Thelma Brooker Receives "Citizen Of The Year" Honor



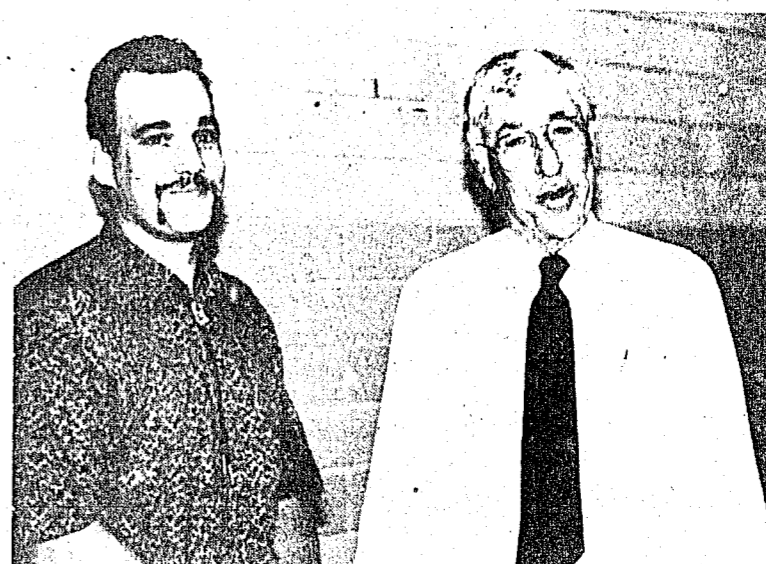

Thelma Brooker was presented with the "Citizen of the Year" award at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet held Saturday night. Ms. Brooker, a former mayor of Santa Anna has for a number of years been a driving force behind Funtier Day planning and organizing and the plain old hard work that goes with pulling off a successful project such as this. In introducing her, past president of the Chamber Montic Guthrie said that Thelma could always be counted on to give 100 percent or

more to any project they asked her to serve on. "You will just as likely find her with a pick or shovel in hand as doing any other type of work on any given project."

Thelma is the type of person who never says, "this can't be accomplished." In fact, you better watch out if you tell her that. She will probably end up proving you wrong, and more often than not has done just that. She was the first woman mayor of Santa Anna when elected to that post several years ago, serving one term and elected to

a second. She resigned because of family commitments before finishing that second term. She served as mayor preceding present Mayor Gale Allen-Brock.

The Rob Cheaney "Best Dressed" award went to Jasper McClellan. The award traditionally goes to someone who puts forth a lot of effort, working quietly behind the scene, in promoting the causes and projects of the Chamber of Commerce. McClellan has served on the Chamber board of directors and has been very active in Chamber activities.

Senator Temple Dickson was guest speaker for the occasion, being introduced by Carol Kingsbery Otto, a native of Santa Anna who is General Counsel for the Senate Economic Development Committee of which Dickson is serving as Chairman. Ms. Otto is a SAHS graduate, the daughter of Tom and Barbara Kingsbery.

The Senator talked about his work with the Economic Development Committee and his efforts on behalf of the 24th Senatorial District which covers several counties in West Texas as

well as reaching into East Central Texas. He touched on what impact recent legislation might have on this area and the small schools. He claims he is a strong supporter of small schools and says he will continue to work on their behalf in his position as Senator and on the committee.

He ended by saying, "if Houston business owners want to see 'true grit' come to West Texas and Santa Anna. If Big City School Administrators want to see some hard working individuals trying to hold things together, come to West

Texas and Santa Anna. If Farmers and ranchers of the state want to see observance some real perseverance, come to West Texas and the Santa Anna area."

Mrs. Dickson accompanied the Senator.

Before the honorees and the guest speaker were introduced, Chamber president Mike Simmons welcomed the audience and gave a report on the projects of the Chamber for the past year and told of the accomplishments they had made in various areas.

