270 Register During Annual Homecoming Sat.

A total of 270 persons registered for the 10th Annual Homecoming of Ex-Students of the Santa Anna Schools Saturday. Of this number about 54 were guests, husbands, wives and children of the former students. This compares with 224 registering last year.

The Homecoming was a big success, with a number of persons being here for the first time. As usual, some who are here almost every time, were unable to attend. Everyone enjoyed the day's activities very much.

All the program went off as announced. It was really a treat for the Ex-Students this year attending the Homecoming Game, as the Mountaineers won 14-6 over a foe of many years standing, Cross Plains and the Mountaineers have played a number of Homecoming Games, with the Buffaloes winning the most of them. A large number attended the Fellowship at the First Baptist Church after the game.

Registration began at 9:00 a. m. Saturday at the high school and continued throughout the day. A good number attended the coffee in the lunchroom, honoring all the classes ending in "1". Class reunions and visitation periods were from 12:00 noon to 4:00 p. m. The Class of 1934 and the Class of 1938 held reunions, but we do not know of any other classes holding reunions. Clubs Can Get Current Data On Social Security

October, November, and December are the months it is easiest for clubs and organizations to book a film and/or speaker from the Abilene social security office, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager.

"Although we try to fill all requests, at any time of the year, it is always easier for us to do so in the last three months of each year because of the seasonal decline in claims and other workload items," Tuley said.

Any civic club, fraternal organization, study group, employee or employer association, that would like to learn firsthand of the changes made in the Social Security Act by the 1960 and 1961 Amendments, should write Tuley at Box 5168, Abilene, Texas, or phone him at OR-4-5262 to arrange matters. Either Tuley Assistant Manager Ralph Fish-ette, and Field Representatives Don Austin, Howard Weatherly, Glenn McNatt, and Fay Ford, depending on other commitments, can and will meet with a club for a talk or film showing and question-and-answer sessions.

Tuley says his office is still finding people who have lost money because of failure to keep up with recent changes in the law that could have been of earlier benefit to persons past age 62 or to survivors of persons whose deaths occurred after March 31, 1938.

14 Boys To Attend RA Rally In Brownwood

Dallas — Fourteen boys and their sponsors from First Baptist Church of Santa Anna, Texas will attend the Regional Texas Baptist Royal Ambassador Rally on October 21st, at Howard Payne University of Brownwood, Texas.

After attending Leadership Conferences on the New Royal Ambassador Program, they will hear a message on "The Future is in Our Hands", by Rev. Ray Milligan, Foreign Missionary to Kenya, in East Africa.

Austin — Ten top-flight law enforcement officers took the oath of office as Texas Rangers recently in the greatest expansion of the 138-year-old organization since 1935.

The ceremony took place in the office of Col. Homer Garrison Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety and Chief of the Rangers.

The new Rangers were sworn in following completion of a week-long refresher course in modern criminology at the department's Law Enforcement Academy in Austin.

"We are proud to have these fine officers on the Ranger force," Garrison said. "They were carefully selected from a field of some 400 applicants and represent virtually every area of the state. They bring to the force a total of about 140 years experience in law enforcement."

The Ranger force was increased from 52 to 62 by an act of the last session of the Legislature.



A West Texas House Wife Circles The Globe

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SIGHT - SEEING IN THAILAND

During my stay in Burma, Beth and I flew to Bangkok, Thailand, for a few days of sight-seeing. Although Burma and Thailand join, it is impossible to travel from one to the other except by plane, because of the high rugged mountains that separate them. As we flew over Thailand, we saw acres and acres of rice paddies; coconut groves; forests of bananas; and immense fields of green vegetables, for Thailand is a very fertile country and is said to produce the finest rice in the world.

The airport is twenty miles from the city, but when we arrived, an Embassy car and chauffeur were awaiting us, due to the courtesy of the Thailand Ambassador in Rangoon. A few days before we left Rangoon, he had sent me with his compliments, and a note saying: "I wish you pleasure in my coun-

try." A pictorial magazine of the King and Queen: their Majesties, King Blumethal and Queen Sirikit of Thailand. He had asked the Embassy at Bangkok to have a car there for our arrival and at the hotel for our departure. We were driven to the Erwin Hotel, which was familiarized to Americans by Lyndon Johnson's stay there while in Bangkok.

