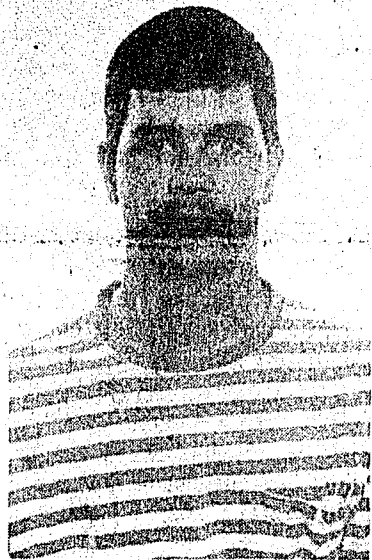

Lots Of Water In Santa Anna Lakes

This is the spillway bridge at Lake Santana. Water is running over the spillway and under the bridge for the first time that anyone we have been able to talk to can remember. Lake Sealy is also running around the spillway. As City Water Plant Operator, Tommy Blanton, said, "there is lots of water out here." In fact, there is lots of water all around this area of Central Texas since the rains of last week. With somewhere near ten inches of rain falling so far in September with almost 7 inches of that coming in one 24 hour period last week. Added to a previous total of 25 inches through August, it makes the year's total now at approximately 35 inches in the Santa Anna area. Our yearly average is about 27 inches, according to longtime rain record keeper, R.W. Balke. J.B. Brooke

J.B. Brooke, 81, of Abilene, who gave this part of Texas the name of "Big Country", died Tuesday, September 17, 1991 in Human Hospital, Abilene.

Funeral services were held Thursday, Sept. 19 in Calvary Baptist Church in Abilene with the Revs. Hollis Yelding and Wayne Oglesby officiating. Graveside services were at 3:00 p.m. at Coleman City Cemetery, directed by Henderson Funeral Home.

Brooke submitted the name "The Big Country" to an Abilene Reporter News contest in 1966. His entry was selected by a team of nine judges from throughout the area and he was presented a check for \$100 by former Reporter News columnist, Katharyn Duff. He had been an Abilene resident since 1953.

Born Feb. 18, 1910 on the Brooke farm in Coleman County, he was the son of Joseph R. and Eva Henderson Brooke. The farm is now listed in Texas Heritage. He married Hazel Bassett November 8, 1931, in Coleman.

Mr. Brooke was a 1929 graduate of Coleman High School and attended Draughon's Business College. He was employed by the Texas Railroad Commission for several years and was an artist, having several pencil sketches on display in the LBJ Library. Mr. Brooke was a member of Calvary Baptist Church where he was a deacon and Sunday School teacher. He was also a member of Texas Baptist Men Builders Association and the Masonic Lodge.

Survivors include his wife, Hazel Brooke of Abilene; two daughters, Peggy Stracner of San Angelo, and Shirley Clark of Abilene; a son, James Brooke of Beeville; two brothers, Joe C. Brooke of Santa Anna and Coy Brooke of Coleman, six grandchildren; eight great-grandchildren; and a great-great-grandchild.

Library Notes

Check It Out

A couple of weeks ago, Betty Key wrote about a poem she had found in an old book purchased at a library book sale a year or so ago. She wondered if it was an original poem or if it had just caught someone's eye and that person had preserved a copy in the book.

Her article brought to mind one written by Harriette Graves of the Brownwood Bulletin editorial staff back in 1984. Letha Martin, Santa Anna librarian, brought the NEWS a copy of that article and looking through it we discover numerous items that are occasionally left in library books.

Central Texans who have lost something in the past few years and have given up hope of finding it, there's hope.

But the hope lies in whether or not the person who lost the article made a trip to the library.

Librarians have found everything from a grocery list to a deck of cards left in library books.

Whenever possible library employees try to reunite the owner and their misplaced possessions.

A Brownwood librarian likes to tell the story with a happy ending that occurred one year just before Christmas. Less than an hour before the library was to close for a long holiday weekend, a man walked in and photocopied his paycheck and promptly left. A few minutes later someone found the original check in the copy machine.

The librarian said everyone worried what the loss of the check would do for the Christmas Festivities. They hastily scrutinized the check for the patron's telephone number and then immediately called the family. It didn't take long for the man to come rushing back to claim his check.

