteran of World War I, Mr. Blue was a former member of the City Council and former member of the school board. He had been a member of the Lions Club for more than 25 years and a member of the Masonic Lodge for 47 years. He had been a member of the official board of the Methodist Church since 1921 and during that time served 13 years as Sunday School Superintendent.

Survivors include his wife of Santa Anna; one son, John Hardy Blue of Carmi, Illinois; one daughter, Mrs. Bettie Ruth Henderson of Snyder; two sisters, Miss Bettie Blue and Mrs. Tom Mills of Santa Anna; and one grandchild, Orabeth Henderson of Snyder.

Firemen to Take Civil Defense Survival Course

All members of the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department and any other citizens of this area who might be interested, will take a course in Civil Defense Survival, beginning next week.

The City of Santa Anna will pay a bounty of \$1.00 for each stray dog brought to the City Hall through the month of August. This offer was announced Tuesday morning by Mayor Ford Barnes.

During recent weeks a rabid dog and a rabid sheep died in the immediate vicinity of Santa Anna. More than 30 cases of rabies have been found in the county this year, and everything is being done to prevent the spread of the disease.

The only qualification on the bounty offer is that the stray dog must be picked up in the City Limits of Santa Anna.

In order for a dog to be allowed to run free in the City Limits, it is necessary to obtain a City License. In order to purchase a City License, the dog's owner must have it vaccinated against rabies, then bring the receipt for the vaccination to the City Hall and purchase a License for \$1.00. During the last week eight licenses have been sold through the city office.

There are many more dogs than that running loose in the city. Anyone who wants to collect the \$1.00 bounty is invited to take part in the campaign to rid Santa Anna of stray or unwanted dogs.

Primarily, rabies is spread through dogs, fox and skunks. All fox and skunks should be killed where possible.

Dogs brought to the City Hall will be impounded for three days. If the owner does not claim the dog in that length of time and pay all charges against the dog, they will be disposed of at the end of the three-day period.

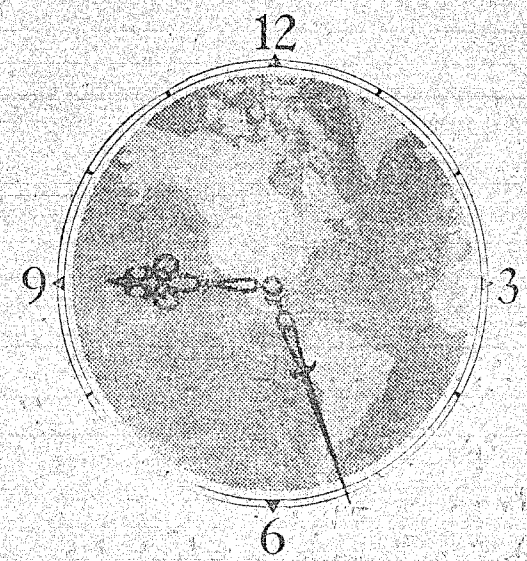

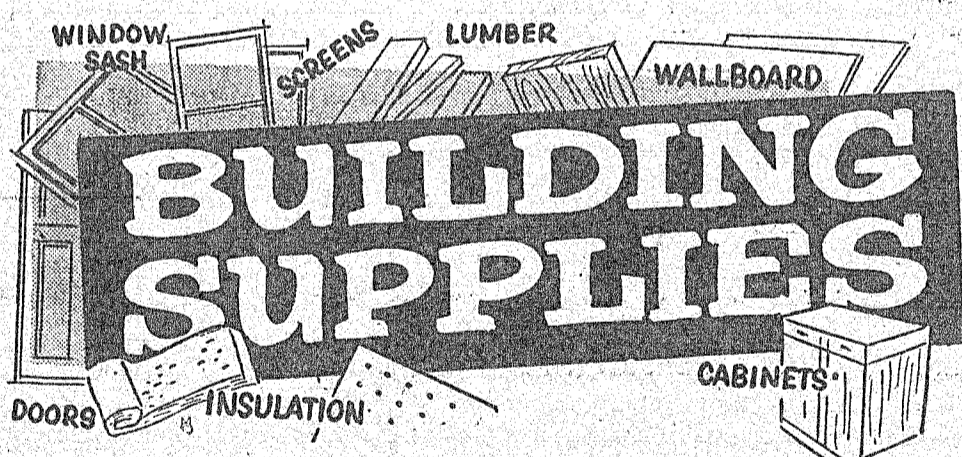

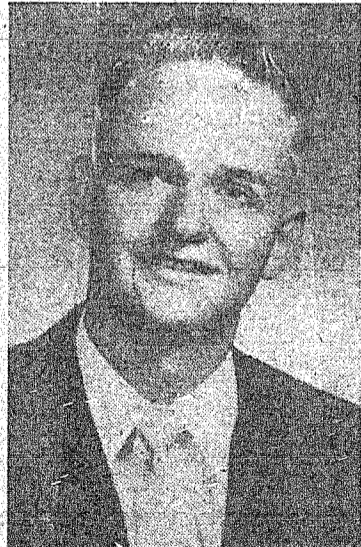

State Capital NEWS

Austin — If the brackish "hard as bricks" water common to many parts of West Texas can be made suitable for domestic use, Texas' available water supply would be materially increased.

