Letter To The Editor

Following is a letter received by The News, and addressed to the Citizens of the Santa Anna Independent School District. We urge your consideration of the thoughts of a mother concerning the coming tax election.

Dear Citizens:

We are proud of our school buildings and ground. We are proud of our students and teachers. But we need more money to keep our present system and to better it. Our teachers are teaching more subjects than is required of them. They are doing this so that our children may have the best education possible under our present system.

We need more teachers. You can help this situation and assure our children a better education by voting for Senate Bill 116 on December 2nd.

If you do not vote for this bill, we will lose two teachers after this year. Don't let this happen to our children.

We haven't been able to have a foreign language in high school in at least seven years. Our graduates now in colleges are forced to be in classes with other students who have as much as two years of foreign language. Some of our students cannot enter colleges of their choice, because our schools cannot offer sufficient credits in some fields.

The parents and teachers want our children to have an education equal to other schools. You can help us give them this education by voting for Senate Bill 116.

Think of our children — the future citizens of our town and country — when you vote December 2nd.

Discussion on Tax Election

On December 2nd the resident, taxpaying patrons who own property within the Santa Anna Independent School District and have rendered that property for taxes will vote on the adoption of Article 2784e-1, commonly known as Senate Bill 116, passed in 1955 by the Texas Legislature.

The purpose of this law is to help all school districts, with voter approval, to meet the rising costs which all operations face. No school can operate on the same basis as it was operating 10 years ago and maintain standards and make the improvements now required. Small schools must maintain high standards if they expect to continue to exist; many small schools are today in jeopardy because they are not being supported properly to meet the needs of students who face a more complicated future than did their parents or grandparents.

LET US LOOK AT SOME FACTS:

1. Santa Anna Schools must maintain a curriculum above the minimum requirements. What has been done in the past years was commended by recent visitors from the Accreditation Division; however, this cannot continue without additional financing. Two extra teachers have been used to prevent overcrowded classes; some office help, available to all personnel, has been used in order that the superintendent and principals may assume some teaching responsibilities.

2. Costs in bus transportation have so increased during recent years that revenue from transportation is more than \$3,000 per year short of actual expense. The school board must finance the deficit from local funds; our excellent bus service is in danger of being curtailed.

3. No salary increases are involved in this proposed increase in revenue. Santa Anna Schools operate on the state minimum salary schedule, and no professional salaries may be placed below the schedule specifications. The increased revenue is needed to meet operating expenses and will be used for this purpose; no salaries will be increased with local revenue.

4. The recent visit by the State Agency Accreditation team pointed up a need for an improved physical education department, and the necessary showers and dressing rooms to complement the present inadequate facilities in this department. Finances must be made available to make these improvements. The physical education instruction should not be confused with athletics because it is separate, not athletic in scope, but is connected to health instruction and activity training.

of a shortage of money. Failure to do proper maintenance on buildings is false economy. The Santa Anna Schools have good buildings which must be constantly maintained to obtain maximum life and use from them. The recent visiting committee pointed out that certain maintenance work was needed and that lighting was bad in the high school. The Texas Education Agency will be expecting that these improvements should be made; they cannot be made unless additional revenue is made available.

6. It is hoped that the Santa Anna Schools must not return to the minimum in the school program; it should at least hold what it has and this cannot be done on the present tax and valuation structure.

The proposed increase will effect school taxes only; no changes in county, state or city taxes are involved.

7. Monday night, Nov. 28th, a meeting will be held at the high school, that all who will attend may learn more about the needs and the requirements of the schools. It is hoped that many will attend in order to become better informed regarding the local school tax structure.

Thanksgiving Dinner Much Easier to Prepare

The Pilgrim homemaker boiled and toiled for days to prepare for the first Thanksgiving dinner in 1621. But, thanks to methods of food preservation she never dreamed of, her modern sister can put a similar feast on the table in a matter of hours.

It was almost 700 years after Governor William Bradford decreed a day of thanksgiving that canning was invented. A candy-maker named Nicolas Appert published the report of his invention in 1810, after collecting the prize of 12,000 francs that the French government had offered for a method of preserving food for its troops.

Now the housewife can simply open a can of mincemeat, pumpkin, or cranberry sauce — or any of the other foods that bring the yearly retail value of canned foods to approximately \$4.5 billion.