Bangkok is known as the Venice of the Far East because of its network of waterways.

We spent our first day there looking over the Grand Palace which is the greatest attraction in the City. Its architecture, and decorative design is regarded as the triumph of the East, and the grandeur of it is breathtaking. However, the young king and his family live in a much simpler palace in another part of the city.

The palace grounds are a dream world of magnificent audience halls with ornate roofs projecting far out over very quaint structures. In front of these audience halls, stand col-

ossal life-like images which are a motley crew of grotesque figures with animal heads and exaggerated human bodies. The Buddhists regard these monstrosities as demi-gods, whose presence insures the safety of their government. While here, we went into the Royal Chapel in the Compound of the Grand Palace, where the "Emerald Buddha" sits on a solid piece of emerald-like jasper, and is one of the wonders of the world. At the beginning of each season of the year, a great festival is held, in which the King arrives in his royal barge, seated on his golden throne and bringing with him an elaborate new garment, with which he clothes the emerald idol.

The following day we ventured out to view the 300 magnificent Buddhist temples or parodas, as they are referred to by the natives. These fabulous parodas are some of the most noted in the world. In the Wat Po, we walked from the huge gold-painted feet of the immense "Reclining Buddha" along the one hundred and sixty feet length of his body to his colossal head, which measures forty feet in height as it lays there, in symbolic slumber. This immense statue is all covered in leaf gold, and was 16 years in carving and gilding. His position is representative of his passing into Nirvana, which in Buddhism is the state of perfect blessedness, achieved by the extinction of all desires and passions.

To get a full view of the tallest Buddha in the world - approximately one hundred and seven feet high - we had to stand a distance of a block from it. To get a picture of it would be impossible.

We drove to Wat Arun, to see the Temple of The Dawn. At the base of this impressive marble structure, is a porcelain encrusted pavilion, in which is displayed four episodes in the life of Buddha - birth, enlightenment, first converts, and death. In the niche at the lower left, the Moon God rides a white horse. This temple soars 140 feet and is the pride of the Buddhists.

In the early dawn of the third day, Beth and I boarded a canopied motor boat which sailed along the Chao Phraya River, until we reached the famous canal with its floating market. Of all the strange sights I have ever looked upon, this was the most unusual - a solid traffic jam of nondescript houseboats, barges, mixed in with a conglomeration of row boats filled with every conceivable kind of produce, and manipulated in most cases by a lone woman. From our seats on the boat, we looked down on this moving mass of chunks of freshly butchered hogs; other little boats filled with green vegetables; or black coal, or white salt, or bananas, or bamboo poles, or coconuts, or teakwood, or papayas, or garlands of flowers or embroidered linens, or grapefruit, or eggs, or bettle leaves, or loaves of bread, or steaming soup still in pots on live coals, or rice or mangoes, or huge ti leaves, or anything there is in this world.

As our boat edged its way

through this unique grocery store, I thought how enticing such bargains would be to West Texas housewives! With our American dollars worth over twice as much as the Thai baht, we could fill our frigidaires with purchases paid for with a single dollar.

On each side of this floating market are hundreds of families, living in pathetic old shacks, thrown together, out of old discarded boards and pieces of tin and other junk; and in these live people who have never sat in a chair, or turned a water faucet, or seen inside of an automobile. Here they are born, marry, live and die without ever seeing the outside world. They use this murky canal water to brush their teeth, to bathe in, to cook with, and to take care of their disposal.

These Siamese people are gentle and kind, and hospitable to strangers. As our boat passed in front of these nondescript shacks, the little children stood outside, smiling and lovingly waving their hands, and how happy it seemed to make them when we waved back to them.

Thailand is much more westernized than Burma, and we saw many people dressed in Western style clothes - some of the women we passed in the business section of the city wore their skirts an inch briefer than the latest style in the U. S. A. On the other hand, I saw many yellow robed priests and priestesses, with their heads shaved and shining like billiard balls in the sun. Some of these priestesses were helping to unload boats. How thankful I was to live in this blessed America, when I observed women in overalls working beside men in filthy, slishy, sewer ditches!

