
Santa Anna High School Class of 1923

When asked about her years in the classroom, Margaret Crews replied, "I enjoyed evey minute of that time."

Roy England, named Ex-Student of the Year for the 1993 Homecomine, was the second of five children of George and Bessie England to graduate from Santa Anna High School. Following graduation in May, 1943, he entered military service as a Naval Aviation Cadet, was commissioned a Naval Aviator and joined the U.S. Pacific Fleet as a seaplane pilot. In 1947, he married Joyce Gill, Class of 1945. He was released from active duty in 1948, and entered college at Texas A&M University in 1949, graduating with a B.S. degree in Animal Science in January, 1953.

Immediately following graduation, he was recalled to active duty and assigned to a scaplane squadron covering Naval Task Force 7 in the Korean Service Area, during which time his wife and three children lived in Santa Anna.

Upon his release from Naval service in 1955, he joined the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and served as Knox County Agricultural Agent until 1958, when he returned

to Coleman County to assist his father-in-law, E. W. (Doc) Gill in his ranching operations at Whon, Texas, and his children attended school in Santa Anna.

In 1964, Roy returned to Texas A&M and entered the College of Veterinary Medicine, graduated in 1967 as a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine and joined the teaching faculty in the Department of Veterinary Medicine and Surgery, where he taught Large Animal Clinical Medicine and was active in research for 19 years, retiring as Professor emeritus in 1986.

Roy and Joyce currently live at Horseshoe Bay in southeastern Llano County where they enjoy golf and traveling.

Sandra Hosch Ferrara has been selected as Coming Home Queen for 1993. She is a 1973 graduate of Santa Anna High School. Ms. Ferrara earned her bachelor's degree in nursing from Texas Women's University in 1977 and is a registered nurse. She earned a master's degree in business administration from the University of Texas in 1990

Ms. Ferrara has been employed with the Texas Youth Commission for 11 years. She is the Health Services Administrator for the agency which provides rehabilitation services to approximately 6,000 youth throughout the state. Her department is responsible for medical, mental health, nutrition, chemical dependency and case management services. Prior to TYC she was employed in various critical care nursing positions.

She was a member of Beta Club for four years and was named in the 1972 Who's Who Among American High School students in 1972. She was awarded the Crisco Homemaking Award in

County Judge Won't Seek Re-Election



The commissioner's court approved plans by Sheriff Wade Turner to overhaul department vehicles rather than try to purchase new ones.


The court also voted to hire another jailer to be in compliance with state laws regarding jail number of jailers per jail population. They court had earlier received a warning about non-compliance with state standards.





Texas Toughens Drunk Driving Laws

1993. That's because the 73rd Texas Legislature passed numerous measures relating to impaired driving during the session ending June 30 of this vear. Many of the new laws became effective in time for the Labor Day weekend--a period of historically fraught with a disproportionate number of alcohol-related highway deaths and injuries compared to other non-holiday weekends.

These new laws are sure to reduce alcohol-related deaths and injuries on Texas roads" says Edwina Hopper, President of Mothers Against Drunk Driving, Coleman County Chapter. "Drunk drivers will face stricter penalties, but the big emphasis is on deterring drunk driving in the first

Following is a list of new laws and their effective dates:

Laws which became effective September 1, 1993

*Minors arrested for DWI may now have their driver's license suspended for up to one year for failing a breath test or registering a blood alcohol concentration level of .07 or greater.

*Minors caught in possession of alcohol will now have to pay a fine and attend an alcohol awareness course on their first offense. Previously, minors would only face one of those two punishments.

*The Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission can now revoke the permits of retailers who sell alcohol with criminal negligence" to those under 21. Previously, the TABC could only revoke the permits of retailers who "knowingly" sold alcohol to those under 21. That standard of "knowingly" was difficult to prove and made the 21 drinking age extremely difficult to enforce.

*Abusable glue, aerosol paint and substances that contain a volatile released on parole. chemical have now been added to the definition of intoxication in the DWI statutes.

*Mandatory jail time as a condition of probation has been restored.

*Under the old law, ignition in-

Texas' drunk driving laws got a lot terlock devices were merely options tougher beginning September 1, that judges could choose to use as a that judges could choose to use as a condition of probation. Under a law passed this session, they are required if an offender receives probation for his third DWI. They are also required if the offender receives probation and he has previously been convicted once of DWI and once of DWI involuntary manslaughter.

*The implied consent law (breath test) can now be enforced on any public place, not just on state roads or highways.

*Two bills passed that increase the funding to the state victims ompensation fund.

Laws that become effective September 1, 1994 *Out-of-state DWI convictions may

now be used for purposes of enhancement.

*The offense of DWI involuntary manslaughter has been replaced with

the offense of "intoxication manslaughter," and the punishment has been raised to 2-20 years (a second degree felony). The previous punishment was 2-10 years. *The offense of DWI with serious

bodily injury has been replaced with the offense of "intoxication assault," and the punishment has been raised to 1-10 years (a third degree felony). Previously, serious bodily injury was simply used to enhance the punishment that an individual received for the DWI offense for which he has charged. That enhancement amounted to a 60-day increase in the minimum jail time.

*Whenever there is a finding of a deadly weapon, the offender must now serve 50 percent of his sentence before becoming eligible for parole.

*Due to the structure of the new penal code, it has been projected that all violent offenders will now serve more of their sentence before being

*Any person whose license is suspended under the implied consent law cannot have that suspension probated. Law that becomes effective January

January 1, 1995. Hailed as the single greatest deterent to drunk driving, ALR has significantly reduced alcohol-related deaths and injuries in three dozen states. Under ALR, drivers who fail or

refuse a chemical blood test to determine blood alcohol concentration are served notice that their driver's license will be suspended on the 40th

Perhaps the most effective new law

passed by the 73rd Legislature is Administrative License Revocation

(ALR), which becomes effective

day after the arrest unless the suspension is successfully appealed in an administrative hearing, which must be scheduled within 15 days. First offenders receive a license

suspension of 60 days if they fail the test and 90 days if they refuse to take it. Subsequent offenses carry a 120 days suspension if the test is failed and 180 days if the test is refused. At the end of the suspension period, the offender pays a 100 dollars reinstatement fee.

ALR is a separate proceeding from criminal drunk driving charges offenders may face.
