#### Glen Copeland

Glen Copeland, 75, of Santa Anna died Thursday, Feb. 24, 1994 at 2:30 p.m. in the North Runnels' Hospital in Winters, Texas.

He was born Joe Glen Copeland to the late James J. and Ola Davis Copeland on Sept. 9, 1918 in Coleman County, Texas. Glen was a lifetime resident of Santa Anna and graduated from the Santa Anna High School in 1936.

He was an Army veteran of World War II serving with the 36th Division. Glen married Udell Windham in Coleman on July 28, 1945 and they enjoyed 48 years of marriage.

He was a member of the Northside Church of Christ and a past Mayor of Santa Anna. He served as director of the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative for 31 years, was on the Coleman County Tax Appraisal Board, was a past board member and longtime treasurer of the Santa Anna Cemetery Association.

Mr. Copeland was employed with Chinese style macaroni, chinese the Santa Anna National Bank for 37 years where he served as a board member and cashier until his retirement. At the time of his death he was executive director of the Santa Anna Housing Authority.

Survivors include his wife, Udell Copeland of Santa Anna; two daughters, Dianne Sindt of Irving and Paula Blanton of Santa Anna; one son, Gordon Copeland of Virginia; one brother, Pete Copeland of Hogan Lake. Michigan; five grandchildren; and two step-grandchildren.

The Runaway Train

"Behold, how great a matter a little fire kindleth." James 3:6 The words of this text reminds me of a story I read sometime ago.

It was Friday, March 13, 1959 when it happened and it was in the middle of the afternoon at the Tumwater switchyards two miles south of Olympia, Washington. The switching crew uncoupled fifteen cars from the Locomotive and placed them on a siding for Olympia. The remainder of the cars were pulled into the Olympia Brewing Company yard. For some reason no one thought to set the hand brakes on the fifteen cars.

At about five forty-two p.m. the fifteen cars began to move. Soon nearly two million pounds of steel and wood were rolling down the track at a mile a minute, headed for the back of the Fourth Avenue Station.

At approximately 5:45 p.m. the runaway train crashed through the steel bumper guard at the end of the line. It tore through the concrete platform and into the brick wall of the station then charged through the station and out the opposite wall into the street. It plowed into the Sta-Well Health Store and came to rest in a tangled mass of brick, lumber and health-food

Some of the cars were slammed into other shops. Others overturned in the street. Behind the station still others lay in a jumbled mass of steel and wires. The railroad telegrapher was dead.

What a lot of damage was done within a few minutes-all because someone forget to put on the brakes. Even one small block beneath the wheels could have prevented the tragedy. One small mistake took the life of one man, wounded twenty others, and did thousands of dollars' worth of damage to at least eight buildings.

It only takes a little worm to spoil an apple. A small mistake may ruin a life. It only takes a little word to wreck a friendship. One match can set a forest on fire

"Never underrate the importance of little things. Little things supply the actual discipline of life. It is by them that the soul is trained that it may grow into the likeness of Christ, or bear the likeness of evil.' Messages to Young People, p. 202.

Little things are important. Therefore, let us watch the little things in our lives today.

The eyes of Texas--and the nation-are focused on an experiment in education going at the University of Texas of North Texas in Denton.

The state's fourth largest university has opened its doors to selected sophomores from high schools around the state. Those accepted get their tuition paid and emerge from UNT 24 months later with their high school diploma plus two years of college

This fall, 200 students--mostly 15 and 16 years old and with only two years of high school behind them--will be entering UNT. They will be making the jump from high school to college because each has done exceptionally well in mathematics and science.

Sending students to college at the end of their sophomore year in high school is an unusual experiment in education that began in 1988 when the Legislature, concerned with the low scores of high school students were math and science, created the Texas Academy of Mathematics and Science and charged it with solving the

Headquartered on the Denton campus, the TAMS program started with 88 students. Last year, it had 374 for the classes of 1993 and 1994. There will be 200 new students in the class of 1995 this fall.

Although the program is the only one of its kind in Texas and one of the few in the nation, most Texans are unaware of it. Dr. Richard Sinclair, the director, is not surprised.