Or, she can roast a frozen turkey and open a package of frozen corn, part of the \$2 billion worth of frozen food that is produced annually, according to World Book Encyclopedia. The Pilgrims probably kept some foods on ice, but it was the mechanical refrigeration developed in the late 1800's and the quick-freezing process of Clarence Birdseye developed in the 1920's that made freezing an important means of food preservation.

In Thanksgiving dinners yet to come, the housewife may serve a freeze-dried turkey, one that has been quick-frozen and the moisture removed. Freeze-drying was used in the day of the Pilgrims but only for preserving biological specimens in the laboratory. Just a few decades ago, scientists began to apply this method to food. A shipment of freeze-dried food currently is nourishing the World Book Encyclopedia Scientific Expedition to the Himalaya, led by Sir Edmund Hillary.

Recently scientists have been experimenting with irradiation as a method of preserving food. If further experiments are successful, tomorrow's turkey dinner may be chock full of gamma rays.

Color slides of the Bible Lands will be shown by Rev. Curtis M. Carroll in the North Side Baptist Church of Santa Anna, November 26, at 7:00 p. m. Rev. Carroll is editor of the Baptist Progress, official journal of the Baptist Missionary Association of Texas, with offices located in Dallas, Texas.

The pictures will be shown accompanied by a lecture by Rev. Carroll who made the pictures last year on a trip that carried him through 14 countries and to three continents. The countries primarily featured will be Egypt, Lebanon, Jordan and Israel.

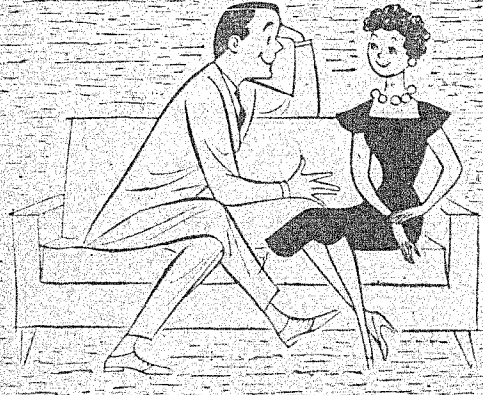

Leaf Rust Most Destructive Oat Disease

College Station — Leaf rust occurs in all oat growing areas, but it is more likely to cause severe damage in areas of high rainfall or during years of above average rainfall.

This fungus caused severe damage in South Texas in 1958. New races attacked several varieties, and oat plants were killed in early April. Normally, pastures in South Texas produce forage until the middle of May or early June.

Leaf rust reduces the yield of grain per acre, and it causes severe lodging in maturing plants. The fungus produces small, bright orange-red, dust-like bumps (pustules) on the leaves. This dust contains many microscopic rust seed (spores), which are spread by wind.

Temperatures of 70 to 80 degrees are favorable for the

disease. Once the disease is on a plant, the temperature can drop below freezing and the fungus will remain dormant, only to emerge again with warmer weather.

The best guard against leaf rust is to grow resistant varieties or those that tend to escape the disease. No commercial variety is resistant to all races of leaf rust, but Suregrain and Moregrain are resistant to a number of races. Race 261, which attacks Suregrain and Moregrain, was found in the southern United States in 1960, however. Albar, New Nortex and Camellia produce some grain and forage even when rust is present.

Because of the continued threat of new rust races, the need for improved, resistant varieties is always present. An effort is underway to establish certain oat varieties, and this should reduce the risk of new and dangerous rust races being carried into Texas by the wind.

Nation's Largest Oak Tree Found In East Texas

Texas for the third time is the possessor of a National Champion Big Tree. The Nation's largest water oak (Quercus nigra) has been located in Shelby County.

The giant tree is owned by Mr. E. H. Lawson of Center, Texas, and was discovered by Emory Covington of Timpson, Texas. Measurements were verified by Wesley Bates, former assistant district forester of the Texas Forest Service.

Vital statistics are: circumference, 20 feet 3 inches; total height, 70 feet; and crown spread, 100 feet. The new champion equals the crown spread of the former "champ" in Hillsboro, Georgia, but surpasses it in circumference by 3 feet 5 inches.

The giant oak can be seen on the E. H. Lawson place, 9 miles north of Center, on the old Center-Louisiana road. Physical condition of the tree is good, however, an ice storm in 1947 broke off some large limbs and a hurricane, in 1927, damaged the tree. A small hole at the base of the tree indicates the presence of butt-rot.

