

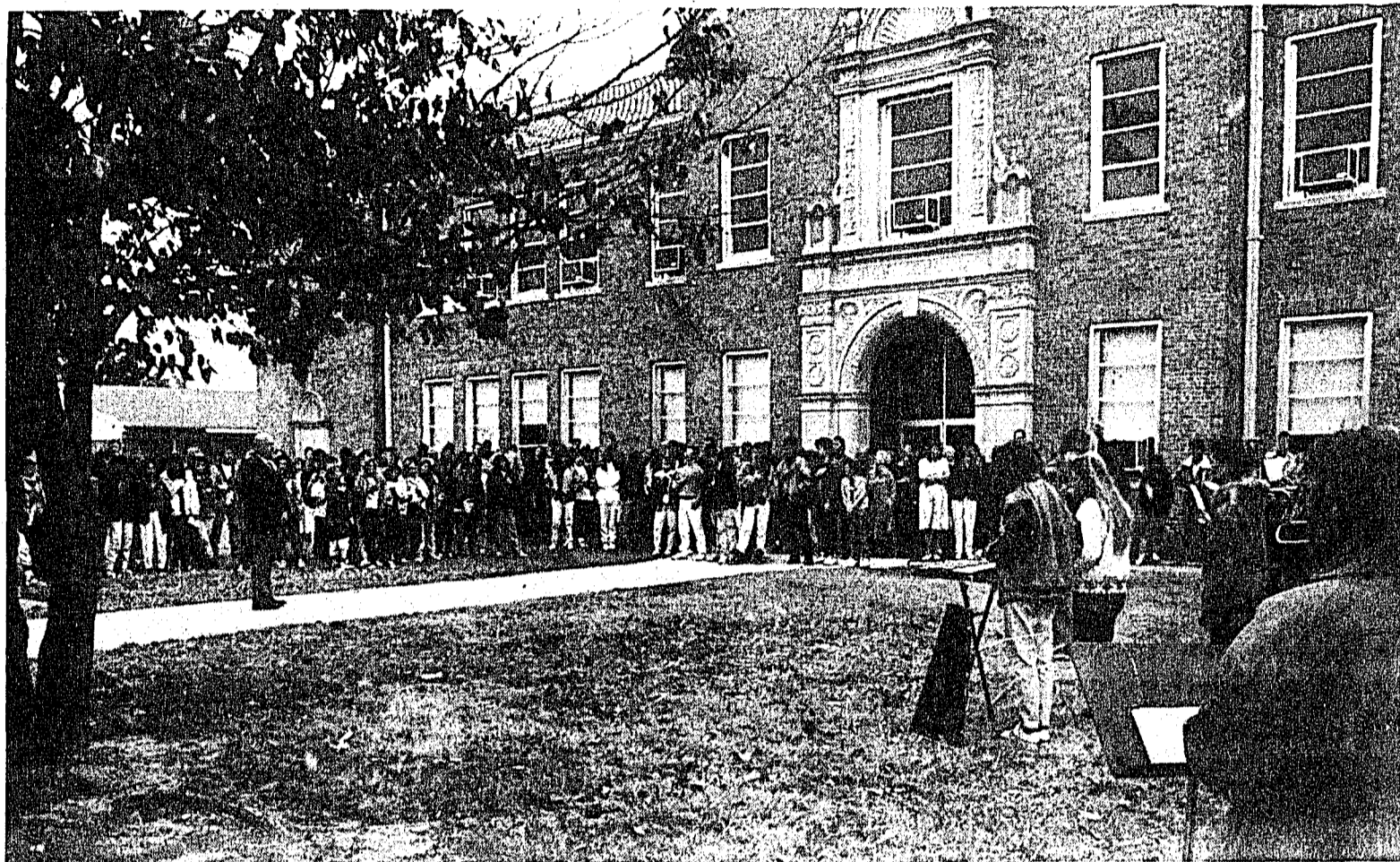

## Gov. Richards Appoints Ross Jones To New District Attorney Post

AUSTIN—Governor Ann Richards announced Tuesday that she had appointed Ross Jones of Coleman to the post of District Attorney of Coleman County. She explained that this is a new position created by House Bill 12 of the second called session of the 72nd Legislature.

