

THE ART OF DECEIT

Divide and conquer is a technique long and successfully used by the Washington bureaucracy to build their empires at the expense of the American people.

So long as public resentment remained scattered, the Federal corporate activities flourished and expanded with little hindrance. Now, however, the "Proposed 23rd Amendment" pending in Congress as H. J. Res. 23 threatens the very existence of these unconstitutional operations.

To head off action on the "Proposed 23rd Amendment" which will prove fatal to bureaucracy's dream of total domination, bureaucracy has used its access to the Congress to produce Senate Document No. 5, an instrument of deceit and subterfuge.

This document, supported by a letter of unrivaled misinformation by North Dakota's Senator Young, caused the North Dakota Senate to table the Resolution for the "Proposed 23rd Amendment." Congressman Don Short of North Dakota wrote Congressman James B. Utt, author of H. J. Res. 23, asking for clarification. On February 25, 1961, Mr. Utt replied:

"There are several misstatements in Senator Young's letter. I assume they are unintentional as apparently he has made no study of the 'Proposed 23rd Amendment.'"

"Apparently the Senator believes that corporation taxes would be repealed. He should know better than this. The Supreme Court held that corporation taxes were an excise tax and would therefore not be affected by repeal of the 16th Amendment."

"The resolution does not include every business operation but only those businesses not permitted by the Constitution anyway. Therefore, the post offices, national parks (purchased with the consent of the States), federal buildings, etc., are not included."

"The Senator's statement that these yards (navy yards which are already provided for in the Constitution) construct most of our aircraft carriers, atomic submarines, etc., is misleading and untrue. Most of the submarines are built by private contractors such as General Dynamics and others. The Newport Shipbuilding Corp., the largest and most economical shipbuilder, contracts to build many of our navy ships."

"The federal Building in Bismarck would not be disturbed in any way. The suggestion that President Kennedy's family would escape taxes on their scotch whiskey monopoly is absurd as excise taxes on whiskey are not included (in the amendment) nor are the corporate taxes on their corporate holdings."

"The Senator is wrong when he states that income taxes make up 75 percent of the total revenue. The Senator does not realize that selling government owned industrial facilities would reduce the national debt \$65 billion or more, thus reducing interest on the national debt more than \$2 billion annually. He does not take into account that subsidy costs of these government operations amount to nearly \$20 billion a year, or one-half of the total of personal income taxes."

"He (Senator Young) is throwing a scare of a federal sales tax of 20 percent or 30 percent. This he picks up from Senate Document No. 5 by the staff of the Joint Committee on Economics, which document has been thoroughly discounted as not being factual."

Congressman Utt's letter illustrates that the struggle for economic freedom goes on. It should inspire us to redoubled effort to gain action on the "Proposed 23rd Amendment" which is not designed to change the original Constitution but will give it full force and effort. It provides that:

"Sec. 1. The Government of the United States shall not engage in any business, professional, commercial, financial or

Dr. L. O. Garrett, 76, passed away at his home here about 11 p. m. Thursday, March 16, after an illness of more than a year. The local dentist for 45 years, Dr. Garrett became ill and retired from practice Feb. 1, 1960. He had been critically ill for the past several weeks.

Funeral services were held at the Christian Church at 2:00 p. m. Saturday, March 18, with the pastor, the Rev. Walter Allen, officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. E. L. Craig, pastor of the First Methodist Church. Burial was in the Santa Anna Cemetery under the direction of Hosh Funeral Home.

Linton Otis Garrett was born August 10, 1884 in Hopkins County, Texas. He came to Santa Anna in 1908 and was married to Miss Beatrice Taylor of Santa Anna in Coleman December 4, 1910. Before coming to Santa Anna, Dr. Garrett had attended a Dental College for one year. He worked in a local bank and in a Midland bank at intervals, while completing his dental college work at the Texas State Dental College in Dallas. He completed his college work in 1915 and established his practice here in the fall of that year. His work was well known throughout Texas and in other states, many patients being sent to him by other dentists throughout Texas.

He was a Charter Member of the Santa Anna Lions Club and served as a member of the City Council soon after World War II. He was a Mason, a Shriner and a Baptist.

