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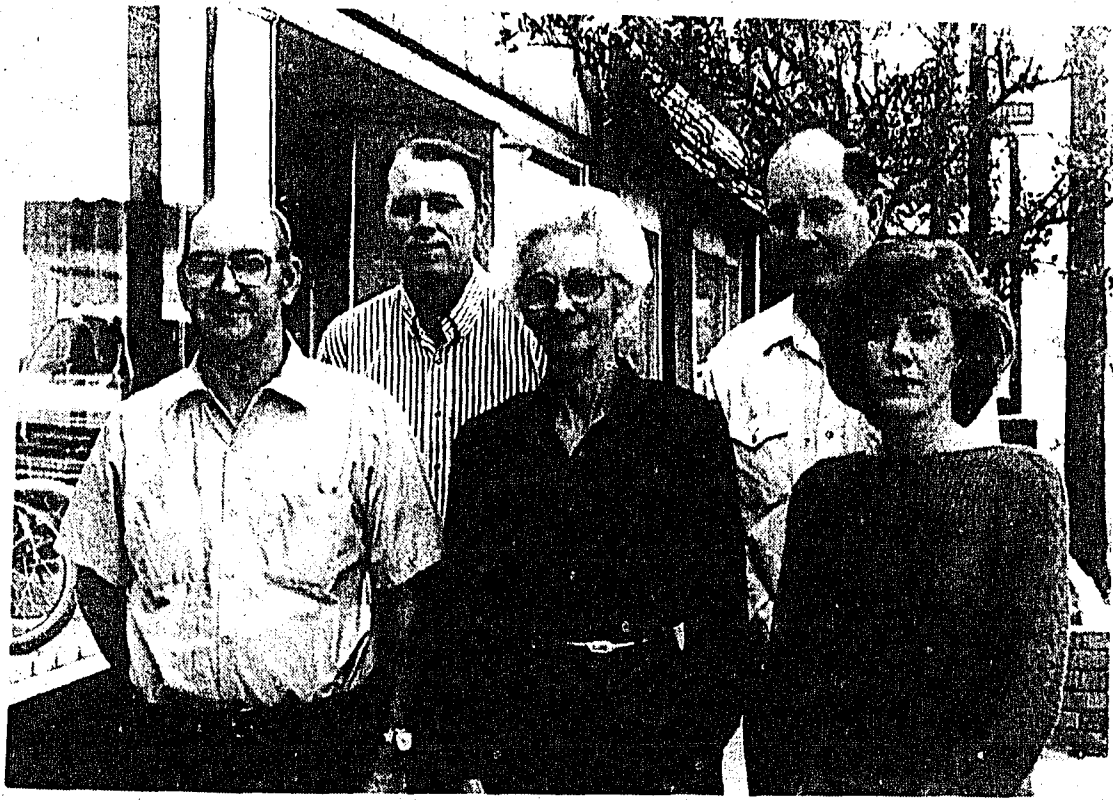

Comanche Women: Power and Influence

Tabbe Pête

This Comanche woman warrior/leader was documented by at least two historians. Thomas Kavanagh provided the following information in his dissertation:

Sometime in 1849 or 1850, Mexican officials in Chihuahua and other northern states, encountered another group of Comanches. The head of the group was said to be a woman called "Tabbe Pete". She was the "generaless and prophetess" of the Comanche. Together with her two grandsons "Tabetoi", and "Mague", and other relatives they began a series of varied relationships with the states of Northern Mexico.

It was also reported that the "old woman", Tabbe Pete, was 112 years old in 1851. (Even if this age was exaggerated it certainly makes the point that she was very old.) Kavanagh concluded by reporting that Tabbe Pete and over one hundred Comanches were killed by Mexican forces in a battle at the spring of Espiritu Santu in southern Chihuahua on February 13, 1854.

Tabbe Pete was also documented by Raht in a history he compiled of the Davis Mountains and the Big Bend country. He reported Tabbe Pete was the mother of Tave Tuk, also called Bajo el Sol, a Comanche war chief distinguished mostly for indomitable courage. Raht reported:

His mother, old Tave Pete, was a kind of female shaman in her tribe. She was old—so old, the time-honored Mexicans said, that when she rode on the forays, she tied up her lower jaw by a thong passing up over her head, in order to prevent it dropping down against her throat and breast, as it otherwise would have done; yet she had great influence with her people. An old Mexican, who formerly told the story of the prowess of Bajo el Sol, said that he listened to Tave Pete once deliver her orders to her people from the belfry in the church at the old presidio of San Carlos; and that immediately after her harangue, the Indians hastily packed, mounted their horses and took their way to the hills.

Local People Encouraged To Sponsor Funtier Food & Games

In keeping with the Chamber of Commerce policy for this year's Funtier Days celebration, only local people will have food and game booths. In years past, food vendors have come from out of town and any money made went right back out of town.

In an effort to help local non-profit organizations, the Chamber has set up the new policy.

