Students Photographs To Document One Day In Texas

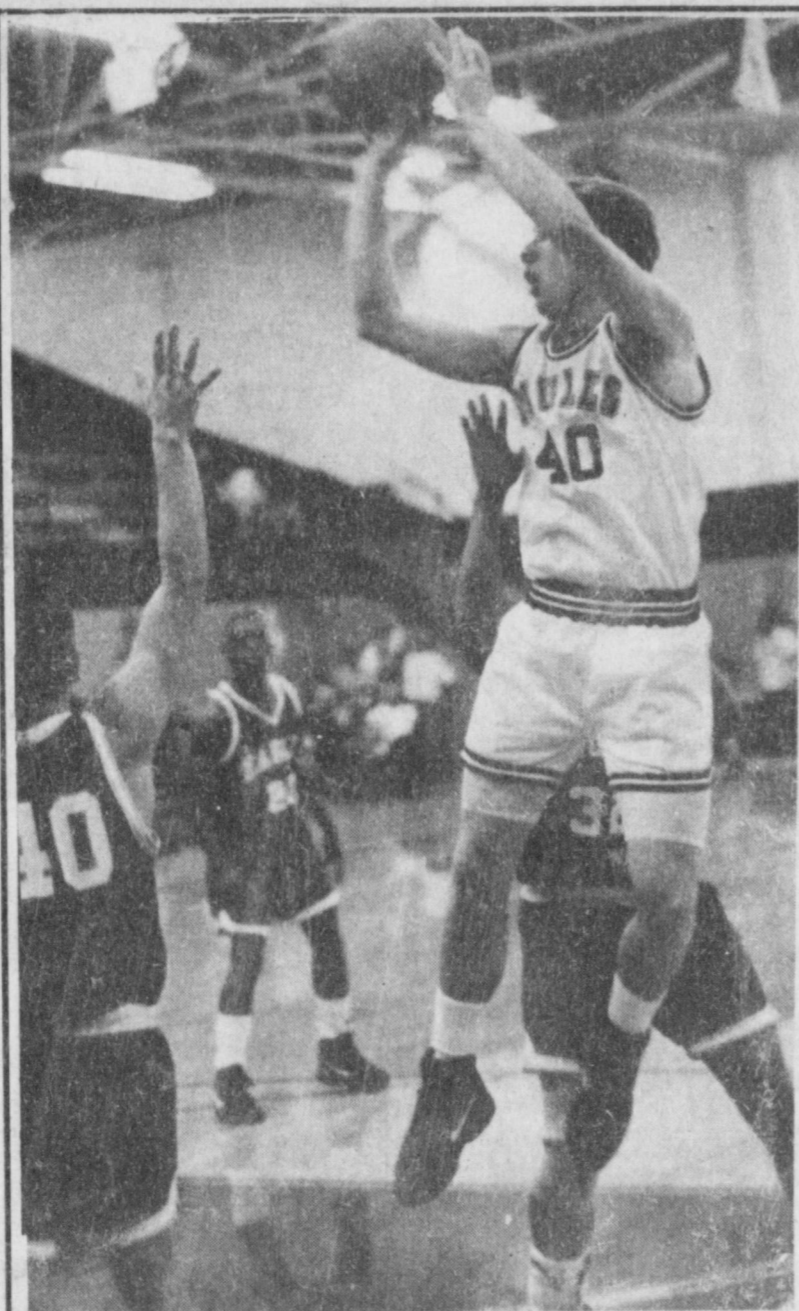

Service Center for high school students throughout The West Texas area.

Students are selected by giving first consideration to those who most need help in learning how to accept responsibility for their own lives. What a way to learn and gain self confidence!!!

