Veteran's Day Ceremony At High School Campus Monday

A ceremony commemorating Veteran's Day will take place at 11:00 a.m. Monday at the High School Campus. Students and faculty members will assemble at the flag pole in front of the high school building for a flag raising ceremony. The high school band will present patriotic selections and high school principal, Frank Gray, will give a short talk on the significance of the day. A choral group made up of faculty members will sing. All members of the community are invited and encouraged to be present for this special event.

Buoyed by victory in the Persian Gulf War, Americans celebrate Veterans Day on Monday, Nov. 11.

This national holiday, commemorating the heroism and sacrifice of U.S. veterans, traces its roots to World War I. Americans hoped that conflict - which marked the introduction of poison gas, aerial bombardment and tanks to warfare - would be "the war to end all wars." And the nation marked its end in 1918 with a wave of memorials.

Even the war's end - on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month - assumed a symbolic importance. Congress declared Nov. 11 as Armistice Day, and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier was dedicated on that day in 1921.

But hopes of eternal peace proved short-lived, as the United States was drawn into a second world war.

At the request of President Dwight Eisenhower, commander of the forces who successfully invaded Europe and helped end that war, Congress expanded the commemorative day in 1954 to Veterans Day. Nov. 11 then became a day to honor American veterans of all wars, just as the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier was expanded to include soldiers from World War II, Korea and Vietnam.

We join with U.S. Senator Phil Graham, who, in a recent news release, urged all Americans to thank a veteran on Veterans Day, Nov. 11, for the service that millions of vets have rendered to America.

"On Veterans Day, we honor the brave men and women who have

answered the nation's call, who have gone all over the world to defend our freedom," Gramm said.

"I hope you will join me in remembering the 600,000 Americans who died for our freedom in this century and to join me in thanking the tens of millions who have served," he said.

Like all of us, they had their individual lives which they left to stand up for America. They left their families, their schools, their jobs and went far away and served with distinction. Many faced combat and they fought with courage and pride.

From the Revolutionary War to Operation Desert Storm, millions

More than 60 percent of all who have served in the U.S. armed forces throughout history are alive today. Nearly a third of them served during World War II. America marks the 50th anniversary of entry into World War II Dec. 7, 1991, the date of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

of Americans put on the uniform of our nation and pledged their lives to the ideal that is America, Gramm noted.

The senator said that all of us can remember and honor those who have served and all of us can commit ourselves to the highest ideals for which they fought by working to make America the greatest country in the world.

Lottery Issue Draws 75 Year Old First Time Voter Coleman County Keeps Tax Assessor

Lottery hit the winning number in Texas Tuesday as voters went to the polls to have their say on Thirteen proposed Constitutional Amendments. The voters overwhelmingly approved an amendment to overturn a 146-year old ban and allow the state to begin operating the gambling game.

Mrs. Ilene Wallace of Santa Anna felt strongly about the lottery issue. Strong enough that the 75 year-old lady decided to exercise her right to vote for the first time in her life. This reporter failed to ask her which way she voted, but no matter, it was a landmark day for her as she asked help from election judge Rose Bass in explaining the voting procedure and then cast her very first ballot.

In Coleman County, voters also voted on keeping the Tax Assessor/Collector office separate from the Sheriff's Department. The

office was kept open by a vote of 1,401 countywide votes. In Santa Anna voters approved with a vote of 224 for and 60 against keeping the office separate from the Sheriff's Department.

Following are figures on how 296 local people voted as well as across the state, with 83 percent of the statewide vote counted at 11:00 Tuesday night:

Prop. 1—Home Rule: Santa Anna, 232 for, 46 against; Statewide, 83% for, 19% against.

Prop. 2—Turnpike: Santa Anna, 114 for, 162 against; Statewide, 50% for, 50% against.

Prop. 3—Land Board: Santa Anna, 163 for, 112 against; Statewide, 54% for, 46% against.

Prop. 4—Prison Bonds: Santa Anna, 202 for, 86 against; Statewide, 67% for, 33% against.

