The Santa Anna Ex-Student Association is pleased to honor noted author and illustrator of children's books, James Rice, as Ex-Student of the Year. Rice was a member of the SAHS graduating class of 1951.

Born and raised on a farm near Santa Anna, the son of Mr. and Mrs. James W. Rice, Sr., he now lives near Hico, Texas. He is married and has five children and seven grandchildren. He holds a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from the University of Texas, a Master of Education degree from Howard Payne University and a Master of Fine Arts degree from Stephen F. Austin State College. He has been a high school band director and has taught art at LSU, Southeastern Louisiana University, and Dallas Baptist College. For some of his writings Rice had drawn on his own boyhood experiences on the farm near Santa Anna.

From "Prairie Night Before Christmas" he writes "T'was a cold Christmas eve on the Southwestern plain and the North wind was blowin' through a broken window-pane."

And this from Rice's "Cowboy Alphabet": 'B' is for bronc. He'll shake the kinks out of your spine especially on a cold winter morn-

ing. 'B' is for barbed wire that's crippled many a good horse and a few head of spirited stock. 'B' is for bar ditch, what you try not to get into when you're coming in after a big Saturday night.

He is very active professionally in both illustration and sculpture and enjoys playing in various musical groups.

Mr. Rice is widely acclaimed as the South's leading illustrator of juvenile books. He now has a total of over 700,000 books in print, a record that ranks him with the top authors and illustrators nationally. His creation of Gaston The Green-Nosed Alligator, has quickly become one of the most celebrated characters in modern juvenile literature.

In recent years James Rice has participated in the Texas State Author-in-Residence program. He frequently visits schools, universities and bookstores to discuss his life as an author/illustrator.

Nancy Lee Baugh Lowry has been chosen as Coming-Home Queen for the 1991 Homecoming. Nancy is married to Lonnie Lowry, also a Santa Anna High School graduate. The couple has two children, Kayla and Will. Nancy's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Dick Baugh of Santa Anna.

After attending all twelve grades in Santa Anna schools, Nancy graduated as salutatorian of the Class of 1971. She continued her studies, graduating in 1973 with a Bachelor of Science degree from McMurry University and received a Master of Education Curriculum and Instruction from Texas A & M University in 1975. She holds a Professional Teaching, Reading Specialist and Supervisor's Certification from the Texas Education Agency.

Nancy is a very active young woman. Besides her duties as wife and mother, she currently serves as a reading specialist in the Chapter I Program for Brownwood ISD. She has taught 5th, 2nd and first grades. She has served as Music Director for 15 years at the Bangs First United Methodist Church, where she also teaches a Sr. High Sunday school class.

Nancy serves as editor of "The Lognette," a review journal from the Heart of Texas Children and Young Adult Book Review Center, a project sponsored by Phi Delta Kappa.

Roxie Allison

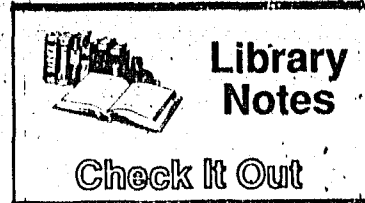

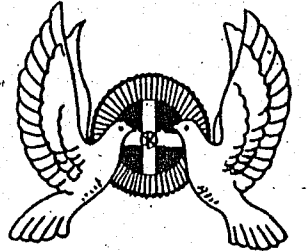
BURDENS CAN BE BLESSINGS

".....I am the Lord and I will bring you out from under the burdens.....Exodus 6:6

If someone made this promise, we would probably take it with a "grain of salt." But notice that God prefaces this promise with the statement, "I am the Lord." That is all the qualification He needs to supply to convince us of His ability. Wherever we look in the word of God we are impressed with the powerfulness of our God. So, we can take Him at His Word and then proceed without fear on the basis of His promise. If we have burdens, He has promised to bring us out from under them. In other words, He will take over the burden and leave us with the blessing. Perhaps others could take over our burden for a while, but eventually they would have to give it back to us. Not so with God. He is the only One with "what it takes" to assume our burden permanently and conclusively.

I watched an ant carrying a piece of grass stem....what seemed a huge burden to the tiny ant. The ant came to a wide crack too broad for it to cross. It stood for a minute as if pondering the problem. Then it laid the grass straw over the crack for a minute and walked over it! That ant teaches us all a lesson. A person's burden can become a bridge over the problem. Burdens are sometimes blessings in disguise.

Directors of Coleman County Appraisal District met in regular session on Monday, Sept. 9 at the district office in Coleman. Dwight Nanny, vice chairman, led the meeting in the absence of the chairman, Barbara Kingsbery.

The session opened with a public hearing, with no visitors present. The board adopted unanimously the 1991 budget as submitted to the taxing entities, at \$242,475 for the calendar year.

Collier Watson, CPA, presented the annual audit report, praising the district for the good report for the past year. The district collects and disburses tax monies for the eight taxing entities in Coleman County.

Chief Appraiser Bill Jones gave the monthly financial report and also reported on tax collections for the month of August which totaled over \$45,000. That figure is over twice as much as in August 1990. Total collections for all entities are

at 98.49 percent, which is above the average at this time last year.

Mr. Jones reported the new computer is being installed at the downtown office. It was purchased by the Coleman County school districts to accommodate the additional work that is required by the newly-organized County Education District.

After routine business, the meeting adjourned. Other board members present were Max Horne, Jack Knox and D.G. Allen.