Jones, a longtime attorney with offices in Coleman, is currently serving as Assistant County Attorney (Felony Prosecutor) a post he has held since 1987.

Ross Jones received his Bachelor degree from Texas Tech University and his Law Degree from The University of Texas School of Law. He is a member of the State Bar Association, the Coleman County Bar Association and is a Fellow of the Texas Bar Foundation.

Jones will serve as Coleman County District Attorney until the next general election.

## Henderson Will Continue Ambulance Service, At Least For Time Being

Two firms in Santa Anna had continued ambulance service even after the county began paying a subsidy to another service. Last week one of those firms,

## His Humor Will Still Be Enjoyed

KERRVILLE—Cowboy cartoonist Ace Reid, whose cartoons have entertained millions over the last four decades, is gone, but his unique characters Jake and Zeb live on.

Reid, 66, died Sunday at Methodist Hospital in San Antonio after a long battle with leukemia and diabetes.

Stan Ried of Kerrville said Monday that his father's cartoons will continue to be available to newspapers, magazines and calendar publications for years to come.

"That was his life. The cartoon is not going to die. He will continue to live throughout these cartoons," Reid said.

The popular cartoon is seen each week in the Santa Anna National Bank advertisement in the Santa Anna News and is one of our more popular features. Many of our readers look for that cartoon first when reading the NEWS.

Reid's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ace Reid, Sr., were residents of Santa Anna for a number of years before Mr. Reid Sr's death. His mother, Callie Reid, now resides in Fredericksburg. Reid spoke for the Chamber of Commerce banquet a couple of years ago and drew the largest crowd ever for the event.

"His genius was to be able to see the world in its humor and put it down on paper," his son said. "In his cartoons, he would go straight to the point of the problems of everyday people. He made them feel comfortable."

A memorial service was to be held Wednesday at St. Peter's

Episcopal Church in Kerrville. Reid's body will be cremated.

"No tombstone," he once said, "because I don't believe in being buried and taking up some good ranch country an old cow or sheep could be grazing on."

When he wasn't raising cattle, drilling for oil or hanging out with the late humorist Hondo Crouch, a comfort rancher and owner of Luckenbach, Reid was drawing, "Cowpokes," a weekly self syndicated cartoon, doing some serious painting or making a speech to a crowd of bankers or ranchers.

Reid's inspirational, funny outlook on life made him a popular speaker across the country.

He was born March 10, 1925, at Lelia Lake in Donley County in the Texas Panhandle and grew up near Electra, west of Wichita Falls. He married Madge Parmley on Sept 11, 1949 in Dallas. He had been a resident of Kerrville since 1951.

He was a benefactor of many organizations including the Hill Country Youth Ranch at Ingram, and West Texas Boys Ranch near San Angelo. He helped to organize the Horned Toad Association and the Crippled Cowboys Association. Reid's drive to success wasn't

easy. He flunked art in high school and never took a drawing lesson.

In an interview several years ago, he said he started his Cowpokes cartoon idea when he had to choose between "cowboying and cartooning. The oil wells went dry; the green bugs got my wheat; and the bottom fell out of the cow market."

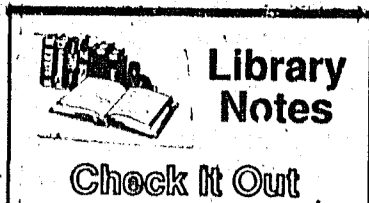

Christmas is around the corner. Buy books! Now is the time to visit book stores as the supplies are good. I had a very few minutes in B. Dalton's and found a treasure land for children. A wonderful teacher from the Wylie schools was there and she shared some of her latest treasures...*The True Storey of The Three Little Pigs* by Jon Scieszka. The wolf tells his side of the storey in a very amusing way. *Christmas Pocket Postage Book*, letters to Red Riding Hood from the wolf and her letters to him. These are little letters tucked inside envelopes. This enthusiastic, imaginative teacher planned to ask her pupils to make their own book using the letter idea. She showed me another beautiful book about an Indian Chief's farewell speech to his people. I was so interested I failed to get the title. You can recognize it by the beautiful drawings. The front has a drawing of the chief.