The other two Texas giants, now recognized by the American Forestry Association Big Tree Committee are located in Liberty and Coryell Counties. An American holly (Ilex opaca) is near Hardin in Liberty County, and the largest honey mesquite (Prosopis glandulosa) can be seen near Gatesville in Coryell County.

The American Forestry Association in 1940 inaugurated the Big Tree Contest "to halt the tragic disappearance of America's most magnificent tree specimens."

USDA Announces Spring Vegetable Acreage Guides

College Station — Vegetable growers have to take a long look ahead at planting time to make sure there'll be a good market for the produce they harvest. Months later, points out Clyde Singletary, extension horticulturist at Texas A&M College.

While each grower has to make his own decisions, the U.S. Department of Agriculture offers some help with acreage-marketing guides on vegetable crops. The guides are based on expected demand, orderly marketing and average yields.

Just released are acreage-marketing guides for 1961 spring vegetables and melons. If Texas growers follow these recommendations, they'll plant 30 percent more early-spring tomatoes and 5 percent more late-spring tomatoes, this year than last.

The guides also called for 20 percent fewer acres in carrots and eggplants in Texas; 5 percent less early-spring cauliflower, celery, and cucumbers; 5 percent more early-spring cabbage and lettuce, late-spring sweetcorn and spring watermelons; and 10 percent more spring cantaloupes.

It is recommended that acreages of other spring vegetables be unchanged from 1960 plantings. Most will be harvested in April, May and June, 1961.

The USDA guides call for 4 percent more spring vegetables for fresh use, and 6 percent more 1961 spring melon acreage, for all states that produce these crops.

Compliance with the guides is voluntary, although any USDA assistance to producers will be conditioned on compliance in specific areas.

1961 Cotton Allotments Explained

College Station — In response to questions raised by some growers about 1961 upland cotton allotments, B. P. Davenport Jr., Chairman, Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, today explained the difference between the 1961 program and the one in effect for the past two cotton crops.

He pointed out that the 1961 national allotment of 18.5 million acres compares with the "regular" 1960 allotment of 16.3 million acres. This 1960 figure was increased to 17.5 million acres under Choice (B) elections. In 1961, there will be only one upland cotton allotment, whereas for the past two crops growers had a choice between the "regular" farm allotment and the 40-percent-larger (B) allotment. All eligible growers in 1961 may receive the full available price support on their cotton, whereas in 1960 the eligible (B) growers received lower support but a larger acreage allotment.

Because of the provisions of the law the effect of the increased national allotment on the size of the State, county, and farm allotments will vary widely. Some farms may receive no increase or possibly a reduction from the available allotment acreage for 1960 primarily because of the operation of the minimum allotment provisions or participation in the Choice (B) program in 1960.

Growers on 1960 Choice (B) farms and on farms with allotments of 10 acres or less should keep these facts in mind when they receive their notices of 1961 upland allotments.

Davenport reminded farmers that the allotments will remain in effect for 1961-crop cotton whether or not growers approve 1961 marketing quotas in the national referendum to be held December 13. Allotments are used as a means of determining eligibility for the available price support.

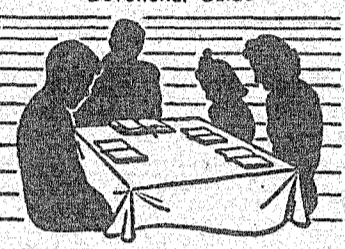
A two-thirds favorable vote in the referendum would mean quotas for the 1961 cotton crop, marketing quota penalties on any "excess" cotton, and price support at not less than 70 percent of parity. Opposition to the quotas by more than a third of the voters would mean no quotas or penalties for 1961 and support at 50 percent of parity to growers who complied with their acreage allotments.

