Plans Underway For Rural Health Center In Santa Anna

Santa Anna and the surrounding area will soon have a rural health center staffed with a full-time physician's assistant.

During the Coleman County Medical Center's board of director meeting recently, Administrator Nick Blythe announced that space

had been rent in the Kanger Park Inn to house the clinic. The clinic will be directed by Dr. Orhan Oral and the Coleman County Medical Center. It is anticipated that the clinic in Santa Anna will be open about the first of December.

According to board president Clyde Allen, this will fulfill a

promise which was made when the hospital district was formed.

Mark Spencer of Moore, Okla. has been employed as full-time duties as physician's assistant and will begin his duties on Oct. 1 in Coleman. He will be supervised by Dr. Oral.

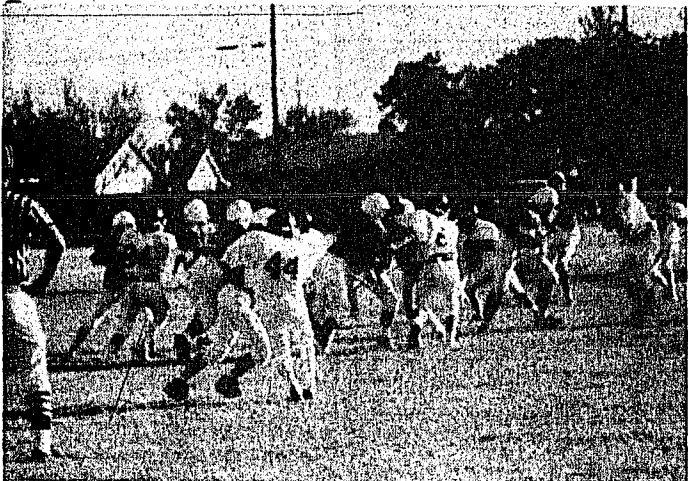

Stocking Rate Adjustments-- Critical Decisions For Area Ranchers

Scattered rains have started falling again, but how much grass will it grow before frost? How much will the old grass deteriorate? How much grass will we have going into the winter? How does one decide what numbers of livestock and what kind to carry on pastures and rangeland through the winter? How does a rancher answer these questions?

Answering these questions will be the highlight of the Stocking Rate Symposium at Fredericksburg on October 13, 1993, specialists from across the state as well as local ranchers will related what they feel is important in handling stocking rate questions. Adjusting animal numbers relative to the amount of forage available is one of the most critical decisions a rancher has to make.

"Matching animal demand to forage availability impacts the success and profitability of the ranching enterprise," says Dr. Jake Landers,

Extension Range Specialist in San Angelo. The immediate effect of heavy stocking is the disappearance of standing forage, but there are long term effects which may be more serious. Desirable grasses may be too damaged to recover; brush, pricklypear and undesirable grasses may replace the desirable ones; valuable soil may be lost due to accelerated erosion, all of which results in lowered animal numbers and productivity. Fewer animals, lowered productivity and higher costs of controlling undesirable plants can easily erase ranching profits, says Landers.

Proper grazing allows grasses to remain more productive with stronger root systems. They will stay stronger during dry weather and recover faster when rains come again.

The Fredericksburg Symposium will be held at Lady Bird Johnson Pavilion, Lady Bird Johnson Municipal Park, 3 miles SW of Fredericksburg on Highway 16 South.

Emergency Response Systems Available For Elderly

The West Central Texas Council of Governments have available emergency response systems for the elderly.

There is no installation fee but a \$15.00 monthly donation is requested.

The system works by the person wearing a small personal help button around the neck with a button to be pressed for assistance. The button activates the telephone until which dials the Emergency Response Center who calls the home to see if help is needed.

If the Responder is unable to reach the person, they call the person chosen to be called in an emergency. When the Responder arrives at the home they reset the button.

The unit will call for help within 24 hours even if a person is not able to press the button.

Many of these books plus other books from the early 1900's will be offered for sale at a very reasonable price.

Also at the sale will be duplicate books and other books that the library does not need that have been donated recently.

Many of the books have the original owners name written in them. Anyone who finds the name of a member of their family in a book, may have that books free of charge.

Proceeds of the sale will be used to buy library supplies and books.

Library board members hope that everything in the old library building will sell. The building will then be turned over to the city to be used for other purposes.

Our librarian Ovella Williams had an encounter with the dentist recently.

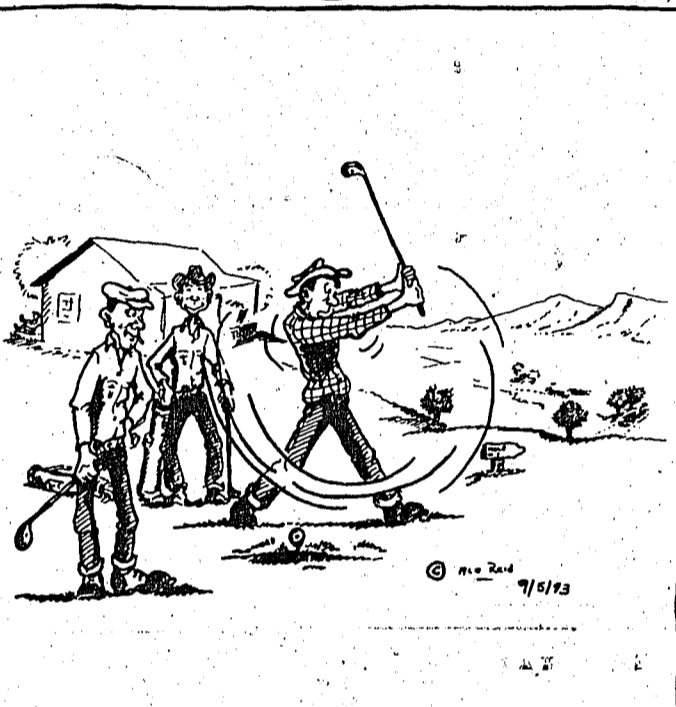

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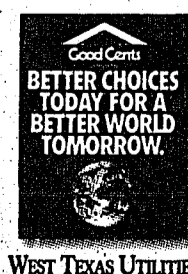

The Way We Were

SEPTEMBER 26, 1963

The last non-conference game of the season for the Santa Anna Mountaineers will be played on the local field Friday.

More than 300 persons from the Central Texas area were in Santa Anna Sunday afternoon to attend the first Coleman County Ceramic Show.

Amy Beal served 7 points in the second game while Rachel Guerrero served 6; and Amy Ellerbe and Bertha Frausto served 1 each.

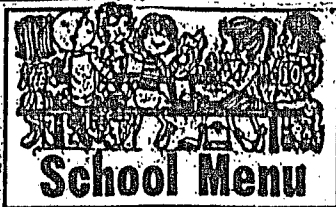

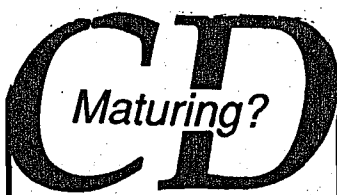

If you believe you are eligible for this refund, contact the Comptroller's Office at 1-800-252-1382 for a refund claim form, or obtain one at your County Tax Assessor-Collector's office.

The Comptroller's Office is authorized to make refunds only for claims received by November 1, 1993. Claim forms and refunds of the \$5 special license fee paid on or after August 30, 1993, will be available only from County Tax Assessor-Collectors.