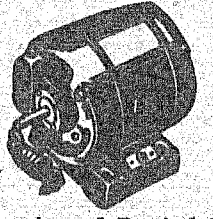

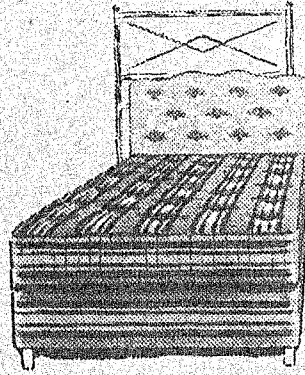

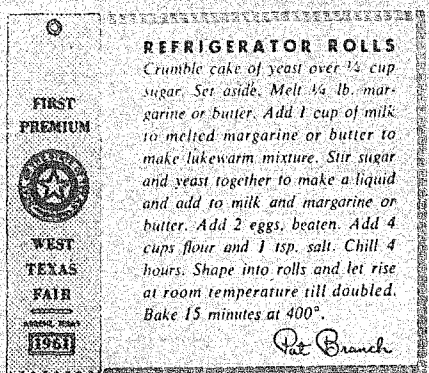

State Capital NEWS

Austin — Year-round colleges, less work for the Attorney General and more realistic election laws, could result from studies being undertaken by the Texas Legislative Council.

The Council, the Legislature's research arm, agreed to undertake eleven studies during the coming year. A total of 25 were proposed. List was trimmed down because there just isn't enough time or money to study them all.

Subjects selected for study include: Election Code Revision, Space Utilization by Institutions of Higher Education, Coordination of Health and Welfare Services of the State, Non-constitutional Duties of the Attorney General, Opinion Authority of the Attorney General, Laws based on Population Classification, State Hospitals and Special Schools, Texas Utility Regulations, Discrimination in Employment Because of Age, Mentally Ill Children, Health, Accident and Hospitalization Insurance Claims.

Findings will go to the 1963 session of the Legislature for the lawmaker's consideration.

WATER POLLUTION
Governor Daniel will soon name the members of the new State Water Pollution Control Board. This new agency will operate to some extent as a branch of the State Health Department.

Many areas of Texas are having water pollution problems, and those who sought help in Austin went to four or five offices without finding much response. So legislators set up a new agency, but did not give it any operation money. It authorized Governor Daniel and the Health Department to allocate part of their appropriations, if they can spare it, to the new agency.

Daniel will ask this winter's special session of the Legislature to make some improvements in the law and to provide some cash for the agency to begin a real attack on water pollution.

After November 7, no one can discharge any kind of waste into the waters of Texas without a permit from this board.

SALES TAX TIME
Merchants who have been collecting the new state sales tax will make their first payments to the state October 31, covering collections for September.

Payments will then go on a quarterly basis. Collecting stores get to keep one per cent. If they make estimates and pay in advance for each quarter, they can take a three per cent discount. Advance payments on the fourth quarter of 1961 will be due by November 15.

Comptroller Bob Calvert issued some more interpretations of the new law. If you pay the sales tax to the state on credit sales, and then charge them off as bad debts, you can deduct the tax on the tax return for the quarter in which you gave up on collecting.

Unless seller keeps books to show clearly what part of a credit sale is for the item, and what part is for interest, carrying charges and insurance, he must collect the tax on the whole price of the sale.

Shirt boards and clothing bags are exempt from the sales tax when bought by a clothing store for selling new goods. But laundries buying the same items would have to pay the sales tax on them.

A bottler would pay the sales tax on soda pop bottles when he buys them from the factory. But when you put deposit on returnable bottles at the corner store, there's no sales tax on the bottles.

PAPERBACKS

Students in 110 classrooms in Texas will be using some paperback school books in January. Legislators, looking for ways to save money, told the State Board of Education to test out paperback school books and report back by 1963 on whether tax money can be saved.

The board will adopt new books at its meeting November 13. It will vote on 27 books recommended by a teachers textbook committee. Protests have been made by Rancher-Writer J. Everts Haley of Canyon, speaking for the Texans for America organization.

