This document, supported by a letter of unrivalled misinformation by North Dakota's Senator Young, caused the North Dakota Senate to table the Resolution for the "Proposed 23rd Amendment." Congressman Don Short of North Dakota wrote Congressman James B. Utt, author of H. J. Res. 23, asking for clarification. On February 25, 1961, Mr. Utt replied:

"There are several misstate-ments in Senator Young's letter. I assume they are unintentional as apparently he has made no study of the 'Proposed 23rd Amendment.'
