Michael Hartman Receives License To Practice Law

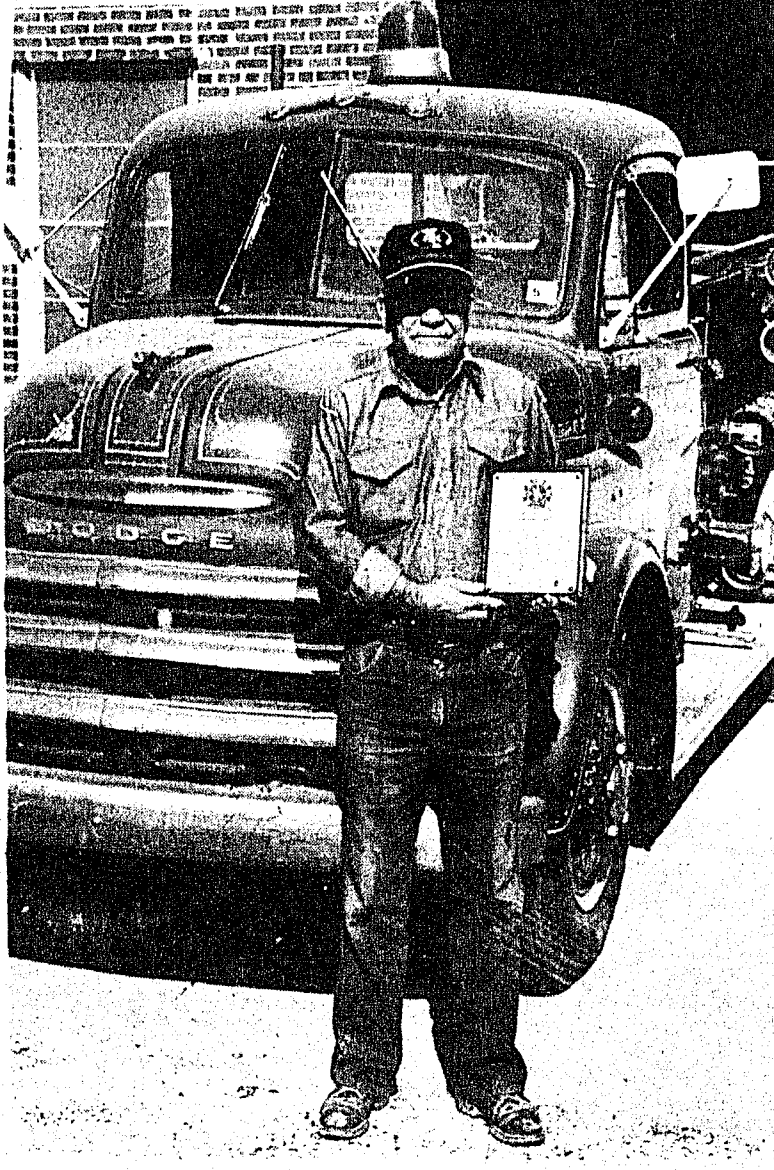

Thoughts From Our Pastors

THE BATTLE GOES ON

This "Thanksgiving" is no different than when the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth Rock. They came seeking to establish full religious freedom and to separate church from state. Nothing could be further from the truth to say that the English Pilgrims and Puritans quickly established full religious freedom and succeeded immediately in separating church and state. Nor would it be the truth to say that the battle for religious freedom began there on the shores of Massachusetts and Virginia. In Acts 4-5 we find the battle for religious freedom for Christians began as Peter and John were ordered to stop preaching and teaching about Jesus Christ. "But Peter and John answered and said unto them, Whether it is right in the sight of God to listen to you more than to God, you judge. For we cannot but speak the things which we have seen and heard." (Acts 4:19-20, NKJV) After having been arrested again, reminded of the order not to preach or teach Jesus Christ, Peter and John said, "We must obey God rather than men" (Acts 5:29 KJV), and they continued to preach and teach Jesus Christ.