There was a new book of Laura Ingalls Wilders writings, *The Little House on Rocky Ridge*. This home is in Mansfield, Missouri (the Ozarks) and is a museum with personal items of Laura's family.

Have you ever seen *Pooh Bears Christmas Book*? There was a book of Dr. Seuss, lots of teenage books. I'm sure every store has a good supply of childrens' books now.

Others that might interest you and yours are: *Bingo Brown and the Language of Love*, this old friend is growing up and his life is changing. *The Wall* might help explain veterans to their children. A boy and his father search for the grandfather's name on the Vietnam Memorial. *The Lampfish of Twill* is an exciting story of a boy whose parents drown. He lives with an aunt and has an underwater adventure with a sea gull and an old man.

The Lone Star Special is a list of books published by Texas A & M, Texas Christian University, and The University of North Texas. Some are for children and some for adults, consider these: *Tame the Wild Stallion*, a storey about a boy who is a captive on a Mexican hacienda. He learns a lot about Mexican culture. *Christmas in Texas* has everything from recipes to decorations. *Texas Toys and Games* gives information on how to make toys and stories about them. Some grandfather would enjoy making these for his loving grandchildren. The children could give the book as a special Christmas present.

Who owns one half of the original copy of *Huckleberry Finn*? Two sisters found it in their grandfather's trunk. Buffalo and Erie County Library owns the other half and claims this part. It could be worth a million dollars and should take years to settle.

Annie Laura Williams was an author's agent. She had sold such books as *Grapes of Wrath* and Loyd C. Douglas' *Magnificent Obsession*. Have you read these classics? Would you believe she went through 12 producers before she sold *Gone With the Wind*?

I can be seen, almost, by observing a blazing fire in a fireplace. I can be felt in a pair of warm mittens, or comfortable house shoes. I am embodied in an expensive mink, but my pleasure is none the less enjoyed by being revealed in an inexpensive cloth coat.

I am the summer sun that follows the worker on a Texas farm, as he plows the rich brown earth in the middle of the day. I am joy in a small boys heart as he fishes beneath a tall pecan tree on the old bayou. I am convinced that mine is an honorable intent and that I can bring peace and happiness to a troubled world. But I shall not force myself upon a civilization. No, I must be selected because I am wanted... and for those who seek me, I promise a peace of mind, and a deeper understanding.

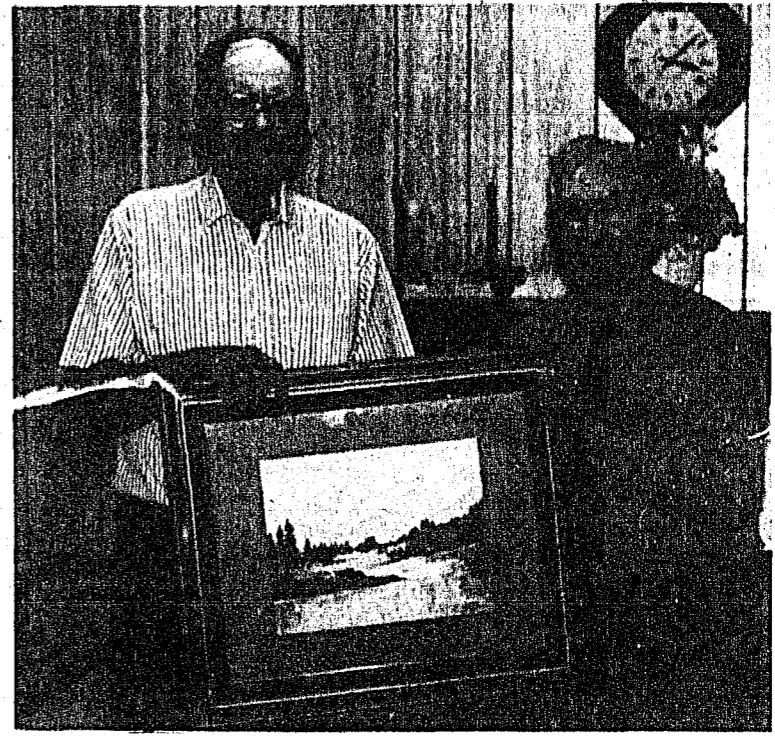

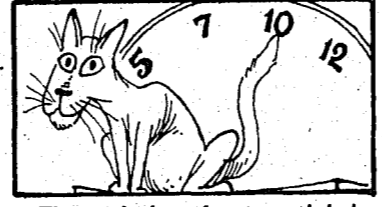
### Training For Those Holding Private Applicator License In Coleman Monday