Eisenhower To Discontinue Ambulance Service

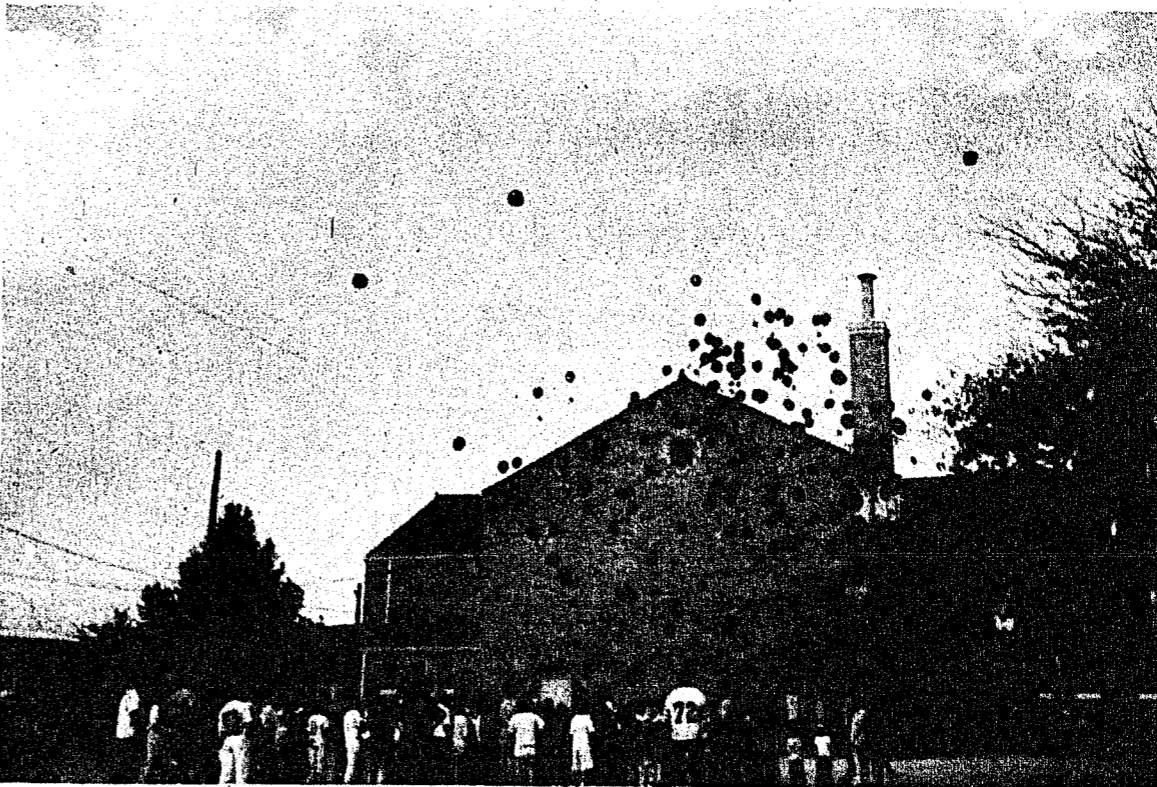

We feel with the implementation of the 911 system in 1992, that things will run very smoothly for receiving emergency help, and we will assist everyone in any way that we can."