Some Central Texan may still be wondering why his landlord didn't bother to take care of the grievances he listed on a mall sheet of paper. There is a reason why things didn't get fixed — the landlord never got the list. The man "mailed" it in a returned library book.

Cash and uncashed checks (two checks totalled \$6,000) were found in books. And for a while some poor fellow drive around without a driver's license because he left it in a borrowed book.

Not just a check but an entire checkbook was found between the covers of a book. No one would deny that a grocery list is important for a housewife. It would have been a lot better, though, if the list had cards, and a woman probably still wonders what happened to the pattern she bought for a dress she was planning to make. The dress either never got made or she had to buy another pattern, because the library staff found the pattern flattened between the pages of the book the woman had returned.

Income tax returns and audits have been found in borrowed books. One staff member reported that one woman left a diaper in a book, but she quickly added that it was a clean one. A genealogy history and the tracing of ancestors were found in separate books.

Other treasures in the lost and found drawer a rain cap, big picture of a little boy, an old time motel key, and letters.

Librarians were amused at the first line of one letter when the writer said, "I wrote you a letter last week and can't find it." It was apparent that he lost the second letter also.

Birthdays cards, sweepstakes entries, a washcloth, newspaper clippings, an excused absentee slip and even report cards have been found in returned books.

There were some moments of surprise when a book yielded a bullet. Music sheets, table napkins, chain letters, and a calendar have been pulled from books as have been medicare statements, snapshots and a Texas Teachers Association membership card.

Bills, trading stamps, photographs, deposit slips, receipts, bookmarks and homework assignments for students are some other items found in books.

There are apparently some things left on purpose. Religious tracts are often found between the pages of books for a reader to find.

So if you have lost something that could have been placed between the pages of a book, it might be worth your while to "check it out" at the library.

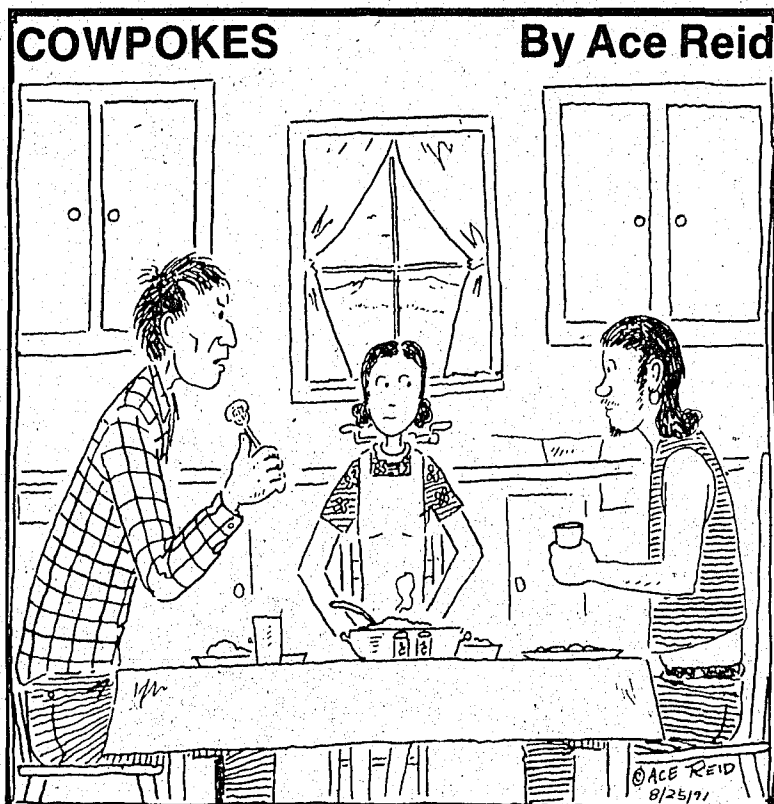

Nutrition Center Meals Changed To Twice Weekly

According to a news release received this week, the Nutrition Center meals that have been served three days a week in Santa Anna will, after October 1, be served only twice weekly.