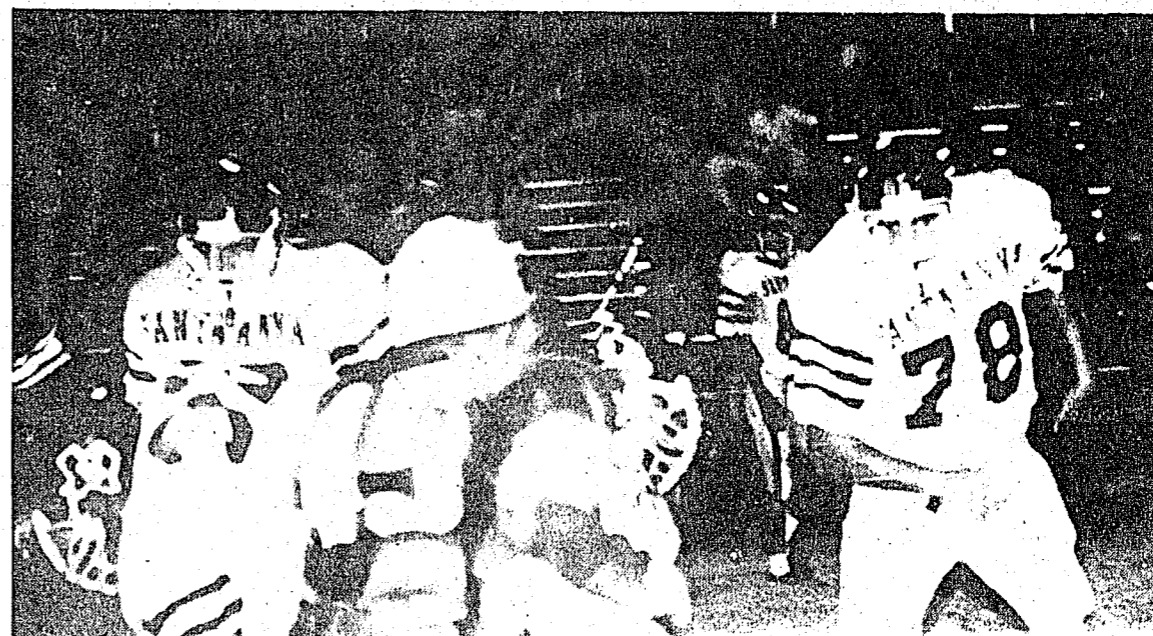

Tom Stroud, band director for the schools, spoke to the board concerning the need for band uniforms and showed a sample uniform. Following some discussion, a motion was made by Simmons, seconded by Guthrie, to purchase 60 new uniforms at the approximate total cost of \$8,000. The motion carried unanimously.

Motion was then made by Simmons and seconded by Absher, for an amendment to the 1991-92 operating budget, adding \$8,000 to cover the cost of the band uniforms. The motion passed unanimously.

Superintendent Gerald Brister recommended that the six early-out days for the school year be October 25, November 27, December 20, April 16, May 21, and May 22. Motion was made by Absher and seconded by Donham to approve the early-out days. Motion passed unanimously.

Before adjourning the board extended a one year contract to Sandra Stith as elementary teacher.

Mountaineers Outlast Rising Star In Defensive Battle

With neither team being able to come up with a strong offensive game, the matchup between the Mountaineers and Rising Star Wildcats turned in to a defensive battle at Rising Star last Friday night.

It was another close one for the Mountaineers who won by a score of 8-0, their only points coming in the fourth quarter with Billy Thomas scoring a touchdown on a 17 yard pass from Vicente Frausto. The point after failed. Moments later Santa Anna caught Rising Star behind the goal line for a safety and another two points.

The Mountaineers had just edged

Cross Plains last week in a defensive battle, winning that one 14-8. Rising Star was coming off a 21-0 win over Ranger.

Both Santa Anna and Rising Star had trouble moving the ball. The mountaineers finished the struggle with 126 yards offense while Rising Star ended with 115 total yards which included one pass for 19 yards.

Head Coach Mike Permenter comments that he was especially proud of his defensive squad and their fine showing in the game. "However," he says, "the offense has some work to do. We plan to work more on our passing game

and try to gather some offense in that area for Friday's game against Robert Lee, here in Santa Anna." He adds that he and the team appreciate the fans' support and hopes they will be out in large numbers for the first home game Friday at 8:00.

Dan Benton, who received an ankle injury in the Cross Plains game a couple of weeks ago, will be back in the lineup this week, playing some at the quarterback position, although Permenter says, Vicente Frausto will start in that position Friday night. Both are also fine running backs.

School Open House Slated

Open House has been scheduled next week for Santa Anna schools. Open house for kindergarten through 6th grade will be held Monday, Sept. 23 starting at 7:00 p.m. Principal Dean Bass will welcome visitors who will then be invited to visit classrooms and talk with teachers.