After the student is notified that he/or she is chosen to take part in a "retreat", preparation for the weekend trip starts. A school bus pulls out of the Muleshoe High School parking lot on Friday evening loaded with anywhere from six to ten excited students and two or three sponsors. After a two hour trip to the camp located near Floydada, Texas, the students are told that they are "nearly there" while all they can see is acres and acres of cotton fields and pumpkin patches. Faces fall until they start down a winding road into a beautiful camp nestled in a tree lined canyon. The bus pulls up before a cabin and the students eagerly start unloading their gear and pick their bunk (top or bottom) for the weekend. The facilities are rustic, but that just adds to the fun, and the students sometimes have to learn that cold showers help you wake up. If the weather is cold, there is a roaring fireplace that warms everyone quickly.

After the bunks are made and things are unpacked groups of students can be seen clustered together watching as students from four or five other schools arrive. When everyone is there (approximately 30 students and 10 sponsors) and settled, it's time for supper. The group hikes up a hill to the cafeteria where they enjoy Cont. Page 6, Col. 2

Shoplifting Seminar Draws Large Crowd

Jay Livingston, Bailey County Attorney Luther Thompson and Sgt. Phil Provence spoke to a full house Thursday night at the Shoplifting Seminar held in the meeting room of the Police Station.

Topics discussed included shoplifting, business theft, and hot checks. According to a video shown shoplifting cost businesses over

\$10 billion last year. "We all pay the price of shoplifting by higher prices passed on to the general public to compensate for the loss."

"Shoplifters may be young, old, either male or female and any race, or in teams. The majority of shoplifting is done in the afternoon when there are more customers in the businesses and by putting items in oversized clothing.

There are professional shoplifters who work in teams. While one is keeping the clerks attention, sometimes by talking and other times by creating a scene, while other members of the team shoplift the items.

A sign in the meeting room read "If you don't want to spend the time, don't commit the crime." Shoplifting can become very expensive.

Shoplifting less than \$20 is a Class C. Misdemeanor and carries a fine. If a shoplifted item is valued at more than \$20 but less than \$200 it is a Class B. Misdemeanor and is punishable by a \$1,500 fine/six months or both.

A Class A misdemeanor is when an item is valued at \$200 but less than \$750 and carries a fine of \$3,000 or one year in jail or both.

Class 4 is, theft of \$750 or more, a felony of third degree and is punishable by a fine of \$10,000 or 2-10 years in jail or both.

Stating that shoplifting is on the rise at this time of year, pointers to help prevent shoplifting were given. "Divide the store into sections and assign each employee the responsibility of covering specific sections. Never leave a section unattended. Encourage employees to circulate throughout their sections and to serve all customers as promptly as possible.

"Develop a warning system for alerting employees that a shoplifter is suspected. Post signs in the store which warn that shoplifters will be prosecuted."

Business crime has increased 33 percent over the past few years and 70 percent of the theft is done by employees. The video showed ways

Dillman Offers Services To Children With Special Needs

Dillman Elementary offers many services for children with special needs. Early Childhood offers assistance to children ages 3 to 5

with handicapping conditions such as: speech, mental retardation, visual and hearing impairment, orthopedic handicaps, and other health impairments. This program is divided into two half-day classes to provide appropriate instruction in small group settings.

For Kindergarten through Second grade, academic assistance is provided in a Special Education Resource classroom. This class provides services for students with learning disabilities, mental retardation, and other conditions that limit a child's ability to successfully function in a regular classroom setting. Assistance is also provided by the Special Education Staff within the students' regular classrooms in order to allow them to achieve academic success along with their peers.

In addition to the Early Childhood and Resource programs, Dillman provides Speech and Language therapy services. Students receive instruction in small group or regular classroom settings for articulation and/or phonological disorders, fluency and/or voice disorders, and language delays/disorders. Handicapped students from age 3 through second grade are eligible to receive these services.

If you suspect that your child may need any of the Special Education services which are provided at Dillman Elementary, contact the Special Education Office by calling 272-5239.

