Every six weeks students at Santa Anna High School who excel in high grade point averages are rewarded by the Partners in Academic Excellence Program. Fifty-one students excelled in the first six weeks of this school year. On the "Straight A" honor roll we had six sophomores and two juniors. Making no grade lower than a "B"

The business before the council was pretty much routine with the following actions taken:

"TRAIN A CHILD IN THE WAY"

I have to confess that at times I wonder how many Christian parents believe such biblical statements as "Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it." (Prov. 22:6) and, "ye fathers, provoke not your children to wrath; but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." (Eph. 6:4). The sad fact is that in too many church homes there is little discussion of spiritual issues. Parents are abandoning their responsibilities to be spiritual role models by failing to actively "seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness." This is evident by their daily conduct and their own neglect of church activities. Then, of course, the church is to blame when their kids dream up excuses as to why they do not want to attend church. Many parents' own commitment to Christ and His church is often suspect to say the least, as a result they find themselves unable to give positive encouragement when their kids begin to fall away from Christ and His church. But fall away they will when the family gives "left over" time, at best, to its spiritual life and eternal matters.

Parents, we are living in perilous times! Most of what our kids are seeing, hearing, and reading is appealing to their sinful appetites. If the eternal destiny of our children means anything to us we must re-organize our priorities and get our own spiritual lives in order. Billy Graham was right when he said: "Parents have little time for children and a great vacuum has developed and into the vacuum is going to move some kind of ideology." Will that ideology be atheism, agnosticism, eastern mysticism, New Age thinking? And more importantly, will their ideology lead them to an eternal existence in Heaven or Hell?

Many parents, being influenced by humanistic theology, are also willing to direct their children's thinking. In the process they are unknowingly turning their children over to the "me first" influence if a humanistic society: Paul Fournier, the noted Swiss theologian, was right when he said: "Parents must not cowardly abandon their authority. Youths who win their independence too easily, without having had to wrest it from their resisting parents, are very poorly prepared to make use of it in life. In the struggle the child will acquire experience; he will learn how far he may resist and at what point he must submit." we are reaping a harvest, even in church, of young people who are not being directed by parental influence to honor the rights and property of others, obey authority, treat respectfully older people, and to behave in a manner that reflects Godly thinking.

This is bound to be the result when parents are not actively involved in the training, nurturing and guidance of their children by both word and deed.

When we Christian parents or non-Christian parents decided to have children we were given responsibility to train them up in the way of the Lord and walk that way ourselves! I like how Josh Billings rephrased Prov. 22:6. "Train up a child in the way it should go, and walk there yourself once in a while." Not bad advice. What do our kids see in us? Do they see us as parents who care more about their destiny than their temporal success?

As parents let us heed the advice of our Lord when He said, "But seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness." (Matt. 6:33). The end result is surely worth the commitment. Do you want your children to go to Heaven? Then make certain you are leading them. That is the only way they are going to make it.

cil had approved this some time back, but the Fire Dept., having just received word from the state about the matter, wanted to check with the council again before proceeding. Council did not foresee any problems with the recertification of the truck.

It was reported that the sewer farm grant and loan closing was completed Friday, October 4, 1991. Bid sheets were cut Monday, Oct. 7. Advertising was to start Oct. 10. (Editor's note: Since this meeting took place Mr. Warnock has received notice there has been another delay due to a change in closing procedures of Farmers Home Administration. He says we are looking at possibly another 6 weeks delay.)

The Texas Municipal Retirement ordinances have been received. They were discussed at the last meeting and all that was needed was final approval. Councilman Kellar made the motion to pass the repeating ordinances so that they would not have to be passed each year, but will be done automatically. Councilman Karen Morris seconded. Motion carried.

A letter had been received from a local citizen regarding the condition of the armory when rented for a family reunion. After some discussion it was decided to contact the janitorial contractor and state what was expected of his janitorial services.

The update on the ambulance subsidy passed by the City of Coleman and the County Commissioners Court was brought

before the council. The subsidy is in effect until January 1992 and there is some talk of an election for an ambulance tax.

Councilman Kellar made the motion to pay accounts payable in the normal manner. Council Simmons seconded. Motion carried.

The meeting adjourned at 7:40 p.m.