Survivors include his wife of Santa Anna; one daughter, Mrs. Mary Southern Starnes of Santa Anna; one brother, Joe Garrett of Winnsboro; three grandchildren and one great-grandchild. He was preceded in death by a son, Bill Jack Garrett, who was drowned on Thanksgiving Day in 1930.

Our WASHINGTON Letter

A REVIVAL OF FEPC (Fair Employment Practices Committee) has been directed by President Kennedy. But the coverage will deal only with employment by contractors holding government contracts.

Under this policing plan, a committee will hear complaints from any disappointed job-seeker who claims he or she was denied a job or promotion because of race or religion. If found guilty the contractor could be penalized in various ways. The President appointed Vice President Lyndon Johnson to head the committees that will run herd on the hundreds of government contractors and sub-contractors who had better watch out. Small wonder business complains about too much government meddling and interference in their affairs.

THE SUPREME COURT showed some signs of being judicial minded in a 5-to-4 decision the other day which upheld a contempt-of-Congress conviction of two men who refused to answer questions asked by the House Un-American Activities Committee. They had been questioned about subversive connections.

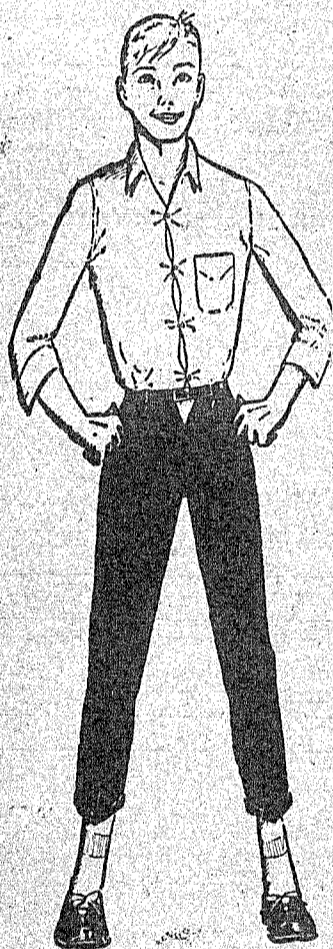
As you might expect, the dissent came from Justices Black, Douglas, Brennan and Chief Justice Warren. This decision may indicate a switch in the balance of power on the Court in favor of the moderate-con-

servative wing that does not choose to treat the Communists as just another political party but rather as a menace and a conspiracy.

BOYS ON MEN'S ERRANDS

Just as we were about to pen a few words of criticism regarding President Kennedy's plan to launch a "Peace Corps," comes a copy of a letter that completely coincides with our thinking.

This letter was written on March 9, 1961, to the Editor of the Tulsa (Okla.) Tribune by Mr. A. Arutunoff, President of the Reda Pump Corp. of Tulsa. His letter packs a punch — it's short, so we quote it in full:

"President Kennedy has announced the formation of his 'Peace Corps' and has asked Congress for legislation to organize the Corps on a permanent basis under the supervision of the State Department.

"For the task at hand, we need the 'Peace Corps' as a dog needs fleas. To stop losing the Cold War and to start winning it, we need a plan of action such as **People to People, Mass Exchange of Youth Plan (MEP)**, and not the Kremlin sponsored 'Cultural Exchanges,' and now, not the Kennedy sponsored **BABIES-IN-THE-WOODS PEACE CORPS.**"

We would like to add our two cents' worth to Mr. Arutunoff's terse comment. We have the greatest respect and admiration for today's American youth. But we do believe that for the important assignments envisioned in President Kennedy's "Peace Corps," the experience which youth lacks is a must. Let's not be sending boys on men's errands.

MRS. IDA L. COZART WHON POST MASTER FOR 32 YEARS RETIRES

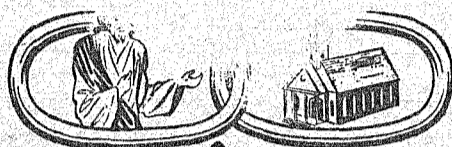





Austin — Foes of a general retail sales tax are pushing to get it before the Legislature. Friends of the tax are trying to hold it back.

At a hearing before the House Revenue and Taxation Committee, representatives of regional Chambers of Commerce, generally favorable to a sales tax, asked that the matter be delayed. Committee members opposed to the tax insisted on going ahead.