Beginning October 1, 1991 each county will have to serve five Congregate noon meals a week within their county to stay in compliance with the Older American Act of 1965. If the county has only one center, all five meals must be served at that center, however if the county has more than one center, as does Coleman County, the serving days will be divided among the operating centers. Because of reductions of funding to the Coleman County centers, it is not financially

feasible to operate either the Coleman or Santa Anna center on a full time basis. Therefore, beginning October 1, 1991 all meals will be prepared as usual in Coleman and transported to Santa Anna on Tuesday and Thursday instead of Monday, Wednesday and Friday as has been done in the past.

The Coleman Center will continue to serve on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. These constructive changes will assure that 60-plus Coleman County citizens will be able to acquire a nutritious balanced meal five days a week.

Since the last special session of the Texas Legislature went out of session August 25th, I have had numerous persons ask if the news column would continue to be provided to the news media. It does seem appropriate from time-to-time to prepare a Capitol Comments column, even if not with the frequency required when the Legislature is in session.

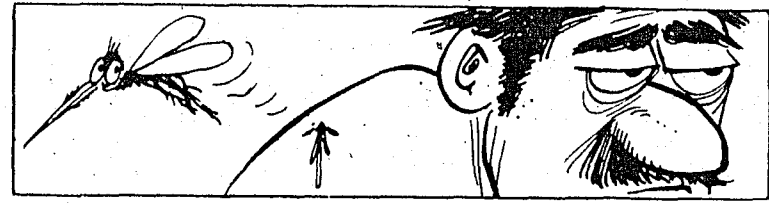
The problem of re-districting is one of the dilemmas that citizens seem very concerned about "who will be our state representative?" is one of the questions most frequently asked me. At this time, this issue is really an unknown element, since court cases have been filed, contesting the proposed plan now being considered. It is quite realistic that the Court's final decision will not be made prior to the January 2, 1992 filing date. The primary election is March 10, 1992.

After visiting with long-time members of the Texas House and other government folks who observed the redistricting process in 1965 and 1981, I have arrived at the confusing decision that it is possible for me to be required to run for re-election in my present district instead of my new district. I could be seeking re-election in the 65th District (Brown, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, McCulloch and Runnels Counties). Depending on the Court decision I also will possibly be seeking re-election in the new 73rd District (Brown, Coleman, Concho, Mason, Menard, Llano, Edwards, Real, Bandera, Schleicher, Crockett, Sutton, Ward, Crane, Upton and Kimbell Counties). Then, to absolutely confuse the issue, the Courts could completely re-draw the districts with boundaries different than any considered before.

During the interim, when the Texas Legislature is not in session, there are numerous meetings, conferences or "speaking" engagements that keep a steady pace, but I enjoy all of this activity very much. I would welcome the opportunity to visit with any of the high school government or civics classes in my district who would like a presentation on state government, so please feel free to contact me - teachers or

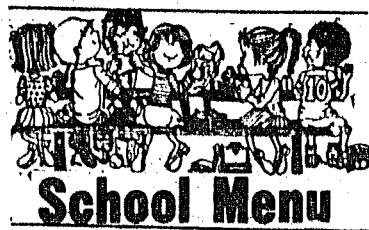

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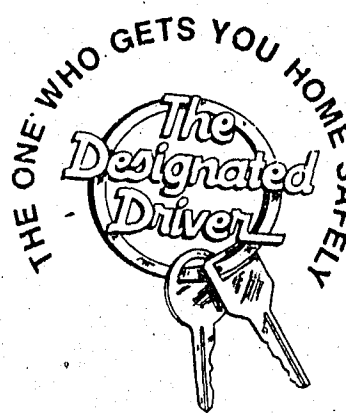


Panther Creek Team Featured In Texas Basketball Magazine

SAD Forecast for January/February

"In no other civilization has garbage ever been more grand—or grandiose—or had more to say about its creators," says William Rathje, archaeologist and founder of the Garbage Project at the University of Arizona.

Rathje studies our culture by what we throw away. "I felt that if archaeologists can learn about ancient societies by exhuming old refuse, maybe sorting through fresh trash would produce new insights into our own society," he says.

Rathje and his students have slogged through U.S. dumps since 1973, and finds our garbage tells a lot about us.

