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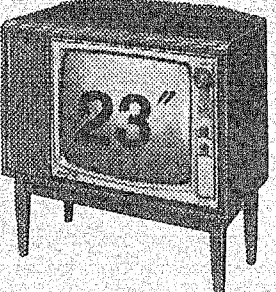
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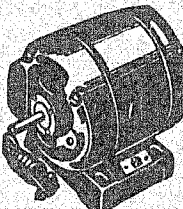
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NOTICE

A West Texas House Wife Circles The Globe

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HONG KONG — A BEAUTIFUL CITY

Hong Kong has one of the most enchantingly beautiful harbors in the world and it was a joyful privilege to witness such a fabulous sight as our entrance into this port of the city, known as the glamour capitol of the Far East.

Junks with patched sails were criss-crossing the blue green waters, and sampans filled with scantily clad mothers and children, swarmed around our boat, asking for "kumshaw."

As I came out of my stateroom on A Deck, a group of reporters were standing there in the corridor in front of my door. I thought nothing of the inquiries made of me, as it is customary to be questioned so many times before landing in a foreign country. But I heard from this later, when I was handed a Hong Kong newspaper, and I saw the announcement of my arrival and an article about me. I was flabbergasted!

A representative from a travel agency met me in the main lounge, introduced himself, and asked the Purser's permission to take charge of my luggage. As we walked down the gang plank, I saw throngs of people standing behind the iron railing that separated them from the Cleveland, which they had come to see anchored. Imagine my delight when someone called out: "Mrs. Barnes!" I looked at the speaker and sure enough, it was Bill Wong. He had a lovely blonde woman with him, whom he introduced as Mrs. Scanlon. Bill explained that his wife, Priscilla, was ill and had sent her best friend to show me around.

I never was happier to see anyone. Bill Wong is an architect from San Antonio, who had designed our son's home there. He had married the beautiful Priscilla Wu, whom I had met on several social occasions there. Bill was born in Hong Kong, but had been educated in the United States, having received his degree in architecture from Georgia Tech. He and Priscilla had heard from Priscilla's mother that I was to be in Hong Kong. They had written Jimmy, our son, that they would meet me at the boat. What a relief it was to have someone who knew the town to guide me around! There is no hospitality anywhere to equal that of the Orient.

I had reservations at the Peninsula Hotel, which is on the Kowloon side. I should explain here that Hong Kong is made up of the island of Hong Kong and the peninsula of Kowloon. Kowloon and the New Territories are both an extension of the mainland of Red China. The Peninsula Hotel is only a short walking distance from the harbor. After we arrived at the hotel and I had registered and was shown my suite of rooms, which consisted of a large sitting room and a spacious bedroom, both of which were entered through a large entrance hall, Mrs. Scanlon took me in charge and what a blessing that was! I had to catch a ferry everywhere I went—to town, to the Wong home, or on any sight-seeing jaunt. I would have been completely bewildered all alone.

Hong Kong is known as the city of dragon festivals, and cricket matches; British tweed and Mandarin Brocade; the shopping paradise of the world—from "tiffin" to a "Cantonese" dinner. I was completely captivated by the glamorous displays, gorgeous sweaters and dresses in the shops; and compared with American prices, and the high value of the U. S. dollar (one U. S. dollar equals 5.85 H. K. dollars). These money values and the cheap labor employed, makes their merchandise a terrific bargain. We had been warned by the boat officials not to buy anything made in Red China, for it could not be brought back into the United States, so, I asked for certificates of origin for each of the few pieces of merchandise I

bought. Mrs. Scanlon showed me through the shops and the enormous department stores, and then took me to lunch in the celebrated Marco Polo Restaurant, which is noted for its delicious steaks, its crepe suzettes, and coconut ice-cream.

During the afternoon, we rode rickshaws for some more sight-seeing and afterwards we were driven out to the Wong home. Never before had I seen a home in such a heavenly picturesque location. It stood at the edge of Repulse Bay and through the long white glass wall you look out on the sapphire water with twinkling lights of hundreds of small fishing boats, all around them flash myriads of lights from hotels, apartment houses and homes built on the sides of the mountains that slope down the shore lines of the bay.

The Wongs took me in their car up on Victoria Peak that evening, where we looked down on the fabulous city below literally ablaze with the jeweled sparkle of thousands of multi-colored lights, and the waters of

the bay aglow with illuminated boats of all sizes, while the green sloping mountains scintillated with starry brilliance from the many buildings there. I sat looking down at this enchanting scene 2000 feet below us, with breathless wonder as I thought of the two-and-one-fourth million people who lived in Hong Kong, in addition to the thousands of Red Chinese refugees, living in make-shift shacks; under trees; in small boats, jammed together into a solid mass on the water.

The next day we visited Tiger Balm Gardens, one of the gaudiest and most bizarre sights in all the world; decorated with scarlet pagodas; vivid statuary; and bright blue pavilions; it

fairly shouts at the beholder like an exotic circus of evil spirits; there on the mountain side. To the Chinese it represents mythical, historical, and religious figures and incidents traditionally well known to them. The gardens were contributed and laid out by a millionaire Chinese patent medicine man, who passed away in 1954.

I don't think anyone could have seen more of this city than I did in three days, due to the wonderful hospitality of the Bill Wong family—but my heart was already in Burma, where our children: the Terry Sanders family lived. Our son-in-law, Terry Bentley Sanders, Jr., was at the time associated with the American Embassy in Rangoon. I

thought my plane—an Eastern Airlines Jet—would never take off. I had not the faintest conception of what awaited me in

this startling strange world, that lay on the other side of the Earth from ours.


