Amendments On Ballot Tuesday; Cast Your Ballots At Mountain City Center

Texans are being reminded to vote on Tuesday, November 2 in the general election. Voting will take place in Santa Anna at Mountain City Community Center from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. with Rose Bass as election judge. Although there are no races on the ballots in most counties this year, there are 16 proposed amendments.

The following is a brief explanation of the amendments:

Proposition 1: Authorizing the Legislature to provide for the issuance of bonds for the state financing of start-up costs for historically under-utilized businesses.

Proposition 2: Relating to the

exemption from ad valorem taxation of real and personal property used primarily for the control of air, water or land pollution.

Proposition 3: Relating to clearing land titles by relinquishing and releasing any claim of sovereign ownership or title to interest to certain counties.

Proposition 4: Relating to a personal income tax and dedicating the proceeds of the tax to education and property tax relief.

Proposition 5: Authorizing the Legislature to prescribe the qualifications of sheriffs.

Proposition 6: Abolishing the office of county surveyor in

Jackson County.

Proposition 7: Relating to repealing the constitutional provision limiting the consideration for which stocks and bonds of a corporation may be issued.

Proposition 8: Abolishing the office of county surveyor in McLennan County.

Proposition 9: Relating to modifying the provisions for the redemption of real property sold at a tax sale.

Proposition 10: Relating to bonds issued to augment the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund, to fund the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II and to provide financial assistance to veterans of the state.

Proposition 11: Relating to the duties of trustees of local public pension systems.

Proposition 12: Relating to the denial of bail on certain persons charged with certain violent or sexual offenses.

Proposition 13: Relating to adding the Texas State Technical College System to certain constitutionally dedicated funding for public institutions of higher education.

Proposition 14: Providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds for acquiring, constructing or equipping corrections and MHMR institutions and for major repair or renovation of existing facilities of those institutions.

Proposition 15: Providing for the abolishment of the office of county surveyor.

Proposition 16: Providing for an increase in the principal amount of bonds for the support of the Texas agricultural fund that may be outstanding at one time.

The amendments were published in full in an earlier edition of the NEWS. Anyone wishing may purchase one of those papers for study of the amendments.