TAX ATTACKED
Three gas pipeline companies brought suit in Austin to try to knock out the new tax on production of gas under dedicated-reserve contracts.

This is merely a token tax, designed to find out whether this new approach to the taxing of natural gas is constitutional. Suit was expected.

Two previous efforts to levy an additional tax on gas have been knocked out by the courts. Rep. Robert C. Eckhardt, Houston, devised this new method and believes it is valid despite some amendments he opposed on the ground that they would weaken the chance of standing up in court.

MORE G. I. LOANS
Veterans Land Board advertised for bids for \$25,000,000 more in State bonds to expand the program of farm and ranch loans to Texas veterans.

Step up in the program was announced by Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, who said tracts to be subdivided for sale to GIs will be appraised before the owner has surveys made.

LAST WORD
Some 7,700 Texans got checks from State Insurance Liquidator C. H. Langdeau which brought to 39 per cent their recovery from the bankrupt U. S. Trust and Guaranty Company. This was the big insurance, investment and automobile sales firm which collapsed in 1955.

Langdeau has almost liquidated all the assets, but has pending a lawsuit in which he and Mrs. A. B. Shoemaker, wife of the president of the firm, are arguing as to whether a large Waco residence is her homestead or the company's.

So a proposition was made to the 9,000 creditors and claimants — settle for another two per cent, and charge off the rest of your loss on your 1961 income tax return. Or, if you choose, hang on and perhaps get a little more if the state wins the lawsuit.

In all, 7,700 took the two per cent, but 1,300 said they would wait and see. As it stands now, Langdeau found \$7,100,000 worth of debts and deposits in U. S. Trust and Guaranty Company. He was able to scrape to gether only \$2,800,000 to pay on the claims.

DIGGINGS PLANNED
Archaeologists from the University of Texas will dig for Indian relics in seven parts of Texas which are soon to be covered with water.

National Park Service is advancing \$60,000 to finance the searches. Seven areas to be mined for remains of Indian cultures are those to be covered by Sanford Reservoir on the Canadian, Amistad on the Rio Grande, McGee Bend on the Angelina, Navarro Mills on Richland Creek near Corsicana, Columbus Bend near Columbus on the Colorado, Livingston on the lower Trinity and Toledo Bend on the Sabine.

FOURTH TERM
Political newsmaker-of-the-week was Att. Gen. Will Wilson. He walked into the State Democratic Executive Committee meeting to charge that Governor Daniel had made a deal with Sec. of Navy John Connally of Fort Worth by which Daniel would support Connally for governor and would himself run for lieutenant governor.

Wilson challenged Daniel to run for a fourth term (against Wilson), rather than to support Connally for the place "when he has barely got his seat warm in Washington."

Connally, in Texas making a speech, said he had no comment, that he had "quit reading fairy tales a long time ago."

Daniel said any fair-minded person "who reads the entire statement is bound to know it is false and a concoction of his imagination."

CANDIDACY ANNOUNCED
Texas got the first announced candidate for the Democratic primary next May 5. He is a young West-Texan who has set out to be a giant-killer.

Keith Wheatley, 28, of Stamford, announced as a candidate against Railroad Commissioner Ben Ramsey for the remaining two years of the late Commissioner, Olin Culberson's term.

Wheatley, an independent oil operator and son of State Rep. J. C. Wheatley of Haskell, said the little men in the Texas oil business are being starved out by the Railroad Commission's proration policies.

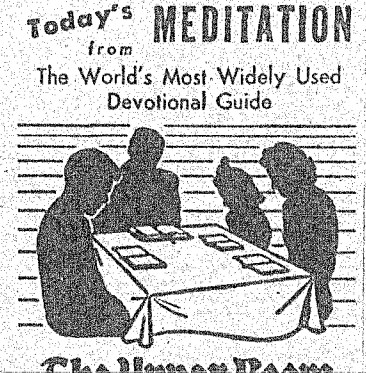

The Mountaineers ran up a total of 348 yards rushing Friday night to only 83 for the Cross Plains Buffaloes in defeating them the narrow margin of 14-6. Many times the words, "The score does not indicate the game" have been repeated and we think they could justly be repeated again, but with a different meaning from usual. Twice the Mountaineers lost the ball on fumbles when they had a good drive underway, once on the Buffalo 25-yard line and once on the Buffalo 6-yard line. Two other times penalties at critical points cost the Mountaineers a TD. Only one time during the entire game did the Buffs get a drive underway and manage to gain more than one first down in succession.

