Turner Files For Re-election

COLEMAN--State Representative Robert R. (Bob) Turner, (D), 73rd District announced Monday, Dec. 6, 1993 that he has filed for re-election to the Texas House of Representatives. Turner, a resident of Voss in Coleman county, entered the Texas Legislature in March of 1991 and represented what was then House District number 65. This district was changed to House District 73 during legislative redistricting, and now includes these counties: Bandera, Brown, Coleman, Concho, Crane, Crockett, Edwards, Kimble, Llano, Mason, Menard, Real, Schleicher, Sutton, Upton, Ward and a portion of southeast Ector county. District 73 is larger in square miles than the combined areas of the states of Vermont, New Hampshire and Rhode Island. Despite the district's large size, Turner states that he "thoroughly enjoyed representing the interests of rural Texans in the 73rd District in Austin."

Representative Turner is married to the former Ann Holt of Santa Anna. The couple has three grown sons, and two daughters-in-law. He is a farmer and a sheep producer and Executive Director of the Coleman County Economic Development Company. Representative Turner and his wife are members of the Gouldbusk United Methodist Church, where Bob is Music Director and Lay Speaker and Ann teaches youth Sunday School classes. Turner is a retired Lt. Col. in the U. S. Army Reserve, with

35 years total service, a seventeen year veteran of his local school board, and past president of both the Coleman Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture and the Coleman County Farm Bureau. Turner also served five years on the Board of Directors of Texas Farm Bureau, one year of which was in the capacity of Vice President. He was named outstanding Rural Citizen by the Coleman Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture in 1990. Turner served as the chairman of the National Animal Damage Control

Advisory Committee for then U. S. Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan.

Turner states, "I am extremely concerned about rural Texas, the unique problems that are ours, and the lack of representation and voice rural residents have in government. Further, I am very interested in seeking the understanding and assistance of urban legislators in finding solutions to our problems. Lack of understanding of our rural problems is an element that needs to be overcome if rural Texas is to survive."

Guy Allen Wins Championship Eighth Time

Although the 1993 champions of the PCRA rodeo circuit are being decided at the National Finals in Las Vegas this week, the Steer Roping championship has already been awarded. Local and area people have a special interest in the contest as a Santa Anna native was winner of the World Championship title in Guthrie, Oklahoma on November 27.

Guy Allen, now of Venita, Oklahoma, won his eighth World Championship title and set a record by having three consecutive titles. He finished the 1993 season with winnings of \$53,322. Runner-up was Arnold Felts of Sonora, with Roy Cooper of Childress in third place.

Allen, the son of former Santa Annans James and Ann Allen, won his first world championship in 1977 age age 19 and while a freshman in college. The seven other titles came in '80, '82, '84, '89, and the last three consecutive years. He has qualified for each of the last 17 consecutive steer roping finals.

Guy grew up in the roping arena on the family ranch northeast of Santa Anna. He and his brother, Gip, competed in roping events and his sisters, Tony and Becky, were barrel racers and were active in 4-H horse events. Their dad also competed in roping events since his youth.

After graduation from Santa Anna High School, Guy attended Ranger Junior College one year on a rodeo scholarship, then transferred to Sul Ross State University at Alpine to

complete his degree and compete with the Sul Ross rodeo team. It was there he met and married his wife, Creel, and the couple are now parents of two daughters.

In a recent feature story in Rodeo Sports News, Guy modestly credited his dad for his help and encour-

agement, the good roping horses he has had, and "whatever roping talent I have had has been a gift of God."

At age 35, Allen is still expected to see many more championship titles, and Santa Anna friends will be watching from the sidelines with pride.

Several Local Students Included In 1992-93 Who's Who Among American High School Students

A total of 11 students from Santa Anna are included in the 27th Annual Edition of *Who's Who Among American High School Students*, 1992-93.

Who's Who, published by Educational Communications, Inc., Lake Forest, Illinois, is the largest high school recognition publication in the country. Students are nominated by high school principals and guidance counselors, national youth groups, churches or by the publishing company based upon student's performance in scholarship award contests or extracurricular activities.

Final selection is determined on the basis of criteria which include high achievement in academics and leadership in school activities, athletics or community service. Traditionally, 99% of *Who's Who* students have a grade point average of 'B' or better and 97% are college bound.