SAHS Graduate Honored At HPU Homecoming

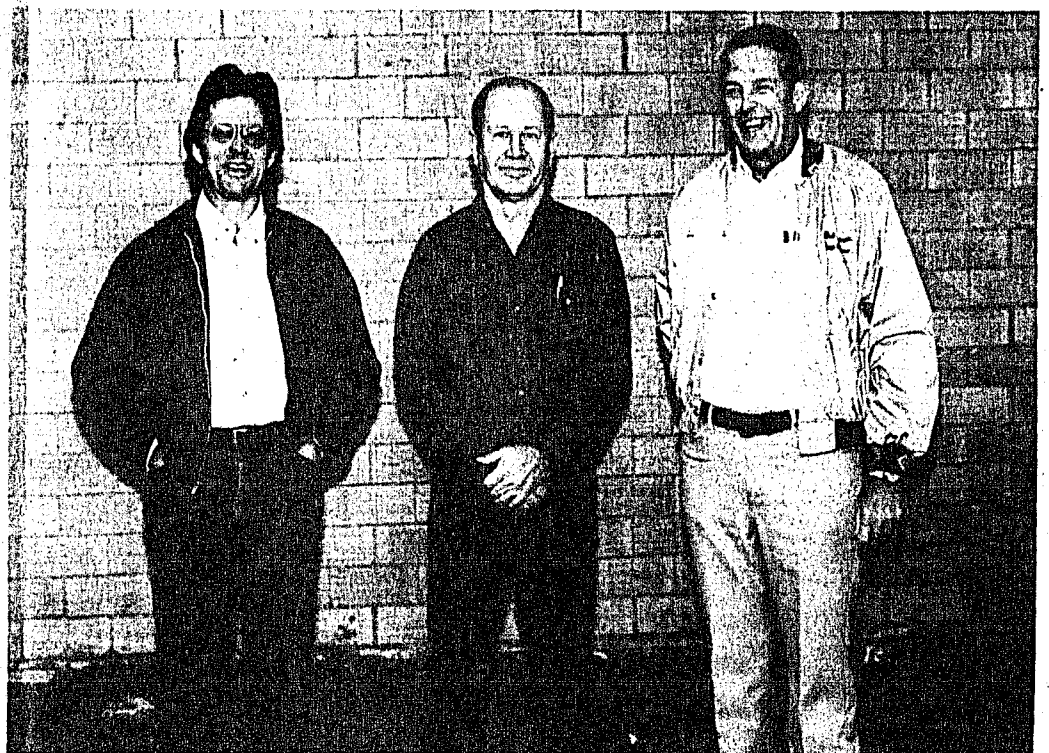


Freddie Cullins

Now It's Time To Begin Our Serious Work

An informative "town meeting" was held Saturday evening when the Chamber of Commerce hosted its annual membership kick-off dinner. A barbecue Brisket meal was served to a good crowd of interested Santa Anna citizens. Those attending either bought memberships to the Chamber of Commerce or made contributions to the group.

State Representative Bob Turner was among those giving updates on the Chamber's project of trying to secure a Comanche Historical Museum in Santa Anna. Turner said he had committed to working with the group to attain their goal. He has accepted a position on the board of directors of the Santa Anna Historical Development Committee.

He remarked that "roads go two directions." He said that even though highways lead out of Santa Anna, they also come into Santa Anna. "There," he said, "is our challenge. We need to establish something worthwhile that will cause some of those travelling through Santa Anna to stop and visit here."

Turner advised there are multitudes of programs to be researched for obtaining funding for a project such as the Chamber has in mind. He added that the project already offers two assets toward establishing criteria for funding...it is historical in nature and involves a minority. "Minorities can tap the funding agencies," he said.

Turner said, "Lots of big things can happen here and the

possibilities are limited only by our own 'un-imagination.'" He related that on Friday he had received word that Sonora, a town not much bigger than Santa Anna, had been awarded a Texas Historical Commission 'Main Street' renewal grant. According to State Highway Department figures, there is more traffic through Santa Anna than goes through Sonora.

Montie Guthrie, chairman of the Santa Anna Historical Development Committee, offered that a study by the State Highway Department shows that 5,900 vehicles a day pass through Santa Anna. That would calculate to be well over two million vehicles passing through here in a year's time. Guthrie said, "We don't expect to be able to stop all of them, but if only 10,000 of that number stops, the benefit to Santa Anna would be mind boggling." It is said that every ten dollars spent in a community turns over four times. Guthrie added that if 10,000 visitors a year spent \$10 each in Santa Anna, we are looking at \$400,000 coming into our town that has been going right on through to somewhere else.

"We have the Mountain, the history, and we sit at the intersection of three highways," Guthrie said, "and that can add up to a lot of visitors if we can offer something they will be interested in stopping to see." While stopped many will decide to browse through our stores and most probably end up buying something. Some will

buy something to eat before leaving town.

Russell Ellis, Director of Economic Development for the Comanche Nation, was to have been present at the meeting but was called to take care of other obligations. Others to have been here with Ellis were investors who could make a commitment to the Chamber dreams.

Guthrie said that Ellis, in previous meetings with some of the Santa Anna Historical Committee, had advised that our main street was our biggest liability but also our biggest asset in that it shows a lot of potential. Ellis is an expert in researching grants and since that is one of his jobs with the Comanche Nation, he will also assist in grant research for the Santa Anna Historical Museum project.

Guthrie commented that Santa Anna's main resource is its people; people who are committed to making Santa Anna a better place than when they arrived here.

Rod Musick, a member of the Historical Development Committee who has been given the job of doing grant research, told of a number of funding possibilities and how he would go about carrying out his obligation to the project. He also stated that Santa Anna is going to have to start by taking more pride in our community. "In a few years," he said, "we can proudly tell people that we live in Santa Anna, where the Comanche Historical Museum is located."

Tex Wright spoke of the historical aspects of our area and especially how much Comanche history and lore is related to our area and community. How Santa Anna is named for Chief Santanna, Mukewater Creek named for Chief Mukwara (sp?) and Jim Ned for a Chief by that name. "We are surrounded by Indian history," he said. He added there are still many Indian campgrounds in the local vicinity, many of which can be identified as Comanche.