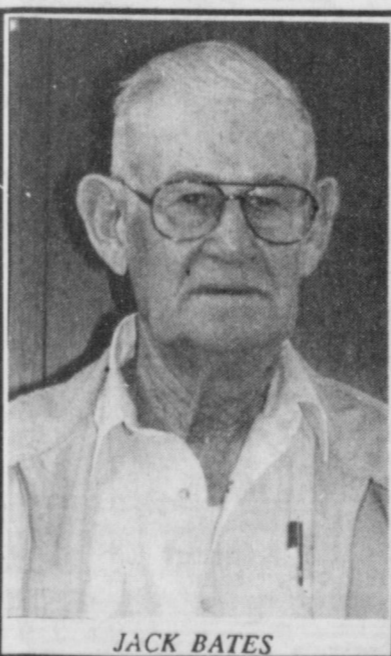
Commissioners Court To Meet In Regular Session

A Tribute To Texas Children

At the Annual Winter Convention of the Texas Elementary Principals and Supervisors Association in Dallas, the education association announced plans to create life-size bronze statues of children on the grounds of the State Capitol and invited the three million children of Texas to participate in raising the funds.

"We invite you to participate in a 'Tribute to Texas Children', Gretchen Ricker, President of TEPSA, told the audience of 1,700 association members at the First General Session at 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday, December 8, 1993. "Your students and your school have an opportunity to become part of a unique project which will go far beyond this generation of children and generations to come."

The monument, the only one of its kind in the United States, will display free-form, ethnically diverse bronze statues of children ages 5 through 18, Ricker told the audience. It will be located at the Texas capitol, just west of the new north entrance where school buses are unloaded. All visitors, and particularly Texas students who visit the Capitol on school field trips, will see these realistic replicas of children...like themselves.

"This is a once in a life time opportunity to have children helping children honor children," said Brad Duggan, Executive Director of TEPSA. "We believe that it is fitting for students to participate in raising funds for the construction because when they see this monument, they will share in the pride of their school's contribution towards its creation."

"As you know, historically statues are cast in bronze because of its permanence. It is a tangible way through which we show honor and respect for an outstanding person's lasting contribution to our society. For centuries, these statues are going to communicate a simple message...the importance of our children. "This is the largest, most exciting, and most lasting project the education community has undertaken to date," Duggan said. "But as Texas stands on the brink of a new millennium, we believe that it's appropriate that we pay tribute to the citizens who will shape the future of Texas and our world...our children."

The project to raise the funds will begin in January 1994, conclude in May 1995, and the monument could be dedicated as early as May 1996.

"The challenge of raising the needed \$750,000 is itself monumental," Ricker, Principal of Koennecke Elementary School in Seguin, told the educators. "To accomplish the funding, the students at your campus are being asked to make a contribution. Just as the students did when it came time to restore the Goddess of Liberty on the top of the Capitol, as well as the Battleship of Texas, we hope each campus finds its own way of raising the funds, from spelling bees, bake sales, marathons, recycling drives...whatever you can think of. We encourage the participation of all students, parents, campuses, districts and school boards to help with this fund drive."

"While we will of course accept individual and private contributions, it is our hope that the children of Texas will lead this fund drive so that they will be able to come back to the Capitol one day and show their children, or grandchildren, what they helped to create...a monument to honor the value of the child. Our children today find themselves in a throw-away society. Because they often

have so much insecurity and so little permanence in their lives, we feel that these statues will reflect the permanence and stability they need," Ricker said.

"As students grow up, grow older, then grow away from our influence, what is there of permanence for them? What can we do as educators to connect children and their past to one another? As educators, you know that a school, or a classroom, or a teacher, is often only a temporary anchor for students. This project will therefore be more than a temporary anchor or physical landmark; it is truly a tribute to the one constant in our profession--children. It is our hope that this experience will become a part of each child's personal history. Something they can say...I helped create that," Ricker said.

Each campus which participates will receive a certificate signed by the Governor and a photograph of the completed project. Each student who participates will receive a certificate to recognize his/her part of this history-making event.