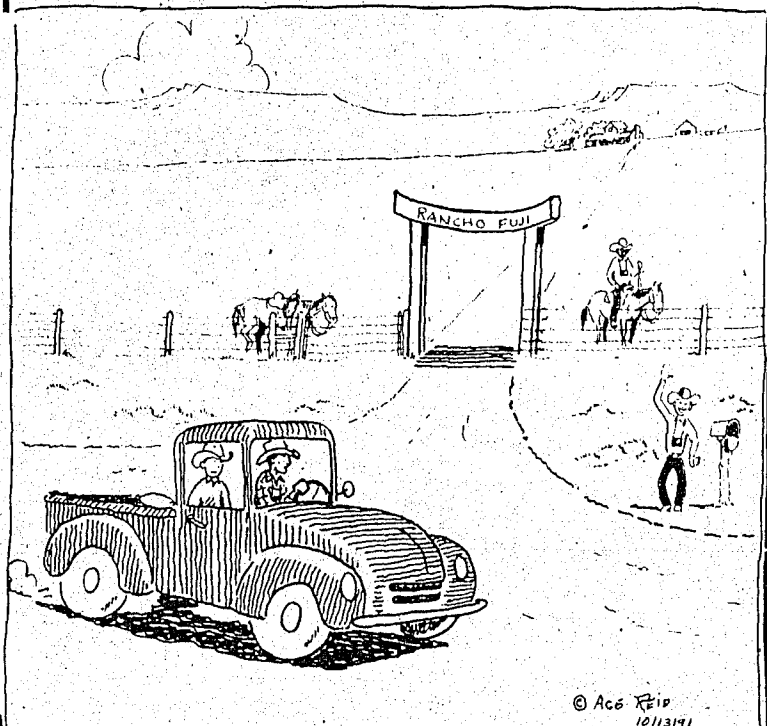

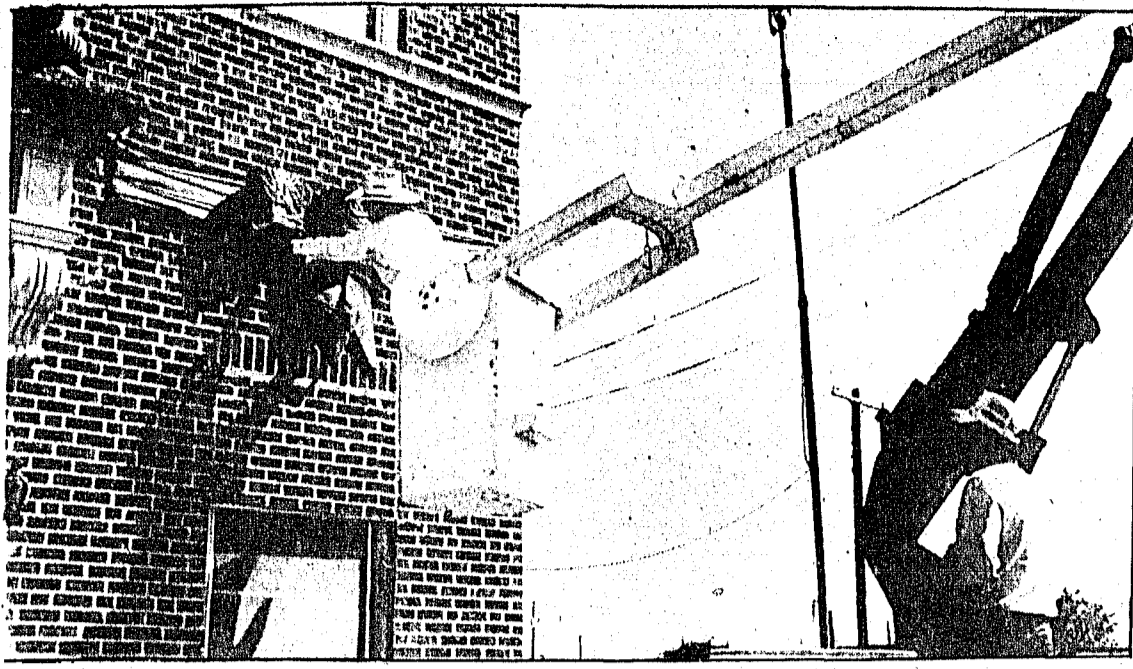

District Clerk Louise Thompson made two requests of the commissioners and won one approval which is to increase by \$55.00 the amount of fine assessed for felony DWI. The additional fine was approved by the legislature in HB 195 but is subject to action by each Texas county.