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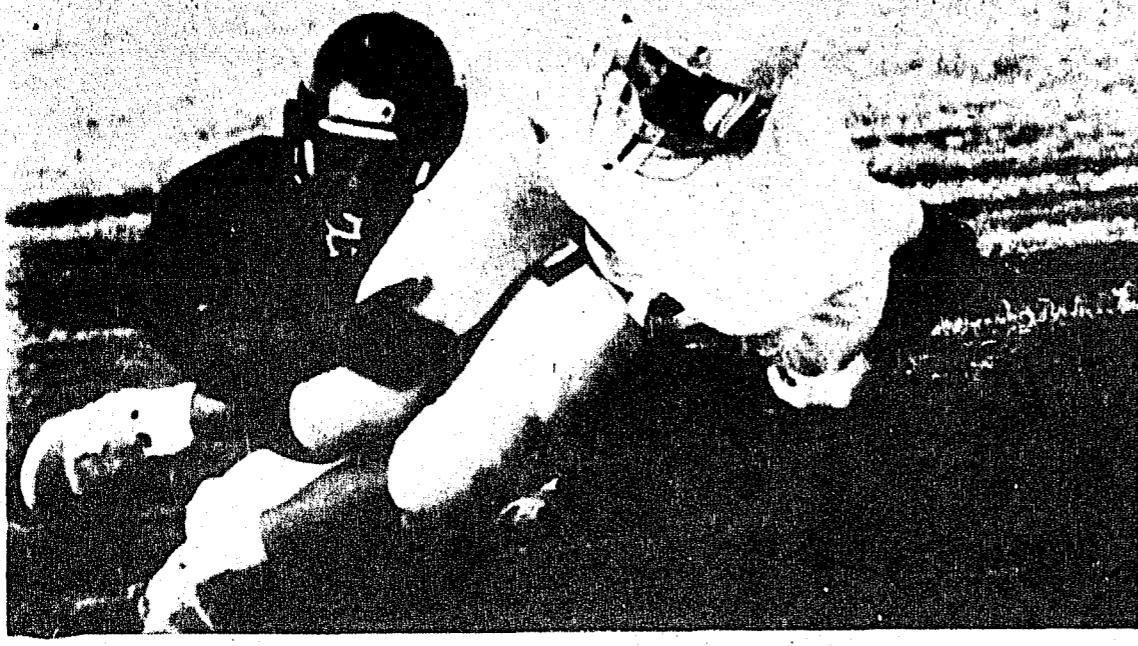

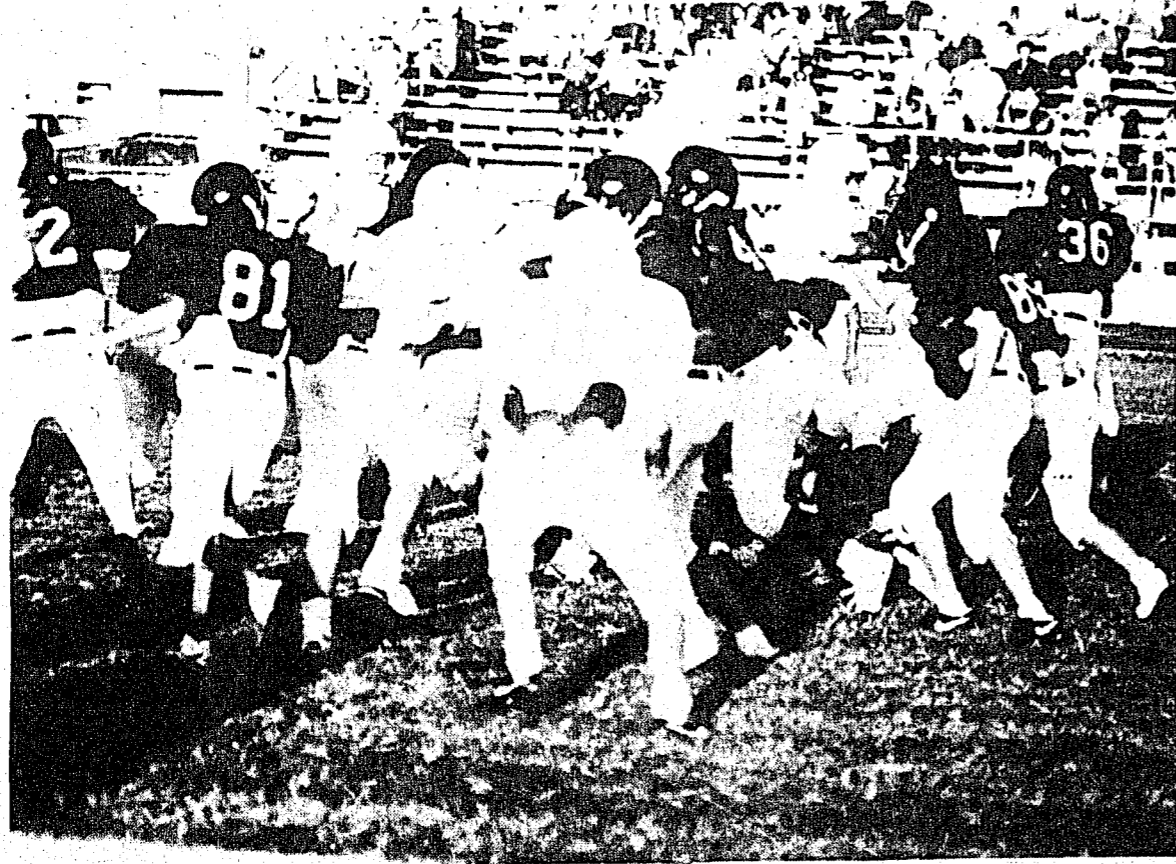