"The sculptor for this project has not yet been chosen," reported Duggan. "Within the next couple of months, invitations will be sent to all Texas sculptors, inviting them to submit photographs of their work to a selection committee. The final design will be the chosen sculptor's own interpretation and creation. We have suggested ideas for themes which might portray children on an actual field trip, reading, studying, playing or sharing. The space that has been allocated to us by the State Preservation Board is quite

large, so the number of statues to be created will depend on the amount of money to be raised. The Associate is hoping to raise approximately \$750,000," Duggan said.

The Tribute has been in motion for more than a year. Any building project that affects the State Capitol or its grounds requires legislation. During the last legislative session, SCR 62 bill was carried in the Texas House of Representatives by Representative Libby Linebarger, Chairman of the House Education Committee and Senator Bill Ratliff, Chairman of the Senate Education Committee who sponsored it in the Texas Senate. In April 1993, the bill was passed directing the State Preservation Board to include on the Capitol grounds a permanent

monument in tribute to children and to accept the funds raised totally by private donations. It also directed that the names of the donors not be inscribed or placed on the monument, and that the Board should oversee its design and installation. All funds will be deposited directly into a foundation which was created by the State of Texas to fund projects like the renovation of the Governor's mansion. All funds will be controlled and monitored by this foundation; TEPSA and TASSP (the Texas Association of Secondary School Principals) are serving only as coordinators of this project and will receive no financial remuneration. All education associations have been asked to co-sponsor the project.

"Every time any member of the legislature or state government passes these life-size statues of children, they will be reminded of just how important their jobs are in determining the future of our children's education."

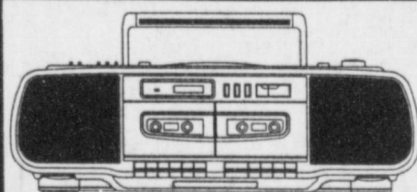

Don't Add Girth To Your Mirth This Holiday Season

Ah, the holidays: a time for family gatherings, Christmas shopping, parties, and eating enough to be 5 to 7 pounds heavier come Super Bowl Sunday in late January.

Many people gain about that much during the holiday season, according to Kay Schooler, registered dietician and Director of Nutrition Services at Scott & White Memorial Hospital and Clinic.

"Seven pounds is easy to gain. If a person takes in an extra 500 calories a day, just in little extra treats, he or she will gain about a pound a week. That's not hard to do with all the cookies and sweets around work," said Ms. Schooler.

Many people get into trouble by letting the holidays linger on for several months, starting with Halloween and continuing through the Super Bowl.

It's normal for people to overeat this time of the year. "The trap we get into during the holidays is that we feel we must partake completely. Then we blame ourselves when we overindulge. It's better if we could limit overeating to just a few days instead of a whole two months," she said.

But instead, people sit back and say, "Well, I've messed up my diet by eating this, so why should I try to keep up with my diet the rest of the year?"

The key to avoid having to loosen your belt buckle a couple of notches over the holidays is planning.

"You know you're going to Grandma's for a big holiday dinner," Ms. Schooler added. "Admit to yourself you might go overboard for just this one meal. Begin earlier in the week by watching your calorie intake and increase your activity level a well or two beforehand. When you plan on overeating, the most important thing you can do is get additional exercise."

To burn off the extra 17,500 or so calories consumed over the holidays, you will have to walk 175 miles. Burning 100 calories per mile, it will take over 58 days of walking 3 miles a day to work off all those extra pounds.

Determination is also important.

"If you don't want to gain weight, you won't if you plan ahead. Mind over matter is pretty important," Ms. Schooler said.