The 27th edition of *Who's Who*, published in 16 regional volumes, features nearly 725,000 students or just over 5% of the nation's 12,000,000 high school students. They represent approximately 15,000 of the 22,000 public, private and parochial high schools in the country.

Who's Who students also compete for \$125,000 in scholarship awards and participate in the publi-

cation's annual opinion poll of teen attitudes. The books is distributed to up to 15,000 high schools, colleges, universities and public libraries throughout the country.

Locals' Grandson Big Part Of Panther Creek's Success

According to a recent article by Bill Hart in the Abilene Reporter News, Panther Creek High School coaches say Todd Harris is the toughest player on the team.

The running back receiver played most of last year with a separated shoulder after a player fell on him in a workout two weeks before the season opener last year. He sat out the game with Cherokee, Panther Creek's last loss.

Todd said, "The doctors wanted to do surgery, but I wanted to wait until after the season because they

told me it wouldn't get any worse. Everyone has to play with a little pain, but when it got real bad, the coach would pull me out. I think I re-injured it just before halftime of the state championship game with Fort Hancock; something happened because I was in a lot of pain. But not enough to not play that day."

Todd, who is the grandson of local residents, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Pittard and son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Harris of Fisk (Mrs. Harris will be

remembered here as the former Geneva Pittard), injured a hand several weeks ago, thinking at first it might be broken. The hand got caught between two teammate's

helmets. But it hasn't kept him from blocking, catching passes or running on rare occasions.

Last week in the Panthers' state playoff semifinal win against Guthrie, Todd caught two passes for 16 yards, in spite of his injuries. He will be ready to go again this

week when Panther Creek meets Dell City at 3:00 Saturday in Big Spring in the Six-Man state championship game.

The Panthers go into the game sporting a 14-0 record while Dell City has a 13-0 record. Panther Creek is seeking its second straight state championship. They beat out

Fort Hancock last year for the championship title.

Harris, now a senior at Panther Creek, had surgery a week after the

state championship game. It knocked him out of basketball, but with a lot of rigorous rehabilitation, he was able to pole vault last spring and qualified for the Class A state meet where he finished fourth. He was third as a sophomore.

He carries on a family tradition by riding bulls at rodeos when not competing in school sports, following in the steps of his father, brothers and cousins and has some

rodeo wins to his credit.

But most of his wins are on the football field. This year, he's caught 26 passes for 452 yards, has kicked 7 extra points and has rushed seven times for 38 yards and a touchdown.

His blocks have allowed Chad Humphries to collect 2,951 yards this year. The Panthers will be

playing without Humphries this week. He was injured in last weeks game. But Todd will be there, tough as ever.

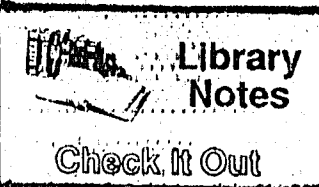
Clarence Laws

Senator Bill Sims Announces For Re-election

PAINT ROCK—Senator Bill Sims (D-Paint Rock) has announced his candidacy for Texas Senate District 24 on the steps of the Coke County Courthouse in Robert Lee.

Sims chose the location because Coke County is one of two counties he has represented his entire time in the Texas Legislature, Menard County being the other. He has served in the Texas Senate since 1983 and was voted President Pro Tempore of the Texas Senate in 1992.

"The people of the 24th District, particularly those involved with agriculture, face many new challenges as the role of the federal government changes and trade with Mexico grows more important," Sims said. "They need strong, experienced leadership in state government. I can continue to provide that leadership."

As chairman of the Natural Resources Committee and a member of the Finance and Criminal Justice committees, Sims plays a key role in shaping policies that affect the 24th District, Texas and the nation.

In addition to his positions on standing committees of the Texas Senate, Sims serves the state on a number of boards, including the Texas Energy Council, the Edwards Aquifer Oversight Committee, and the Southern State Energy Board. He also is co-chairman of the Joint Interim Committee on Storage Tanks and serves as director of the High Plains Research Foundation. He has been executive secretary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association and the Texas Wool and Mohair Warehouse Association since 1966.