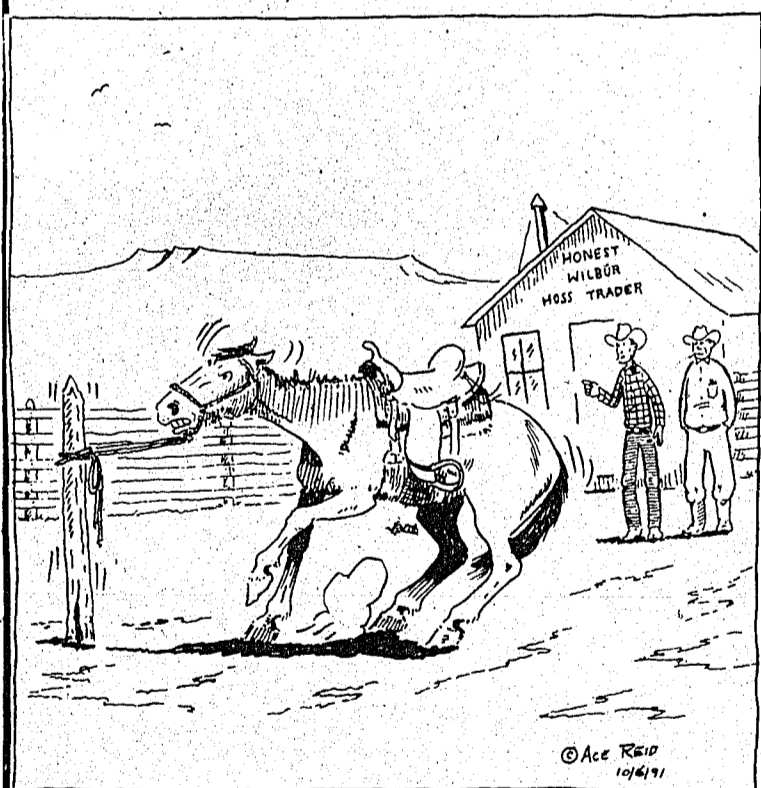

THE NEED OF THE HOUR

Much is heard today about NEEDS. Some husband or wife seeks to terminate a marriage that God says is to be lifelong and we hear, "My needs were not being met." A person or family quits worshipping with a certain church and again we hear, "Our NEEDS were not being met."

Some have mentioned that we NEED to hear sermons on stewardship and tithing, which is also a valid concern. God pulls no punches and does not hide His request. "Bring the whole tithe to me," He says in Mal. 3:10 and in previous verse says you are stealing from God if you do not do so.

God does not NEED anything we have to offer, Nothing, Zero, Zippo! He owns it all anyway. Rather we NEED to be givers. We NEED to learn to give Biblically. God's Sovereign will, established before the foundation of the world, will be accomplished whether you obey and participate and receive the subsequent blessings or not.

Then what IS the need of the hour? If God really NEEDS nothing for Himself, and has promised with an immutable promise to meet all our NEEDS according to His riches in glory in Christ Jesus (Phil. 4:19), perhaps NEEDS are more imagined than real.

A certain kind of people. Christian people who are trained to be skilled laborers for His harvest. Sometimes called disciples Sometimes called faithful stewards, sometimes laborers. In the simplest form, it just means people who believe God's Word enough to order their lives by it. Completely! Consistently! Continually! God doesn't NEED you! God DESIRES you!

The historic St. Cyriacus Lutheran Church in Grobe Helen, Germany was the setting for the Saturday, Sept. 4, wedding of Heidi Schroder and William Henry (Bill) Kingsbery. The minister of the church officiated at the afternoon ceremony.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ehler Schroder of Grobe Helen. Mr. and Mrs. H.W. Kingsbery of Beaumont are the parents of the groom. The late Mr. and Mrs. Howard T. Kingsbery of Santa Anna are grandparents of the groom.

In traditional German fashion, the couple entered the church together, followed by their parents, attendants and relatives. Wedding guests lined

the walkway of the church. Karen Johanning of Stuttgart Germany, was her sister's matron of honor. Stuart Kingsbery of Boulder, Colorado, served his brother as best man. Flower children were Maren Johanning, niece of the bride, and Stefanie and Florian Scholz.

Traditional wedding selections were played preceding the ceremony, and music included hymns and two traditional German wedding songs sung by the congregation.

For her wedding the bride wore a long dress of white lace over taffeta, styled with portrait neckline, short puffed sleeves and bouffant skirt with fitted waistline. Her headpiece was of silk flowers with elbow-length satin-edged veil.

Her bouquet was a cascade of

pink roses and white and pink carnations tied with white satin ribbon.

Following the ceremony the parents of the bride were hosts for a dinner and dance at Hotel Celler. The meal began with the traditional German wedding soup and buffet. Singing, music and toasts to the newlyweds entertained the wedding party and guests. At midnight the wedding cake and other pastries and desserts were served, and a band played until early morning for dancing.

On Thursday preceding the church ceremony, a civil ceremony was held at the Town Hall in Celle, Germany, with the bride's sister and Walter Kingsbery, the groom's brother of Boulder, as witnesses. The bridal couple and their families walked through the town square to the ceremony for which the bride wore a white tailored suit and carried a bouquet of roses.

A traditional Polterabend pre-nuptial celebration was held in Celle to honor the bridal couple with a buffet supper and dance the evening of the civil ceremony.

The couple took a wedding trip to Paris, France, and have returned to Celle where he is a geophysicist with Mobil Oil Company. He is a graduate of Texas A & M University. The bride studied at Colorado College, Colorado, Springs, and is an English teacher at Heese School in Celle where the couple will make their home.

