



Along that same note, have you heard about the mystery Bible found at Boerne, Texas? The school found the old book and turned it over to the historical society. The book is written in a German dialect that has not been written in centuries. In fact, the book was published in 1614. It is one of five known editions, including one in the British Museum. No one knows anything about Johan Schwartinge who wrote his name in the book in 1660. What a story this Bible could tell of the past 400 years. By-the-way, the company that published the book is still in business! Have you looked at all the old books in your family? Do you check publishing dates at book sales? Treasures are often found there.

A recent column had some gardening tips. Here's one that also concerns preserving the past. If you have some seeds from a flower or vegetable that came to America in frontier days, seeds that are no longer available on the market, you can help keep the seed for future generations. Pack some of the seeds securely and send to Seed Saver Exchange, Rout 3, Box 239, Dekoria, Iowa. (Sorry I don't have the zip). This is a farm run by a family who started 20 years ago with three kinds of seeds from their grandfather Ott. His pink tomato, morning glory and beans still grow. You can buy seeds of old varieties. They grow, process and freeze these seeds.

Were you touched by the "Diary of Anne Frank"? There is a copy in our library. If you haven't read this story of a Jewish girl caught up in the holocaust in Holland, you really should. A new book picks up there the diary ended. Six women who were in concentration camps where Anne Frank died have told what happened in those last 7 months. "The Last Seven Months of Anne Frank" by Willy Lindiver should remind all free people to protect the rights of all people. When Jim and I were on a boat tour in Holland we saw Anne Frank's home. We were the only Americans in the group of German tourists. The stop was not on the agenda and the guide offered to stop for a visit. We were the only ones interested and have often wondered if the others felt guilty. This tour took place in 1960.

If someone made this promise, we would probably take it with a "grain of salt." But notice that God prefaces this promise with the statement, "I am the Lord." That is all the qualification He needs to supply to convince us of His ability. Wherever we look in the word of God we are impressed with the powerfulness of our God. 



"In Honor of Those Who Served ..."

"In honor of the men and women of the Armed Forces of the United States who served in the Vietnam War. The names of those who gave their lives and of those who remain missing are inscribed in the order they were taken from us."

These words preface the list of casualties inscribed on the two walls of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. Located between the Washington Monument and the Lincoln Memorial in the heart of our nation's capital, it is the most visited site in Washington, D.C. - approximately 2 million people are drawn to the v-shaped memorial each year.

The move for a memorial began in April 1979 when a group of Vietnam veterans in Washington, D.C., joined together to establish the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund. Their goal: to establish a tangible symbol of recognition for Vietnam veterans that would help begin a process of national reconciliation. They raised \$7 million through contributions from corporations, foundations, unions, veterans, civic organizations and more than 275,000 individual Americans.

The memorial was designed by Maya Ling Lin, a 21-year-old Yale University student from Athens, Ohio, who won the nationwide design contest sponsored by the memorial fund in 1981. Its walls are constructed of polished black granite, creating a mirrorlike surface that reflects the surrounding trees, lawns, monuments, and people searching the 58,175 names for lost loved ones and friends or stopping to leave photographs, medals, flowers, poems and other memorabilia.

The names, which have been sandblasted onto the granite, are inscribed, chronologically by date of casualty. Each name is marked with either a diamond or a cross. A diamond denotes that the individual's death was confirmed; a cross marks the names of those who were missing or prisoners at the end of the war. If a person returns alive, a circle symbolizing life — is inscribed around the cross. If an individual's remains are returned, or otherwise accounted for, a diamond is superimposed over the cross.

President Reagan accepted the Vietnam Veterans Memorial on behalf of the United States on Veterans Day, Nov. 11, 1982, and it was dedicated

A life-size statue of three servicemen, symbolizing the typical American soldier, marks the entrance plaza to the memorial. The U.S. flag flies above the statue, and the base is emblazoned with the emblems of the five branches of U.S. military service.

The park in which the memorial is set was designed to be a quiet and protected place - a natural setting filled with life, honoring those who made the ultimate sacrifice in serving their country. Id One of a series of columns on the history and heritage of America.