The group wants to limit most food sales to snacks and drinks in order to encourage Funtier visitors to purchase the buffalo sandwiches that will be available after the judging of the Buffalo Cook-off. According to a report received by the NEWS, the Fire Department

will sell their famous hamburgers and the Guadeloupe Society will sell their delicious Mexican food specialties. Other food sales will be limited to snacks and drinks. It is suggested that those organizations sponsoring fun and game booths might sell drinks and snacks from their locations.

Local non-profit organizations will not be charged for game booth spaces which will be set up in Gary James Memorial Park. The Armory and surrounding area will be reserved for arts and craft booths for which there will be a charge.

Oil Recycling Center Becomes Reality Next Week

February 28, 1994 marks the kick-off of our Do-It-Yourself Used Oil Recycling Program in Santa Anna.

According to information from Scott Patterson, an official with

West Central Texas Council of Governments, the used oil recycling program, initiated by the WCTCOG in coordination with local officials and financed by the Texas Natural Resource

Conservation Commission, will be the first of its kind staged in West Texas.

City and WCTCOG officials will mark the opening of a local collection site at the City Yard at 3:30 p.m. Monday.

The objectives of the program are to educate do-it-yourself oil changers of the importance of

keeping their used oil out of storm drains, household refuse, and ground water; to provide environmentally sound collection area; and to recycle a valuable resource.

Instructions for use of the containers to be placed at the site are as follows:

What is acceptable? Engine oil, gear oil, hydraulic fluid, transmission fluid, rear end oil.

What is not acceptable? Oil filters, anti-freeze, brake fluid, contaminated oil, gasoline, grease, pesticide/fertilizer.

The WCTCOG has established a network of 33 collection centers for used oil recycling in its nineteen county region. These collection sites can be identified by the 465 gallon tank and numerous posters and signs. They will be publicized area wide with multi-media advertising.

The local oil recycling center at the City Yard will be open 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. each Wednesday. The yard is located at the corner of North Santa Fe and 3rd Street.

Volunteers Canvassing Area For 911 Information

Volunteers from all rural areas of the county met in the District Courtroom of the Courthouse last Thursday night with Conrad Buchanan, representing Jedco Design, Inc. of Clyde to begin the task of locating homes for 911 addressing.

Volunteers will be driving all county roads identifying residences whether lived in or vacant in coming weeks. They will also be visiting with residents gaining valuable information to be used for the 911 system in Coleman County.

Jedco will take the completed information and computerize it for use by 911 dispatchers in directing ambulances, fire trucks and law enforcement personnel to rural areas of the county when they are needed.

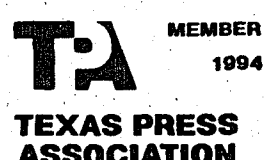

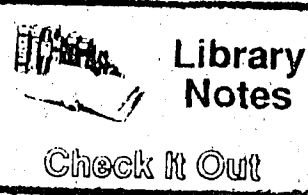
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Check It Out

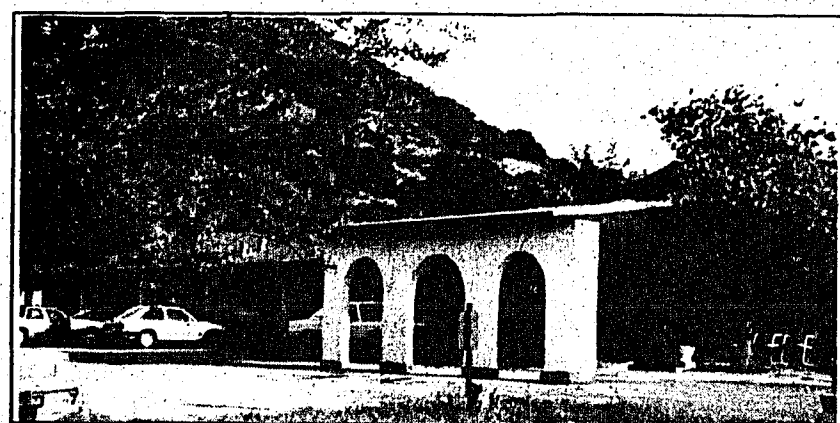
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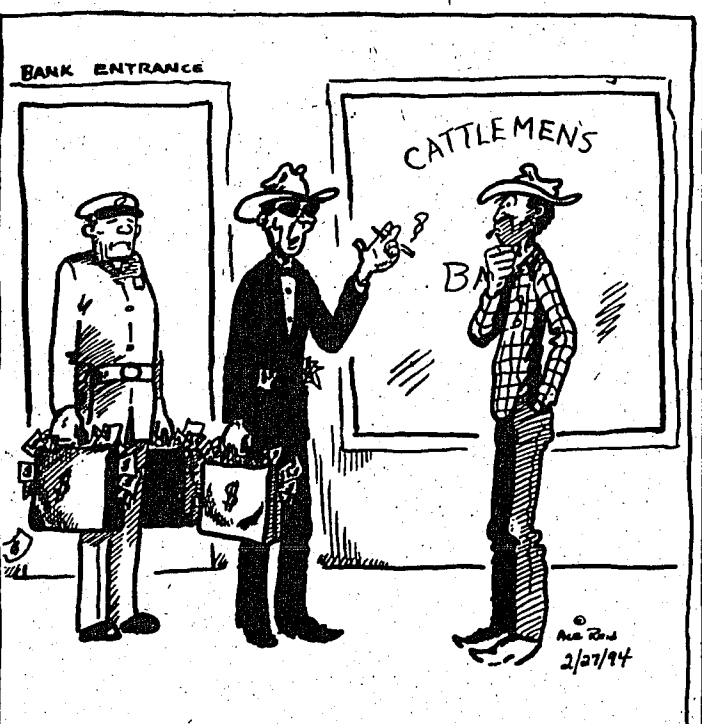

Suzan Daniel will be part of an eight member team that will be in Lubbock Feb. 28 and March 1 to make a presentation to educators from Texas Tech University as well as superintendents and principals from across Texas.