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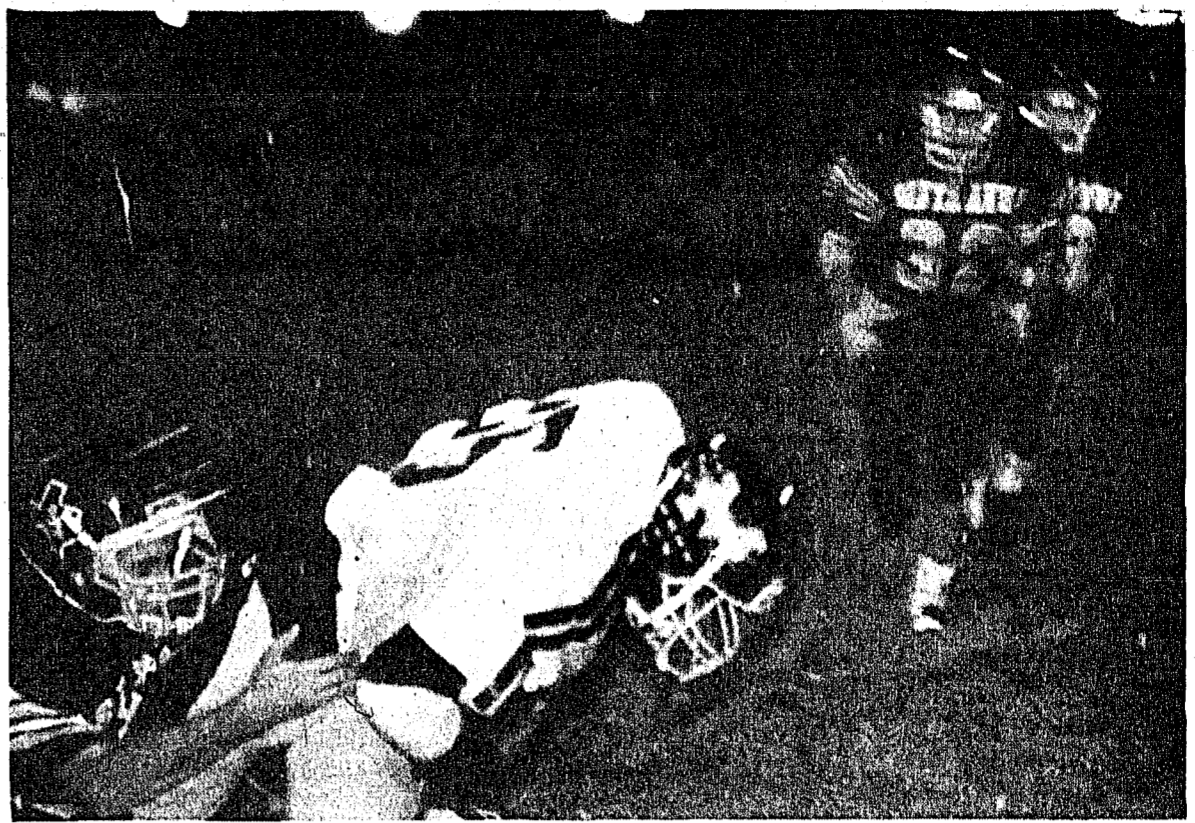

The SAHS Mountaineers will most likely play their last football game of this year Friday night when they meet Miles here at Mountaineer Stadium. Barring some unforeseen upset when Menard plays Irion County Friday and the Eden Bulldogs take on Water Valley. The Mountaineers can end up in third place in District 11-A. Santa Anna and Miles are both 2-2 in district play going into Friday's games. The Mountaineers had a chance to widen their lead in the third quarter when Billy Thomas blocked a Menard punt. The Mountaineers took over at the Menard 12, but filed to get a first down on fourth and one from the three.