Sims is a native of Paint Rock. He attend San Angelo Junior College (today's Angelo State University) and graduated from Texas Tech with a degree in Animal

Husbandry. Texas Tech honored Sims with the Gerald W. Thomas Award for Outstanding Agriculturists in 1984 and the Distinguished Alumnus Award for the Texas Tech College of Agricultural Sciences in 1991.

District Court Hears Cases For Disposition And Arraignment

District Attorney Ross L. Jones presented the following cases to Judge Jesse Holloway on Thursday, Nov. 18, 1993:

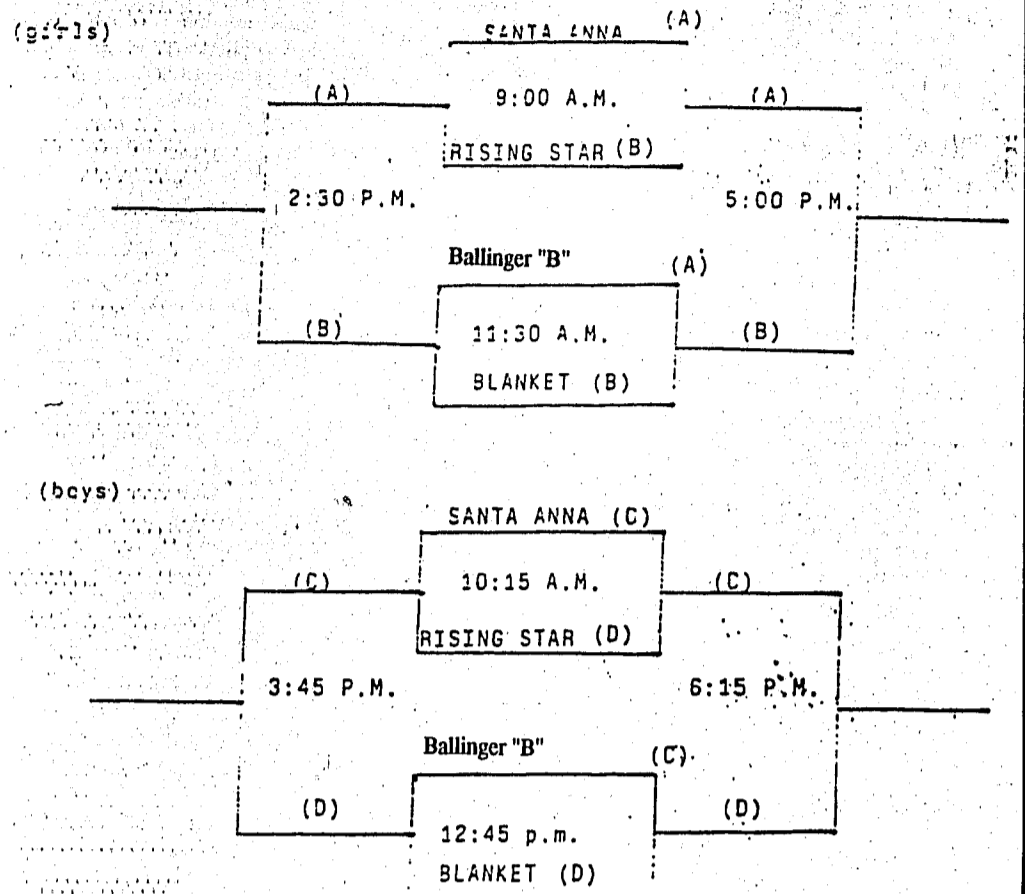

AUSTIN — An opinion regarding the conduct of state officeholders rendered by the Texas Ethics Commission last week was hailed by U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison's staff but downplayed by the Travis County District Attorney's Office.

Reacting publicly first, attorney Michael Tigar interpreted the Ethics Commission opinion as favorable to Hutchison, his client, who is under investigation by a Travis County grand jury for the alleged misuse of state employees and equipment for personal and political purposes while serving as state treasurer between 1990 and 1993 and for allegedly destroying state records in an attempted cover-up.

But Steve McCleery, first assistant district attorney, said the allegations "go way beyond the kind of conduct permitted" under the opinion and that the opinion would not damage the grand jury investigation or affect the prosecution's case against the senator. And John Steiner, executive director of the Ethics Commission, said Hutchison's attorneys had misread the opinion.