So here are some tips to keep in mind to get you through the holidays without gaining weight:

- Don't approach holiday meals after fasting all day. A light snack beforehand will keep you from gorging when you arrive at a party.
- Never stand at a buffet or hors d'oeuvres table. Take one or two items and move across the room and talk with someone.
- Keep in mind that alcohol does have calories. If eggnog is served, limit yourself to one punch cup, which has 335 calories.
- If you want to try everything at a buffet, take a fourth or a third of the average serving size.
- Don't overeat or take seconds to please an insistent hostess.
- Don't use holidays or vacations as an excuse for gaining weight.
- Don't neglect exercise or physical activity.
- Eat dessert two hours after the main meal. This will replace the 1,000 calories snack usually eaten later.
- Concentrate on socializing and being with people. Don't make food the focus.
- Just say "no thanks"; it's easier than you think.

- Watch out for salty foods. They trigger your appetite for more. Also, salty dishes tend to make you more thirsty.

- Plan ahead and be specific about how to approach the holidays. Focus on the positive.

- Chew gum while preparing and cleaning up the meal so you won't be tempted to snack.

- Remember to eat slowly and savor every mouthful; you will be satisfied with less food.

Healthy Eating

Much is heard about garlic in the diet and rightly so. Recent discoveries show garlic might be beneficial in alleviating or preventing asthma and certain body pains. Some believe it helpful in fighting cancer and several other serious diseases.

There is disagreement over how one should get the benefits of garlic, some saying that adding garlic when cooking won't provide enough.

These experts say garlic supplements, in the form of pills or capsules, should be taken. There are capsules on the market which are practically odorless.

In Texas, It's Gene-gle Bells For Cloned Christmas Trees

They look like perfectly formed factory Christmas trees stuck in dirt.

But the only thing artificial about these living tannenbaums is the way life began--as clones rather than seedlings.

The first of several hundred cloned Virginia pines growing in Texas soil are ready this year to deck the halls in a modern way--a la gene-gle bells.

"The cloned tree is the future for Christmas trees in the South," said Don Kachtik, a grower whose test tube-to-tree-farm pines are among the first in the state ready to be cut for the holidays. "We only have one type of tree that grows well in Southeast Texas, the Virginia pine, so we need a good one."

A "good" Christmas tree to the consumer is two things: its straight trunk easily slips into a stand; and, it can hold lots of ornaments on full whorls, or the sets of limbs that fan out from the trunk. Growers want the whorls and stand-friendly trunk to be coupled with rapid growth and disease and insect resistance.

Santa Claus for the Christmas tree industry has come in the guise of forest researchers at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. They found that one can save a whole lot of time producing better trees by breeding good ones, then duplicating them by cloning.

"When we find a tree with good genetic material, we can capture improvements faster than going through the usual propagation," said Dr. Craig McKinley, who with Dr. Ron Newton selected good "parent" trees for the experiment and developed the cloning technique.

The cloning process took about 15 months. This year's consumer-

ready trees first felt soil in April 1990 when they were potted and placed in a greenhouse for 6-9 months. Add at least another couple of years in the field and these trees have been on the wish list for about 5 years, according to Newton. In all, about 450 cloned trees are growing commercially in Texas now, but not all of those are ready for trimming this year.

Newton said consumers can expect more cloned Christmas trees to be available in coming years as growers opt to pay the price to get a more marketable tree. The traditional Virginia pine seedling costs less than 7 cents compared to the current cost of 75 cent to \$1.50 for a cloned tree ready to plant. But the researcher expects the cost of cloned tree plantlets to decrease when the trees are mass produced.

It's not likely that the cloned trees, especially those improved genetically to resist insects and disease, will cost consumers more, however, according to Dr. Mike Walterscheid, forest specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Growers hope that with cloning, they will be able to sell 95 percent of the trees they plant," Walterscheid said. "Right now, only 60 percent to 70 percent are sold because the others are ugly or they die from disease or something."

Kachtik agreed that what he wants under his tree (or trees) this season is a consumer's saw blade in action. But he said purchasing a real tree--whether cloned or traditional--is also a gift for the environment.

"The oxygen trees produce while growing improves the environment," he said, "and after Christmas, they can be mulched for the city parks."