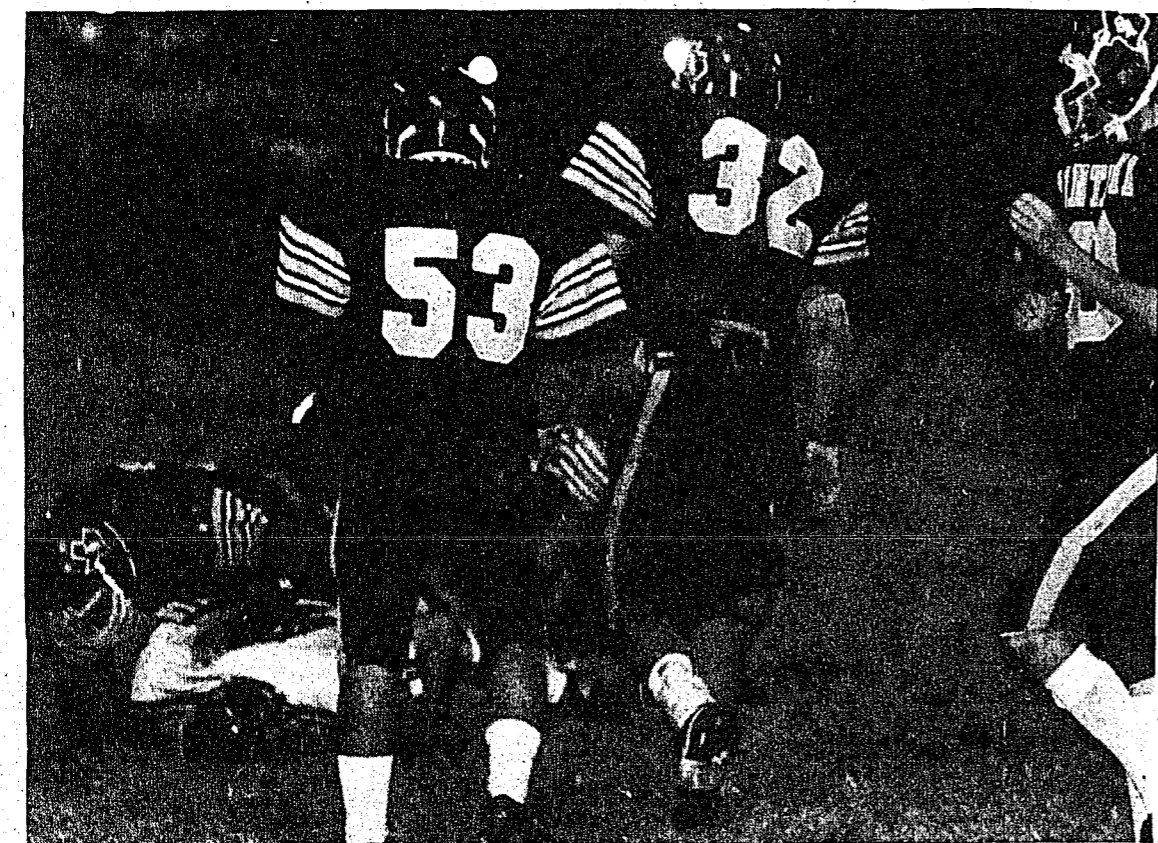

ASCS News

1992 FEED GRAIN ACREAGE REDUCTION: Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan has announced a 5 percent acreage reduction program (ARP) for the 1992 crops of corn, grain sorghum and barley and zero percent ARP for oats.

The 1992 crop corn, grain sorghum and barley ARP's are lower from the 7.5 percent ARP for the 1991 crop while the oats ARP remains the same. Adjustments in the 1992 ARP percentages may be made not later than Nov. 15 if the total supply of feed grains changes significantly. Any such adjustment would be announced by Nov. 15.

COMMUNITY COMMITTEE ELECTION: The Community Committee election will be held this year for Local Administrative Area (LAA 3), the southwest area of the county. Nominating petitions have been mailed to all known eligible voters. Persons should nominate active farmers in LAA 3 who are eligible to hold office and who will be willing to serve if elected.

Community committeemen who are elected will meet at the Coleman Convention to elect a County Committeeman. Barry Wilson served as County Committeeman for LAA 3 for the last three years. He is eligible for another 3-year term.

ACR AND CU FOR PAY ACREAGE: ACR and CU for pay acreages in Coleman County will be released for haying and grazing on October 31, 1991. This date represents the end of the non-grazing period for the 1991 Farm Program. There is no need to notify the ASCS office if you wish to hay or graze and ACR of CU for pay acreage after October 31.

1991 COTTON LOANS: CCC loans are available for upland cotton participating in the 1991 Farm Program. "Invisible" or "wildcat" cotton is not eligible for loan and must be kept separate from program cotton if you intend to put it in the loan. However, cotton that is grown on "flex" acres from another crop is eligible for the loan.

1991 GINNERS AGREEMENTS: The Santa Anna Cotton Gin has signed a cooperating ginner's agreement to use bagging and ties which meet specifications to be eligible for CCC loans.

Participation in programs administered by ASCS is open to all eligible producers without regard to race, color, religion, age, sex, marital status, disability, or national origin.