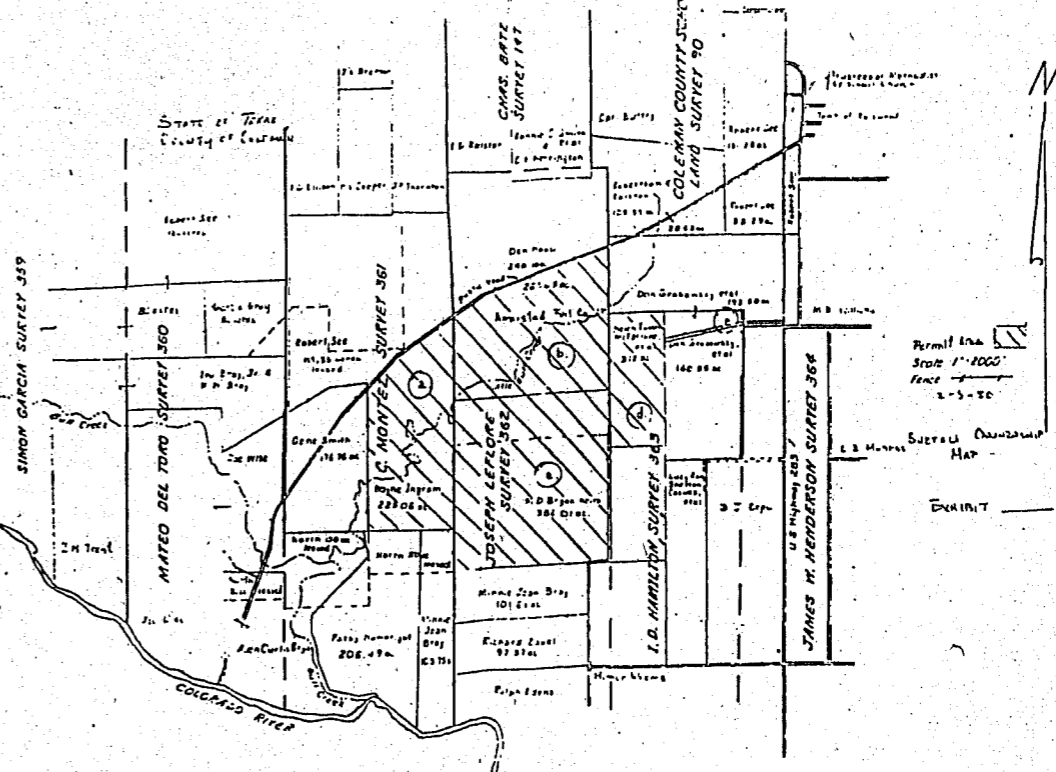

