disease. Once the disease is on plant, the temperature can drop below freezing and the fungus will remain dormant only to emerge again with warmer weather.

The best guard against leaf rust is to grow resistant varie ties or those that tend to escape the disease. No commercial variety is resistant to all races of leaf rust, but Suregrain and Moregrain are resistant to a number of races, Race 264, 00 which attacks Suregram and Moregrain, was found in the southern United States in 1980, however. Albar, New Nortex and Camellia produce some grain and forage even when rust is

Because of the continued threat of new rust races, the need for improved, resistant varities is always present. An effort is underway to establish certain oat varities, and this should reduce the risk of new and dangerous rust races being carried into Texas by the wind.