This Thanksgiving I am thankful that faithful Christians down through history have stood for, and in many cases, died for religious freedom. In America, you and I have enjoyed the "freedom of religion", but if Christians do not begin taking a stand for this God-given right, there will come a day that "freedom from religion" will rule. November 6th the Supreme Court began hearing a case in which the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) claims it was illegal for a local minister to use the word "God" in his prayer at a voluntary high school commencement program, held outside regular school hours in the presence of family and friends. If the Supreme Court rules in favor of the ACLU's claim, then all Christians in this country will have their First Amendment Rights violated. The First Amendment of the Constitution of the United States guarantees that "Congress shall make no law respecting an established religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof." If the Supreme Court rules in favor of the ACLU claim, then the Supreme Court will be saying that it is OK to curse, slander, and mock the name of God on television, radio and in print, but it is illegal to pray to the one and only living God.

The court's decision last week prohibiting school officials in Duncannon, Texas from participating in prayer with students that wish to do so is a violation of the First Amendment rights of those officials. Their rights have been violated because they're not allowed the free exercise of religion and they no longer have the freedom of speech. The First Amendment took "the state out of the church," not "the church out of the state." If laws were passed to censor information printed by the press, every reporter around would be screaming, "Violation of freedom of speech," but the court of this land believes it can muzzle the prayers of Christians. I've got news for the courts of this land....they will never censor this Christian. It is time that Christians all across the country stand up and say in unison, "We must obey God rather than men, and we will continue to preach, teach and pray in the blessed Holy name of God and His son Jesus Christ. Don't just be thankful this Thanksgiving that you as a Christian can freely take a stand for right and wrong according to God, but go ahead and take a stand. Do not sit back and wait for someone else to do it."

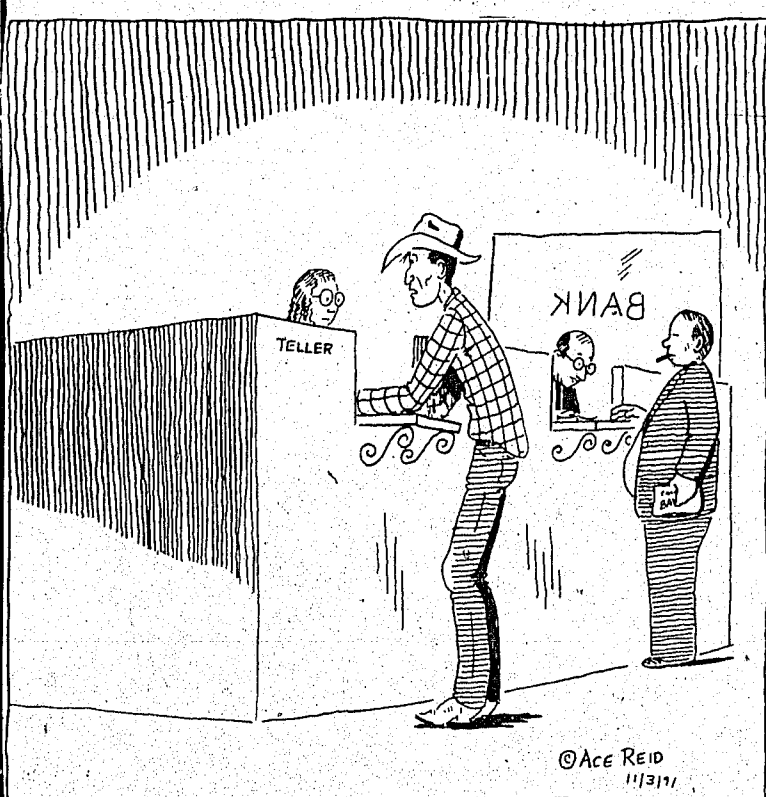

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Wage Garnishment For Defaulted Student Loans Tied To Unemployment Benefit Bill

Student loan borrowers who default on payments can now have their wages garnished, due to an addition to the unemployment benefits bill signed November 15. Revenue raised through garnishing wages of defaulted student loan borrowers is one of the sources for funding the extended unemployment benefits.