Rep. George Hinson of Minneola, who is against a sales tax, charged backers with dragging their feet in hopes their plan would finally be accepted in last-minute desperation.

Hearing was on a general sales tax measure by Rep. Charles N. Wilson of Trinity. Wilson introduced the bill and asked for immediate hearing to outmaneuver those who wanted to delay. After hearing, the bill was, by the usual procedure, sent to subcommittee.

Awaiting consideration is just about every type tax bill imaginable. Among them:

A temporary (1-year) 20 percent increase in the omnibus tax (a collection of existing taxes on many items) by Representative Hinson. Estimated yield: \$40,000,000.

A one percent corporate income tax by Rep. Chares Ballman of Borger and a three percent corporate income tax by Rep. Tony Koriolth of Sherman.

A 10 percent levy on petrochemicals by Rep. Lloyd Guffey of El Campo.

A six percent tax on income

from dividends and interest by Rep. Bob Eckhardt of Houston.

A two percent Texas business invoice tax by Rep. Mace Stewart of Galveston.

A graduated production tax on oil, a corporate income tax to replace the franchise tax and an excise tax on utilities by Representative Stewart.

An increase in state college tuition from \$50 to \$100 per semester by Rep. Frank McGregor of Waco.

A three percent sales tax on furniture and household equipment by Rep. John C. Alaniz of San Antonio.

A five percent tax on gross receipts of highway contractors by Rep. W. T. Dungan of McKinney.

A five percent tax on gross receipts from marine products by Rep. Jake Johnson of San Antonio.

FIREMEN'S BILL HELD LEGAL
Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has ruled that a proposed bill to set up machinery to arbitrate firemen's wage and hour problems would be constitutional.

Rep. Robert Hughes of Dallas is sponsor of the bill which would set up an arbitration board to work out disputes between firemen and city governments. Disputes not settled by the board could be taken to the people in an election once each year.

AUTO RATE BILL MOVES

A bill directing the State Board of Insurance to make drastic changes in the merit rating auto insurance plans has been approved by the Senate Insurance Committee.

Passage came after a lengthy hassle in committee. More heated debate and attempts to amend are expected when the bill is taken up by the entire Senate.

As approved by committee, the plan would still assess insurance premium penalties for speeding but not for running red lights or stop signs, making illegal passing or negligent collision. It would still assess penalties for accident with damage of more than \$25, and it would still be retroactive for three years.

"FLEXIBLE" RATING KILLED
House, meantime, killed by a decisive 125-to-21 vote a bill that would have provided a complete new approach for auto insurance in Texas.

Called "flexible" rating, it would allow each insurance

company to set its own auto insurance rates. Rep. W. C. Pearcy of Temple sponsored the bill which has been defeated by previous legislatures. He argued for it on the basis of free competition rather than state-controlled rates.

Opponents successfully argued that the plan allows large out-of-state concerns to take over the market and eventually set much higher rates.

MILK IS BOILING TOPIC

Milk continues to stir up arguments in this legislative session.

Senate passed a bill placing restrictions on the importing of milk from other states, but the House postponed floor debate after tempers flared to the shouting point.

Sen. Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo sponsored the Senate bill, and Rep. Steve Burgess of Nacogdoches is the House sponsor. Their measure would bar out-of-state milk from Texas unless a health inspector could certify that he had "personal knowledge" that the milk had been produced under the same standards as Texas milk.

Dairymen-supporters contend that it is a health standards protection and will prevent "unfair competition" from out of state. It is opposed by milk processors who declare it will limit the supply unnecessarily and force up prices.

GARNISHEE BILLS STUDIED

Proposals that would allow for the garnishment (taking over) of wages for payment of debts are being considered by the House Constitutional Amendments Committee.

Rep. Henry Fletcher of Luling is sponsor of a proposed constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to pass a broad garnishment act.

Rep. Ben Jarvis of Tyler is sponsor of another that would allow for attachment of wages only to make child support payments.

MINIMUM WAGE ARGUED

Proposal for a 75-cent-an-hour minimum wage for Texas workers, including farm labor, was argued before the House

State Affairs Committee. Employers of fewer than four persons would be exempt. A spokesman for the AFL-CIO testified in favor of the bill, declaring that migrant farm laborers are often paid only 30 cents an hour.
