We learn that a large party, consisting of about fifty Indians, anived in this cily opposite the Union office. A great number of persons called on Saturday to take a look at these children of the forest, several of whom, especially Santa Anna, the principal chief of the Camanches (sic), are said to be bold and brave looking fellows. Public curiosity is much excited to view this numerous party of Indians. They
consist of delegates from the following ribes, Camanches 3. Lippans consist of delegates from the following tribes, Camanches 3, Lippans
2, Tonkaways 9 , Wacoes 4, Wichitas 2, Tawakonies 2, PawneeMahaws 1, Onadecas 6, Ionies 3, Caddoes 2, Kechies 3, Muscogees 2, Cherokees 1, Delawares 2, one Mexican prisoner brought from the Camanches
