



New ground rules are being pushed for one of the hardest-

fought, most trouble-causing races in Texas politics. A proposed constitutional amendment would allow newly

elected House members to meet and elect their speaker at least a month before the regular session opening day, Reps. W. T. Dungan of McKinney and Ben Lewis of Dallas are sponsors. This plan would give the winning speaker time to name committees and be ready to begin work on an organized basis at the start of the session.

Proposed amendment would also limit a presiding officer to one term, bar campaigning in the House and require monthly reports on campaign contribu-

tions. Also proposed is that the post be an elective one the same as the Lt. Governor's office. That would let the people decide and settle the matter early in November.
