Glen Donham, a senior at Santa Anna High School has been named one of the three 1994 DAR Good Citizens.

Donham, Ben Rudolph of Coleman and Amy Scarborough of Panther Creek have been named winners of the local DAR 1994 Good Citizens Program and Scholarship Contest. The winners were announced by the Captain William Buckner Chapter of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution.

The Good Citizens program is open to all senior students enrolled in accredited public or private secondary schools or secondary schools which are in good standing with the State Board of Education. All high schools in Coleman County were invited to participate in the program and nominate a senior student from their school.

Students selected exhibited the following four qualities as required by the DAR: Dependability (which includes truthfulness, loyalty, punctuality), Service (which includes cooperation, courtesy, consideration of others), Leadership (which includes personality, self-control, ability to assume responsibility), and Patriotism (which includes unselfish interest in family, school, community and nation).

## County Fire Depts. Meet To Discuss Single Radio Frequency

Members of the fire departments in Coleman County met last Thursday to discuss progress of installing a single frequency radio system for use by all fire departments in the county.

Marty Donham of the Santa Anna Fire Department and Joe Watson of the Coleman Fire Department reported to the group which began the planning for the radio system five years ago.

Donham and Watson reported that the cost of the equipment and installing a repeater-type system on the Santa Anna Mountain would cost each fire department \$500.00 with some of the money going to maintenance.

Bill McCrary, Commissioner of Precinct Two, is seeking help for the Santa Anna rural area, and those available for the project may contact him or be at the meeting in Coleman.

McCrary said that the volunteers can have flexible schedules, but that the work will probably start within a short time after the February 17 meeting and be completed as quickly as possible.

### Perry Warns Against Overregulation, Calls For Cooperative Solutions

NACOGDOCHES—Calling farmers and ranchers the original environmentalists, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry recently warned against a growing burden of overregulation threatening private property rights and pitting agriculture against government. He spoke to the Nacogdoches County Extension Program Council.

Perry said rural landowners must be involved in helping government find environmental solutions that neither infringe on property rights nor saddle producers with devastating costs.

"Instead of bludgeoning those who feed us, government must take a cooperative, incentive-based stance on working with agriculture to protect natural resources," Perry said.

Perry cited the Endangered Species Act as one example of legislation that restricts property rights and ignores private solutions to wildlife preservation. For generations, "good land management practices have provided viable habitats for many endangered species," he said.

While recognizing the need for some government regulations, Perry said overregulation has become so extreme many producers don't even know how to comply with the law. Others have to hire someone to do increasing amounts of government paperwork.

He said the Texas Department of Agriculture wants to work with producers and not against them—for example, by making compliance with pesticide laws clearer and easier. TDA staff will also rewrite

state Right-to-Know regulations to mirror new federal Worker Protection Standards as much as possible.

TDA regulations are not the only ones that must be simplified, Perry said. Air- and water-control regulations that threaten to put producers and agricultural industries out of business, must also be rewritten.

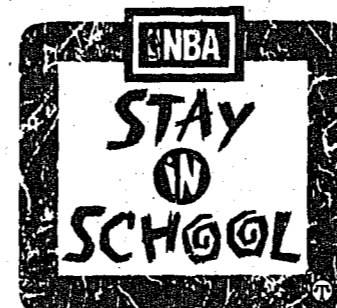

"The Texas Farm Bureau, with more than 293,000 member families, is influential in both state and national affairs on behalf of agriculture," the proclamation reads.

He said the Farm Bureau is a general farm organization that seeks to improve income and living conditions of farm and ranch families. It represents the farmer and rancher at the local county courthouse in Austin and in the nation's capital, Washington, D. C.

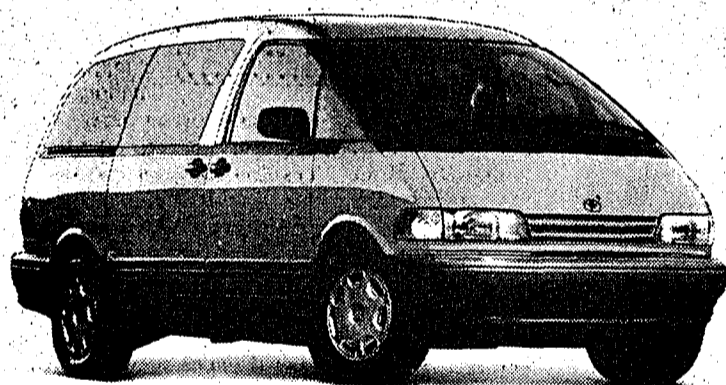
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
