of standing forage, but there are long term effects which may be more serious. Desirable grasses may be too damaged to recover; brush; pricklypear and undcsirable grasses may replace the desirable
ones; valuable soil may be lost due to accelerated crosion, all of which results in lowered animal number and productivity. Fewer animals
