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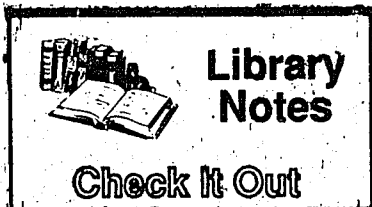

## When Will The Library Be Moved?

Members of the Library Board are often asked "When are you going to move the library?" We always answer, "When we get the money to finish the building."

The building next door to Phillips Drug was given to the City of Santa Anna a number of years ago to be used for a library. The City has no funds to put into the library. They do furnish the utilities, building maintenance and lots of moral support. Our librarians are Green Thumb workers paid by the Federal Government. Everything else is done by volunteers and contributions.

There are no funds to buy new books but the book supply is growing. Many people have been very generous in giving us good books. Some people also place new books in the library as memorials. We always welcome these donated books.

Our ongoing expenses like office supplies, postage, new book shelves and light fixtures, and expenses of the summer reading program are met by donations and fund raising events.

At the time we received the building there were no funds for remodeling it. It took several years of book sales, bake sales, raffles and begging donations to begin work on the building.

Progress is slow, but steady. So far we have put on a new roof, a new back wall and back entrance, roughed in the plumbing and out up the inside stud walls. This summer we had some concrete work done to improve the drainage at the back of the building. We are now raising money to out in a new ceiling. That is a big job. We need new