The federal provision overrides a Texas constitutional prohibition against garnishment.

The new provision could affect as many as 250,000 borrowers in Texas, according to Joe McCormick, President of the Texas Guaranteed Student Loan Corporation. TGSCLC administers the federal Guaranteed Student Loan Program for the state of Texas.

Wage garnishment goes into effect immediately, although TGSCLC officials estimate it will be a few months before Texas borrowers will actually have a portion of their paycheck taken to pay off their defaulted loan.

"Wage garnishment is the single most effective tool for collection of defaulted student loans," Mr. McCormick said. "TGSCLC will work very quickly to implement a garnishment program."

Borrowers who have voluntarily entered into a repayment agreement and are making payments will not be subject to wage garnishment. Borrowers who wish to discuss repayment arrangements can contact the TGSCLC Collections Department at 1-800-222-6297.

Other changes to the guaranteed student loan program that were included in the unemployment benefit bill are:

* Credit report required on all borrowers over age 21; borrowers with

adverse credit will be required to have a co-signer

* The Department of Education, and every guarantor, including TGSCLC, is permitted to obtain a borrower's address and his/her employer's address from any U.S. governmental entity to help locate borrowers who have defaulted.

* A borrower must provide, at the time he/she leaves school, his/her expected address, the address of next of kin and employer's address.

Police Report

Police Chief Carlos Torres reports a busy month with the following police activity for the month of October.

Totals arrests were four. Eleven tickets were written and there were 6 written warnings issued. Torres assisted the DPS with one accident. He investigated three calls of harassment; one burglary; three family disturbances; two thefts; one terroristic threat; one case of unlawful carrying of prohibited weapon; three trespassing complaints; five assaults complaints; and one instance of abuse of an elderly person.

The charge of elderly abuse was filed through the District Attorney's office. On the assaults, one arrest was made and an additional seven charges for assault for different incidents were filed through the County Attorney's office and warrants issued. One arrest was made on the

terroristic threat and unlawfully carrying a prohibited weapon. One arrest was made for driving while license suspended and DPS warrants and one arrest for driving while license suspended only. Two charges were filed for criminal trespassing, warrants issued. One charge filed for telephone harassment.

There were four cases of animals running loose and three incidents of livestock on the highway. There were two complaints of loud music and three for hotrodding. Chief Torres investigated two welfare concerns. Two complaints of prowlers were received, and one runaway reported. He also worked with three juvenile problems.

Chief Torres says he expects to be quite busy from now through the holidays as that is the norm for this time of year.

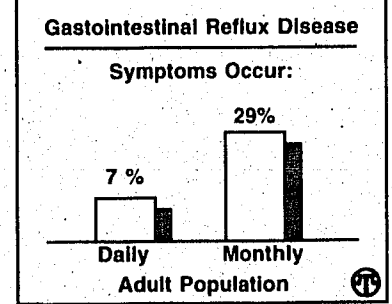

If the symptoms are mild, you'll probably be told to take antacids, lose weight if you're overweight, avoid smoking and alcohol, and eat smaller but more frequent meals, and elevate the head of your bed—reflux problems are more common during the night. For more serious symptoms your doctor can prescribe an H₂ receptor antagonist—a drug that increases the speed with which food passes through the stomach and into the intestines.