An early landfill find was "the great beef discovery." In Tucson, people were tossing large amounts of edible beef—traced, ironically, to the 1973 national beef shortage.

"We attributed the waste to crisis buying," he says. "People (were) rushing out to purchase cheap cuts they didn't know how to prepare and large quantities they weren't used to storing. The result was beef waste three times higher than normal."

Vegetables tell us, too. Asparagus reflects affluence—the richer you are, the more stalk you discard.

Garbage can label its creators by race. A scorched Mexican TV dinner, for example, decidedly did not come from a Hispanic home, Rathje says. Most Hispanic households prepare food

fresh at home. "Hispanic households waste very little food," he says.

By contrast, other households waste a lot of food—a telltale sign of our hurried lives. Rathje sees phenomenal waste in the amount of food thrown away. The problem? Lack of time. Cooks know they should buy healthy fresh produce, but it often spoils before it can be prepared.

Class is another telltale thread running through Rathje's garbage forays. Lower income groups discard motor oil, degreasers, and fuel additives. Middle income families throw away home fix-up products—paints, stains and varnishes. Upper-income folks toss out pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizers.

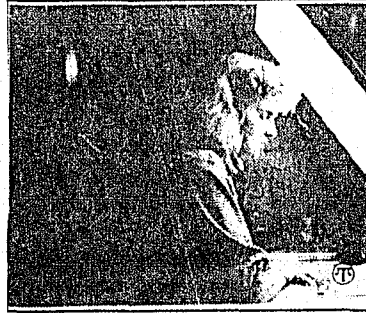
"I wonder sometimes how future generations will see us when they look at our garbage," Rathje muses. "I interpret the Classic period of the ancient Maya civilization as one of profligate waste, followed by a period of decline. The Maya woke up and discovered resources were in short supply, and they became very efficient very fast—they recycled, they reused. But it was too late."

We can learn from their mistakes, Rathje says.

"We have an important opportunity today. We can go into a period of efficiency and pragmatism, and in that way sustain our society in the style to which we've become accustomed for a much longer time."

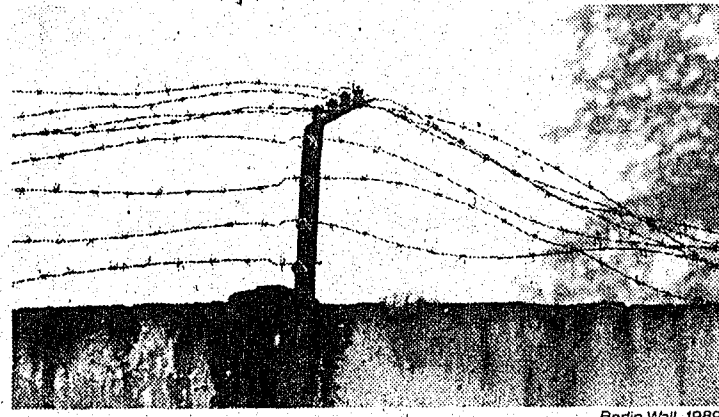
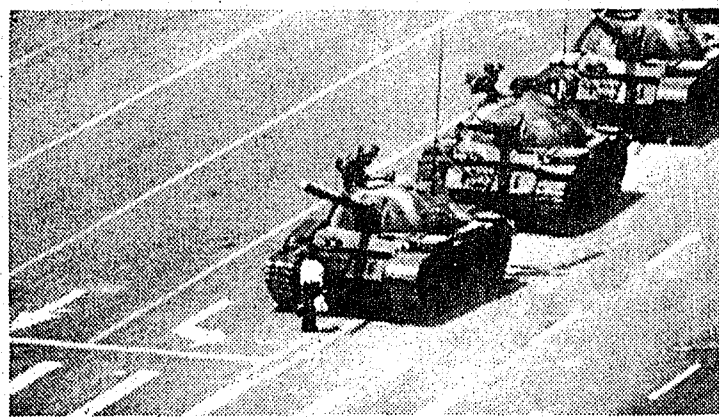

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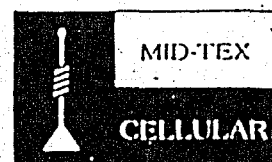
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