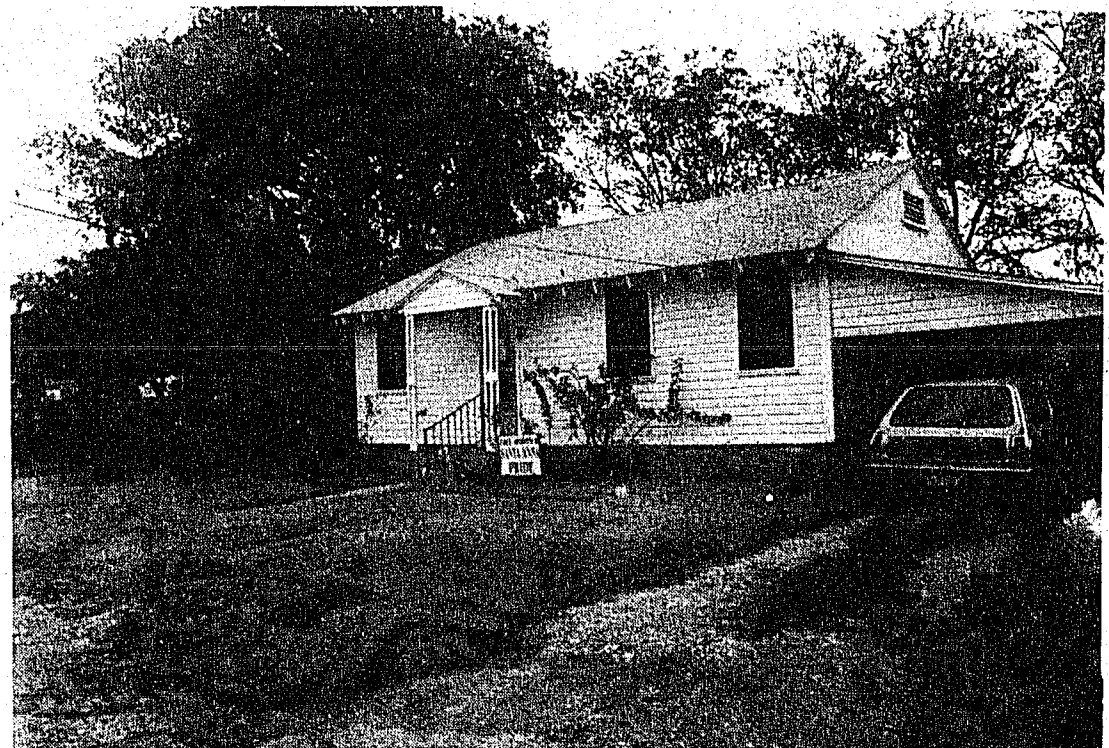

## Volunteers Keeping Library Open In Absence Of Librarian

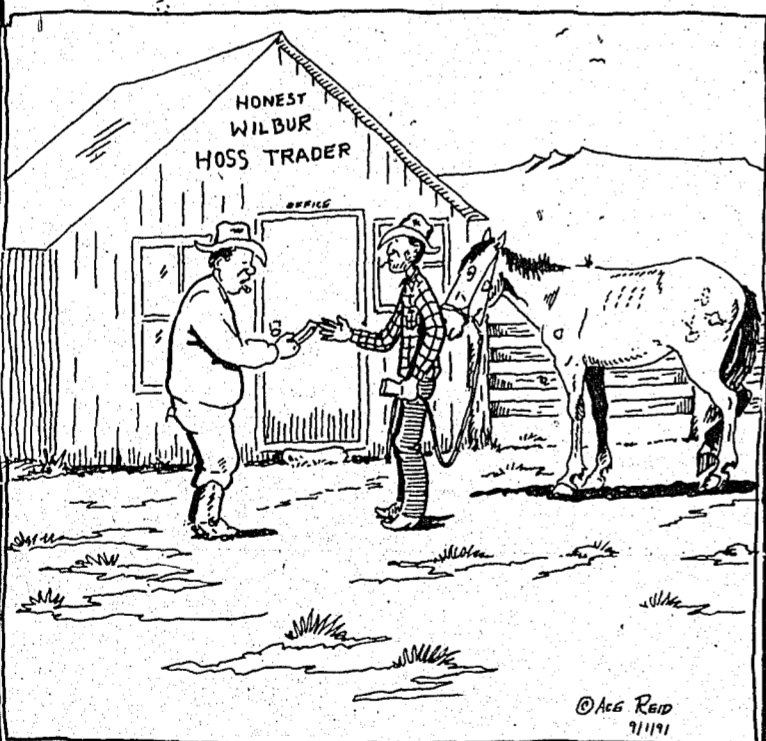
Volunteers are keeping the library open during the absence of librarian Letha Martin who suffered an accident recently. She will be unable to return to work for another couple of weeks.

## Turner Appointed To Health Task Force

AUSTIN-- House Speaker Gib Lewis announced last Wednesday that he has appointed Rep Bob Turner of Voss as a member of the Texas Health Policy Task Force that will develop a comprehensive plan to address health care and health insurance needs of all Texans.

The 26-member task force was created by an executive order issued last Wednesday by Gov. Ann Richards and will be chaired by Dr. Shirley S. Chater president of Texas Woman's University.

Rising health costs and increasing numbers of people lacking adequate health care coverage have created a crisis that requires coordinated efforts by government, business health care providers insurers and consumers. Speaker Lewis said "This task force is our opportunity to craft real solutions that will work in Texas." Rep Turner is a member of the House committee on Science and Technology and the committee on cultural and Historical Resources. "I Selected Rep. Turner because of his expertise in issues affecting health care will be valuable to the task force in dealing with this complex issue," Lewis said.

The task force will report to the Governor, Lt. Governor and Speaker by Nov. 1, 1992, with recommendations to provide the basis for legislation to be considered by lawmakers in 1993.

The responsibilities of the task force include:

-- Defining what we mean when we talk about basic health care for Texans, and outlining what Texas can do to enhance preventive and primary care;

-- Proposing a basic health insurance benefits package or other financing arrangements that are not necessarily tied to place of employment;

-- Coming up with a range of health insurance coverage options for small businesses;

-- Recommending cost-saving measures;

-- Recommending ways to coordinate the health-care delivery system, with special emphasis on rural health services and trauma care.