Tuesday of this week SAHS hosted Panther Creek for games at

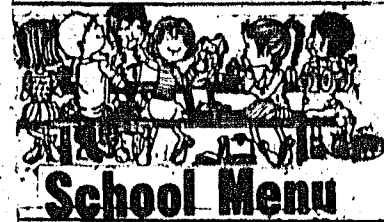

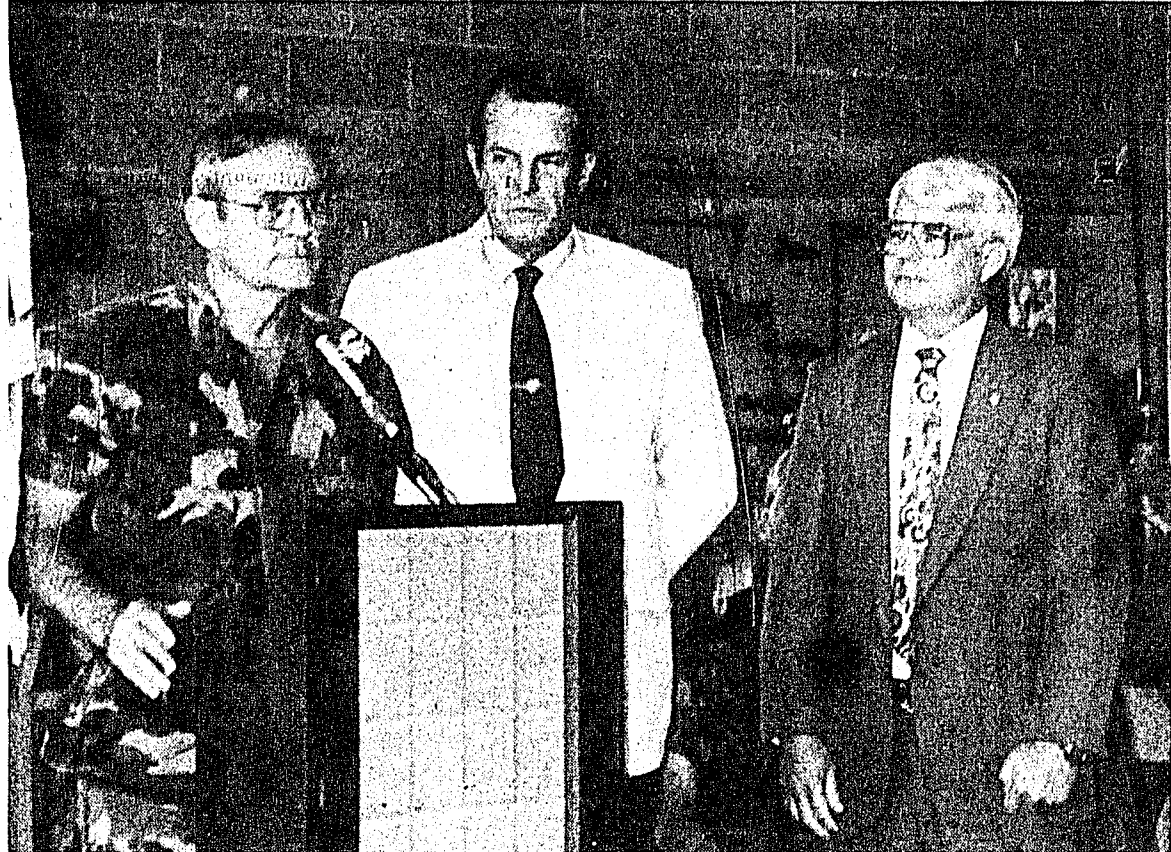

How Much Dishwasher Detergent Is Too Much?

It may be tempting to fill both sections of the detergent dispenser in your dishwasher to get dishes as clean as possible...but Whirlpool home economists say this habit can be wasteful. Here's why:



In almost all of today's built-in dishwashers, the detergent dispenser has two sections or "cups," one with a cover, one without. Cycles with two washes—such as the one for scrubbing pots and pans—use the detergent in both sections.

But for single-wash cycles—for example, a normal or light wash—you should use the covered section only. In fact, these cycles normally begin with a rinse, so filling both sides is the same as flushing the extra detergent right down the drain!

Here's another tip: You'll get the best cleaning results when you use detergent that's fresh, dry and free from lumps. So be sure to open just one package of detergent at a time and to store it in a cool, dry place to assure its freshness and pourability.