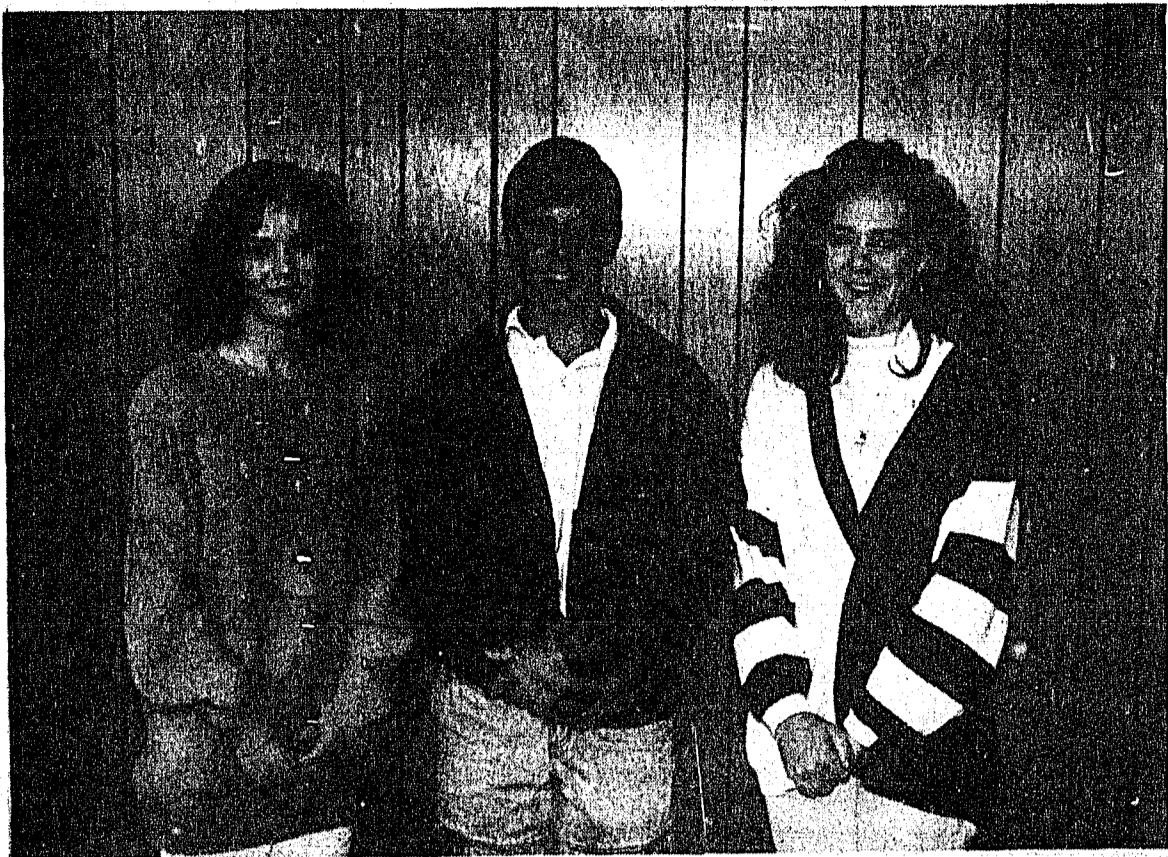

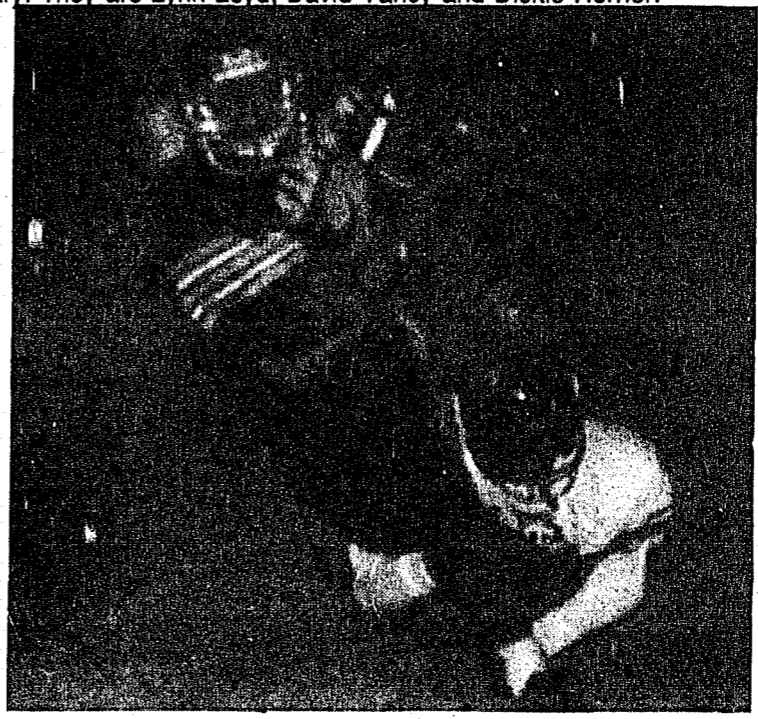
