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Santa Fe To Increase Speed

Santa Anna Mayor Gale Brock has received a letter from Santa Fe Railway Company informing her it has conducted a survey of local ordinances governing train operations.

The letter states they have ascertained "there are innumerable ordinances which restrict ability to operate a safe and efficient transportation service. The ordinances are outdated, given modern train operating practices and upgraded crossing warning devices at many locations." In revising the Santa Fe train operating practices they plan to increase train speeds through Santa Anna and other area towns.

The letter says a comprehensive study of the effect of federal regulations of the Federal Railroad Administration on local speed ordinances has been conducted by the North Central Texas Council of Governments. It notes that slower doesn't mean safer, as slow train speeds often encourage motorists to "beat" the train. Stopping distances for trains at any speed are such that slower speeds add little to the margin of safety for avoiding careless motorists or pedestrians.

Comanche Women: Power And Influence

The roles of these Comanche women have been overlooked and/or their contributions minimized by the accepted sources of information on Comanches and Comanche history. Over the next few months some of their stories will be partially told. Much more research is needed to present accounts which adequately address this important aspect of Comanche ethnohistory.

A letter to Sam Houston, dictated by Comanche Chief Mopechucop (Old Owl), will be presented first. This letter is intended to establish a Comanche context for this subject and set the tone for this series of articles.

Letter from Mopechucop, Comanche Chief, to Sam Houston March 21, 1844

you thanked us verry (sic) much for the way we treated your commissioners last year and wished to see us to thank us again but you have returned that fore fold by the way you have treated this old woman that has been to see you; her story of you and your people and the way she was treated makes my heart glad to think you would notice her; and at the same time makes me mad at my self and people to think that such an old woman should go so far to make peace for her tribe when there (sic) is plenty of young men doing nothing; her talk is all good and I know every word of it is true. I thank you for the little girl you sent home by the old woman; she got home safe to her people to the arms of her mother her father is dead.

Daughter Of SA Native Chosen Governor-Elect Of Rotary District

Janet Woodward Holland of Mineral Wells, the daughter of Santa Anna natives, has recently been chosen governor-elect of Rotary International District 5790. This is the first year in Rotary history that women can serve beyond the local level, and at this time, only an Ann Arbor, Michigan woman has been elected to a district governorship.


Rotary International was organized in 1905 for business and professional men and is the oldest service organization in the world. It did not officially welcome women into its membership until 1987. This is the first year that women may hold district offices as any member must be active in their local club seven years before being considered for the district post.

Ms. Holland will serve as governor-elect during 1994 and assume the duties of governor in July 1995. District 5790 includes 64 clubs in

an area from Arlington, north to the Red River, west to Wichita Falls, and south to Abilene. As governor-elect, she will be planning conventions and other meetings and preparing for the leaderships role of the district. She is only the second district governor chosen from Mineral Wells in the local club's 76-year history.

Holland's father, the late W. Lee Woodward, also served as a district governor while living in Alva, Okla., so Rotary work has been a long-time interest. She ended a term as local president last year and has held other offices, including an international committee post.

In addition to ranching interests with her husband, Mike Holland, Janet owns and manages the True Value Hardware Store in Mineral Wells. The couple are parents of two grown children. Her mother will also be remembered here as the late Merle Kingsbery Woodward.



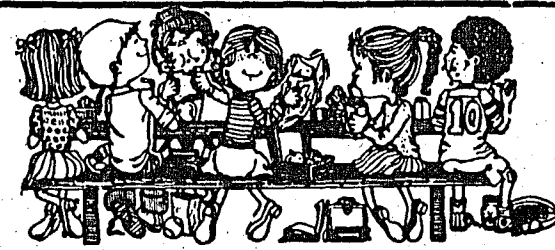

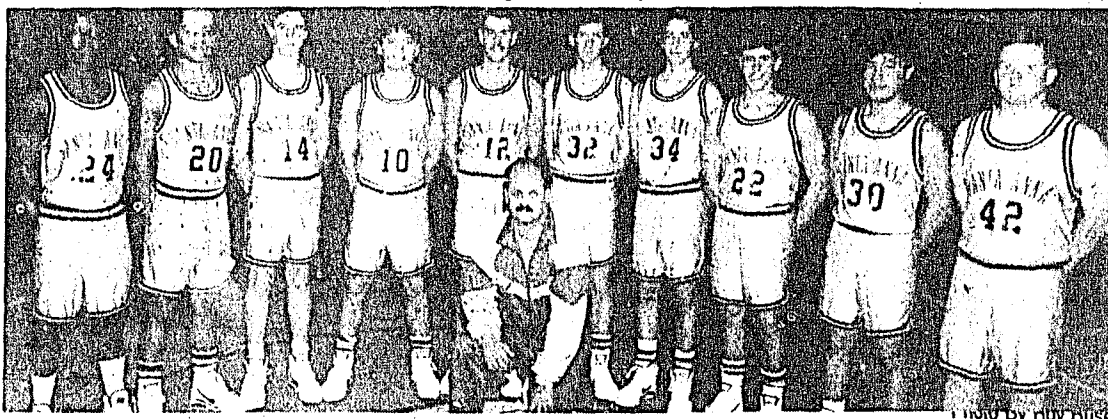

Plan to keep more of your money in your pockets in 1994. Here are a few resolutions to get you started.
*Shop for the best interest rate for credit cards. The credit card market is very competitive now. You can pay less interest on your credit card balance if you shop around. Your own financial institu-

tion may offer lower rates but may not be publicizing the fact. Ask your credit union or alumni association if it offers a credit card. Look not only for lower interest rates, but also check for low or no annual fees.