To this end, the State Water Board has approved a demineralization research project to be carried out by the board, University of Dallas and Texas Electric Service Co. Board will put \$20,000 into the work.

Board engineers say total demineralization is not necessary and that it is possible the process can be accomplished at an economically feasible cost.

In another move to increase available water, the Board has set a series of hearings on cancellation of water appropriation permits that have not been used. First 10 of the permits to be reviewed are scheduled for hearing Sept. 22. Some of the permits date back as far as 1918.

DPS ASKS BOOST

With more traffic to patrol and more crime to fight, the Department of Public Safety will ask the next Legislature for money to increase its staff.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS director, has presented a budget calling for \$16,481,260 for 1962 and \$17,729,166 for 1963. This compares to \$12,420,490 allocated to DPS for this year and \$13,253,272 for the new fiscal year beginning Sept. 1.

Requested increases would allow the addition of 200 new highway patrolmen, 10 Texas Rangers, four narcotics agents and four intelligence agents.

Supporting his request, Garrison made this grim forecast: 29,000 more major crimes will be committed in Texas in 1963 than in 1959. This is apparently a continuation of the trend which saw major crimes rise 45 percent in the past five years, rising to 175,851 in 1959.

PAROLE EXPANSION SOUGHT

Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles has a plan for saving the state some money.

But to do so, the Board says it will need some more money to invest in enlarging the state's staff of parole supervisors. Since the paid parole system got under way in 1953, the Board says it has saved the state \$3,000,000. It says that more money can be saved if the state can pay a parolee less than it costs to board and clothe a prisoner and make relief payments to his family.

Then the Board feels it needs a 70-man parole staff, rather than the present 40 — to do the

Daily allowable will be 2,630,069 barrels a day.

A majority of producers appearing before the Commission said there is still an oil glut in Texas and continued restriction is needed to protect the market.

Commission action came in the wake of a declaration by UT's Bureau of Business Research director that oil is no longer king in Texas. Even with foreign import limits, said Dr. John Stockton, supply outruns demand so that production has had to be held down to 80 to 12 days a month for the past two years.

Stockton foresees no improvement, Texas, he said, must develop new industries to bolster its economy or lose out to more dynamic areas.

OIL FLOW UNCHANGED

Texas Railroad Commission has announced an eight-day producing pattern for the Texas oil industry in August — the same as for July.

PARKS SURVEY SET

State Parks Board has announced the Texas Research League will make a study of its operations and report to the next Legislature.

League is a privately financed, non-profit government research organization which studies state agencies at their own request.

State Auditor C. H. Cavness has recommended the Parks Board hire an auditor to keep track of the receipts from concessions operated in the state parks. Cavness also urged that the next Legislature act on a Legislature Council report presented to the 1959 session making recommendations for the continuing, expanding and abandoning of various parks.

Parks Board has designated a new state park, to be known as San Marcos State Park to be located near the proposed Canyon Dam site on the Guadalupe River.

SCHOOL REPORT CARD

State Commission on School Accreditation has weighed Texas public schools against state standards and found 54 wanting.

Inspection teams recommend-

ed disciplinary action against 20 schools and warnings of a need for immediate improvement by 34 more.

If a school loses its accreditation, the work of its students cannot be transferred to accredited schools with full credit.

Commission recommendations will be reviewed by the State Board of Education at its September meeting.

TRAFFIC TOLL CUT

While nationally the drop in traffic deaths for this year is one percent, Texas has improved by nine percent.

Texas traffic deaths up to mid-July of this year totaled 1,049, compared to 1,152 for the same period last year.

A veteran highway patrol officer said he believes the new auto insurance rates, which jump sharply for motorists with accidents or violations on their records, have contributed substantially to the better record. But radar, he said, had the

same effect until people got used to it and became indifferent again.

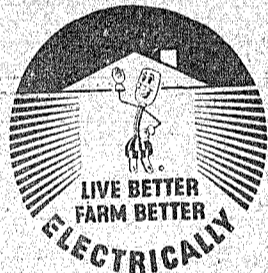

About Your Health

Almost as quickly as you can say "please pass the potato salad," a tiny, microscopic speck of bacterial life can make shambles of that great American summer time institution, the picnic.