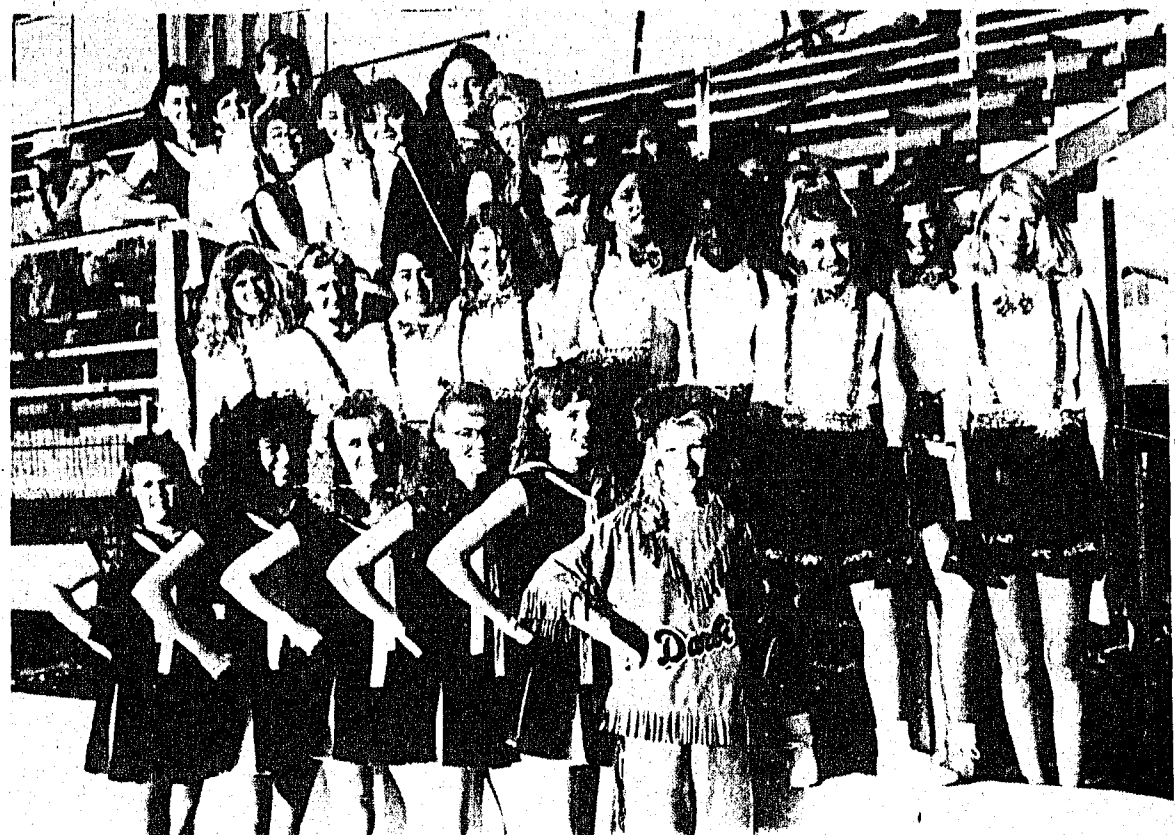

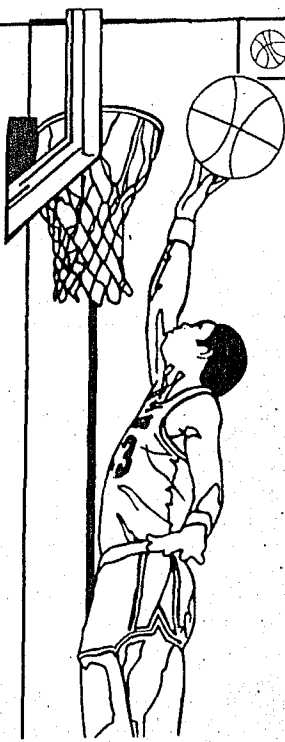

## Cold, Icy Weather Could Pose Threat To Home LP-Gas Users

AUSTIN—With the arrival of the winter heating season, Texas homeowners who fuel furnaces and appliances with liquefied petroleum gas should double-check to make sure the regulator on their LP-gas tank is properly installed, say Chairman Lena Guerrero and safety officials of the Railroad Commission's Liquefied Petroleum Gas Division.

If the regulator vent ices over, high-pressure gas can be released directly to home appliances. A normal 3/4-inch blue flame on an appliance could suddenly surge, becoming a dangerous torch. Over the past few winters, several fires have been caused by such regulator freeze-ups, officials say.

Regulators on many home tanks are located under a protective metal dome on the top of the tank, shielding them from weather and insects. However, homeowners with tanks where the circular regulator has been installed outside the dome cover should check to make sure that the regulator vent is pointing

down toward the ground, away from the elements.

If homeowners are concerned about whether or not their regulator is properly installed, they should contact the local LP-gas dealer that fills or services their tank.

For economic reasons, some consumers are buying propane in portable tanks for use as a supplemental heat source. However, a dangerous and potentially deadly situation can develop when homeowners bring LP-gas portable cylinders indoors. Commission safety regulations prohibit portable LP-gas containers indoors because of the danger of explosion or fire if stored too close to a heat source.

Cylinders and containers must be installed outside in accordance with the Commission's LP-gas safety rules.

LP-gas more commonly known as propane or butane, is used as a residential and commercial fuel in areas where natural gas utility service is not available.
