Glen Donham, a senior at Santa Anna High School has been named one of the three 1994 DAR Good Citizens.

Donham, Ben Rudolph of Coleman and Amy Scarborough of Panther Creek have been named winners of the local DAR 1994 Good Citizens Program and Scholarship Contest. The winners were announced by the Captain William Buckner Chapter of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution.


John Vance of Coleman is chairman of the membership committee which is responsible for membership acquisition and maintenance. Other committee members are Mike Calk and Dick Jamison,