It was a hard fought game. The Mountaineers proved their superiority many times during the evening, by being capable of stopping everything the Buffs had to throw at them, with only one exception during the middle of the fourth period when they suffered the heart-breaking loss of the ball on a fumble on the Buffs 6-yard line.

The Mountaineers received eight penalties that amounted to 85 yards. One of these penalties cost them 10 yards plus a punt return of about 40 yards, another cost them a 29-yard TD run by Brown plus the 15 yards another penalty cost them 15 yards plus a 14-yard run by Walker that would have put the ball on the Buff 3-yard line.

Things like this are enough to disrupt any team, but mostly the Mountaineers remained in good spirits, and kept their defense good.

THE GAME

The Mountaineers kicked to the Buff 12-yard line with a return to the 31. A pass was good for a first down on the 45, then a short gain minus a 5 yard penalty and a short loss and incomplete pass caused the Buffs to punt from their 40-yard line to the Mountaineer 40-yard line. The Mountaineers picked up 8 yards in 2 tries, gained a few inches on a fumble. At this point on fourth down, Simmons handed off to Dockery for a smash through right tackle in an effort to pick up 2 yards for a first down. Dockery found a hole opened by good blocking and before you knew it he was racing the 52 yards for the Mountaineers first TD. Harold Walker then went through right tackle for the 2 extra points.

The kick-off was returned 17

yards and the Buffs could not gain and punted out of bounds on the Mountaineers 46-yard line. Two first downs put the Mountaineers in scoring position again, but lost the ball on a fumble on the Buff 25-yard line. The Buffs completed two passes and with short rushing gains went to the 50-yard line, but lost back to the 44 and punted to the Mountaineer 11-yard line. A good punt return was nullified with a clipping penalty on the 20-yard line that put the Mountaineers back on their 10-yard line. As the quarter ended the Mountaineers were on their 26-yard line.

An exchange of 5-yard penalties and failure to gain caused the Mountaineers to punt to the Buff 25-yard line with no return. The Buffs couldn't gain and punted to the Mountaineer 27-yard line. The Mountaineers got a good drive underway and went to the Buff 28-yard line. Randy Brown made one of the best runs we have seen him make this year from this point and went all the way to pay dirt, but the play was called back for another 15-yard penalty. The boys could not get the drive going again and punted to the Buff 11-yard line. The Buffs gained 5 yards then lost 7 on a penalty and had gained back to the 19 as the half

ended. The Mountaineers took the kick-off out of bounds on their 35-yard line. They gained 3 yards then lost 15 on a penalty. On the next play the Buffs received a 15-yard penalty, putting the ball on the 36-yard line. The Mountaineers got their drive going and Walker went over from 24 yards out for the TD. The try for extra points failed and the Mountaineers led 14-0.

The Buffs fumbled the kick-off but recovered it on their 8-yard line, then gained about 8 yards and a 15-yard penalty for the Mountaineers put the ball on the 30-yard line. A Buff 15-yard penalty put them back on the 15 and they failed to gain and punted to their 46, with the Mountaineers returning to their 33. The Mountaineers drove to the 16 then Walker went to the 2, but the local boys received another 15 yarder that put them back on the 25. They gained to the 14-yard line as the ball went over. The Buffs couldn't gain and got off a short punt, to their 37-yard line. The Mountaineers drove to the 6-yard line and lost the ball on a fumble. From here the Buffs got their only drive of the evening underway. Their drive was good for 94 yards with their L. V. Falkner going the final 3

yards for the TD. Their pass attempt failed on the extra point try and the score was 14-6. The Buffs tried an on-sides kick, but the Mountaineer line recovered the ball on the 42-yard line. Walker got loose on a

29-yard jaunt but the Buffs managed to get him from behind. Simmons then started using Walker and Brown on short plunges to run the clock out. The game ended with the Mountaineers on the Buffs 7-yard line.