Seventh grade through 12th grade will host open house on Tuesday evening, also beginning at 7:00.

A National Honor Society installation service will be held at 7:00 p.m. Tuesday night in the high school auditorium and Partners in Academic Excellence awards will be presented. There will also be a short performance by the band, directed by Tom Stroud.

After the program is completed, classrooms will be open for visiting and teachers will be available.

School Board Sets Tax Rate

The Santa Anna School Board set the effective tax rate at \$0.36 per \$100 valuation when it met for its regular monthly meeting last Tuesday, Sept. 10.

Present were school board members Ruth Wise, Roy Joe Harvey, Sharon Guthrie, Marty Donham, Gary Absher and Barbara Simmons. Also present were Principals Bass and Gray, Business Manager, Judy Hartman, and Administrative Secretary Carole Voss. Several teachers were also present for the meeting.

A review of accounts payable led to a motion by Absher and second by Harvey to approve for payment. Passed unanimously.

Board member Donham made the motion to set the effective tax rate at \$0.36 per \$100 valuation. A second to the motion came from

Harvey. Motion passed with those for the measure being Harvey, Guthrie, Absher, Donham, and Simmons. Voting against the motion was Mrs. Wise.

Motion was made by Harvey, seconded by Absher to adopt the TASB policy update #40 into the local policy. Motion passed unanimously.

After a lengthy discussion concerning the establishing a baseball program, the board agreed to take action on this item which was tabled at a previous meeting. Motion was then made by Harvey, seconded by Simmons to vote on having a baseball program for the 1991-92 school year. Approval of the motion failed with Donham voting for the measure and Wise, Guthrie, Simmons, Absher and Harvey voting against it.

City Tax Rate Slightly Lower

City officials were able to go against the trend around the state and pass a slightly lower tax rate when they met on Tuesday of last week. Mayor Gale Brock called the meeting to order with Councilmen Thomas Hays, Jim Spillman, Karen Morris and Emmitt Simmons present. Others were Secretary Alys Pelton, and Supt. of Operations Derriel Warnock.

The police report was reviewed in the absence of Police Chief Carlos Torres who was attending a meeting in San Antonio.

Mr. Warnock, in giving his monthly report, stated the past month had been relatively quiet as far as utility problems were concerned. There had been no water leaks, some minor sewer line stop ups, and the crew had done as much

street patching as possible. He reported the new refuse truck is working out very well. The garbage pickup could possibly be cut down to two days a week for residential customers, considering that less time is being taken since the truck requires fewer trips to the landfill.

He also informed the council that the City of Richland Springs has

Two Local Churches Vandalized

There were two cases of vandalism in local churches over the weekend. The first case reported was at the First United Methodist Church. It was discovered early Saturday morning by the church's pastor, Rev. Don Elrod. Several fire extinguishers had been emptied by spraying the foam on pews and carpet in the sanctuary and through a foyer and in church school classrooms upstairs in the sanctuary building. According to the report we received, a fifth grade student has confessed to the vandalism. Both incidents took place on Friday night.

Police Report

The following report is submitted by Police Chief Carlos Torres concerning police activity of the past month in Santa Anna.

Torres reports four total arrests; 11 tickets written; three accidents worked; one case of shoplifting investigated; one burglary complaint investigated; four harassments; one family disturbance and one case of vandalism.

The burglary is still under investigation as is the theft incidence. A suspect in the shoplifting incident has been turned over to juvenile authorities.

One subject was arrested for DWI and one on an outstanding warrant out of the Coleman County Sheriff's Department.

Torres traveled to Denton to return a suspect on a burglary warrant.

Other incidents included two juvenile problems; for reports of hotrodging; three reports of animals running loose (horses and dogs); one reckless driving; three reports of prowlers; two loud parties and disturbances; one trespassing incident; one incidence of a customer

driving off without paying for gas; towed two illegally parked vehicles; and investigated two incidents of suspicious vehicles.

asked for permission to dump at the Santa Anna landfill, approximately one load a week. Warnock recommended that the City accept the refuse at no less than \$100 per load and that it should be household garbage only. Councilman Karen Morris made the motion to propose the \$100 a load rate on a 6 month trial contract. Councilman Simmons seconded the motion which carried.