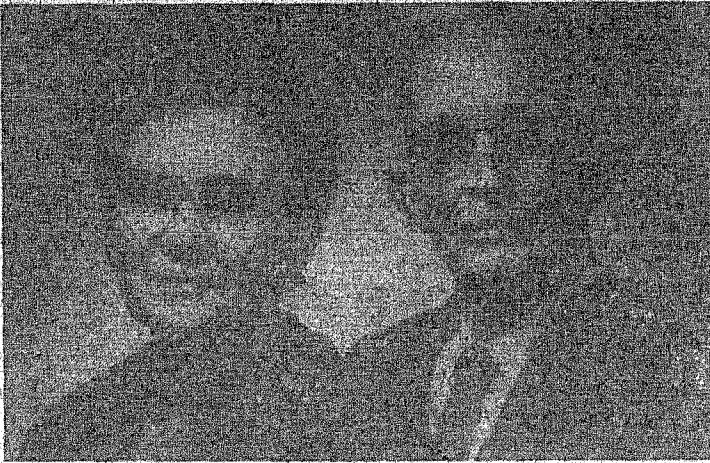

Seven food items will be especially plentiful all month. These are cranberries, broiler-fryers, turkeys, onions, dates, peanuts and peanut products, and vegetable fats and oils.

Broilers and cranberries are the features of the December list.

Recent chick placements have been running 15 to 20 percent higher than a year ago, so it looks like marketings of live broilers will be unusually heavy in December. Fresh cranberries come from 1960 record crops, which was a third above average.

The plentiful foods list is determined each month by the area food distribution division of the Agricultural Marketing Service. Items are eligible for listing, at the request of the food industry, when supplies exceed expected trade needs.

Consumers usually will find it profitable to watch for special sales on plentiful items at local stores, as the food industry cooperates with producers in attempts to move the abundance in normal trade channels.

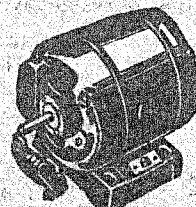

Hunting Season In Full Swing Thruout State

Austin — The Texas hunting season now is in full swing with practically all species available to the gun, according to H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

Deer and turkey seasons opened in most areas Nov. 16. Duck season previously had opened Nov. 11. Goose season had opened Oct. 26. Quail season also is in progress in all the Trans-Pecos counties, and in several others in the State. Quail season will open in the Possum Kingdom area Nov. 24, and in the remainder of the State Dec. 1.

Although dove season in the North Zone ended Oct. 30, it will remain open in the South Zone through Dec. 5. Most of the South Zone area reports a bountiful supply, but with deer and turkey season open most of the shooters are turning to the larger game.

Although hunters report seeing many ducks and geese, warm weather has been a barrier to successful hunting in many areas. There hasn't been enough cold weather as yet to bring them down to decoys, and there is so much water on the ground both the ducks and geese are badly scattered.

A number of seasonal wardens have been added over the State, and every effort will be made to reduce illegal kills, according to Dodgen.

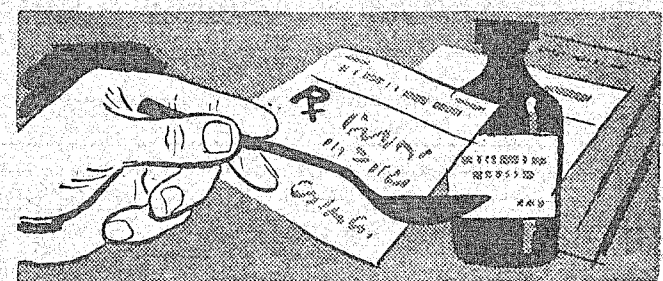

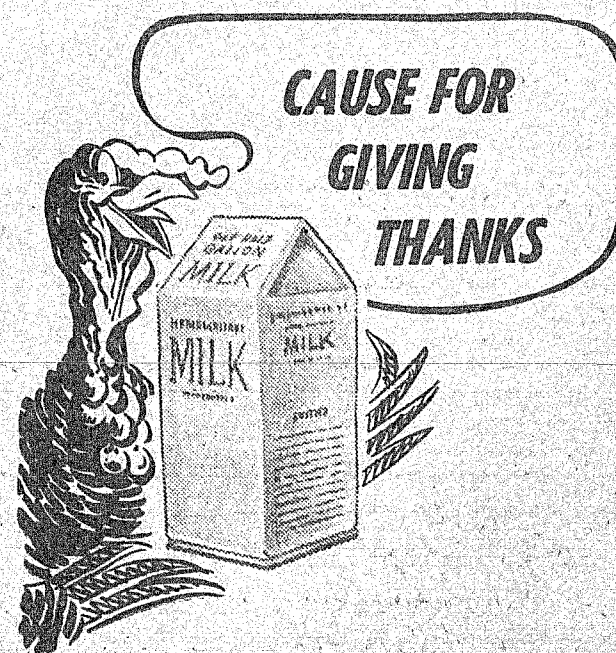
