Filing Ends For March Primaries, Seven On Ballot For Co. Judge Turner Draws Opponent At Last Minute

With the filing deadline for the Freeman and Kay LeMay, both Democratic and Republic Primaries Democrats; ending Monday, January 3 a number of persons tossed their hats into Thompson (incumbent): the ring for an office.

EDUCATION FOR A WORLD WHERE MINORITIES HAVE DISAPPEARED

Minorities? Census experts say they are changing rapidly in Texas, and educators are concerned with how to prepare students to face a risk youths to complete high world that will look very different school and further their education. from today's.

Demographers predict that shortly after the new century arrives, Texas will become the third state---joining Hawaii and California---to have a population in which there is no racial or ethnic majority.

Census Bureau projections show why. Hispanics in Texas are increasing faster than the state's overall population. African-American and Asian populations are also continuing to grow: Minority students already are in the majority in many public schools, and their numbers are increasing.

What does this mean for the future of Texas colleges and universi-

"The state will be increasingly dependent on today's minorities to provide the backbone of the work force," says President William Mobley of Texas A&M University. "The work force and the leaders who will set the pace for progress and prosperity must be significantly better prepared than their counterparts today."

This means that education is the key, he says. And Texas colleges and universities, both public and private, already are taking steps to broaden the opportunities of young people from various racial and ethnic backgrounds.

Texas A&M is one of the leaders of this movement. For years, it has sponsored a variety of outreach programs designed to encourage at-It presently enrolls more than 6,000 minority students.

The University of Texas System has won national recognition for its efforts. A recent survey found that UT leads the nation in the number of degrees awarded to Hispanics in medicine, education, engineering and life and physical sciences.

UT schools also are among the nation's leading institutions in awarding undergraduate degrees to Hispanics, Blacks and Asian-Americans in other fields.

The University of Texas Pan American in Edingburg, where minorities account for 87 percent of the student body, is the national leader in training Hispanics as future educators. UT El Paso ranks second nationally in awarding degrees in education to Hispanics, UT Brownsville is seventh, UT Austin is 11th and UT San Antonio is 13th.

Enrollments are expected to increase in the decade ahead. Last year, minorities accounted for ALL of the enrollment growth in Texas public universities as the number of white, Anglo students continued showing a slow decline.

Private schools also expect mi-

nority enrollment to spiral. Texas Christian University at Fort Worth will spend \$750,000 over the next five years to entice them to its campus. TCU's student body is 20 percent minority.

The University of Houston, which has had an African-American Studies Program for a quarter of a century, is expanding the program with a grant of \$532,000 from the National Endowment for the Humanities. Houston has committed to quadruple the grant and raise an additional \$4.5 million from other sources.

'Cedar Fever' Attacks Part Of **Texas Winter**

According to allergy specialists, Texas is not unique in its number of natural irritants for allergy suffers. However, the fact that people in other states suffer from itchy eyes, runny noses, sneezing, headaches, general fatigue and other lergic Texan's outlook.

For many Texans, one of the most miserable seasons of the year the first frost, "cedan fever" will de-

Cedar fever is an allergic reaction is actually two species of juniper, shrubs release pollen from mid-November to mid-March.

Dennis Perrotta, chief of the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Bureau of Epidemiology, said that cedar fever is second only to ragweed allergy in the number of Texans it affects. "The severity of cedar allergy may be greater in individuals than is ragweed allergy," he said. "Even people able to resist other allergies may suffer from cedar fever. Also, the severity of their reactions may vary from year to vear."

For people with numerous allergies, cedar fever may compound earlier reactions to ragweed and fall elm pollen in November, and be further aggravated by oak, elm, pecan and other pollens in March. In addition, humidity at any time can increase the number of mold spores--another allergen--in the air.

"People in the midst of a pollen allergy attack may wonder about its seriousness. If there is any consolation for them, it is that while most reactions are uncomfortable, they are temporary. Relatively mild cases may be controlled with over-the-counter antihistamines, Perrotta said.

Perrotta added, however, that anyone with severe or persistent symptoms should consult a physician. He said that prolonged irritation of the sinuses or throat can predispose a person to infections, or may be signs of another illness. Also, anyone with a history of recurrent respiratory disease may need to seek treatment by an allergy spe-



Boll Weevil Eradication Community Meeting In Coleman Jan. 12




Ambrose Hall and January 13 at 8 a.m. in Rowena's O.D.H.S. Hall.