News From Congressman Larry Combest

Combest Highlights Need For Tissue Bank Quality Safety Standards

Highlighting the need for certainty in screening donated tissue for AIDS as well as assuring the quality of donated tissue, U.S. Representative Larry Combest (R-Texas) is examining the impact of proposed legislation currently before his Small Business Subcommittee on Regulation. Unlike the strict controls on blood banks and organ donor banks, there are no mandatory federal guidelines for tissue banks. The congressman's comments came Tuesday afternoon during a tour of the Lions Club Eye Bank in Lubbock, which Combest noted already meets standards of quality control and safety envisioned in the proposed federal tissue bank legislation.

"It is not much of an exaggeration to say that someone could start a tissue bank in their basement, in the absence of enforceable federal standards," said Combest. "There have been a few but frightening cases of patients receiving AIDS-infected tissue who have no idea they are now infected because tracking and testing of tissue is not required."

"The limited edition state ornament series is now available in the states of Mississippi, Georgia, Alabama, Louisiana and Tennessee where previous editions are still sought by collectors."

The 1993 ornament features the Texas Longhorn Steer with the words "Christmas in Texas 1993" on it. The Texas ornament is available in either polished pewter or in pewter with a 14 karat gold overlay.

The Texas ornaments are oval cutouts approximately 2 1/4" x 2 1/2" and may be hung on the Christmas tree or worn on a cord as jewelry during the holiday season.

Each ornament comes with a free gift box.

Miazza, who has been in business since 1966, says he is fortunate to have Maurice Milleur reproduce his designs each year. "While the Lions Eye Bank has been exemplary in meeting or exceeding the proposed federal standards, not all tissue banks in the U.S. can claim that same quality and safety assurance for patients receiving donated tissue," said Combest. "I am concerned that some in Congress are proposing a 5 percent gross receipts fee against tissue banks, which would severely hamper the work done by the Lions Eye Bank, and add costs passed along to patients. Congress should not penalize the good guys because of the lack of accountability of others in the tissue bank industry."

Combest is ranking member of the Small Business Subcommittee on Regulation, which heard testimony revealing that in rare but troubling circumstances, AIDS-infected tissues were transplanted into a number of patients from just one donor in Virginia. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) knows little about the source, quality and handling of tissues which include bone, bone matter, ligaments, corneas, heart valves, arteries and veins.

* A criminal will pretend to have a conversation on one public phone in order to hear what's being said at the next phone. If you must read your card number aloud to an operator, do it in a soft voice to avoid being overheard.

* Customers should call their

calling-card providers to learn what safeguards those companies offer. For instance, AT&T Personal Choice Calling Card customers can easily memorize their card numbers, so they don't need to carry or expose their cards to place calls. And all AT&T calling-card customers can put restrictions on their cards that prevent the cards from being used for international calls--the favorite use of calling-card thieves.

* Report stolen calling cards or suspicion of fraud to your long-distance company immediately. The company will cancel the calling-card number and issue a new card to you. AT&T Calling Card customers should call 1-800-CALL-ATT.

Holiday Meal Makeover Can Keep Dieters On Track

People can enjoy the holidays without gaining weight by doing a holiday meal makeover, suggests a registered dietician.

"Most holiday activities center on food, which is a big challenge for those who cannot afford to gain extra pounds," said Dr. Mary Kinney Bielamowicz, professor and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "However, if you change your strategy and streamline your meal, the holidays will be more enjoyable and lower in fat."

As a hostess, the biggest contribution a person can make is to offer guests a variety of lower-fat, lower calorie foods along with traditional favorites, Bielamowicz said.

