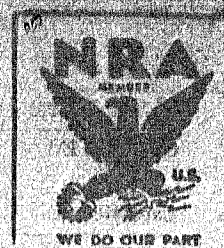

### Home Owners Loan Corporation Completes Loans

The report from the County Appraisers office in Coleman reveals that 100 loans have been applied for in the Home Owners Loan Corporation prior to January 1st.

Preliminary appraisals have been made on 99 applications. Formal appraisals by the county appraiser have been made on 75 applications. Forty-three loans have been approved, 23 of them in Santa Anna. Twelve loans have been closed, 3 in Coleman and 9 in Santa Anna.

The county and district appraisers were here this week, and while here handed out several checks to parties who had met the requirements and got their loans thru.

### Aged Burkett Man Dies Here

Uncle Henry Thate, 84, prominent farmer of the Burkett Community, died in the hospital here Monday night, after a very brief illness. Mr. Thate was brought here Sunday afternoon in such condition that human skill and science could not cope with the senile and infirmed condition.

Deceased was a native of Germany, coming to the United States in early life, and was a loyal and patriotic citizen. He and his companion, who preceded him in death by only three months, lived in the Burkett community for forty-four years. Ten living children and a number of grand-children survive the aged couple. All the children live in the vicinity of Burkett.

People are going to buy the goods they see advertised, and there is no way to keep them from it. Advertising is the silent salesman that goes direct into the home of the buying public. Everyone knows this but some are slow to admit it.

397 Agents In 237 Counties Serve Texas

Texas counties this year will have the services of 397 county and home demonstration agents and assistants in 237 counties. An increase of fifty-six county agents and one assistant, and three home demonstration agents and seven negro agents since July 1.

Only twenty-one counties will not have the services of county agents. Fourteen counties will be served by agents from adjoining or near-by counties. In extreme cases one agent or assistant may serve four or five counties. Counties without agents are mostly located in the great sheep and goat and cattle-ranching sections of West and Southwest Texas where little farming is practiced.

Women home demonstration agents to the number of 117 and three assistants will serve 119 Texas counties. Two women agents will serve five counties in adjoining territory. In 135 Texas counties there are no women agents. Four negro county agents and three negro home demonstration agents have been added.

This large staff of extension workers will carry the brunt of the campaign of cotton and other acreage and live stock reduction fostered by the Federal Government in an effort to reduce surpluses and restore higher prices to farmers.

For the county agents it means a new lease of life a new field of activity added to the long-established program of efficient crop production. When the depression reached its peak in Texas last year many counties planned to get along without county agents. Commissioners' Courts in various sections of Texas were hard put to find the necessary funds out of which county agents are to be paid (leaving aside the Federal funds since appropriated for extension service work).

At that critical moment in the life of the extension service came the new deal of President Roosevelt's agricultural policies. That these were revolutionary goes without saying, but that they have been of direct help everyone in Texas knows by this time. Then came the further proviso by the Federal crop adjusters that since the county agents were to be the duly qualified leader-managers of the Government's farm adjustment program in each county, it would be just too bad for any county which did not have a county agent if it expected to get direct benefits from such Federal adjustments. Counties which for some years were without county agents got busy. They wanted some of these Federal benefits which were bringing hundreds of thousands of thousands of cash to farmers in adjoining counties. They got in touch with extension forces and somehow the money was provided and county agents began to be assigned. Result—the ablest extension service machine possibly ever put into the field, all fired with new responsibility and new vision of their field of work which has broadened enormously.

This army of county agents is now busily at work signing up cotton farmers for the 1936 acreage reduction program. Similar work for wheat acreage reduction was carried out last fall and the corn-hog reduction campaign will get under way speedily.

The county agent, who in the past has been a crop advisor or has given personal service in such matters as culling flocks of chickens or immunizing hogs today finds his work doubled and trebled. He has become an administrator and direct representative among farmers for the Federal Government's policies as to land usage, the final word and authority on allotted acreage and how it is to be planted, and last but not least, on the all important per acre payment the farmer is to receive from the Government.

In short the county agent sits on the lid. He must keep the county farm machine running smoothly so that the greatest possible good will result. He must prevent abuses and mistakes as far as possible and in a crisis he is expected to make the decision of a Solomon. Let it be said that these county agents are tackling their new jobs with vim and appreciation of the responsibility involved. As a whole they are pretty well trained and the experience gained last season will greatly help them this year. So will the nuclei of locals organized in the various counties.