The denied request would have required additional expenditures of county funds. Thompson proposed

to have a deputy on duty in her office four days a week instead of the present two days. One of those days would be paid for by funds to be sent to the county by the state Attorney General as provided in the recently approved HB 202.

The reasoning of the commissioners in turning down the request is that they, too, need more help for road maintenance in all the precincts. Also, they have turned down requests for additional staffing by both the Sheriff and the Justice of the Peace. Now they have done so for the District Clerk as well.

Something For A Great Fall Treat

PECAN CRISPIES

- 2 C. all-purpose flour
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 C. softened butter or margarine
- 1 1/4 C. sugar, divided
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 C. finely chopped pecans

In medium bowl, mix flour, baking powder and salt. In large bowl, cream together butter and 1 cup sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs, one at a time, then add vanilla. Add flour mixture 1/4 at a time, mixing well after each addition. Wrap dough in plastic wrap and chill 1-2 hours. Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Shape dough into 1-inch balls. Roll in chopped pecans and place 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheets. Put remaining 1/4 cup sugar in small dish. Dip a flat-bottomed glass in water and then in sugar and press 1 or 2 cookies flat. Repeat until all cookies are flattened. Bake 6 to 8 minutes, or until light brown around the edges. Remove from oven; cool on cookie sheet 5 minutes before removing to a wire rack to cool completely. Makes about 9 dozen.

AMSTAR submitted a bill for ambulance services rendered for three individuals stated to be indigents. And the commissioners approved the transfer of \$5,000 each to Precincts 2 and 3. The transfer is to be made from the General Road and Bridge Fund.

The Mountaineers took it on the chin at Eden last Friday night when the Bulldogs exploded for 51 points to 7 for the Black and Gold, but are looking forward to matching up with Water Valley this week.

Eden scored 29 unanswered points in the second half in a battle of teams that represented District 11-A in the playoffs last season.

Eden had a 22-7 halftime lead but upped that score to 38-7 in the third quarter. It was the district opener for both teams which were picked in pre-season polls to fight it out for second place to Menard who knocked off Miles 32-6 Friday night. Irion County edged Water Valley 19-18 in the other District 11-A game.

A balanced Eden offense produced 432 yards against Santa Anna limiting the Mountaineers to 126 yards. Eden quarterback Jeff Brandenburger passed for 209 yards and three TDs.

The Mountaineer touchdown came on a 76-yard run by Phillip Hernandez with 13 seconds left in the first half.

The loss leaves Santa Anna standing at 3-2-1 on the year and Eden at 4-2, this being their fourth straight win.

"But the Mountaineers are not looking back at that loss," says Coach Mike Permenter. "We have to put that behind us and look forward to the rest of the season. We are at exactly the same point we were this time last year, starting district play with a loss to Eden, and we can still pull out of it like we did last year when we came on to take second place in district and into the playoffs. We can do it again if we set our minds to it and believe we can."

Coach Permenter and his staff always expresses their appreciation of the loyal Mountaineer fans and

hopes to see them out there when the Mountaineers meet Water Valley here Friday night.

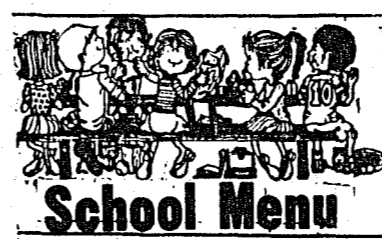

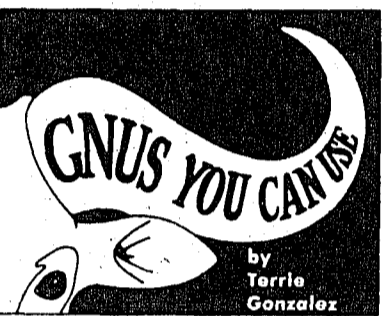
