Tax Notice May Cause Confusion Among Tax Payers

A tax notice published in this newspaper and paid for by Santa Anna I.S.D. may leave some local taxpayers scratching their heads in confusion.

The notice incorrectly states that the school tax rate will grow by 286 percent. But in publishing the notice, local school officials are only complying with a state law.

"This is one of those situations where the law doesn't make any sense, but we must nevertheless comply with it or risk serious consequences," said Jim McPherson, superintendent of schools.

Perry Promotes NAFTA

COLEMAN — Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry promoted the North American Free Trade Agreement during a stop here Monday.

Speaking to the Coleman Rotary Club, Perry said Mexico bought \$40 billion worth of goods from the United States last year.

"Somebody is buying our raw products and processed goods in Mexico. They are the No. 1 trading partner for Texas," Perry said.

He used Pace picante and Blue Bell ice cream as examples of Texas-made products selling well in Mexico.

"NAFTA will be very much a net-plus for those of us in Texas and Texas agriculture," he said.

Perry also urged those in attendance to vote for Proposition 16 on the Nov. 2 ballot to maintain

funding for the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority.

"The TFAFA program is creating jobs in the private sector," Perry said.

Passage of Proposition 16 would increase state funding of the program from \$25 million to \$100 million.

"Passage would extend its authority to continue creating value-added processing projects across the state of Texas," Perry said.

Seventh, eighth and ninth graders must have a grade point average of 4.25 to qualify for gold card recognition and a 3.75 grade point average to qualify for silver card recognition.

Tenth, eleventh and twelfth graders must have a 4.50 grade point average to qualify for gold card recognition and a 4.00 grade point average to qualify for silver card recognition.

The difference is seventh through ninth grades is not a lower standard. Tenth through twelfth grades have the opportunity to take honors courses, which may earn up to a 6.9 grade point, and academic classes, which may earn up to 5.9 grade point.