Hutchison spokesman David Beck

with rejected McCleery's remarks and maintained that the opinion undermines the prosecution's case.

The opinion concludes that in some cases, an elected official may have employees keep track of political and personal appointments as part of a daily schedule, according to a breaking story in the Dallas Morning News. Also, the opinion said that in some cases, employees may work on state time and use state equipment to handle financial contributions to a politician's officeholder account.

Commenting on the opinion, Tigar was quoted as saying, "It means if a state elected official

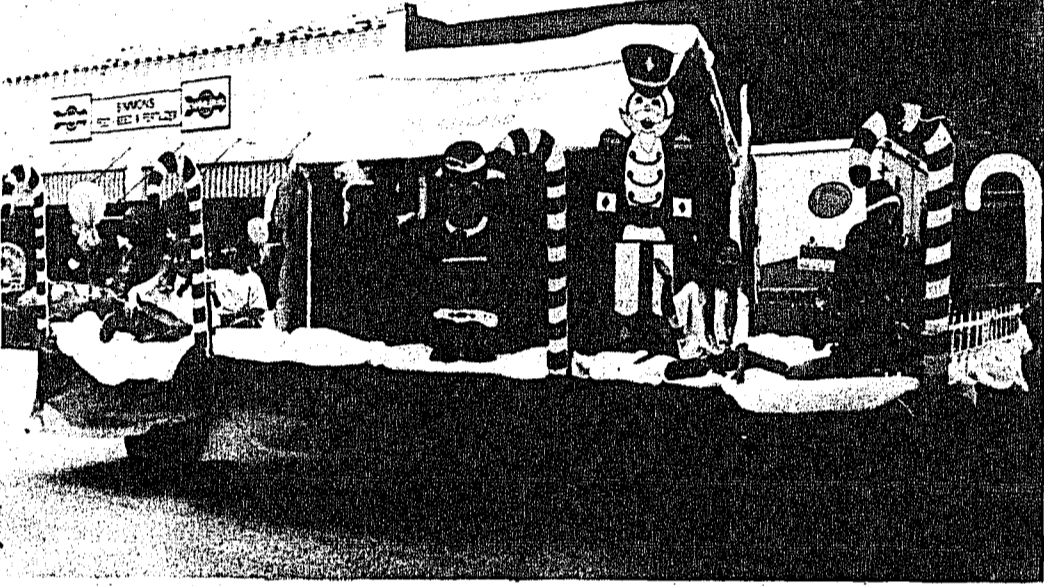

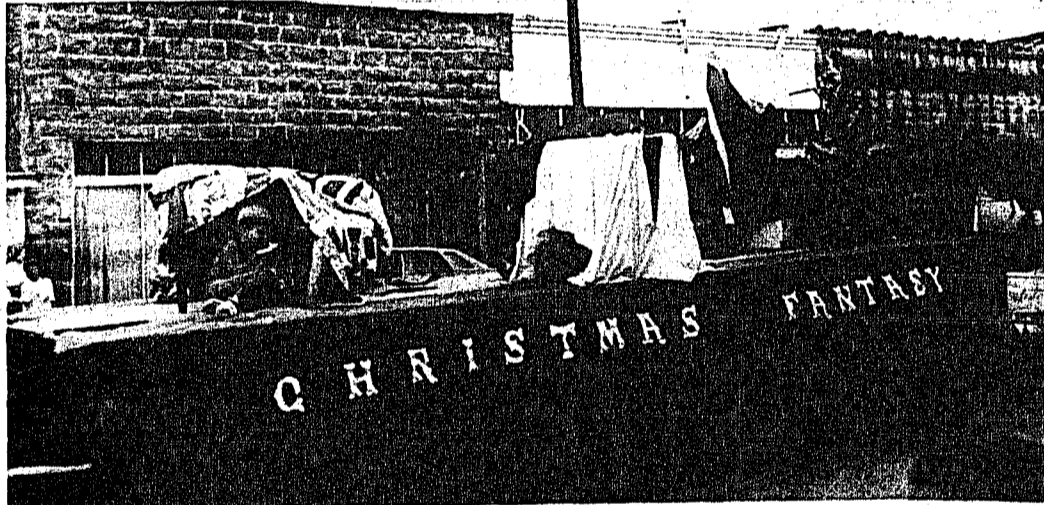