Chamber president Edwin Hipsher, who also gave the welcome for the beginning of the meeting, related that the Santa Anna Historical Development Committee has completed the paperwork to be established as a non-profit tax exempt organization, a first step in being able to obtain funding. "At a meeting attended in Early September, in Lawton, Oklahoma, we formalized our partnership with the Comanche Nation," he said, "and now it is time to begin our serious work here."

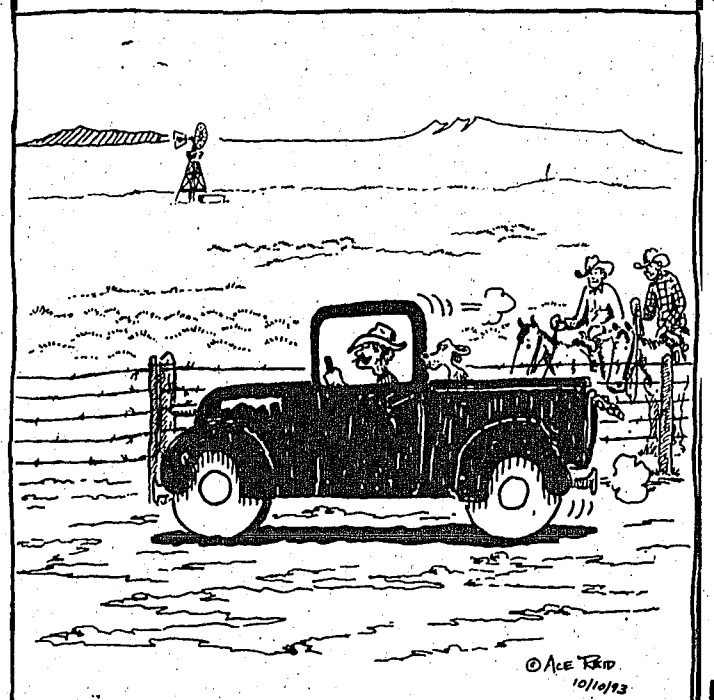

munity.

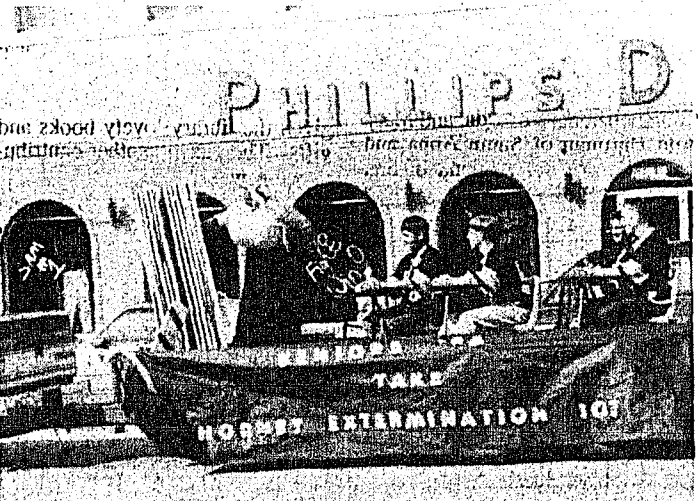

Santa Anna Penatuhkah Comanche Chief

(Editor's Note: The following is one of continuing series of articles being furnished by Ms. Pelon concerning Chief Santa Anna and his impact on our local history.)
The following article was published in the *Daily National Intelligencer* (Washington) on Monday, June 29, 1846.

ARRIVAL OF THE CAMANCHE INDIANS

We learn that a large party, consisting of about fifty Indians, arrived in this city last Friday, and are now quartered with Col. M. O. Lewis, United States Agent, at Mr. Maher's Globe Hotel, nearly opposite the Union office. A great number of persons called on Saturday to take a look at these children of the forest, several of whom, especially Santa Anna, the principal chief of the Camanches (sic), are said to be bold and brave looking fellows. Public curiosity is much excited to view this numerous party of Indians. They consist of delegates from the following tribes, Camanches 3, Lippans 2, Tonkaways 9, Wacoos 4, Wichitas 2, Tawakonies 2, Pawnee-Mahaws 1, Onadecas 6, Ionies 3, Caddoes 2, Kechies 3, Muscogeos 2, Cherokees 1, Delawares 2, one Mexican prisoner brought from the Camanches.