Called staphylococci — "staph" for short — these pernicious bits of living matter are said by health authorities to be far the most common cause of food poisoning. Closely related strains, called "epidemic" or "hospital" strains, have caused fatal infections in hospital nurseries.

About the picnic — If you're careless in preparing the food, staph may invade and multiply in items on the bill of fare. The ham, for instance, or the chicken salad, or the cream-filled layer cake, in a matter of hours, once eaten, they can turn a strong man into a cramped, tormented weakling.

But it's easy to prevent this fun-wrecking development: simply keep the foods chilled between the time of preparation and service, and serve as soon as possible.

State health authorities are quick to point out that staph-caused food poisoning isn't

limited to summer nor to picnics, but can occur when ever conditions are right regardless of the time or place. Conditions are more apt to be right during summer when outdoor eating is in vogue and staph can team up with the heat and lack of refrigeration to spoil food.

As a point of academic interest, it isn't the organism themselves that do the damage, but a toxin produced by adult organisms. Admittedly, the point is of little consolation to the wrung-out victim, but it does provide a clue to preventing other cases.

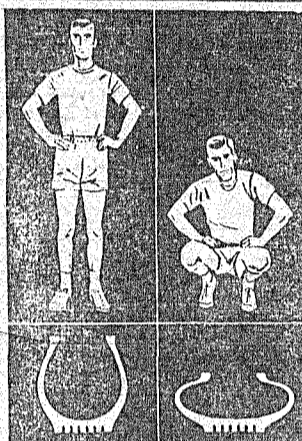
Staph germs are so widely distributed in nature — in nose and throat secretions, in exudate of boils and carbuncles, on skin and clothing, in the very air — that there is little chance of avoiding them completely. The trick is to keep them from growing and multiplying so they cannot produce the toxin.

Refrigeration is the key to stunting staph germs. They can't grow in cold temperatures, but thrive in bountiful profusion at room temperature. Therefore, refrigeration susceptible foods at 40 degree temperatures. Use shallow pans so the ingredients will chill through.

Keep these facts in mind when you plan your next picnic. Remember, there is no point in contending with more than the usual ants and wasps. (A weekly feature of the Health Education Division, State Department of Health.)

Fishermen With No Licenses Taken to Court

Austin — Despite warnings, fishermen still persist in going out without licenses. The June report of the director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission showed 207 sports fishermen paid fines and 24 in the commercial fishing industry went into court.

Game wardens also made it hard on "telephoners." They arrested 12 and charged them with illegal use of electrical devices on catching fish.

The game wardens during June made 319 arrests. The courts collected \$6,621 in fines and costs.

New hunting and fishing licenses for the 1960-61 season will be mailed out of Austin August 19, to license deputies throughout the State. They will go on sale shortly thereafter. New licenses are required after Sept. 1. In the meantime, a license is required of anyone who fishes outside his home county, or fishes with a rod and reel if he is between the ages of 17 and 65.

Long Season, And 15 Limit Set on Doves

Austin — Hunters seem to be well pleased at the bonus dove shooting they will get during the 1960 season, according to the executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

The North Zone season this year will start at 12 noon, Sept. 1, and close at sunset October 30. The South Zone will open October 7 and close December 5, except in the counties where white-winged dove shooting will be permitted three days earlier.

The white-winged dove season will be for three days, September 9, 10 and 11. This season will be from 2 p. m. until sunset.

There also will be an increase in bag limit on mourning doves for the upcoming season. The shooter will be permitted to take 15 per day and have 30 in possession.

Whitewing shooters, who may also kill mourning doves at the same time, will be permitted to have 10 whitewings and 5 mourners for the first day of hunting. They may have 20 mourning doves and 10 whitewings in possession after the second day.

Generally, the Texas quail season will begin December 1, under the general laws. The Commission will set the quail season in regulatory authority counties at its meeting October 7. At that

time, biologists will know more about the supply of birds.

Another drastic change in the hunting laws will be legalizing spike bucks in counties under regulatory authority.

UNIVERSITY TO DISCONTINUE ADMISSION TESTS

Austin — After the 1961 Fall Semester the University of Texas will discontinue its own admission tests. Thereafter, entering freshmen who have not previously taken the University admission test will be required to submit scores made on College Entrance Examination Board's scholastic aptitude tests as part of admission requirements at the Main University.

CEEB tests are available everywhere and high school counselors and principals can advise students how and when to take them.

A retired stock farmer, he was a member of the Baptist Church.

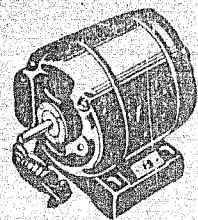