Daniel will present information on how she is utilizing technology in her classroom. Included in her presentation will be how she uses computers to teach her students problem solving skills. Also, she

will discuss the use of laser technology to teach science. Other information she will present will be the use of a computer scanner to improve the quality of creative writing as well as informative writing. She will also include how to use an L.C.D. projection panel to teach students basic computer skills and show how the panel can be a valuable teaching tool when the teacher has only one computer in the classroom. Finally, she will outline

how she uses computer technology to teach a tutorial program designed for students who did not master either the reading, writing or mathematics part of the state-mandated TAAS test.

Daniel is the technology coordinator at Coggin Elementary in Brownwood. She also teaches fifth grade. In addition, she is a teacher in a before school program for gifted and talented students as well as a teacher in an after-school TAAS remediation tutorial program.

Coggin Elementary is the recipient of a technology grant in cooperation with Howard Payne University. This grant was a result of the Brownwood I.S.D. agreeing

that Coggin would become a Professional Development School. In that capacity, selected Coggin teachers provide training for the education majors of Howard Payne University. This training encompasses more than the usual student teacher training. It provides first hand instruction to those entering the teaching profession on the elementary level. All of this training takes place before the student teacher is placed with a supervising teacher.

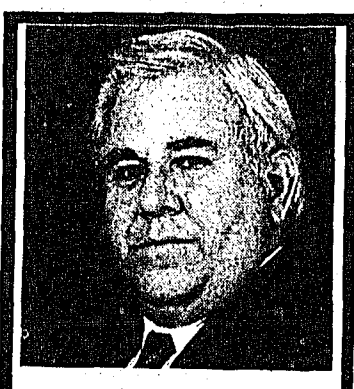

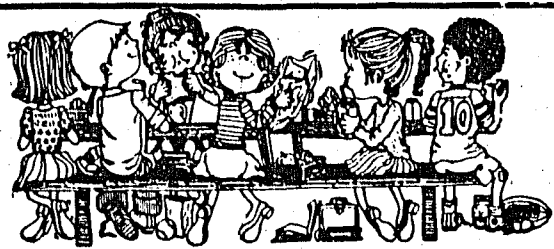

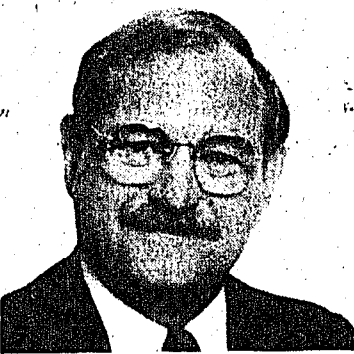

since that time.

The duties of the county treasurer as defined by the laws of the State of Texas are very complex. The responsibilities of this important office do not end with the mere receiving and disbursing of monies, but they extend to the exact accounting of these monies to you the taxpayers. When I was elected seventeen years ago, the county received and disbursed approximately \$650,000, and now the figure is approximately \$2,500,000. Each month I prepare a financial report for commissioners' court, and a quarterly report is published in the newspaper for you the taxpayers. When I was elected county treasurer in 1976, I began to keep all the county funds invested in a savings account and by doing so, there has been \$478,000 earned in interest since that time. This amount is \$213,000 more than the cost to operate the county treasurer office for the same period of time.

Other than being a keeper of the county funds, some other important duties to mention a few are a bi-weekly payroll for 52 employees, paying bills and jurors, and preparing quarterly reports.

If re-elected I will continue to perform all the duties of the office of county treasurer to the utmost of my ability.

Annual Angora Goat Performance Test Begins

The Annual Angora Goat Performance Test conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station begins February 25-28 with delivery of the animals to the station. The station's annual Angora Goat Performance Test Field Day is set for July 28. Other important dates include: shearing, March 7 or

8; weighing on test, March 9; weigh day, May 4, final weighing, June 29, and final shearing, June 30.

The goats will be tested using a special index that measures clean fleece, average daily gain, fiber length and fineness, face and neck cover, and breed character. Animals on the 112-day test may be entered singly or in sire groups. The bucks need not be registered, but sale or use prospects would be improved with registered animals. Each breeder is limited to no more than 12 animals, except with special permission. A four animal minimum is suggested but not required. A deposit of \$135.00 per animal to cover feed, shearing and laboratory work will be charged. Any unused funds will be returned to the consignor at the test's completion.