Some of the other news of the day included:

The Twenty-Ninth Congress was in session. In the senate a motion was made to "postpone the prior orders, with a view to take up the joint resolution from the House of Representatives authorizing the selection of a suitable site from the public lots within the city for the erection of a monument to Washington."

The "price of peace" was being questioned. A report reprinted from the *New Orleans Commercial Times* stated, "The question is being frequently asked, 'What is the definite object of the war with Mexico?'"

Area Scouts To Join Nationwide Food Appeal

More than 4800 local youth and adults will be mobilized during the week of October 30 through November 6 to help feed the hungry in the Big Country area.

Organized by the Chisholm Trail Council, Boy Scouts of America, the Scouting for Food Good Turn will involve Scouts and volunteer leaders from all over the Big Country in an effort to collect 25,000 pounds of food. The local appeal is part of a national Good Turn, being conducted by the Boy Scouts of America, that

seeks to ease the food problem for the more than 20 million American who go hungry at some time each month.

The five year campaign has netted some 343 million pounds nationally, including over 100,000 pounds for the Big Country.

Another New Player Wins In Frenzy

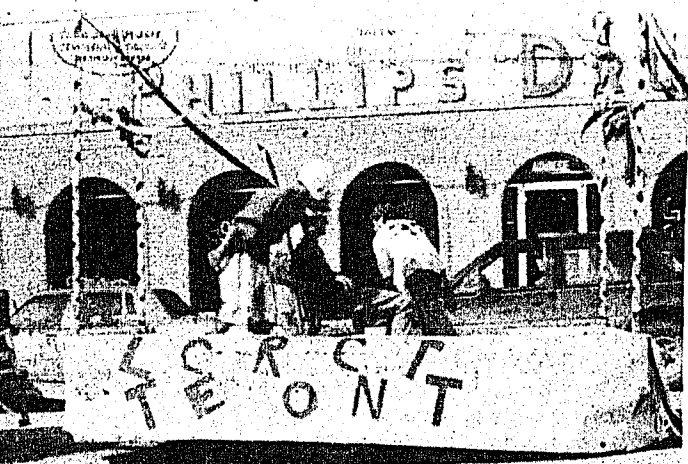
Another new Mountaineer Football Frenzy player stepped into the spotlight by outguessing everyone in last week's schedule of games.

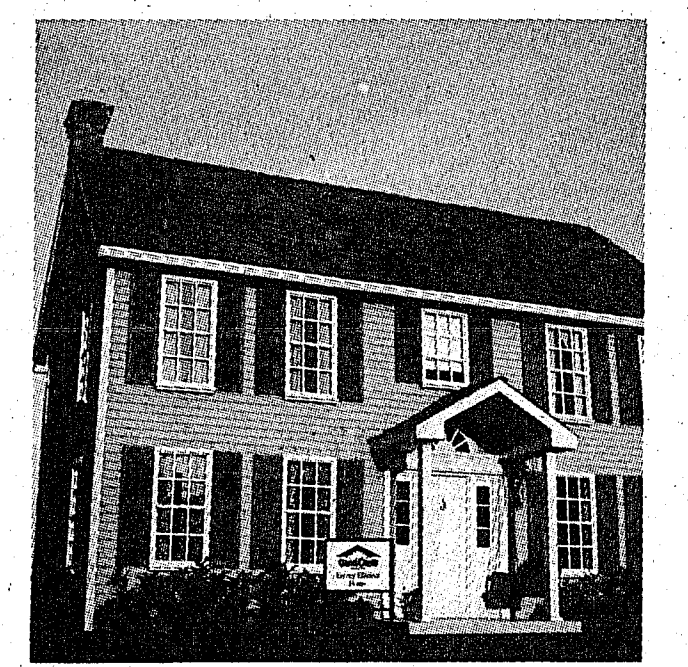

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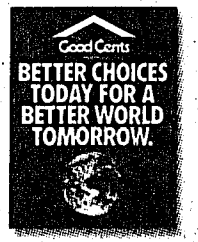
