
#### Tax Notice May Cause Confusion Among Tax Payers

# Perry **Promotes NAFTA**

COLEMAN — Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry promoted the North American Free Trade Agreement during a stop here Monday.

Speaking to the Coleman Rotary Club, Perry said Mexico bought \$40 billion worth of goods from the United States last year.

"Somebody is buying our raw products and processed goods in Mexico. They are the No. 1 trading partner for Texas," Perry

He used Pace picante and Blue Bell ice cream as examples of Texas-made products selling well in Mexico.

"NAFTA will be very much a net-plus for those of us in Texas and Texas agriculture," he said. Perry also urged those in attendance to vote for Proposition 16

on the Nov. 2 ballot to maintain

funding for the Texas Agricul-tural Finance Authority. "The TAFA program is cre-ating jobs in the private sector," Perry said.

Passage of Proposition 16 would increase state funding of the program from \$25 million to \$100 million.

'Passage would extend its authority to continue creating value-added processing projects across the state of Texas," Perry

#### Young Farmer **Loan Applications Now Available**

AUSTIN--The Texas Department of Agriculture is accepting applications for up to \$50,000 in loan guaranties through the Young Farmers Loan Guarantee Program.

About \$1.7 million has been raised for the program from a \$5 farm motor vehicle fee that was collected beginning Jan. 1, 1993. However, in order to keep the program constitutional, this year's Legislature designated the \$5 fee as voluntary. Those who paid the fee between Jan. 1, 1992 and Aug. 29, 1993, and who want a refund must file for a claim by Nov. 1 with the State Comptroller. After Nov. 1, refund requests will be processed by the local county tax offices.

He joined the Navy in July, 1991.



the state's "truth-in-taxation" law to publish an official notice reporting last year's tax rate, the proposed tax rate for this year, and the percentage increase. However, due to a drafting oversight in the new school finance law, the notice significantly understates the tax rate for last year and produces a misleading comparison between last year's and their year's school taxes.

Under the previous school finance law, the county education district (CED) levied part of the taxes used for operating schools and the school district levied the rest. Under the new school finance law, CEDs are eliminated and all school taxes are levied by the school district.

Last year, the county education district imposed a tax rate of \$1.04 (per \$100 of value) and Santa Anna I.S.D. imposed a tax rate of \$0.36 for a combined school tax rate of \$1.40. This year, Santa Anna I.S.D. is proposing a tax rate of \$1.40.

Because of the mistake in the new school finance law, Santa Anna I.S.D. is required to report a 1992-93 tax rate of \$0.36, at 1993-94 tax rate of \$1.40, and an increase of 286 percent, when in reality the rate will be exactly the same. There will be no increase.

In an effort to correct the misinformation, Santa Anna I.S.D. is publishing alongside the tax notice an advertisement indicating that the official tax notice is wrong. The supplemental advertisement,

The Santa Anna Independent School District is required by state law to publish the accompanying tax notice in this form, even though the notice is deceptive.

Because of an omission in the recently-enacted state law. Santa Anna I.S.D. may not include revenue collected by the county education district in the calculation of taxes for the 1992-93 school year. The effect of this is to understate last year's actual school tax rate and produce an inaccurate comparison of last year's tax rate to this year's tax rate.