According to Bielamowicz, some simple changes will allow guests to enjoy a healthful holiday meal:

- * Serve a variety of low-fat, lower calories choices at all courses. Offer raw vegetables or pretzel chips with low-fat, yogurt-based or salsa-based dips as an hors d'oeuvre. Also, have several different grain and vegetable dishes available at the main meal and an assortment of fruit along with other dessert choices.
- * Use low-fat or low saturated fat (saturated fatty acids) ingredients in your favorite and traditional recipes, when possible.
- * Start new, low-fat traditions by adding some delicious low-fat dishes. Bielamowicz recommends using the following recipe substitutions or checking with your local home economics county Extension agent to make your meals lower in fat:

* Chocolate--use 3 tablespoons of powdered cocoa mixed with 1 tablespoon of oil instead of chocolate.

* Eggs--one half cup of cholesterol free egg substitutes or 4 egg white instead of 2 whole eggs.

- * Butter--use margarine, corn oil, soybean oil, safflower oil or cottonseed oil.
- * Whole Milk--use 1 percent milk, nonfat or skim milk or skim buttermilk instead.
- * Cream Cheese--use light or non-fat cream cheese.
- * Cheese--use low-fat processed cheese.
- * Sour Cream--use low-fat or nonfat sour cream.
- * A buttered pan--use non-stick cooking spray.
- * Basting with butter or drippings--use wine, fruit juice or broth.
- * Buttered bread crumbs--use crushed cereal.
- * A stuffed bird--cook stuffing outside the bird.
- * Chocolate Chips--use raisins.
- * Sausage or processed meats--substitute light or lower fat varieties of sausage or processed meats.

"It's also a good idea to encourage family and holiday guests to go for a long, leisurely walk before eating," Bielamowicz said. "Physical activity is critical for weight control, and holiday outings can be as sociable and rewarding as the meal itself."

U.S. and Canada Honor Senator Leahy and Six Others

Mollie Beattie, Director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, announced the recipients of the newly established National Great Blue Heron Award, recognizing four individuals, two corporations, and a conservation organization in the U.S. and Canada for their work on behalf of wetlands and the North American Waterfowl Management Plan.

The awards went to Senator Patrick J. Leahy of Vermont, James D. Range of Rust International, and The Nature Conservancy in the U.S., and to Don Simkin, Andre Magny, TransCanada PipeLines Ltd., and Inco Limited in Canada. Each will receive a framed model of a great blue heron, hand-carved by "Cork" McGee of Chincoteague, Virginia.

The awards are the highest honor bestowed at the national level by the North American Waterfowl Management Plan Committee, which is composed of six U.S. and six Canadian members

appointed by the Directors of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Canadian Wildlife Service. The committee guides implementation of the Plan, a 1986 agreement between the two nations to restore waterfowl populations through conservation and protection of the wetland habitats on which they and other species depend.

Senator Leahy was honored for his leadership in crafting the conservation provisions of the 1990 Farm Bill, which "represent the single most significant public policy contribution to date toward meeting the goals of the North American Waterfowl Management Plan in the United States," according to the award citation. Senator Leahy was nominated by the National Association of Conservation Districts.

James D. Range, Vice President for Government Affairs for Rust International of Birmingham, Alabama, was recognized for the key role he played in launching the

Plan, particularly the strategy for matching and leveraging public and private partnership dollars for use in Canada. He was also instrumental in securing passage of related legislation and served as chairman of the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation and is now on the Board of Directors of Ducks Unlimited. He was nominated by Gary T. Myers, Executive Director of the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency.

The Nature Conservancy was recognized as a major contributor to the Plan, not only financially but also for its leadership role in "forging broader public/private partnerships promoting the importance of watershed, ecosystem, and landscape perspectives." It has helped protect some of the most sensitive and significant priority areas identified under the North American Plan such as the ACE Basin in South Carolina; Sacramento National Wildlife Refuge in California; Mad Island, Texas; Cache River, Illinois; and Cheyenne Bottoms, Kansas. It was nominated by the

Izaak Walton League. "I am delighted to join in recognizing two such outstanding individuals and one of the leading conservation organizations in the world," said Director Beattie. "The North American Waterfowl Management Plan and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service are indeed fortunate to have their backing and support, which has made the Plan the largest and most successful wetlands conservation effort in history."