Councilman Jim Spillman made the motion to set the 1991 tax rate at .7082, a decrease of .0080 from last year's rate of .7162. Councilman Hays seconded the motion which carried.

The second reading of a truck code amendment was heard. Two councilmen were in favor of the amendment, Spillman and Hays. Two were opposed, Morris and Simmons. After some discussion, it was decided to hold off on passing the amendment until after contacting the Texas Highway Department to see if signs could be put up in trouble spots advising that truck parking is not allowed in that area.

Texas Municipal Retirement System has drawn up an ordinance which, if passed, will automatically update the City's services every year without the council having to review and pass two ordinances every year to update retirement services. This one ordinance will stay in effect unless one of three things occur: 1) it is rescinded by the City Council, or 2) the actuary deter-

mines that the City's contribution rate will exceed the statutory maximum amount, or 3) the council adopts a change in either the employee contribution rate or the City's matching ratio. Councilman Spillman made the motion to enact this ordinance as soon as it is re-

ceived from Texas Municipal Retirement. Councilman Simmons seconded and the motion carried.

Accounts payable were reviewed and accepted for payment in the usual manner.

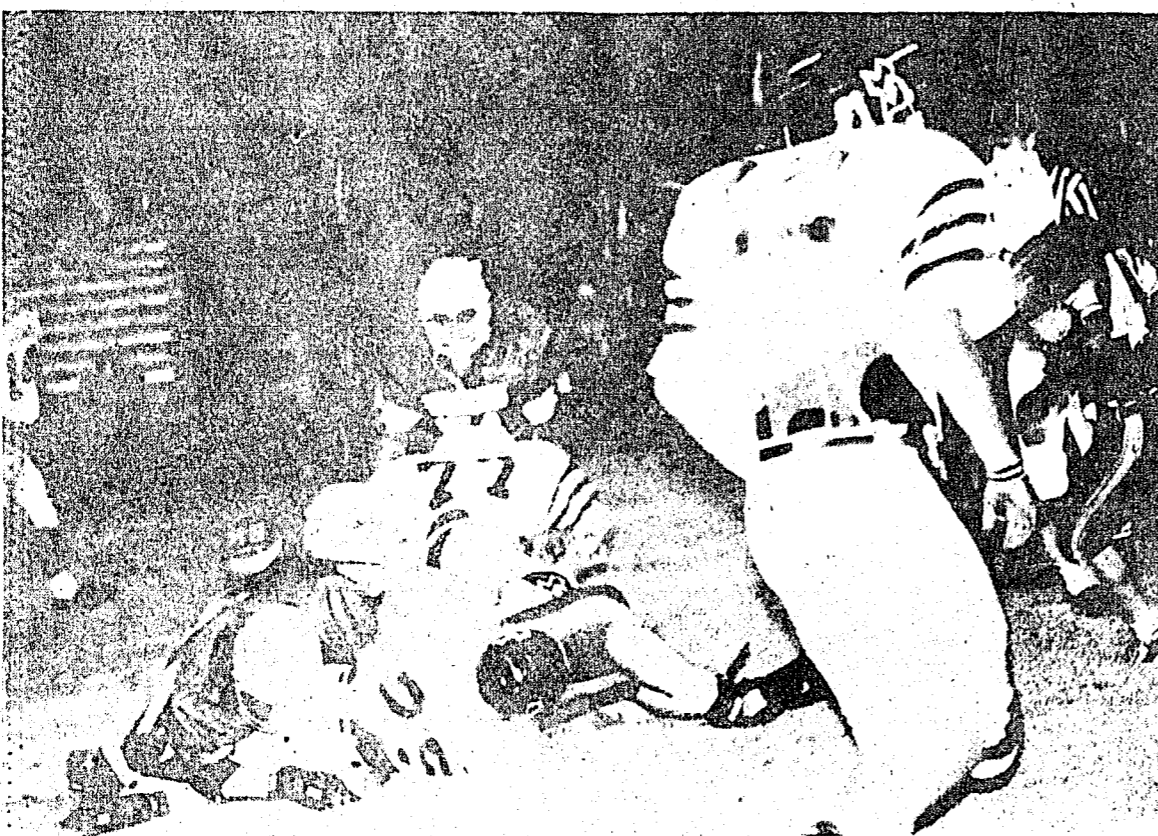
